Turkey Prices Low This Year So Their Popularity Returns

RANGER, Nov. 28.—Turkeys are so cheap this year that many Ranger housewives, who ordinarily would buy chickens for the Thanksgiving table, are buying a gobbler for the first time in many years.

Wednesday, retail grocers and meat dealers were quoting turkeys to their trade at 25 cents a pound, dressed and 22 and 23 cents on foot. Chickens were being quoted at similar prices for dressed and live. Last year, turkeys sold for 45 cents, dressed.

The sale of chickens is correspondingly lower this season with the bigger market for turkeys in Ranger.

At one store, it was said that at least 200 turkeys would be sold. Sixty orders had been placed early this morning out of a shipment of 125 turkeys from the farm. There were 100 more turkeys on the farm supplying the house, of which a number are expected to be sold before tomorrow.

At another grocery, it was said that the preference for turkey this year was very decided among their customers.

The Thanksgiving trade among the grocery stores visited was as brisk as usual the day before the holiday.

TURKEY MARKET IN NEW YORK DEMORALIZED

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—The turkey market here yesterday was demoralized traders said. The unusual influx of fresh killed turkeys into New York in the last two weeks has caused wholesale prices to drop steadily.

The wholesale prices for some of the cheaper grades dropped as low as 20 cents a pound and, "very fancy" birds, which a week ago brought 55 cents, sold yesterday for 50 cents. Retail prices were from 10 to 30 cents a pound over the wholesale prices.

PROSECUTOR'S APPEAL GETS REVERSAL OF CASE

AUSTIN, Nov. 28.—For a second time this term of court, the court of criminal appeals today granted a rehearing in a case, where an attempt was made to influence members of an organization was advanced.

The court today granted a rehearing to Earl Tucker of Harrison county on the grounds that the prosecuting attorney appealed to the jury to be true to the doctrine of any plan to which they might belong.

In granting the rehearing the court said: "An appeal to any members of the jury who for any reason, real or fancied, might have believed that any criminal laws are not being enforced as they should be, can not be sanctioned by this court."

THIEVES BREAK INTO HUB CITY GARAGE

RANGER, Nov. 28.—Thieves last night broke into the Hub City garage, which was closed recently, and carried off a number of things. A description of the articles stolen could not be given until the manager checked up. The place was not visited until almost noon today and, when it was discovered that the building had been entered, the police were notified.

The thieves pried the lock off a rear door, Police Chief O. V. Davenport said after investigating. He gave it as his belief that the "job" was done by boys. Finger prints were found on a window and a finger expert has been called in, Davenport said.

The garage has been closed pending the settlement of claims held by creditors.

CONFESSIONS CLEARING UP WORK OF HIGHWAYMEN

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—District Attorney Dodd announced today that the Diamond brothers, Maurice and Joseph, have made a complete confession of the holdup and murder of two bank messengers in Brooklyn on Nov. 14. Both men denied that they fired the shots and named two gunmen who they alleged did.

Maurice asserted his brother was innocent of the shooting.

Anthony Pantano, arrested today as the "tipoff" in the case agreed to make a complete confession of his part, Dodd said.

JAMES WILKINS, PIONEER BANKER, DIES IN OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 28.—James Wilkins, 64, pioneer banker, died here today after an illness of several weeks. He was a former member of the board of regents of the state university and prominent in state lodge circles. He formerly lived in Brenham, Tex., and later was associated with a bank at Colorado, Texas.

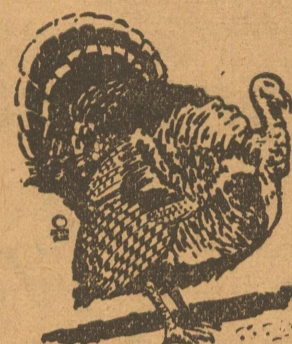

FIFTEEN-YEAR-OLD MOTHER BEING RESTORED TO HEALTH

HOUSTON, Nov. 28.—Mrs. G. W. Rogers, 15-year-old mother of little Marie, the one-pound baby who for 20 days made a hard fight for life, was thankful today that she would soon be able to return to her home. Just convalescing from an attack of typhoid pneumonia, it was feared that grief over her baby's death would prove fatal, but physicians today said she had begun to improve and soon should be quite well.

CATTLE AND HORSES MUST BE KEPT IN OR WILL BE IMPOUNDED

RANGER, Nov. 28.—Complaints of cattle and horses being allowed to run loose in the city, damaging shade trees and shrubbery, were lodged with the Ranger city commission yesterday. B. F. Bennett, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, said that personal complaints were registered at the chamber's office by property owners and residents. "The damage cows do is discouraging people from putting out shade trees," he said.

The complaints resulted in the authorization of the employment of a special man to do pound duty at nights for a period of two weeks. He will work whenever stray cows or horses become a menace to lawns and trees. A motion to this effect was offered by Raymond Teal, following the statement by Colonel Brashier that he believed some persons were turning their cattle loose at nights. Mayor Hodges said that this was a custom in the spring and fall among some folks about the city.

Bennett said that he had no criticism to make of Wade Swift's efforts in this direction, but he believed the fault was in the small fine assessed against owners of stock taken to the pound.

DOMINANT PARTIES TO AVOID KLAN ISSUE IS FORECAST

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 28.—Both major political parties will denounce the Ku Klux Klan as an organization dangerous to the republic, Congressman Harry B. Hawes said here today. He predicted that both presidential candidates will renounce the organization.

"Every leader in the Democratic party, without exception has not failed upon the proper occasion to denounce in unmeasured terms any interference with the rights of conscience and religion," Hawes said.

Quakers Heading Movement To Feed Hungry German Tots

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 28.—Wilbur K. Thomas, secretary of the American Friends Service committee outlined here today the Quakers' plans for feeding millions of starving children in Germany this winter with the fund being raised throughout the United States by the American committee headed by General Henry T. Allen.

This will be the most extensive relief program ever undertaken by the American Quakers, who have distributed over \$12,000,000 worth of food in Germany since the armistice in addition to their work in France during the war and in Poland, Austria and Russia since then.

"Definite assurance has recently been received," Mr. Thomas said, "that both the German government and the German people will cooperate with us in every possible way. In addition to furnishing a substantial part of the foodstuffs the German government will meet all insurance, storage, transportation and other overhead charges. It is not generally known that the German government supplied all the sugar and fat, which amounted to 47 per cent of the total amount of food we distributed in Germany since the war."

A small staff of American Quakers will join those now in Germany within a few days to superintend the child-feeding, Henry T. Brown of Moorestown, N. J., will be in charge of the Quaker organization in Germany. The actual work of preparing and serving the one warm meal a day to the undernourished children will be done by German volunteers. This is the arrangement found most satisfactory during the winter of 1920-21 when 40,000 German civilians helped the Quakers feed a million children a day. Many more will be needed this winter.

DALLAS.—Structures of the Dallas Textile Mills are nearing completion and the mill will be ready for machinery in a few days. This is a million-dollar plant.

GRAND JURY WILL MEET NEXT MONDAY

EASTLAND, Nov. 28.—Considerable interest was manifested, Wednesday, in the personnel of the grand jury, as announced by Judge Davenport of the Ninety-first district court.

The inquisitors have been summoned for next Monday morning, Dec. 3, and it depended on the men selected as to who, if any, would have to leave Eastland for a while.

Liquor violators, gamblers and other "10 per cent Americans" always get nervous when a grand jury is announced.

The Eastland county jury commission appointed by Judge George L. Davenport to select a grand jury for the December term of the Ninety-first district court was composed of Frank Kirk of Gorman, Colonel Brashier of Ranger and Oscar Wilson of Eastland.

STREETS NEED REPAIRS BUT FUNDS SHORT

Delinquent Tax Payers Said to Be Most Solicitous for Work to Be Done

RANGER, Nov. 28.—"When anyone comes to me asking that his street be fixed up," said Street Commissioner Raymond Teal, "I'll ask him if he has paid up his taxes."

Teal was led to make this statement, following information from the city's tax department that some property owners of the city have been to the city hall, pleading that their streets be improved, but at the same time their names appeared on the city delinquent tax rolls.

One property owner, who had asked that "something be done" with the street in front of his house, has not paid any taxes in two years.

"We can't do anything for them if they won't give the city money to do it," Mayor R. H. Hodges commented.

"It is unfair not to work the street in front of property rented out," E. A. Ringold, special tax collector said when he was called in on a tax matter, "just because the owner won't pay his taxes, but you can't get by with the present tax rate and keep your street work costs up to the figure it is now."

The statement that street work costs must be brought down to keep within the city's budget as fixed to meet the expected income from taxes precipitated a lively discussion, in which all of the commissioners participated.

Street Commissioner Teal made a plea that the work now going on in different parts of town, with four teams in use, be allowed to go on. "I go out to these places complained of," he said. "And I'll tell you they don't exaggerate. Here there is a culvert washed out, there a drain blocked, and at other places deep ruts and roadways washed out."

"The Lions and Rotarians spent more than \$1,000 on the West Main street highway last spring and we've got to watch it after rains. Why, during these heavy rains, persons living at the street intersections in the Young addition, must leave their cars on Young street or Foch street, if they don't want their cars bogged."

It was indicated early in the discussion on street costs that the parking knife might be applied to the street department, as it has been wielded against other departments.

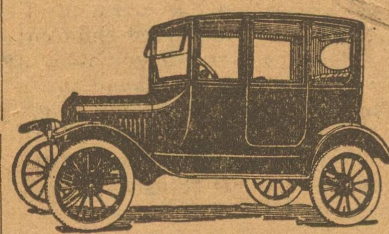

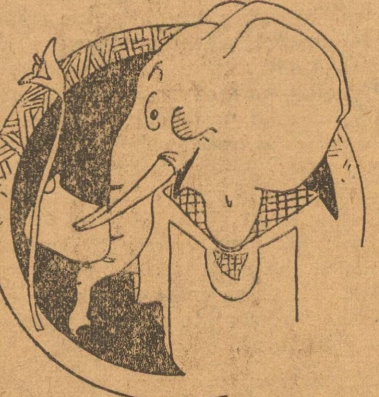

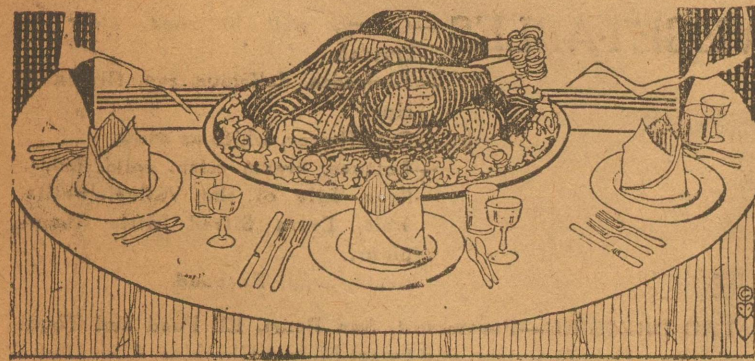
