Revolt Against Obregon's Candidate Starts in Vera Cruz; Claim It Is Widespread.

VERA CRUZ, Mexico., Dec. 7 .-General Guadalupe Sanchez, rebel leader, issued a proclamation today in which he says the Mexican insurrection was started to prevent President Obregon from dictating the election of General P. Elias Calles

as his successor in office. The proclamation says the federal administration is attempting to impose a successor to President Obregon upon the nation, consequently it has become the duty of supporters of Adolfo de la Huerta, liberal candilate, to protest against such action.

The revolt was started at the home of Geneal Sanchez, where a meeting was held last night, ending at midnight, following which a message was sent to Obregon announcing the rebellion. The rebels then proceeded to put their own men in charge f the principal offices of the port aking over the customs house, the nails and the telegraph. The governor of the state was deposed and Rodolfo Loyo named provisional

BALANCE OF POWER COUNTS It is not always the fleetest who wins the race or the strongest who MRS. BURNETT HONORED gains victory in battle. It is the AT TEACHERS' CONVENTION balance of power that counts. This may lie in generalship or, in contests between parties, it may attack to minorities which take on material strength when the dominant parties are nearly evenly divided.

This was clearly demonstrated at the opening of congress, when the other dominant party, the Demo-

In many elections the same bal ance of power is held by a small number of voters. There are some voters who will stick to their party even if the devil himself was the leader. There are many voters who will_support the party through thick and thin because it is their party they have no better reason frequent ly because they do not think fo themselves. These voters may al ways be relied upon to vote as the party directs, so it is not necessary to make any fight for or against and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. J. An-

But always there is a small group of independent voters who will no attach themselves irrevocably to any party. They may prefer one or the other, but principles count with their more than party and if the party of their preference does not do what they believe to be right they are likely to swing to another. If the dominant parties have nearly equa the balance of power. They mus

be reckoned with. Perhaps it was for the purpose o preventing the weaning away of in dependent voters that pledges were attached to many primary election ballots. This has availed little, how ever, and is likely to continue o little effect so long as the citizen clings to the right of mental res ervations, even to the extent of vio lating the law when the law does no accord with his views or wishes.

There is much to commend the independent voter even though his indifference to a pledge cannot 1, commended. Holding the balance of power, as they frequently do, the dominant parties must take then into consideration. Often they act as a restraining influence to pre vent the adoption of wrong princi ples; fear of the independent voter has induced many party leaders to throw their influence to candidates of a second choice because they know that in the exercise of the balance of power the independent vote would defeat the others.

It is essential, therefore, that the independent voters pay their pol taxes. They owe the money to their schools, but equally they owe a duty to their nation, their state and their community to exercise a check or dominant party leaders. Acherents of the dominant parties will pay their poll taxes; it is a part of their creed to do so. But the independent voter is likely to be careless. He does not always appreciate that he exercises a balance of power and may ever think his vote does not count. But it counts for much in the maintenance of good government; it counts for more than the regular party votes which offset each other.

So if you are an independent voter pay your poll tax and continue to hold the balance of power.


