## HAILSTORM, SHOWERS PROMISE RAINFALL

### Testimony In "Bandit Prince's" Trial Favors Chapman

#### RAINS AND HAIL AT CISCO BRING HOPE TO COUNTY

Precipitation Promising for Ranger and Vicinity

"How in the hell can the Old Folks tell 'Tain't gonna rain no mo'?"

At last Jupiter Pluvius, either weakening under the state-wide cussing so generously handed him for some time, or possibly with the determination to "heap coals of fire on the heads" of his vociferous critics, has turned on the life-giving fluid in many sections of the state, including Eastland county, and while Eastland, Cisco and that section have been more favored in the earlier precipitation, overhanging clouds promise the immediate vicinity of Ranger a portion, at least, of the recently promised gullywasher.

Just a two-minute shower lit into the dust of Ranger, giving a taste for more, which seemed forecast by the clouds that piled up last night and the damp breeze that blew. This morning dawned dull and gray and clouds prevailed through the morning, but by noon the sun began struggling to come out, though clouds low on the horizon, continue to hold out hope that heavy rainfall may arrive soon.

Eastland and Cisco had somewhat more rain Sunday afternoon. The rain at Cisco was preceded by a hail storm, following which showers came.

#### Ma and Jim' May Be Eastland Bar Members' Guests at Celebration

Members of the Eastland County Bar association will be invited to attend a banquet to be given at the Eastland Golf and Country club in Eastland within the next few weeks, possibly on April 21, San Jacinto day. A similar meeting, sponsored by the Eastland bar, was held last year on that date at Leon lake near Eastland and it was decided at that time to make the meeting an annual affair.

Eastland attorneys are also planning to celebrate the passage of the eleventh court of civil appeals bill and the locating of the court in Eastland, in connection with the annual San Jacinto day celebration. There is nothing definite yet regarding the plans for the meeting except that it is understood that Governor Miriam Ferguson and her husband, James E. Ferguson, are to be invited. Also the judges of the new court, which have not yet been appointed but doubtless will be by that time.

A few members of the Eastland bar held a meeting Saturday afternoon and discussed plans for the coming meeting, but nothing further than those mentioned above was given out for publication.

#### MOTHER EARTH ROCKING AGAIN

Tremors Felt From New York To Panama Canal

NEW YORK, March 30.—The seismograph at Fordham University recorded an earthquake Sunday afternoon. The instrument showed the earth movement started at 4:15 and reached the highest point at 4:33. The earthquake which rocked South America Sunday was predicted Saturday by Dr. Benadanti, the Italian scientist. His forecast of an earthquake in New York was borne out about a month ago. Benadanti predicted the earthquake in Japan two years ago.

PANAMA CANAL AFFECTED  
BALBOA, Canal Zone, March 30.—The water in the Panama canal was disturbed by an earthquake late Sunday. No damage was reported. The quake was the heaviest since 1913. The center of the disturbance was believed about 150 miles north of the canal.

#### Lubbock Negro Jailed

SLATON, March 30.—Dan Henderson, 30, negro, was placed in jail at Lubbock today for safe keeping, following a confession of assaulting Mrs. R. L. Henry Saturday night. Henderson told officers he struck the woman with a hammer when she awoke while he was pillaging her home.

#### BURKETT OFFERS ROAD STATEMENT

Highway Commissioner Replies to County Officials

Senator Joe Burkett, member of the state highway commission, gave out an interview this morning with reference to the \$150,000 offered by the highway commission to Eastland county to be spent on our highways.

Senator Burkett insists if the commissioners' court cannot or will not raise the money to match the amount offered by the highway commission, the county stands to lose much on roads that have been started but are yet incomplete, and that some of the roads, possibly the road from Cisco north over the Lake Cisco dam, will never be constructed if it isn't done at this time. He says:

Cisco Dam Road.  
"The failure of the commissioners' court to provide funds to match the money which can be secured from the highway department, in all probability, means that the road north from Cisco over Lake Cisco dam to the Shackelford county line on highway 23 will never be built. Callahan county is anxious for it to come from Moran to Putnam, a distance of about 15 miles. Shackelford county will have to build but about three miles to the line towards Putnam, with no bridges, while if the road comes to Cisco, Shackelford county will have to complete about nine miles, including two or three costly bridges. The Bankhead highway is already under construction through Callahan county, and sufficient funds will likely be left with which to match state and federal aid north from Putnam to the county line, and efforts are now being made to make highway 23 from Moran south to some point on the Bankhead a part of the federal aid system. If this effort is successful, then the federal department will furnish one-third, the state one-third and the county one-third of the money, and as Eastland county cannot, or will not, furnish its part and

#### MA' CONTINUES VETO MOVEMENT

District Attorneys, Courts Affected by Latest Act.

AUSTIN, March 30.—House bill by Norman B. Kitchell of Harris county which sought to increase the compensation of assistant district attorneys in counties having a population of 150,000, was vetoed today by the governor for the reason that "becoming a law it would work an unjust hardship upon the district attorneys of Tarrant, Dallas, Harris and Bexar counties."  
The governor also vetoed senate bill relating to the preparation of statements on appeal. The governor said that such a law would place an undue burden on the court of criminal appeals.  
Six bills have now been vetoed by the governor, the anti-pass bill during the session and five others since adjournment.

#### Cisco Candidates Grow In Numbers

CISCO, March 30.—J. M. Williamson will be a candidate for mayor to succeed himself and will be opposed by Eugene Lankford, at the municipal election to be held here Tuesday, April 7.  
L. H. McCrea and Origer Paschall will be candidates to succeed themselves as city commissioners, but E. J. Huey has entered the race for one of these places. The municipal ticket has been arranged and the official ballot ordered printed.  
Eight candidates are in the race for school trustee here, with four to be elected. Candidates may file up to the close of Wednesday, April 1, and others may enter. The eight candidates who have announced are: Mrs. J. D. Alexander, Mrs. A. J. Olson, Dr. E. L. Graham, William Reagan, R. A. Richardson, Dr. C. C. Jones, T. B. Smith and J. T. Berry.

#### STATE, DEFENSE GUARD GERM MURDER WITNESSES

CHICAGO, March 30.—Both sides in the alleged million dollar germ murder guarded their witnesses today in fear of tampering. Dr. C. C. Faiman, John C. Clarke and John Martindale, the three witnesses for the state, are being carefully guarded. William D. Shepherd, the defendant, is guarding Mrs. Luella Rinehart, former secretary of Dr. Faiman, who has evidence which will destroy the "confession" of the doctor, William Scott Stewart, chief defense attorney, holds.

#### COURT BLOCKS INSANE DODGE

"Jazz Baby" Matricide's Counsel Attempts Insanity Tests.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 30.—Possibility of Dorothy Ellingson, 16-year-old matricide, escaping a murder trial on the claim she is insane was temporarily blocked today. Judge Harold Louderback, presiding jurist, refused to allow the defense motion that Dorothy be given a hearing on the basis of an affidavit by Dr. Ball, University of California criminologist, declaring the girl mentally deranged.  
The court held it must be proven Dorothy's insanity is of such a nature that she is unable to understand the nature of the charge against her. Dr. Ball will be questioned at 2 o'clock today.

#### "Isn't It Too Bad," Woman Replies When Told Collier Lives

Ranger and Eastland folk, like every town in Northern and West Texas and Southern Oklahoma, were very much exercised Sunday afternoon over the persistent rumor that ex-Mayor Frank Collier had been killed in Wichita Falls by Mrs. Hattie Robertson, grief-stricken mother of the murdered boy, Elzie, for whose death Collier was last week given a three-year prison sentence.  
Telephonic communication with Wichita Falls police officers, however, proved the rumor unfounded and that Collier was going about, out on bail awaiting action on new trial or appeal, unimpaired.  
Probably the comment of one prominent Eastland county woman expressed the sentiment of a vast majority of those keeping this newspaper's phones busy answering those trying to confirm the rumor.  
When told that the rumor of Collier's death was without foundation, she replied: "Is that so; isn't it too bad?"

#### Former Air Chief to Resume Colony at San Antonio Quarters

NEW YORK, March 30.—Brig. Gen. William Mitchell, on expiration of his term as assistant chief of army air service, April 27, will be assigned as an air service officer of the staff of the eighth corps area at San Antonio, Texas, with the rank of colonel, Secretary of War Weeks said today.  
The definitely disposes of the Mitchell case for the time being, it is understood, as no immediate disciplinary action is now contemplated against Mitchell for his alleged insubordination in published criticisms of the war department.

#### Flames Again Damage Property of Former Victim of Fire Loss

Fire damaged the home of J. B. Ames, 911 Cypress street, early Sunday morning, and at 7 o'clock this morning he had eight carpenters at work re-roofing the building. He estimated his loss to house and furniture at about \$2,000, with no insurance, but said he would have the entire house re-roofed before night, so that if rain comes it can do no further damage. Within two days he expects to have all traces of the fire removed.  
The blaze was started by a child which dropped a lighted match into a waste basket on the rear porch. The flames were carried by a draft into the ceiling and within a few minutes the entire roof was on fire. The flames burned through the ceiling and burning brands dropped to the hardwood floors, but by that time the firemen had reached the scene and a deluge of water put out the blaze.  
Furniture on a rear sleeping porch was damaged by the blaze, but the expensive furniture in dining room, sleeping rooms and living room was removed by neighbors to a house across the street. Ames himself was not at home at the time, but returned about the time the fire had been put out. Within a few hours he had several men working with him removing traces of the fire from the house, mopping up the floors and getting everything ready for the workmen to begin rebuilding today.  
"Having no insurance I had no need to wait for the adjusters before tackling the job," said Mr. Ames, "but I wouldn't have waited anyway."

Mr. Ames has been a heavy fire loser during the last two years. He had a barn filled with feed burned on a Comanche county farm, and was a partner in the grocery firm of Dixon & Ames, burned out in the McCleskey hotel fire of last July.

#### Fourth Fire Visits One Residence Block in Cisco Home Place

CISCO, March 30.—Fire of unknown origin destroyed the home of Albert Willig, Texas company employe, in Mancill addition Saturday morning. The building, which is the fourth house in the block to be destroyed by fire within the past few months, was owned by the Texas company and valued at \$3,000, with \$2,000 insurance. The contents of the building were badly damaged and partially destroyed. They were protected by insurance.  
Lewis P. Kopp of Vernon, who has recently been appointed financial secretary of Randolph college, assumes his duties April 1.

Word has been received in Cisco of the death of Mrs. G. W. Gardenhire, who recently moved with her family to Temple near Cisco. She died last Thursday. Mr. and Mrs. Gardenhire had been residents of Cisco for the past five years, leaving here only a few weeks ago.

#### EVIDENCE TENDS TO FREE ROBBER IN MURDER CASE

Shrewd Underworld Leader is Calmly Directing Battle For His Life.

HARTFORD, Conn., March 30.—Both the defense and prosecution in the trial of Gerald Chapman, mail bandit, for the alleged murder of James Skelly of New Britain, Conn., called up reinforcements today. The state announced it would call Alfred E. Atwater, brother policeman of Skelly, who would testify he saw Chapman shoot Skelly. Word that 50 witnesses were under summons, all ready to give evidence against Chapman, was received.  
The defense said a physician would be produced who saw an automobile supposedly used by Chapman on the night of the killing and that it contained only one man and that man was not Chapman. The defense said that McGue of New Britain would testify that Skelly on his deathbed named a man other than Chapman as the murderer.  
It is thought this week will bring the climax of Chapman's trial. He spent much of Sunday in conference with his attorney. He smoked and read part of the day, showing no evidence of worry.

HARTFORD, March 30.—Gerald Chapman was named today by the only eye witness to the shooting of Policeman James Skelly of New Britain, Conn., as the man who did the killing. Policeman Alfred Atwater of New Britain was the witness. Atwater described going to the scene of the robbery, which preceded the shooting.  
"We went down the alley," he testified. "Skelly was behind me as we entered the building. I went in first and, as I did, that man over there," and Atwater pointed to Chapman who was seated hunched down in his chair with his eyes fixed on the witness, "pulled out his gun and fired three shots. He said, 'put up your hands or I'll shoot,' and then he shot."

#### POLICE PROBE DOUBLE DEATH

DALLAS, March 30.—Officers here today were investigating the death of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Anderson, found dead in their apartment just before noon. Anderson had died instantly from a revolver wound in the heart and two other wounds were on the body. Mrs. Anderson was lying across the bed, dead from a bullet wound in the head. An automatic revolver with four discharged shells was lying near the woman's hand. Both were in night attire.

#### 30 Miners Trapped

NEWCASTLE, Eng., March 30.—Thirty miners are believed trapped in the Montague colliery at Scotswood, which was suddenly flooded today. Rescuers aided 200 miners to escape. Thousands of persons have assembled at the mine head making police precautions necessary.

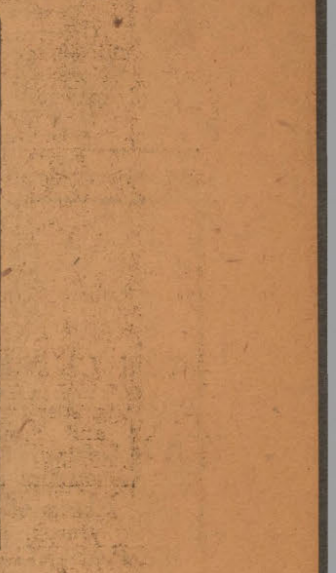
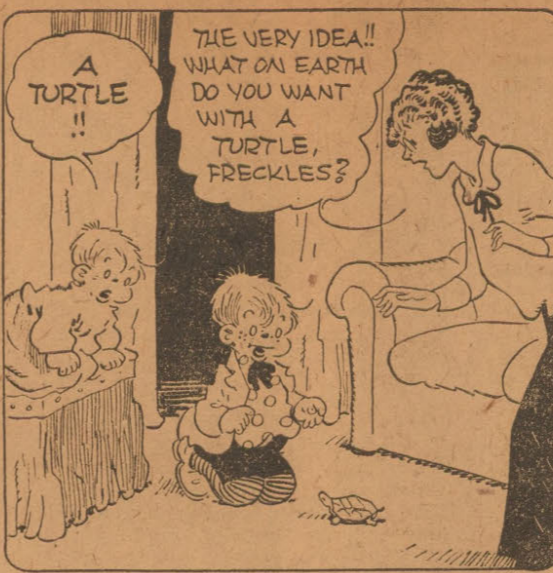

Tales of Two Towns—Kansas Dream Village; Story of Newest Bling, Avon

By United Press. KANSAS CITY, Kan.—Loring Place, "dream town," that never existed, soon will be vacated. The town that failed to materialize was conceived in 1908 by the Springfield, Mo., Marine bank, and is situated south of Bonner Springs, in this county. None knows why the town never developed. It is now a part of a farm owned by J. W. Kreider, who bought the site from an eastern bank and has asked the county commissioners to declare it vacated. Loring Place comprises seven acres and is divided into 23 lots, 50x130 feet in dimensions. It is bounded on the west by a country road called Bur avenue. John Bun was president of the bank when the plan was drawn. The northern boundary is Helme avenue. Dorwin avenue divides the "dream city" in halves and Ferguson avenue, also a country road, bounds the town on the south and west. Loring Place is devoid of houses

and according to records, no lots were ever sold. AMARILLO.—"Anton" is the Panhandle's newest town. Anton was conceived in the heart of the newest southwestern agricultural paradise—on the 170,000 acre Spade ranch between Littlefield and Lubbock. The Spade ranch composed a part of the famous Elwood estate whose colorful—and sometimes bloody—history is chronicled in western fiction. Surrounding the vast tract are fields which have been in cultivation some time. Cotton flourishes there and in all probability Anton, located as it is on the main line of the Santa Fe railroad, will become a distributing center. The new town was named in honor of J. F. Anton, division superintendent of the Santa Fe, who demonstrated his faith in Anton's future by buying all of section 122. Throwing open the ranch sounded the death knell to the cattle business in that section.

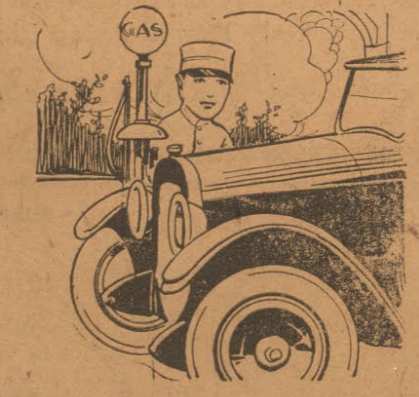
