WICHITA FALLS, Texas, Nov. 16. The "clinging vine" and the "shrinking violet" are no longer symbolic of woman, this type having given away to a creature in all respects the equal of her "lord and master," President H. W. Morelock of Sul Ross state normal college declared in an address prepared for delivery before the Texas Federation of Women's clubs here today.

The new type is fostered by woman's activities in clubs and civic organizations and was inspired by her work n the World war, President Morelock stated.

"For centuries woman has labored behind closed doors," said President Morelock. "In some countries of the east she still wears her veil. Until very recently, in the west, she has been content to sacrifice her genius on the altar of her husband's fame. It is rather strange that woman was first to discover her own abilities; it is tragic that she had to demand for herself a place side by side with her brother on the industrial and political throne. On the social throne she has long held undisputed sway, but like the modest 'violet by the mossy stone, half hidden from the eye' she has 'wasted her sweetness on the desert air.' Women can destroy it," was the message conveyed to the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Thursday night by Mrs. Lee Joseph of San Antonio, state president, when she addressed the state convention in Wichita Falls. Her subject was "Women and International Relations. world economics to world politics and the relation of nationality to world peace.

Economic League. "An international economic league offers a feasible means for the distribution of raw material and also an economic league can employ the economic boycott as a weapon against a disturber of world peace. To be specific, such a boycott would close the telegraphic systems, confine railway lines to their own borders, exclude foreign ships from every port, close access to the coaling stations, prohibit stock quotations and and sever diplomatic relations with a complete withdrawal of financial relations. Under such conditions how long could any nation last and what nation will voluntary invite the paralysing power of an economic

boycott?" "Women peculiarly see that spiritual is stronger than material force. If women will steadfastly determine to maintain world peace they can overcome not only the forces that are already combining to precipitate world war, but they can forever wipe the institution of war from the human race.

"We women must bring to the study of international problems the international mind. To study the economic problems of a nation we must understand their economic needs. Economic necessity of a nation largely determines its national policy. "The lowered standards of




