BUYING AT HOME Without asking that local bids be submitted for the publication of the "Touchbook," the yearbook of the Ranger high school, the student-teacher management of that publication went outside Eastland county and entered into a contract for its publication. It is understood they did not even ask for competitive bids, but just selected an outside concern and entered into a contract. Local dealers, manufacturers, printers, even farmers, cannot complain of loss of business if their prices are appreciably higher than are asked elsewhere, quality and other factors considered, but it is only fair that local people be given an opportunity to bid on work to be done or make prices for goods that are needed, against dealers and manufacturers outside the county, that is their hard luck. It is even more blamable for the students in a local school to get their work done outside the county. The students are children of local business people or wage earners who must depend upon local trade for their support; their education is provided in large part by the taxation of local property and local industry; the advertising they solicit for the publication must come from the local merchants. It would seem that the teachers who fail to instill this thought into the minds of the students are lacking in the knowledge of citizenship. They fail to get outside the narrow horizon of the three "r's" and are unable to direct the students in larger ways. This might be expected of the teacher in the grade schools, for reading, writing and arithmetic are the things they must first drive into the minds of their young charges, but in a high school the teachers should have broader views and impress them upon the students. Clannishness may be carried to an extreme, but it is not clannish for local people to give other local people the first right to make bids to supply their wants. If the bids or service be unsatisfactory, the trade may be taken elsewhere with little likelihood of local complaint, for the opportunity to bid has been given.

MAKING WORLD LAUGH The death of a clown is like the king of clowns dropped out of the line. Al Miacco, whose name was unknown to the world but whose antics had amused millions of people for sixty-two years, kissed his fingers to the crowd and slipped out of life. Behind that gay make-up, that fantastic chalked face with its smiling lips, real suffering had been hidden from the world for at least the last two years of his never-failing appearances. In the ring Al was the spirit of youth—turning his somersaults, falling off his donkey, getting in everybody's way, being slapped and knocked down and bumped over. Out of the ring he was an old man living quietly with his old wife, to whom he had been married since 1867. The day before his final curtain dropped some one asked Al if he thought it had been worth while. "Making them laugh isn't the easiest thing in the world," was his reply. "And if you don't believe it, try it for yourself." But there's a deeper philosophy than that back of the antics of the clown—if you will remember what the great French writer Beaumarchais said: "Praised by some, blamed by others, ridiculed the fools and irritating the wicked, I am compelled to laugh at everything for fear of being forced to tears!"—From the December Delineator.

In America the movement is sponsored by the Near East Relief and in other nations by similar organizations and societies working towards the same end. Details of the correct sort of food to be served for Golden Rule Day dinner and other information concerning it can be had by writing to the National Headquarters of the Near East Relief, 151 Fifth Avenue, New York City, or to the nearest state office. Many prominent European women, including the Queen of Greece, Baroness Schaffalitzky of Denmark, Baroness Sigrid Kurck of Sweden, and Miss Alice Masaryk, daughter of the President of Czechoslovakia, have pledged themselves to observe Golden Rule Day and to further its wide observance in their own countries. 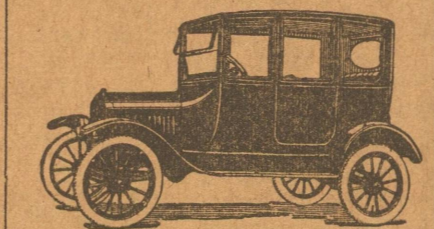

### SUGGESTIONS FOR THE HANDY HOME MAKER

Has it ever occurred to you to lighten a dark room by cutting a square or oblong opening into an adjoining sunny room and filling the space with plain, frosted or colored glass? It then may be treated as a window, using very sheer curtains on each side. On a ledge or shelf built just below this window place some decorative object to increase the suggestion of sunlight.

That you can make a window-seat out of two kitchen chairs by extending a board the width of the seat across the two chairs? Pad well and cover with cretonne. Use roll pillows at the end. A board extended from the lower rungs makes a shelf for books.

That you can make a useful dressing-table by placing small bedside tables either side of a long mirror? They can be painted any color to match the rest of the room.

To convert an oak hat-rack into a floor-lamp by removing the pegs, sandpapering the wood and finishing with a mahogany varnish. Wire for two bulbs. Make the supports for a shade by taking three stout wires of the same length and flattening them at the ends which attach to the pole with screws.

That a mirror hung above a box cut to fit the bottom of it makes an effective flower-box.—From the Designer Magazine for December.

**ECONOMIC EXPERTS ARE STUDYING RANCH PRODUCTION**

Of interest to Texas cattlemen is the co-operative study of the cost of production with range cattle now being conducted in the northeastern portion of the range area of western Texas, and which is a continuation of ranch studies begun several years ago by Dr. B. Youngblood, director Texas agricultural experiment station, and now becoming generally classed as "ranch economics." Some 20 ranches, ranging in size from four to 100 sections, are under systematic observation and through co-operation with the owners, accurate cost data and other records are kept which will, it is believed, after a few years, be a more systematic study of the economic problems involved in the ranching business than is, as yet, possible.

These observations are in the charge of Mr. V. V. Parr of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture. Co-operating with Mr. Parr, but studying more particularly the economic phases of ranching, is Mr. G. S. Klemmedson of the division of agricultural economics, United States department of agriculture.

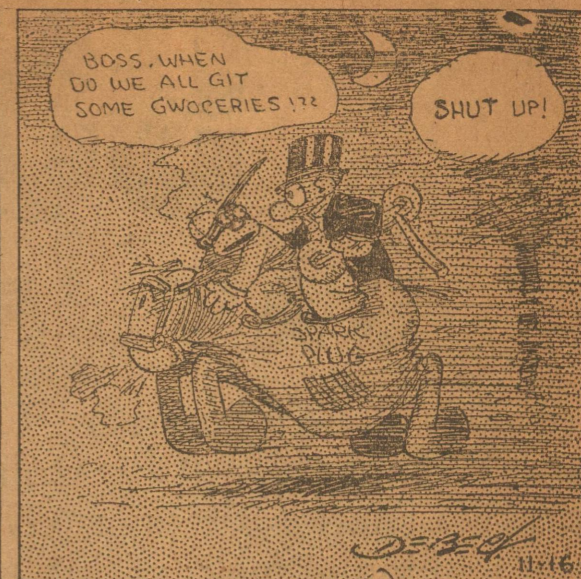
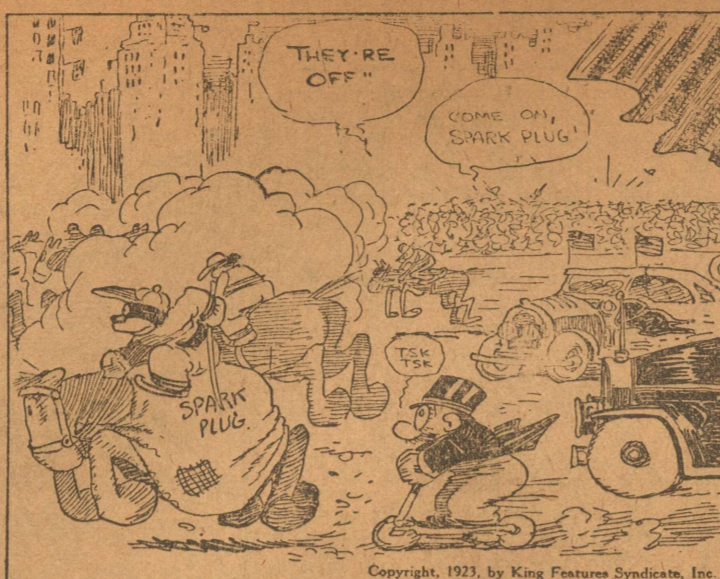
