

Oil Men Are Warned GIANTS WIN THE Against Continued Wasteful Methods; **Reforms Urged**

By Associated Press.

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 10.-A warning to oil men that state regulation of their business is imminent because of present wsateful methods, E. E. Marland, president of the Marland Refining company, suggested today before the International Petroleum Exposition congress that leaders in the industry take immediate steps intelligently to conserve the nation's oil resources.

"I think this subject should be given widespread discussion so that it may be carefully considered," said Mr. Marland, following which a committee should be appointed to prepare plans for legislation desirable to the industry for submission to the legislatures in the oil producing states."

Declaring that over-production in the new fields is a natural result of unregulated competition, Marland said the solution lies in "intelligent and uniform proration for purchasers from flowing wells."
