BATTLE TRIBESMEN Alive After Five-Mile Fall, Pilot Is Eager to Go After New Records

DAYTON, Ohio, Feb. 28.-Major W. Schroeder, chief test pilot, who yesterday fell over five miles in two minutes after shattering the world's altitude record, miraculously escaping death when he righted his airplane BUT WORKOUTS PRIVATE 2,000 feet from the ground, lies today at the army post hospital, recovering from partial blindness.

He is determined to make another ascent into the heavens at the first opportunity. Schroeder climbed to a height of 36,020 feet, lost control of the machine and plunged downward more than five miles.


BOY BREAKS BOTH LEGS WHILE TURNING IN BED
