





The resignation of the legislative council of the Indian government, because of the success of the Swaraj, or home rule party in the recent elections, is looked upon in England as a fresh indication that its eastern empire is slowly slipping away. C. R. Das, leader of the Swarajists, who has been invited by the Governor of Bengal, the Earl Lytton, to form a ministry, is chief lieutenant of Mahatma Mohandas Gandhi.
