

Intense Suffering Among Poor of Big Cities: Wheat Undamaged but Livestock Suffers.

United Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 5-The cold wave which has a grip on the middle west will extend over the eastern section of the country and far into the south by Sunday, the weather bureau today forecast. Temperatures ranging from a few degrees above zero to several degrees below will prevail. The cold wave is described by the weather bureau as severe.

ZERO AT KANSAS CITY.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 5 .- Intense suffering has been caused throughout the Southwest by continuation of the cold wave, which has new held sway for more than a week. The temperature in Kansas City today touched 23 degrees below zero, the coldest weather in many years, it is said. No relief from the cold wave is yet in sight, weather forecasters announced.

The sun came out early and stayed throughout the day, making it a delightful day for the outdor enthusiast. The skies were clear and there was no hint of unsettled weather.

nothing, however, for Harvey was dead. The cause of death is given as heart disease.

Shocked and grieved, Rockefeller hastened to his winter home here and secluded himself. He refused to see any callers and also forbid his secretary and servants to give any details of the tragedy.

Ormand Beach was a flutter with excitement and the death on the golf course was the only subject of conversation. Wild rumors were quickly circulated and as quickly denied. Harvey was 70 years of age and the head of a New York house manufacturing dehydrating machinery. He had been a regular visitor here for the last nine years.
