CITY WATER BONDS BEFORE OPEN FORUM

MASS MEETING TO CONSIDER BOND ISSUE

Ranger Citizens Will Hear Facts and Figures at Liberty Saturday Night.

All citizens of Ranger, and especially those who are tax payers and voters, have been invited to attend a mass meeting at 8 o'clock Saturday evening, to be held in the Liberty theatre, to discuss the proposed municipal bond issue of \$190,000 for the purchase and improvement of the Ranger Water Works.

The meeting has been called by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, with which the Ranger Lions and Rotarians, both of whom have endorsed the bond issue, are cooperating.

Leaders in Ranger, including the heaviest tax payers, are in favor of the bond issue because they believe it means a great forward step in the progress of the city.

Causes of Violent Deaths In Dallas During Last Year

United Press.

DALLAS, Jan. 11.—A new record for Dallas was set last year in the number of violent deaths that occurred, according to police records, which show 140 persons met violent deaths during the past 12 months.

A total of 40 homicidal deaths occurred during the year, the last one on Dec. 31, when S. H. Ramsey was shot and killed in an altercation with his wife.

Motor vehicles claimed 33 victims during the year. Thirty were killed by automobiles while three received fatal injuries from motorcycles.

Nine persons died from heat,

which is also a record for the city.

According to the homicide record, gunshot wounds caused 38 deaths, stabbing one and beating one.

Seven persons were crushed to death in 1923 in Dallas. Falling walls, cave-ins and falling weights are included in the list.

Accidental discharge of fire-arms claimed four lives. Seven died from accidental poisoning while two met death by lightning.

Twenty-three persons committed suicide, 12 choosing poison, eight using pistols and one a knife.

Eleven persons burned to death and three died from electrical shock. One death resulted from poisoned food.

And in the midst of plenty, four Dallasites died from starvation.

LEE REED OF CISCO DIES FROM INJURIES IN CRASH

Lee Reed of Cisco, who was injured several weeks ago in an automobile accident, died Wednesday afternoon in a Fort Worth hospital where he had been taken for treatment, according to word received by relatives here.

Reed, who was about 35 years old, is survived by his wife and one child. He was not driving the car, but was riding with two other men when the car ran into another car. Reed was the only occupant of either car seriously hurt.

TWO WOMEN SUE FATHER AND SON FOR BIG SUMS

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 11.—The \$100,000 breach of promise suit of Mrs. Onezima De Bouchel, New Orleans beauty, against Asa G. Chandler, aged Atlanta millionaire, is on the docket for hearing in federal court here Jan. 30.

Since the suit was filed some months ago, Chandler has married a former stenographer.

Mrs. De Bouchel filed the suit in response to Chandler's claim that after their engagement he had cause to believe the New Orleans beauty had been indiscreet during the Confederate veterans convention here some months previous, for which she was the official sponsor.

After repeated efforts to force the aged millionaire to make public the source of his information and specify his insinuations, Mrs. De Bouchel filed suit for damages.

The suit had been only temporarily set on the docket for Jan. 30, but as both sides have indicated they are ready for the hearing, there probably will be no postponement. The case will be heard in federal court because the principals are residents of different states.

Next month the damage suit of Mrs. Clyde Byfield against Walter Chandler, son of Asa, is scheduled to be heard in the Deatur superior court.

This suit is an outgrowth of a voyage to Europe Chandler made with Mr. and Mrs. Byfield and their children, as his guests. Crossing the Atlantic Chandler broke into her stateroom and attacked her, Mrs. Byfield charged in her suit, which was filed here soon after the party returned from the trip.

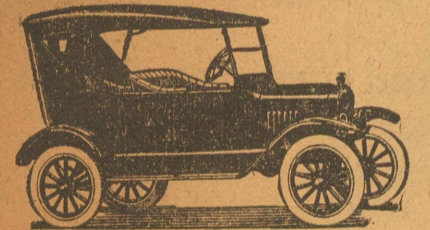
NO. CAROLINA INCREASES HER COTTON SPINDLES

CHAPEL HILL, N. C., Jan. 11.—In the great industrial drama, which marks the shift of the center of gravity of the American cotton industry from the northeast to the eastern cotton states, North Carolina plays the leading part.

Her spinning industry has hit a pace so rapid that no other state north or south of the Mason and Dixon line seems to be able to keep up with her in this respect.

During the last two decades the nation has increased its cotton spindles less than 50 per cent, while in North Carolina the increase has been more than 186 per cent, according to the University of North Carolina extension service. Massachusetts alone possesses a greater number of spindles than the Tarheel state now.

North Carolina has 18 per cent of the spindleage in America, Massachusetts has 29 per cent. In 1901 the figures were 38.3 per cent for the New England state and barely 8 per cent for North Carolina.

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COLD WEATHER GRIPS EUROPE THIS WINTER

LONDON, Jan. 11.—Unusually severe storms, accompanied by intense cold and heavy snow, are sweeping Europe this winter. Off the coasts of Spain and France, the disturbances have proved a serious menace to shipping, while in the North Sea and in Scandinavian waters, the ice floes are so heavy that navigation in many places is difficult.

Not in many years have there been so many casualties from avalanches in the Swiss and French Alps. Heavy rains in the lower passes and foothills of the latter mountain have contributed largely to the Marne and Seine floods in France.

The cold in England is severe and there is much snow especially in the Midlands and in the north.

Wind, snow and rain over all of western Europe have seriously delayed telegraph communication. Until 6 o'clock Thursday morning no press dispatches had reached England from Spain in more than 24 hours.

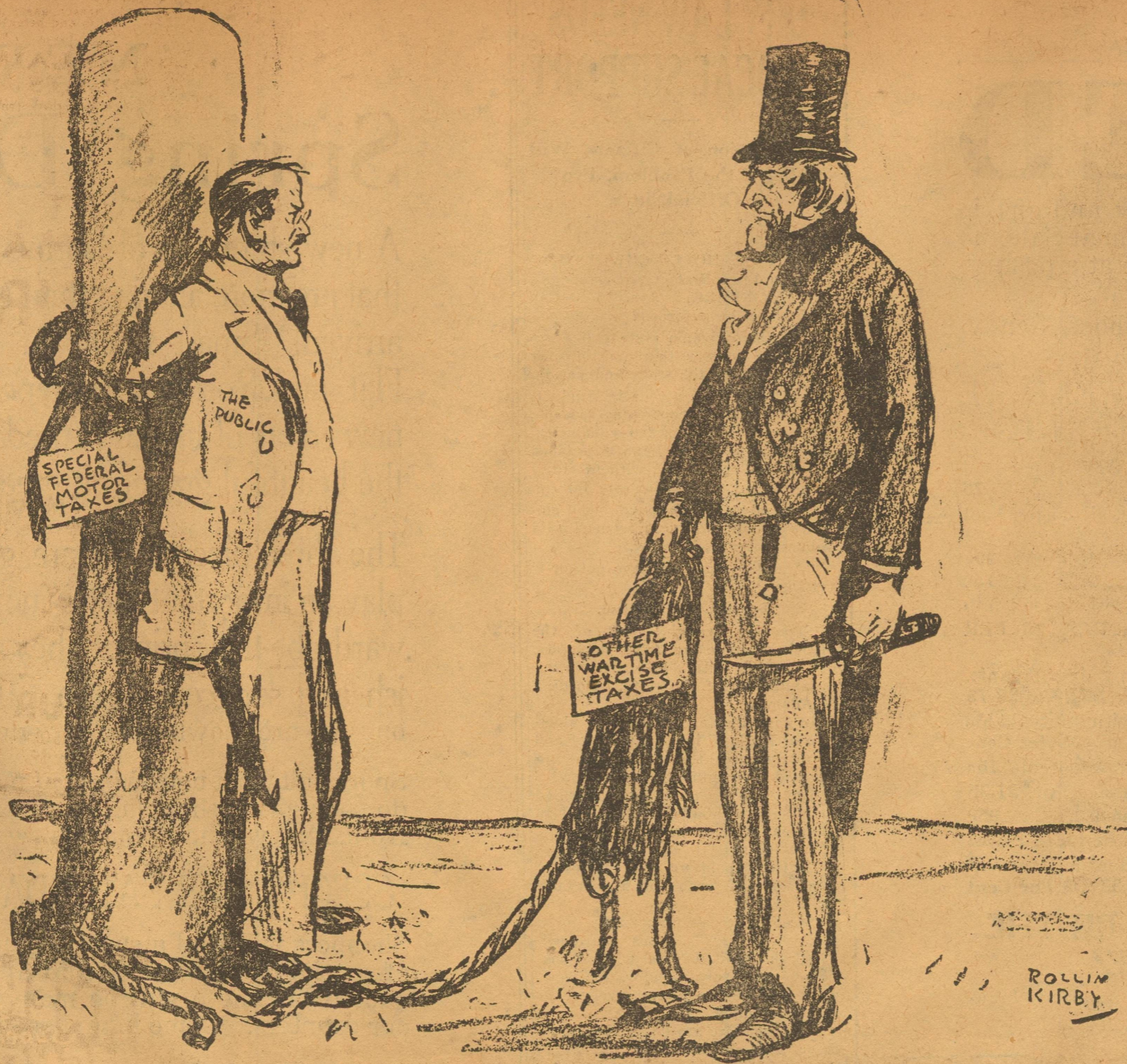

ENFORCEMENT OF DRY LAW NEEDS LOCAL SUPPORT

Co-operation of Citizens Will Solve the Problem, Pro Official Says.

By S. P. HOLLINGSWORTH, United Press Staff Correspondent. HARRISBURG, Jan. 11.—Can prohibition be enforced?

The Pennsylvania state police are trying to answer this question for the benefit of the state and nation.

At the end of a year in conducting Governor Pinchot's dry crusade, they have come to the conclusion, according to Major Lynn G. Adams, superintendent, that without local co-operation, prohibition is a failure.

"The state police have been pioneers in this work, it seems," said Adams, in an interview.

"And the most we have gotten is criticism."

Source of Criticism.

Strangely enough, most of the criticism has come from ministers, dry "enthusiasts" and prohibition organizations of the state, according to Adams.

In each instance, the "open violation of the law" is complained of and in many cases the state police are charged with failing in their duty.

The state troopers are compelled to mingle with all elements and in some cases must "sample" all kinds of bootleg stuff to get evidence.

Ministers hold up their hands at this sort of enforcement, Adams said.

"Prohibition enforcement is not a pink-tea affair," Adams continued. "With our limited force it is not possible to get every violator. We work night and day in almost every case that is handled."

"But what we are doing is to show these little communities, of which there are hundreds in Pennsylvania, as well as the big cities like Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, that there is a method that produces results and we are leaving it to the local police authorities to adopt that method if they want to enforce this law."

Local Action.

The kind of co-operation asked by the state police, if the people actually want the law enforced, is action on the part of local authorities, willingness on the part of citizens to testify in liquor prosecutions and constructive criticism of the methods employed so that better results may be obtained.

"To those who say the state police are concentrating their entire energy on prohibition enforcement, to the exclusion of other crime detection," Adams declared, "it might be said that with 50 state police for the entire state last year more than 50 murderers were caught, about 7,000 arrests for other crimes were made, and thousands of dollars worth of stolen property recovered."

TEXAN HAS DEVICE TO GIVE EYES TO TRAINS

ALPINE, Texas, Jan. 11.—Submission to the interstate commerce commission of a patented automatic train control device invented by S. G. Smith of Alpine will be made soon by Smith who went to Washington recently on business in connection with the invention.

The device would automatically stop trains, according to Smith, when danger lurks ahead on the track.

Smith declares his invention not only is positive in action but is also practicable in its installation.

PHYSICIANS OF THE COUNTRY TO GATHER IN ANNUAL CONVENTION

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—More than 10,000 physicians and surgeons are expected to attend the annual convention of the American Medical Association here June 9 to 13, 1924.

The convention will occupy the second tier of the municipal pier. It will be subdivided into lecture halls, exhibition rooms and an auditorium.

Most recent discoveries in medicine, newly developed apparatus, instruments and other devices used in medical practice, will be exhibited. Motion pictures will illustrate advanced medical methods.

Convention plans were made at a meeting attended by Drs. J. Sheldon Horsley, chairman, Richmond, Va.; E. J. Judd, Mayo clinic; F. Gegenbach, Denver; John E. Lane, professor of diseases of the skin, Yale university, and Roger Morris, professor of medicine, University of Cincinnati.

TOM STEVENS HELD IN CISCO ON ARSON CHARGE

CISCO, Jan. 11.—Tom Stevens was arrested yesterday on a charge of arson and placed in jail. The arrest was made on information furnished by the state fire marshal at Austin. It is expected that other arrests will be made soon.

Stevens was arrested in Breckenridge by Cisco officers late Wednesday night.

STANDING IN LINE FOUND TO BE FAIRLY PROFITABLE

SA NANTONIO, Jan. 11.—Payment of automobile license taxes has provided numbers of San Antonio's unemployed with work of a sort.

Getting on the job in front of the office of the county license inspector early in the morning, the unemployed wait in line until a prosperous looking man arrives to take his place in line and then sell their place to him.

The price of a meal and often more is secured through the wait in line, they say.

Dempsey-Gibbons Match Arranged for Next June

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, and Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul, will fight a title match in New York probably early in June, Promoter Tex Rickard announced Thursday after a conference with Eddie Kane, Gibbons' manager.

Rickard came to a definite agreement with Kane after an hour's conference at Madison Square Garden. Jack Kearns, manager of the champion, has not yet signed articles with Rickard but several days ago he assured the promoter there would be no hitch in arrangements if Gibbons was signed.
