The coil, which is of the spider-web type, is wound on a form consisting of a slotted fiber disk, 18 in. thick, and 5 in. in diameter. There are 13 "spokes" in the form, and, if fiber is unobtainable, heavy cardboard may be used instead. Fifty turns of No. 26 single cotton-covered wire are wound on the form, the wire being led through a small hole drilled near the center of the disk and then wound on the form from the center out, over and under alternate spokes. The turns should be counted every time the starting point is passed, and, when the winding is completed, the end of the wire is passed through another small hole and drilled in the end of one of the

The coil is screwed to a small block of wood, 1 in. square and 34 in. high, which, in turn, is tacked or glued to a 1/4 by 8 by 11-in. baseboard. A bolt may be used if a hole is drilled in the small block and base, and the bolt passed through both. A strip of wood, 1/4 in. thick and 1/4 in. wide is then cut to a length of 6 in. and the phone posts.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Tax reduction legislation and the soldiers' bonus are scheduled to pas the house before the end of February. Administration leaders today assured the bonus advocates of favorable action on the McKenzie adjusted compensation bill. It was indicated also that the tax bill would be framed with the passage of the bonus measure. Withuot that assurance, it was learned that republicans pledged to vote for the bonus would not have agreed to give the Mellon bill right of way.

With the way cleared for early consideration of the tax reduction and bonus measures, administration leaders said a compromise would be effected with the democrats on the provisions of the Mellon bill. Representative Longworth, house republican leader, said concessions might be made also to various factions of the republican party or the entire plan would be endangered.

Representative John Garner of Texas, ranking democrat on the house ways and means committee, said today the republicans must accept his plan or go down to defeat. "The only question for the administration leaders to decdie," he said "was whether they would take their licking in committee or on the floor of the house."

AUSTIN, Jan. 12.—The strap is still being used as a mode of punshment of convicts on the state farms, but its use is not frequent, the board of supervisors of the state penitentiary stated in its annual report to the governor. Under the rule now enforced, the strap can be used only on an order by all three mem bers of the prison commission and it must be applied by the farm man ager. Few convicts have been whip ped during the past year. An ex ample of how seldom the strap is used is the record on the Ferguson farm of incorrigibles. In the past year only three whippings were ordered and executed, where under he old regime men were whipped

Recommendations by the board inlude the sale of the Shaw farm on Red River in Bowie county, and the establishment of an honor farm where convicts will be put entirely on their honor, thus doing away with guards. The sale of the Shaw farm was recommended because of its remoteness from the rest of the prison property. 

Young Wood, only 26, has "cleaned up" \$800,000 by stock market transactions. General Wood, a man of small means himselt, put an end to his son's financial transactions, believing it unwise for a young man to make so great a fortune rapidly. Certain gossip caused the War Department to make an investigation, which resulted in showing that Lieutenant Wood's transactions had been absolutely legitimate and straightforward stock deals, in which he showed remarkable financial acumen. None of his dealings were in Philippine securities, Lieutenant Wood believing it wrong to deal in stocks which might be influenced by any of his father's official actions. 




