They Are to Decide if the City Shall Buy and Operate Its Water Works.

The poll will open at 7 a. m. Tues day at the Ranger city hall, when voters will be given the right as required by law to pass upon the proposed issue of \$190,000 worth of bonds for the purchase and improvement of the Ranger Waterworks company's distributing system, present pumping plant and reservoir. The polls will close at 7 p. m.

This will be the first time citizens of Ranger have ever voted for or against an issue of self-sustaining bonds. All other bond issues, such as those for paving, sewer and necessary improvements, carried a direct taxation burden. WHAT THE THIRD INTERNA-TIONAL IS.

The controversy between Secretary of State Hughes and the Russian government has awakened great curiosity as to the real nature of the Third International. Originally it was a capitalistic organization, started in London in 1862 by business men from all parts of Europe. Two years later the First International was launched by delegates from England, France, Germany, Italy and Poland, on the fundamentals advocated by Karl Marx. Twelve years later the First International convened in Philadelphia and then dis-


