## Illinois Attorney Says Killed Wife In Self-Defense

AURORA, Ill., Jan. 16.-Warren Lincoln, Aurora's eccentric attorney, who confessed to killing his wife and burning her body with that of her brother, Byron Shoup, was held Improvements to Be Made for the Kane county grand jury today on two charges of murder. Lincoln signed a written statement of his earlier confession admitting that he had killed his wife with a stove poker, but insists that she first shot Shoup to death. He admitted having Tuesday's \$190,000 bond issue elec-

No attorney represented Lincoln. When the written statement was placed before him, he read it carefully, made some corrections and then calmly signed it. He then asked to be placed in the county jail.
According to Lincoln's confession, his wife, Alina, shot her brother durning a family quarrel, Jan. 10, 1923, and Lincoln, fearing a like fate, attempted to disarm her with a stove poker and killed her with a blow on the head. He then dismembered both to the issue and 278 against it, a clear majority of 174 votes. There were eight mutilated votes, making a total of 738 votes cast. 


