Flush production from newly developed fields not only supplied all current needs for last year but filled the storage tanks to overflowing so that it finally was killed instantly at 10:15 o'clock this morning when struck in the breast by a dril Istem. TEXAS COMPANY MEETS PRICES

The Texas Pipe Line Company's local office received word this morning that company too was offering higher prices for oil, in order to meet the competitive buying, for the pipe line companies, which supply the market and the storage reservoirs, must have the oil.

Lowery of Ranger, overturned and righted itself in the ditch alongside the Bankhead highway on the Colony creek hill. Lowery suffered no severe injuries, but he stayed in his room at the Gholson hotel Saturday morning.

Maxwell, employed in various capacities by E. N. Dorsey, rig contractor, about 60 years of age, had right leg broken and a deep gash below the right knee. 
