DETROIT, Feb. 8 .- Exposure o the "international banking houses, which conceived and financed the "Teapot Dome deal," is demanded by Henry Ford in a statement issued to

Ford expressed confidence in Secretary Denby's integrity and declared that he believed President Coolidge and the senate will give every man a fair opportunity to defend houself. "But," Ford insists, "let the investigation proceed without personal fears or influence of partisanship until all the facts are disclosed. It is not enough to know who are the immediate persons concerned. Let the probe go deeper until all the officials of the international banking houses are revealed for in the last analysis they are the sources of corruption."


