"He is just slowly ebbing away," Dr. Cary T. Grayson, his physician, told newspaper men today.

He lay almost motionless all day, virtually the only sign of life being an occasional movement of his eyes. He recognizes those about him but is too exhausted to talk. He has not spoken audibly today. Once or wice he has whispered something to

Dr. Grayson, in an informal addiion to his bulletin, said Mr. Wilson was resting quietly and was concious, calm and peaceful, with Mrs. Wilson at the bedside patting his and. Nobody has been admitted to the sick room except Mrs. Wilson and his daughter Margaret. "Mr. Wilson s not fighting for his life as one fights who has a chance; he is just hanging on to life," said Dr. Gray-son. "He is just too game to give up, but he realizes that the fight is over. It almost breaks one down to

prostrated," according to an official and issued at 8:35 p. m.

"There has been no radical change n Mr. Wilson's condition during the day, but rather a gradual wearing away. He is now profoundly prostrated. He has no pain or serious discomfort of any kind. He has lept the greater part of the day and antidotes are unnecessary. heart action is easy. There is no fever. Practically no nourishment has been taken during the day."

"Mr. Wilson has been unable to talk for the last two hours," Dr. Grayson said after the bulletin was issued. Asked whether this would be Mrs. Wilson's last sleep, Dr. Grayson said he could not tell. He pointed out that dying persons sometimes live for days in a state of coma.

Gennany Asks But ers Unwilling Give In Return

BERLIN, Feb. 2.—"Give us outside financial aid and return the Ruhr and Rhineland to the Reich,' reads a German memorandum delivered to the committee of experts headed by General Charles Dawes, which is here examining this country's finances with a view of straightening the reparations muddle.

"Only thus," says the memorandum, "can Germany have normal currency, which is the sin qua non of reparations settlement." The memorandum was made available to the United Press tonight and will be ofcially made public later.

The Germans describe their preser the crisis. The situation is aggravated by the separation of the Ruhr and Rhineland from the Reich, it is asserted, and including the hampering of currency and public financial relations between occupied and unoccupied areas.

linty cotton seed often tends to hang in the plate, therefore, a second spiralshaped cut-off for the under side of the plate beyond the ejector wheel is provided This forces any seed which may have hung to the plate into the boot. If for any reason the seed should still hang to the plate, a by pass is provided, which passes this seed back into the hopper without injury to the seed. This cotton drop seldom cracks a seed.

To be sure you have no skips in the field, due to cans being empty, the can is cut. away so that the point at which the seed leaves the plate is always in full view of operator. This insures full stands of
