Earl Hart of Cisco went to trial in Eastland Wednesday morning in the Ninety-first district court, on a charge of manslaughter, growing out of the killing of Lige Steward at Cisco in May, 1922. Steward was shot with a pistol. Hart was indicted by the Eastland county grand jury on a charge of murder. WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Edward L. Doheny, lessee of the two naval oil leases in California, told the senate public lands committee today that he loaned \$100,000 to Former Secretary of Interior Albert Fall.

Doheny said the loan was made personally on Nov. 30, 1921. Doheny said it was "purely a friendly transaction," and had nothing to do with the two leases he obtained from Fall. He gave the statement in written form. He said he had not told of the loan previously because he had

FOWER OF WALL STREET. New York seems to be afflicted with an epidemic of bogue stock schemes and "bucketing" among brokers on "high finance" plans that make Dr. Cook and some of the Texas oil company promotions look like pikers. Some of the largest firms and financiers are involved and many millions have been taken from trustful investors.

Every effort on the part of congress and by the New York state legislature to put an end to these fly-by-night security houses and drive the bogus stock promoters out of business, have been successfully checked by the board of governors of New York stock exchange. At the moment the state attorney general and the district attorney, who favor the pending blue-sky law, are held in check by the Wall street powers who are intensely opposed to a license system. The stock exchange defeated a bill of this kind last year and seems strong enough this year to force whatever compromise or concession they may demand. It seems to be impossible to pass a law that will prevent these raw robbaries without including or affecting many of the more aristocratic of-

Unless something is done to safeguard innocent investors, it is altogether probable that a congress will be elected some day that will put a crimp in the whole gambling business for keeps.

CONGRESS OF MOTHERS IS NEEDED ORGANIZATION

The whole force of the membership of this national organization is being devoted solely to one cause, the improving of the nation's children. Could any cause be more laudible or more worthy of loyal support? "The National Congress of Mothers has accomplished more than any national or international society for the betterment of conditions of child life: it has done more in America; than has been done throughout the world this far." This is a testimony from one in close touch with all work for children, one who is well acquainted with the value of what is being done by the National Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher asciations.

P. P. Claxton, formerly United States commissioner of education and now provost of the University of Alabama, says:

"I have watched with great pleasure the rapid spread of the Parent-Teacher associations throughout the country. I know of no other organiration that can serve so well to bring together parents and teachers to discuss the welfare of the children in the education of whom they are both interested, and whose education requires the hearty and intelligent cooperation of both teachers and parents, of both the school and the home; nor do I know of any other agency that gives to parents such opportunity to keep themselves informed as to the work of the schools and their needs, which they alone can

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 24 .- H. & B. Beer has wired Jess Taylor & Co. of Cisco as follows:




