## COWARDLY ASSASSINATION AT GLEN ROSE

### KLAN IS NOT IN POLITICS SAYS EVANS

Merely Fights Back When Attacked—and Wins—Says the Imperial Wizard.

DALLAS, Feb. 22.—The Ku Klux Klan is not in politics except where an individual or an organization conducts a political fight against the clan, declared Dr. H. W. Evans, imperial wizard, in an interview here today.

"The Klan fights back and, without exception, breaks the force opposed to it," Evans added, "Patriotism is the dominating note of the organization," he declared.

The imperial wizard pointed out the fact that the Klan supported Fuqua for governor of Louisiana although Fuqua is not a Klansman. He declared there wasn't a single man in the governor's race in Texas who was not a good man—except Jim Ferguson," he concluded.

Evans said he was in Texas merely to make the rounds of the realm.

### MISSOURI STUDENTS ARE EXPELLED AFTER GAY PARTY WITH BOOZE

COLUMBIA, Feb. 22.—Thirteen students, eight men and five women, were expelled from the University of Missouri, today for drinking intoxicating liquor and staying out at late hours last Friday, following a fraternity party. President Stratton Brooks announced today.

The party was given by a women's fraternity at the fashionable Daniel Boone tavern, center of the university's social life. The drinking took place in a room occupied by the mother of one of the women students, who came up from Kansas City to attend the function, it was claimed.

### POULTRY SPECIALIST GIVES INTERESTING ILLUSTRATED TALK

Joe Burger, poultry specialist of St. Louis, gave an illustrated lecture on poultry feeding at Eastland Monday night. The meeting was fairly well attended and was instructive as well as entertaining.

Mr. Burger spoke on the proper calling of poultry, showing the amount of feed it took to produce eggs. He said a hen that produced less than 90 eggs per year did not pay for her keeping. Any number of eggs produced over 90 are profit, he said, showing that it is necessary to cull out the brooders, or unprofitable hens, so that the general average will produce a profit.

Four reels of moving pictures were shown, including the life history of poultry from a fresh egg to the finished product. This picture showed the development of an egg from its first day in the incubator to the baby chick. Many illustrations of balanced and unbalanced rations and their effect on the egg, its fertility, the baby chick and its relative egg production, were shown. Which showed the dire necessity of feeding a ration that will produce all portions of an egg and chick for maximum development. A picture of Charlie Chaplin and his poultry farm was shown which was both comical and instructive.

DALLAS, Feb. 22.—A. S. Thompson, 56, his wife, aged 54, and Miss Alice Thompson, 48, all of Dallas, were killed shortly after 10 o'clock last night when the automobile in which they were riding was struck by a train on a grade crossing near Hutchins, 10 miles south of Dallas.

### Kiss Leads to Resignation of School Teacher

KANSAS CITY, Kan., Feb. 22.—As the sequel to a kiss, E. B. Damon, instructor in printing in the Kansas City, Kan., high school, today resigned.

Charges were brought against Damon by E. M. Pearson, principal of the school, that the printing instructor had accepted a dare and had kissed Miss Margaret Pratt, 18-year-old senior.

According to the explanation of the affair by Mr. Pearson, Damon was talking with a group of girls who dared him to kiss Miss Pratt. While she was walking down a long and dimly lighted hallway, Damon stepped up to her and kissed her. When the story was told by the students he resigned.

### PYTHIAN PARTY FROM EASTLAND GO INTO DITCH

Automobile Contained Judge Joe Jones and Four Friends Turns Turtle

A large automobile driven by Judge Joe Jones and occupied by himself, W. B. Collier, C. F. Shepherd, J. W. Johnson and Joe Marshman of Eastland, turned turtle into a ditch five miles west of town on the Cisco-Eastland highway last night. Beyond a few scratches and slight cuts none of the party was injured.

The party had started to Breckenridge to attend a meeting of the Knights of Pythias lodge. The car was going up-hill at a rate of about 25 or 30 miles per hour. There was a dense fog which made it difficult to see another car coming from the opposite direction until it was so close that Judge Jones, who was driving, had to steer his car into the ditch to keep from hitting the other car, which was being driven by J. F. McWilliams of Eastland.

Mr. Jones, to avert a collision, applied his brakes and released his engine, but the momentum of the heavy car caused it to skid and turn completely over. The fact that no one was seriously hurt was probably due to the fact that just at the point where the car went into the deep ditch, there is a narrow dump for a road leading to the left from the highway on which the car struck and balanced itself. Had it turned off a few feet from either side of the dump it might have turned over several times instead of only once, and been completely demolished and the occupants could scarcely have escaped being badly hurt.

A wrecker was called out and the car pulled back onto the highway and driven to Eastland. Dr. C. E. Richardson of Eastland was passing and helped get the men from under the car and ascertained that no bones were broken.

Judge Jones and party had intended to go to Gorman, but had changed their minds and started to Breckenridge instead.

### PTOMAINE POISON GETS TWO VICTIMS IN HOME OF WEALTHY CHICAGOAN

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—W. L. Holland, 77, wealthy retired tea importer, and his sister, were found dead this morning, apparently the victims of ptomaine poisoning. His wife and daughter were also stricken, but are expected to recover.

They were at dinner at the accustomed hour last night, the meal being served by Miss Virginia Holland in the absence of the cook. The tragedy was not discovered until after midnight by a son when he returned from his club.

He noticed that the lights were on and fearing that robbers were in the house, he asked the taxicab driver to enter the house with him. The bodies of Holland and his sister were found upstairs. Mrs. Holland and her daughter were lying prostrate on the floor downstairs.

Chemists were to examine the remaining food today for a report to the coroner.

### SINCLAIR MAY NOT TESTIFY IN OIL INQUIRY

Committee Subpoenas Him, But May Take Legal Counsel Not To Question Him.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—The senate Teapot Dome investigating committee today decided to issue a subpoena at once for Harry F. Sinclair, lessee of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserves. The decision was reached at a conference between Senator Lenroot, Wisconsin, chairman of the committee, and Senator Walsh of Montana, chief investigator for the committee who returned to Washington today after a brief vacation.

Before the conference it was intimated that Sinclair might not be permitted to testify on the advice of Atlee Pomerene and Owen Roberts, special counsel empowered by the president to conduct the prosecution. Walsh and Lenroot said, however, they were agreed the testimony of Sinclair should be taken by the committee.

### Macready Makes New World Record For High Flying

DAYTON, Ohio, Feb. 22.—Lieut. James Macready, army air pilot, today broke the world's altitude climb, ascending to a height of 41,000 feet. That is a little more than seven miles. His time was two hours and three minutes.

The previous record, 36,746 feet, was made by LeCompte, a French flyer, Oct. 30, 1923.

The record today was unofficial, but the flight was held under regulations of the federal aeronautic code with Orville Wright as chief observer.

### ESKER A. SINGLETON WITH U. S. MARINES IN CARIBBEAN MANEUVERS

HOUSTON, Texas, Feb. 21.—Taking part in the greatest peacetime maneuvers ever held by the land, sea and air forces of the United States, Esker A. Singleton, son of Allen N. Singleton of Ranger, Texas, is now on duty with a detachment of U. S. Marines in the West Indies. His name appears on the official list of marines with the maneuver forces in the Caribbean.

The maneuvers began early in January and will not be completed until the last battleship returns to its home port in May or June. Certain problems in connection with the defense of the Panama Canal and regular battle practice by the ships of the Atlantic and Pacific fleets are being held. Many of the operations are taking place in the vicinity of Culebra, one of a small group of islands in the Caribbean.

The U. S. Marines will remain in the West Indies for periods varying from five weeks to several months, certain units of the corps being assigned to a variety of duties ashore or on ships of the navy during the operations.

Esker joined the Marine corps at Fort Worth, Texas, March 24, 1923; and is now with the 3rd Signal Battalion on the island of Culebra. He will return to his regular station, Quantico, Va., when the maneuvers are over.

### MYSTERIOUS MESSAGE SAYS THAT MISSING MAN IS FOUND AND IS SAFE

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 22.—A mysterious message has been received from Dallas by Mrs. John P. Nelson, whose husband has been missing since last Saturday, saying that Nelson has been found and would start for his home as soon as he is able to travel. The telegram is signed "A Friend," and says: "Your husband is in Dallas, safe. He remembered today who he was. He will start for home as soon as he is able to travel. Says he will write to you."

Nelson's automobile was found last Saturday with his bloody hat in the rear seat and his papers scattered over the floor of the car. It was thought he might have been murdered. The telegram from Dallas was turned over to the police.

The Eastland club, of which W. H. Sewell is president, is now having its court in Connellee park put in shape to play on and when it is finished it will be one of the best in the country.

### REPUBLICANS TORN ON ISSUE OF DAUGHERTY

Chairman National Committee Comes Out In Defense Of Attorney General.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Republican national committee, through its chairman, came to the defense today of Attorney General Daugherty, whose resignation, Senators Lodge, Pepper and Wheeler are seeking because of his connection with the oil scandal.

John Adams, chairman, in announcing that he would later issue a statement defending Daugherty, said: "It is absurd to dismiss a man who has not had a full hearing and had not opportunity to defend himself."

### Daugherty Must Resign Or Face An Investigation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Senator LaFollette today took command of the senate's effort to oust Attorney General Daugherty from the president's cabinet. At the same time belief grew in administration circles that if the president does not yield this week to senate pressure on him to dismiss Daugherty, the president will stand by his attorney general until Daugherty has had a full hearing before a senate committee.

LaFollette's first step was to arrange with Republican leaders for adoption next Monday of the Wheeler resolution to investigate Daugherty and providing for a committee to make the investigation. A meeting of the audit and control committee was called for today to report out the investigation resolution. LaFollette, however, said he believed action by the senate should go over to Monday because nearly a dozen senators whose help is needed are not in town.

### DAUGHERTY DOES NOT FEAR TO ENTER CAMP OF HIS ADVERSARIES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Attorney General Daugherty at sword's points with Republican senators, strode into the senate chamber today. Sitting on a couch in the rear he listened to the reading of Washington's farewell address by Senator Willis of Ohio, a friend.

"I promised a month ago to be here for the reading," Daugherty explained. "I'm not going to talk to anybody, see anyone or confer with anyone. I just came up for the reading of the address."

Senator Wheeler, who bitterly denounced Daugherty on the senate floor and who is author of a resolution to investigate the department of justice, passed in front of the attorney general. They stared at one another but there was no sign of recognition.

Senator Elkins of West Virginia, who speculated in Teapot Dome stock came up after a bit and sat down with Daugherty. They smiled and talked.

### TEXAS HOTEL BUILDING IN EASTLAND NOW IS BEING REMODELED

Workmen are engaged in re-modeling the Texas hotel building in Eastland, at the corner of West Commerce and Mulberry streets. The ground floor of this building, which has heretofore been used for automobile salesrooms, is being converted into a lobby, dining room and kitchen for the hotel that now occupies the two upper floors of the building.

W. C. Dorsey, an experienced hotel man, has leased the building and will conduct a modern, up-to-date hotel on both the American and European plan. When the building is completed it will have 30 guest rooms with hot and cold running water, telephone in each room, baths, ladies' rest room, sample rooms, dining room and a spacious lobby.

Owners of the building are under contract to have the remodeling and repair work completed by March at which time the new hotel is to open.

WILL SEEK TO MAKE NEWSPAPER RETRACT STORY PARIS, Feb. 22.—Mrs. Mable Gilman Corey announced this afternoon that she has engaged a lawyer to obtain a retraction from a Paris newspaper which published a story that she is engaged to marry Louis Du Perland, Bourbon prince.

### Wallace May Be Next Member of Cabinet to Quit

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Secretary of Agriculture Wallace today refused confirmation or denial of reports that he was about to resign from the president's cabinet as a result of differences with President Coolidge over the administration's relief program. The only comment Secretary Wallace would make on the report was this: "I have not resigned."

### RAPID STRIDES BEING MADE IN FARMING LINES

Agriculture, Poultry and Stock Farming Getting Renewed Attention.

Eastland county is making rapid strides along the lines of agriculture, poultry raising and stock-farming. Not only are the farmers taking a greater interest in these lines of industry, but the business men of the county are also turning much of their attention in that direction.

Owners of Eastland county farms are beginning to give them some attention. They have not been receiving much revenue from them in the past three or four years, and they are asking themselves the reason why, which question was answered by the fact that they have given them no attention.

Hundreds of carloads of fertilizer will be placed on the farms of Eastland county this year; many of them will be terraced and have other modern methods put into use on them; new and modern residences, out houses, etc., are being constructed to make life on the farm more attractive as well as to better house the people, stock and farming implements.

The average Eastland county farmer has gotten away from the one crop idea and has gone in to diversify. He is raising some poultry, doing a little truck-farming, growing some blooded hogs or cattle and in many instances both. He is also giving some thought to his orchard and vineyard. In other words he is preparing to live at home and have the proceeds of his money crop, as well as the proceeds from such surplus as he might have from his stock, garden, poultry and orchard, to lay up for a rainy day or to invest in more land or other properties.

The county has a splendid system of good roads, but we need more of them. There is also a crying need in the rural districts, as well as in the towns, for a system of rural telephones that will connect the rural districts with each other and with the various towns of the county.

### OKLAHOMA KLANSMEN IN SESSION TODAY, PARADE PLANNED FOR TONIGHT

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 22.—Approximately 1,000 delegates from various Oklahoma klans were scheduled to go into closed session here today, following which a parade of approximately 25,000 klansmen in full regalia will be held tonight, according to N. C. Jewett, grand dragon.

There will be few klansmen in the city outside of the state delegates for the annual business meeting, Jewett said. The majority of the paraders, who will come for the parade alone, will reach here late today or tonight, just before the parade starts.

### GOVERNOR NEFF MAKES TWO APPOINTMENTS TO FILL BOARD VACANCIES

AUSTIN, Feb. 22.—Mrs. Lee Joseph of San Antonio has been appointed to be a member of the board of regents of the College of Industrial Arts at Denton, to succeed Miss Mary Eleanor Brackenridge, deceased.

Mrs. Joseph is one of the most widely known clubwomen of Texas, having served during last year as president of the Texas Federation of Women's clubs.

Dr. Stewart Cooper of Abilene will succeed Dr. George H. Sandefere, deceased, as a member of the state board of medical examiners, it was announced at the executive department late Thursday afternoon. The appointment was made by Governor Neff.

### PRESIDENT COOLIDGE MEETS DEMPESEY BY APPOINTMENT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—By special appointment, Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, called on President Coolidge today. Although no appointments had been scheduled at the White House, because of the holiday, the president agreed to come to his office to meet Dempsey at noon.

### STAR WITNESS IN DRY RAIDS SHOT TO DEATH

Richard Watson Killed By Bullet Fired Through Window In Friend's House.

GLEN ROSE, Texas, Feb. 22.—Twenty men were being held in jail here today in connection with the assassination from ambush last night of Richard Watson, 27, prohibition officer and star witness in the prosecution of defendants arrested in the liquor raids here last summer.

"I am confident Watson's slayer is among the prisoners," declared Ranger M. Burton, who was with Watson when the latter was killed.

Watson was shot through the window in the home of Tom Duncan, one block from the city square in Glen Rose. He had just returned from Cleburne with State Ranger Burton, where he had testified against E. L. Roark, former county attorney of Somervell county.

Watson fell dead in his chair immediately after the shot was fired. The state has no evidence as to who did the shooting, but several are being held in connection with the investigation, Ranger Burton said. Officers have no clew leading to the identity of the slayer and all the evidence is circumstantial, he said.

Watson testified against the former official, who was charged with accepting bribes in the Glen Rose liquor raids. He had been the chief witness in every case. A brother, C. B. Watson, had also been a witness. Both had commissions as officers in prohibition enforcement cases and 80 arrests were made in connection with evidence obtained by the Watsons in raids in Somervell and Hood counties. Richard Watson was responsible for 44 arrests in Somervell county.

Peace officers of Hood, Johnson and Bosque counties have notified of the killing of Watson and several have offered to come to the aid of the Somervell county officers.

### More Rangers Will Be Sent to Glen Rose If Needed

AUSTIN, Feb. 22.—No order had been issued up to noon today by the adjutant general for additional rangers to go to Glen Rose to aid the two rangers now there in the apprehension of the murderer of Richard Watson, principal witness in the prosecution of liquor cases who was shot and killed at Glen Rose last night. Pending reports from Ranger M. Burton, who was with Watson at the time of the killing, no order in connection with the tragedy will be issued by the adjutant general, it was said, and in the event that help is needed rangers will be sent from the nearest point.

### NEWTON D. BAKER IS READY TO SUPPORT COX FOR THE PRESIDENCY

CLEVELAND, Feb. 22.—Newton D. Baker, war secretary in the Wilson cabinet, declared today that he would support James M. Cox, former governor of Ohio, for the Democratic nomination for president. Cox has signified his intention of entering the Ohio presidential preference primary.

At the same time, Baker said he would urge a League of Nations plank in the Democratic platform. In his interview, he said: "I believe Democrats are proud of the splendid fight made by Governor Cox on the question of foreign relations. He was loyal to the principles of international co-operation President Wilson had proclaimed," in the interests of peace which

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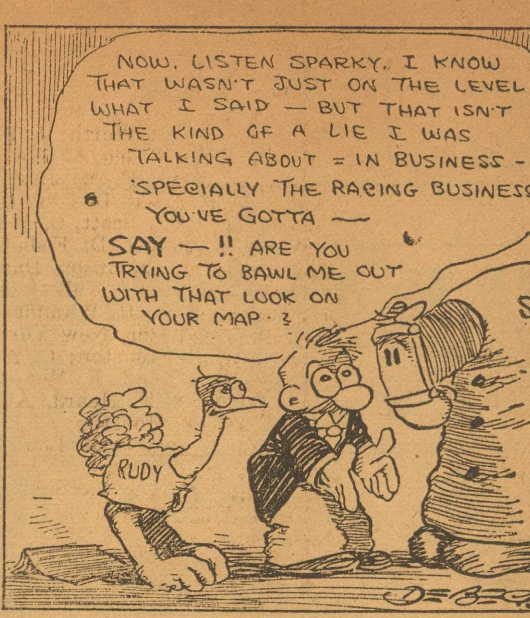
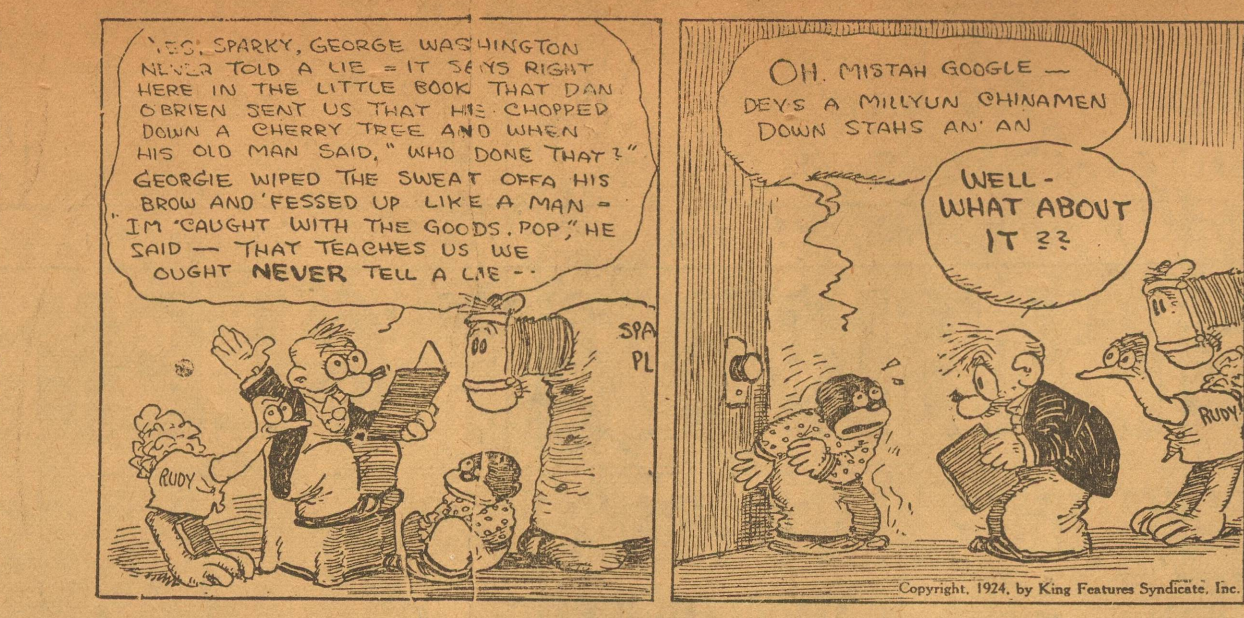

**Telephone Rates In Eastland Boosted Slightly Higher**

The Eastland city commission has agreed to an advance in rates to be charged by the Southwestern Telephone company in Eastland. At a meeting of the commission Thursday night the matter was taken up. The telephone company asked for an advance of \$2 to \$3 on residence telephones and from \$5 to \$6 on business telephones. The rate finally agreed upon was \$2.75 for residence and \$5.50 for business telephones. The telephone company has agreed, it is understood, to put two and four-party rates into effect, which are cheaper than the rates charged where there is only one party on the line. The two-party rate is \$2.25 and the four-party rate is \$1.75. The extension rate is \$1 and the exchange rate is 50 cents. No time limit was set as to when this agreement should end, the telephone company merely accepting for an indefinite time a proposition made by the commission.

**WAGES HERE AND ABROAD**

**THE** American factory worker is receiving wages the purchasing power of which is above the wages paid in any other country of the world. The British Ministry of Labor has made a computation of the amount of food which the wages of workers in different cities of the world will purchase. In the following table the purchasing power of wages in London is taken as 100, and the purchasing power of wages in other cities is shown as percentages of this figure. The table indicates that the worker in New York can buy more than twice as much food with his wages than the worker in London, while the worker in Berlin or Vienna can buy only a little more than half as much with his daily wage as the worker in London, or only one-fourth as much as the worker in New York.

STANDARD FORMULAS OF FERTILIZERS FAVORED BY A. & M. CHEMISTS

COLLEGE STATION, Texas.—Anticipating the use of 30 per cent more fertilizer in Texas this year than in any previous year, Dr. G. S. Fraps, chief of the division of chemistry of the experiment station of the A. & M. college and state chemist, has issued a recommendation to farmers that they buy only the standard fertilizer formulas. While there are 167 different kinds of fertilizer mixtures registered for sale in Texas, Dr. Fraps recommends only the 11 standard formulas. "This great number is not at all necessary," he said, "and their use merely causes fertilizers to cost more. The use of the standard formulas will result in reducing the cost of plant food, simplify recommendations for use of fertilizer and reduce the purchasing and handling of unnecessary weight found in the lower grade fertilizers. Fertilizer means plant food, phosphoric acid, nitrogen and potash in such forms that the plants can take them up readily. It is not possible to buy these elements pure but it must be bought along with other materials which are necessary as carriers of the plant food. There are various combinations but for simplification and economy they have been standardized for Texas conditions on a basis of the soil, crop and other conditions. The names of these are expressed in figures which show the proportionate amounts of the three plant foods and thus are easy remembered and understood. Of the three figures in each fertilizer designation, the first indicates the amount of phosphoric acid, second nitrogen and third potash. For instance a 12-4-4 fertilizer is one containing 12 per cent available phosphoric acid, 4 per cent nitrogen and 4 per cent potash. The analysis printed on the bag or tag should correspond to one of these figures if the goods are standard formulas. Information for selection of the proper formulas may be obtained by writing the college."

COURT DENIES NEW TRIAL TO CLEVE BARNES

Judge George L. Davenport of the Ninety-first district court overruled a motion for a new trial in the Cleve Barnes case. Various reasons were set out by counsel for Barnes in their motion for a new trial chief among which was the fact that the jury, in its deliberations, discussed the fact that the defendant did not go on the stand and testify in his own behalf. These facts were brought out when the jury was placed on the witness stand and questioned regarding the matter. Barnes' attorneys took an appeal to the court of criminal appeals. His bond was fixed at \$5,000 which he gave.

In order that the British Labor Cabinet members may have spokesmen in the House of Lords, the King has conferred the title of Baron on three officials.

MARKET OPINION ISSUED TO JESS TAYLOR & COMPANY

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 22.—H. & R. Beer wired Jess Taylor & Co., of Cisco, as follows: While the market ruled very irregular again it received better support than of late, owing to prospects for an early settlement of the British dock strike. Some little improvement in the demand for cotton goods, and because of a rumor that the government may soon issue a bullish correction in their carry-over figures of American cotton as of July 31, 1923, which totaled 3,965,000 bales against 2,396,000, exclusive of futures. On the other hand London reports that prospects of a lockout in the cotton trade of Lancashire grows daily more threatening. The cartoon representatives, who also are affected by the present dispute, failed to attend a joint conference, which it had been hoped would adopt a scheme of control for the American sections of the trade (and thus using American cotton). This is interpreted as reflecting their dissatisfaction with the negotiations now under way to end the dispute. Meanwhile the weather has improved in the interior, and much will depend on developments in the spot department and the cotton goods markets. In event of the British dock strike being in the immediate future, chances are that the end of the strike would have a bullish effect on values temporarily only. The New York and New Orleans cotton exchanges will be closed today.

### MAIL HOURS IN RANGER ALWAYS BUSY PERIODS

Postmaster Drienhofer Says the Heaviest Load Comes in Early Afternoon.

When does the most mail come into Ranger during postoffice hours? Two o'clock in the afternoon, according to both Postmaster J. F. Drienhofer and Assistant Postmaster George A. Gray. Passenger train No. 3 of the Texas & Pacific railroad brings a heavy load of mail usually for this city, and its distribution begins around 2 o'clock, if the train is on time.

Monday is the busiest day of the week for the postoffice employees. On this day, folks who get their general delivery mail always call for it. On Sundays, first class mail only is sorted for the postoffice private boxes, and all other classes of mail must be taken care of Monday. Carriers, too, have two days' mail to deliver on Monday. More stamps are sold on Monday, more letters registered and more money orders issued.

The smallest volume of business at the city postoffice comes on Wednesday. The most outgoing mail is handled on Monday. Sunday, with its opportunity of attending religious services and obtaining rest, is used by folks to catch up with their correspondence and this mail goes off Monday morning. Both rural and city carriers will yowl for this. The most incoming mail is handled on Sunday's and Tuesday's.

Sunday's volume of parcel post packages runs high. For example on Monday of this week, 101 parcel post packages were checked for delivery through the rented office boxes by Assistant Postmaster Gray. He also estimated that between 75 and 100 packages were delivered by city carriers on the same day.

Clerks have to hustle between the hours of 7 and 9 a. m., each day, as the night incoming mail from three trains has to be shaped up for delivery. The most slack hours of the day come between 12 and 2 o'clock, Gray said. This does not take into consideration the run of business at the windows, as this must necessarily vary.

**NORTH CAROLINA TOBACCO.**  
RALEIGH, N. C., Feb. 20.—State agricultural authorities estimate that 386,000,000 pounds of tobacco were produced on North Carolina farms last summer. More than 262,000,000 pounds has been sold on the independent markets of the state up to January 1, while much of the remaining 124,000,000 pounds was known to have been sold through the growers' co-operative marketing association. A small part of the crop remained in farmers' hands.

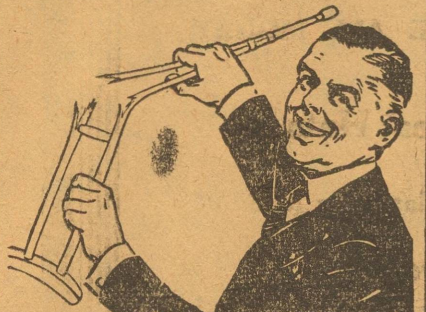
