Cleveland Evens up the Series, 5 to 1 MISCONDUCT IN OFFICE

Four Dodger Pitchers Fail to Stop Indian Batting Onslaughts

Coveleskie Stars Both in Field and in Pitcher's Box; Largest Attendance of Fans During Series Sees Hard Fought Game.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 9.—Brooklyn's star pitching staff crumbled today before the onslaught of Speaker's Tribe. Four slabsters essayed to hold the rampaging Clevelanders and all were made miserable. Cadore started for the Brooklynites. He was bumped for two runs in the first round and nicked for two blows in the second with none down, when he was relieved by Mamaux.

The relief twirler proved equal to the occasion for one inning only. He fanned Coveleskie and his teammates saved the day with a double play on Jamieson's fly, which looked good for extra bases until Hap Myers got under it.

Successive singles by Wambsganns and Speaker greeted the Dodgers in the next round. Robinson called it a day for him and Marquard tried his hand. Burns promptly slammed the ball into left field and when Wheat fumbled the drive two men came home. Marquard pulled out of several tight holes untitl the sixth, when he was taken out to permit Lamar to try his hand as a pinch hitter.

Pfeffer then essayed to block the avalanche of hits. He was bumped for one score in the seventh, but held Cleveland scoreless in the eighth, when a pinch safety would have scored additional tallies for the Indians.

Coveleskie, aside from a splendidly twirled game, made two sensational fielding plays and delivered a hit which blossomed into a run. His support was wobbly in one inning but he pulled through without damage. Brooklyn's one run was earned by the coupling together of Johnston's single and Griffith's two base knocks. ACCUSATION AGAINST OFFICIAL BY CITIZE

Claim Is Made That Bootlegging and Gambling Run Open With Knowledge of Mayor; Incumbent Obtains Restraining Order.

With three newly elected aldermen of Desdemona trying to impeach its mayor, H. W. ALIENS NOT PRIVILEGED.

The "Red" or communist cause in America has not flourished. It has dwarfed and dwindled because it has been drowned in a sea of apathy and indiffer ence to its doctrines. There has been little active opposition to the propaganda except in the suppression of radicals se warped and fanatical that they were li able to inflame the immature minds of ignorant followers to haphazard violence It is simply a doctrine that has no ap peal to the temper and spirit and ideals of the American people. That is all there is to it.

This being the case, it is surprisingor would be surprising were it not for the known single-mindedness of fauatics -that the efforts to further these doc trines do not die from the exhaustion induced by beating against the stone walls of inertia.

Yesterday two men were arrested in Chicago with half a ten of the mos violent Bolsheviki literature in their pos session. When reduced to individual copies, that is a vast number, probably half a million. Printing costs money these days, and the sum involved is considerable, for this one batch alone. Agitators are not producers, and they have no money-and many would be unwilling -to bear the expense of propaganda or this scale from their own pockets. I is doubtful if the money could be raised in America unless some large organiza tion with compulsory contributions ex ists. And the existence of any such society is even more doubtful.

Therefore the conclusion is inevitable that the money for this activity comes from some other country, presumably Russia, since the doctrines promulgate are Russian, and they alone have the time and inclination to further such prop aganda. This theory is further borne out by the federal reserve bank's inquiry into the sources and destination of Russian gold sent to this country.

Free speech and the right to criticis governmental policies is one thing. E tending this privilege to the point of calling on the foreign elements to over throw the government and spare no means of violence in so doing, is another No leniency should be shown this class of dwellers in the darkened cellars of conspiracy in our larger cities. No clemency should be shown persons who are now serving sentences for conspiring against the government. No immigrants should be permitted to land on our shores who do not actually and not as a matter of form renounce all allegiance to any other government or form of government. And it is doubtful if foreign-born citizens should ever be given participation in politics without a thorough training in American ideas and ideals.


