## HAGAMAN WINS CITY WATERWORKS CASE

### JAPANESE EARTHQUAKE DEATH LIST GROWS; 2,275 ARE KILLED

#### FLAMES FOLLOW WAKE OF SHAKE; DEATH IS SPREAD

Devastated Area Shows Terror and Bodies Are Burned in The Wrecks

TOKIO, Japan, March 9.—A wholesale incineration of dead, injured and nearly imprisoned residents of the Sea of Japan coastal towns of Minneyama occurred a few minutes after the earthquake leveled that town, an eye-witness of the horrors told the United Press today. Eye-witness reports of the devastated area of the province of Kyoto revealed that the overwhelming terror of the earthquake scenes has not been conveyed in its gruesome entirety by reports so far received and cabled throughout the world.

The immediate area of Minneyama was wrecked by the quake. The story is partially told in the official figures compiled by the Kyoto prefect:

Dead, 2,275. Injured, 4,100.

Flames rose from the crumpled houses in Minneyama which the dust, occasioned by the quake ignited the debris. The town, the United Press was informed, seemed to have been razed as though by magic. Scores of fires were burning almost immediately. Last night a cold, heavy rain soaked the majority of the 70,000 refugees whose shelter was the sky. They had no hot or even cooked food. They ate raw rice. Everywhere today bodies lay unburied. There were no tools with which to dig graves.

Among the ruins of the villages and on Minneyama survivors assisted with their hands the removal of the debris of their homes to recover incinerated bones of their dead.

Coast artillery men from the Mazuru garrison were carrying tents, bedding and food to the refugees. The area today was a place of misery, suffering and sorrow.

The Japanese who arrived from the quake blasted spot today said the highway between Miyazu north to Minneyama was lined with squatting refugees scarcely any of whom failed to bear some wound.

#### 35 MEN WAR ON DEATH TO SAVE FELLOW

EVANSTON, Ill., March 9.—A modern battle with death with 35 men offering physical endurance and medical science in an attempt to give artificial respiration to Alfred Frick, is being waged today in St. Francis hospital. Frick is suffering from paralysis of the diaphragm and cannot breathe, yet for more than 72 hours a group of his co-workers has kept him alive.

The patient is conscious. He is able to speak only a few words.

One week ago Frick had two teeth removed. He became ill last Thursday and complained of acute pains in his stomach and chest. Saturday progressive paralysis set in, and he lost use of his legs.

Sunday morning respiration became next to impossible.

Frick's respiration ceased entirely at noon that day and three doctors working two at a time and in exact rhythm forced artificial breathing and kept life within Frick. When these doctors tired co-workers volunteered and the shifts were cut to 15 minutes.

Day and night without a break in the steady pressing the workers have stood over Frick maintaining life within him.

One pause in the rhythmic pressing means death because Frick has no way of breathing save for the constant untiring work of his comrades.

#### LEGISLATURE MAY REMAIN IN SESSION ONE WEEK

##### Abolition of Fees To County Officers Bill Is Introduced Today

AUSTIN, March 9.—Suggestion that the legislature remain in session until Saturday, March 19, one week beyond the regular sixty day period, members to receive only \$2 per day for overtime, was made by Governor Moody in his address this morning.

Additional time was asked by the governor to permit completion of a large amount of important legislation.

Governor Moody as he did in his address to the house yesterday afternoon, dwelt at length on the text book legislation, urging legislators to advise at this session the present law on the subject.

Reorganization of the state prison system was advocated by the governor. Passage of the bill to aid the judiciary was also urged.

The senate committee on constitutional amendment today reported favorably the house joint resolution by Representative Williamson, San Antonio, proposing an amendment to the constitution to place all revenue derived from the gasoline tax in the highway department fund. The committee liked that part of the resolution which sought to give to the schools the gross oil production taxes.

Favorable reports were made on the Nabors house joint resolution to exempt church property from taxation after adding Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. property.

Abolition of fees for county judges, county attorneys, county clerks, district clerks, tax assessors, tax collectors, sheriffs, constables, and justices of the peace, is proposed in a joint resolution offered in the house last night. It proposes a constitutional amendment placing these officers on flat salaries.

It was not inspired by the Ohio decision of the supreme court, Representative Wassels the author, says, but meets that decision.

#### Senate Kills Five Joint Resolutions

AUSTIN, March 9.—Senate committee on constitution amendments today killed five joint resolutions, proposing amendments to the constitution. Resolutions killed included the Powell house amendment, limiting the power of the legislature to remit taxes; Greer senate resolution making unfinished business of the legislative session pending during the following session; Fly house amendment for election of secretary of state; Reid senate amendment permitting boards of education to have six years overlapping terms and the Floyd amendment providing that real estate sold for taxes may be redeemed within two years by paying a premium of ten percent for each year with taxes and cost.

#### South Dakota Co-ed Draws 30 Day Term

D., March 9.—Comely Marian Meyers, University of South Dakota co-ed, who attempted to rob a bank in order that she might complete her education was sentenced to 30 days in the penitentiary today. The young woman pleaded guilty to attempting to rob the First National bank of Vermillion.

#### RANGER RATES ON INSURANCE ARE CUT DEEP

Mayor Bob Hodges of Ranger received a wire from Austin yesterday afternoon, authorizing a six percent good fire record cut on Rangers insurance rate.

The wire reads, "Ranger receives six percent good fire record credit, effective March 1st. Notify all agents."

The cut in rate is really tantamount to a fifteen percent reduction, as a nine percent penalty attached in 1926 on account of the bad fire records of the three years prior to that time, is automatically dropped.

The credit is applicable only to policies written on or before March first 1927, and fire insurance policies prior to that date are in no ways affected by the change in rate. The only way that an assured could obtain the new rate would be to cancel short rate on his present policy, which would afford him little if any benefit and the agent a lot of red tape.

The news of the reduction in rate comes after a long hard effort on the part of Fire Chief George Murphy, local insurance agents, chamber of commerce officials, the city commission and the fire prevention committee.

Several years ago the matter of getting the reduction in the fire rate was launched. One of the first things done was the doing away of frame risks in the mercantile district and this has been done so well that only one frame risk remains now. Arson rewards were posted. Fire prevention week was observed and fire prevention taught in the schools. Trash on business and private premises was looked after and hauled off to keep down the danger of fire. The stand pipe was enlarged, more mains were laid, and many, many things were done that have taken time and patience.

With 1927 fire record held down to a near zero point, Ranger may hope for another reduction next year, as the record is based on a three years' fire standing.

There were very few disastrous fires in 1926 and those were not allowed to spread.

#### House Passes Purl Bill To Aid Veterans

AUSTIN, March 9.—The house passed finally the Purl bill providing for appointment of guardians for shell-shocked soldiers where it is necessary that guardians be appointed to receive funds or money due such soldiers from the federal government. The bill had the support of the American Legion.

The senate referred to the committee on education the report of the committee investigating conditions at John Tarleton Junior Agricultural college, with instructions that it give a full hearing and take any action it may see fit.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The white house announced that promising informal negotiations are in progress between this government and Japan for a three-power naval limitation pact, was enthusiastically received here today by big navy advocates and pacifists both.

#### BURNS PROVE FATAL FOR EXPLOSION VICTIM

##### Brother of Injured Man Is Painfully Burned Doing Rescue Work

Edward Wooley of Ranger, aged 33 years, was fatally burned yesterday afternoon at 12:30 o'clock when the Texas pump station at Rising Star blew up. He was rushed to the City-County hospital, Ranger, where he passed away last night at 10 o'clock.

On account of the absence of Bob Kendricks of the Texas Pipe Line company from Ranger today, the details of the tragedy were very meagre. It is alleged that the deceased was working on a pump in the plant and was screwing on a stud on a valve not covered by a gasket, when it broke off, letting a stream of oil into the station building, which was followed by the explosion.

His brother, Frank Wooley, who had arrived at the station shortly before the accident, called to him to run, but Wooley stopped to shut the gate that cut off oil and gas from the lines that lead into the station, and just as he emerged from the building was caught in the explosion.

His brother tore the burning clothes from his body and received serious burns himself about the face and hands.

The deceased is survived by his widow and five small children, a brother, Frank Wooley, and a sister, Mrs. I. W. Lee, both of Ranger. He resided on Foch street.

The body was shipped to his old home in Missouri for interment, this afternoon.

#### BOY BOMBER LAUGHS AT POLICEMEN

DALLAS, March 9.—Howard Barr, 15 years old, admitted in a statement, police said today, he attempted to bomb his father's home in order to collect a \$40,000 insurance policy. He said he wanted the money to visit his mother in San Diego, Calif., according to the statement.

Following an attempt on the lives of Jack Barr, the boy's father, his stepmother and younger brother by bombing early yesterday, the police investigation showed that a stick of dynamite had been stolen from a negro employed by Barr. The negro was arrested but insisted his employer's son had stolen the explosive.

After the boy's arrest at school, it required two hours grilling to break him down, police said.

The father said he would make no attempt to release his son from jail. Smoking a cigarette expertly, young Howard Barr joked and laughed with the police and newspapermen from his cell.

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#### COURT DECIDES CITY MUST PAY FOR PIPELINE

##### Case Involves Over \$5,000, Dates Back To 1918 When Sale Made

In the case of M. H. Hagaman vs. the City of Ranger, held in the Ninety-first district court of Eastland county, a decision was rendered in favor of the plaintiff, for approximately \$5,600.

The controversy arose out of the sale of the Ranger waterworks and dates back to the sale of the distributing system by M. H. Hagaman to the city of Ranger. The issue in the controversy was in the appraised value of a water main leading from the Hagaman lake to the city of Ranger.

When Mr. Hagaman started to put in a waterworks system, back in 1913, the Texas & Pacific Railroad company was planning to put in a six-inch line from the lake to the Texas & Pacific depot for the purpose of furnishing water for their locomotives and other needed purposes. Mr. Hagaman negotiated and made a trade with the railroad company to increase the size of the line from a six-inch to an eight-inch line, he, Hagaman, paying the difference in the cost between the six-inch and the eight-inch line, the greater part of the distance, at an expense to Hagaman of about \$5,600, which contract provided that the line would be used for pumping both city and water for the railroad company.

The contract between Mr. Hagaman and the railroad company provided that title to the line should remain in the railroad company but that Hagaman had the right to use the line for the purpose of pumping city water through it.

#### MOTHER RISKS LIFE FOR BABES

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., March 9.—A frantic mother, her body seared by flames that were threatening the lives of her five children risked her own life to save her little girls and then lost her two sons in a fire at Compton, Ark., near here early today.

Mrs. James Stricklen and her five children were in the chicken house at the Stricklen home when the incubator exploded setting fire to the building. She carried the three small girls to safety and was returning for the two boys when the roof of the building collapsed and burned both of the boys to death. Mrs. Stricklen's burns may prove fatal.

#### This Russian Took Drink, 1812, He Still Lives

LAHTI, Russia.—Ivan Shapkov hasn't been drunk since he celebrated Napoleon's retreat from Moscow in 1812 and was put in the guard-house, he told census takers when he gave them documentary proof that he had been born in 1732, the year when England and the newborn United States signed the peace which closed the American revolution.

As a young soldier of thirty years of age, he helped repel Napoleon's invasion of Russia and fought in the armies of Alexander the Great against the Corsican. His discharge papers established the date of his birth.

He is now 145 years old and enjoying life and good health with his sixth wife, who at the age of 88 might be considered an old woman if she were not years younger than her husband and actually young enough to be his granddaughter.

**EGG-BASKET GETS PUBLICITY.**  
 In the Wednesday morning issue of the Fort Worth Record-Telegram appears the following item about the Eastland county exhibit at the Southwestern Exposition and Pat Stock show:

Co-operative marketing and the promotion of the poultry industry generally has earned for Eastland county the title of "The Egg-Basket of Texas."  
 Methods adopted by poultry raisers of the county in the organization of the Bankhead Poultry Producers' association are outlined in an exhibit at the Southwestern Exposition and Pat Stock show.

"The Egg-Basket of Texas" is a fitting title, due to the fact that 103,000 baby chicks are turned out every three weeks from the custom hatcheries of Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Rising Star in addition to those of a number of smaller incubators being run by farmers and poultrymen.

Twenty thousand hens lay for the Bankhead Poultry Producers' association and the goal of the organization is 100,000 hens by 1930. Shipments of baby chicks from Eastland county are large, but the majority of the chickens are kept in the county.

More than 200,000 Leghorns are in the county now in addition to thousands of other breeds. The situation is the result of three years of intensive effort on the part of the county agent and the chamber of commerce of the four cities involved. They undertook to make Eastland famous for poultry as well as an oil and gas field and a good general farming country.

Farmers in the vicinity are taking advantage of the idea that several hundred hens will add to their general prosperity. The region also is attracting numerous commercial poultry farms. Surplus eggs and fliers are handled by the co-operative marketing system.

This kind of publicity is worth thousands of dollars to Eastland county. It shows that Eastland county thinks about something else besides oil and produces something else besides oil. It will attract the attention of other sections of the state to Eastland county and every town in the county will receive benefits.

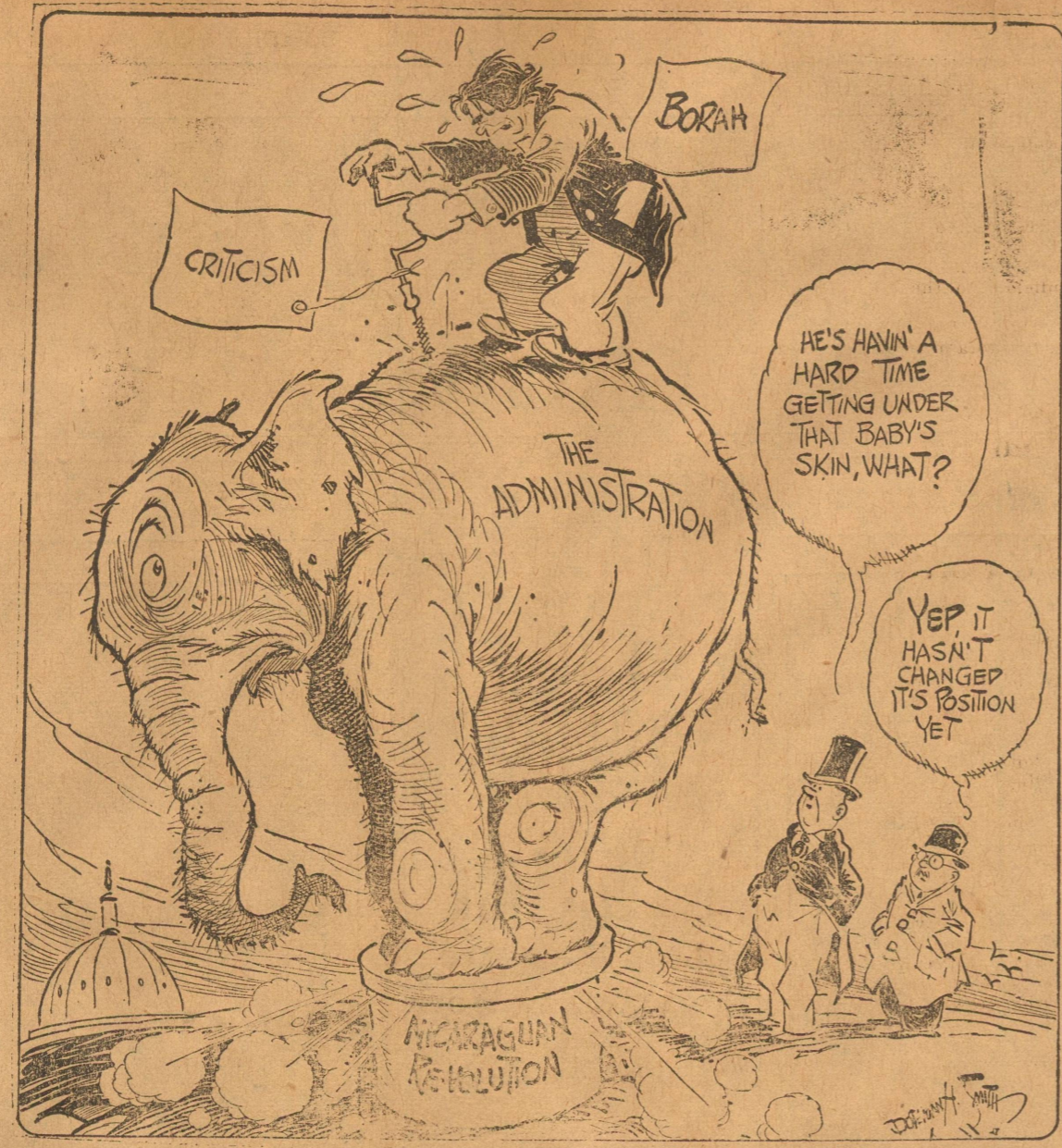

Eastland county is doing pioneer work in co-operative marketing and as a result Eastland county poultry products will soon have a national reputation. **Weissmuller Now After Winning And Not Records**

 CHICAGO, March 9.—Johnny Weissmuller, who has broken so many world's records he is known as the "one man swimming trust," will not try to break any marks in the indoor national swimming meet here April 5, 6, 7 and 8, but will save his energies to win every event he goes into, he told the United Press in an exclusive interview here.

"Because my team-mate Arne Borg, who helped the Illinois Athletic club to win the championship last year has returned to Sweden, I'll have to go into a lot of events to score points for the I. A. C.," Weissmuller confided. "I'm not going to extend myself to break records for I plan on swimming the 100 yard event, the 220, the 500 meter, the backstroke, competing in the medley relay and in the 400 yard relay besides playing about three hard games of water polo."

"I don't mean I'm going to lay down. But if I give all I've got the first day or so, I'll be all tired out the next day. I'm apt to get beat. There's a young fellow—this Walter Lauffer of Cincinnati—who's swimming pretty fast now, and I don't want to drop any events to him if I can help it."

When the National indoor championships are held in Honolulu the last week in August, Weissmuller will turn his attention to his regular business of record breaking, he said. "I'm going out there and I'm going to try to swim the hundred yards in less than 50 seconds," he said. "I hope to break this record before I slow down," he confided. "I already have done it in a 60 foot tank, but to get a world's record—to beat an American record I've got to do it in at least a 75 foot tank. The time I did it indoors, in our 60 foot tank, I got the biggest kick out of swimming that I ever did. I just knew I was traveling faster than I'd ever traveled before. I made it in 49 4-5 and the best I'd ever done it before was 51 3-5."  
 In Hawaii, Lauffer will form his chief proposition, Weissmuller feels. He says he thinks Duke Kohanomoku, Hawaiian swimmer, will remain in Hollywood, where he is employed in the films at present, because the veteran has seen his best swimming days.

**Moscow Fearful Of Spring Rush, City Overcrowded**

 MOSCOW.—Springtime is awaited with intense anxiety by the crowded population of Moscow, because the melting weather is likely to bring illnesses which could quickly reach the proportions of an uncontrollable epidemic in view of the acute housing shortage. The commissariat of health is taking early precautions to prevent a dangerous situation.

With families restricted to living in a single room used for every purpose of life by four or more persons, including babies, the danger of a serious epidemic is present, the health authorities believe. Cleanliness, fresh air and the regular life on which good health depends are difficult if not entirely impossible and with the coming of the melting weather, when Moscow's mountains of snow will turn to floods and the frost will ooze out of the earth, the likelihood of common colds developing into pneumonia and influenza is expected to be great.

**Protectorate Over Nicaragua Seems Assured**

WASHINGTON, March 7.—A virtual United States protectorate over revolution-ridden Nicaragua appears assured now.  
 Officials here are studying reports of statements of the Muz Muz conference in the Nicaraguan jungles by General Moncado, liberal rebel military chief approving the plan of the conservative President Diaz, for a United States-Nicaragua "alliance."  
 The full text of the Diaz proposal is expected in Washington during this week. It provides protection of United States rights to build inter-oceanic canal across that country, to establish naval bases at Corin Islands and Fonseca Bay and "legalizes" United States military intervention and customs and financial control.  
 American forces of occupation numbering 2,500, supporting the Diaz regime against liberal revolution, now control virtually all the inhabited sections of the country.

 LONDON.—Unless there is a big shakeup in the Oxford crew before April 2, when the annual race with Cambridge is scheduled, there will be at least one American in the "Dark Blue" boat. He is H. T. Kingsbury, a former Yale oarsman, now a Rhode scholar.

After much preliminary shuffling, Kingsbury was surprisingly chosen from the large squad of candidates for the place of No. 7. He has quickly adapted himself to English rowing methods, and although it is too early to say that his seat is secure, many of his critics regard him as one of the best men in the boat. He is also the heaviest man, weighing 188. The crew this year is rather on the light side.
