TOBACCO TAX MEETS DEATH IN HOUSE TODAY

Regular Session of The Legislature Will End On March 16, at Noon

AUSTIN, March 10.—The regular session of the fortieth legislature will end Wednesday, March 16 at 12 o'clock noon, the senate this morning having adopted a resolution providing for adjournment at that time. The vote was 21 to 8.

It is generally understood that the remaining days of the term will be given over to important legislation only. Included in that is the revision of the highway law, the two or three cents tax on the gallon of gasoline, and other matters that can hardly be reached and finished. The prison law that is sponsored by the governor also will come up for consideration.

Protectorate Intervention In Nicaragua, No

WASHINGTON, March 10.—The United States has no intention of intervening to establish a protectorate over Nicaragua, the state department informed the senate foreign relations committee in secret session just before congress adjourned.

Cash Balance On Hand by State Largest in History

AUSTIN, March 10.—The state of Texas at close of business had the largest amount of money on hand in the treasury in its history, \$20,316,266, State Treasury W. Gregory Hatcher reported. General revenue fund had a balance of \$5,290,830, available school fund \$5,849,005, highway fund, \$6,573,331.

M'CALL WELL INCREASING PRODUCTION

Development in The McAllister Pool Is Gaining Headway

The McCall well in the Morgan field seven miles south of Carbon and about 15 miles southwest of Eastland by the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company is rated as one of the best producers in the field. It touched the pay for 50 barrels and has steadily increased on being drilled into the sand. An accurate report on its production is not available, but the well will prove a good one. This well is 1,000 feet east of the Morgan No. 1 of the Independent Oil & Gas company.

Delaney's G. W. Hines No. 1, 600 feet north of the McAllister No. 1 is drilling at about 2,000 feet. Cranfill & Reynolds' J. E. Spencer No. 1, three-quarters of a mile southwest of the McAllister No. 1, is drilling around a depth of 1,000 feet. The well on the Mrs. V. Ables tract, 600 feet east of the Hines and 600 feet north of the McAllister No. 2, is reported down to a depth of 2,000 feet.

AUSTIN, March 10.—By vote of 18 to 7, the senate killed Boggs house joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution for payment of county and improvement district taxes on University of Texas lands. Consideration of the resolution was indefinitely postponed on motion of Senator Pollard.

JUSTICES GET \$1,500 RAISE OTHERS \$1,000

Proposed Amendment Constitution to Change School Law Is Killed

AUSTIN, March 10.—Conference committees of the senate and house today agreed on the differences in the bill increasing salaries of judges of the higher courts and the district courts, the amendment adopted by the house being accepted. When the report is adopted by the senate and house the bill will be sent to the governor for his approval.

Salaries of members of the supreme court and court of criminal appeals are increased from \$6,500 to \$8,000 annually; members of the various courts of civil appeals from \$5,000 to \$7,000. District judges' salaries are increased from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

Kuackanboss, 60, both legs broken. J. L. Richards, one leg broken. Mrs. C. A. Adams, internal injuries.

State May Buy Alamo Block To Establish Park

AUSTIN, March 10.—Recommendation was made to the legislature by the "Alamo commission" appointed by Governor Moody under authority of senate concurrent resolution that the state acquire all of the property on the Alamo block at San Antonio not now owned by the state and that it be converted as soon as may be practicable into an Alamo park. The total cost to the state would be \$329,000.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., March 10.—The average hobo eats about five times a day but his greatest difficulty at meal times is finding a place where he can get solid food. Prof. William E. THE ROAD LIGHT HOG.

Last Sunday night the road light hog added another victim to his list. The Cisco man who was killed when his car went into the ditch was the victim, according to advices received from reliable sources. It was the lights on the car of one meeting him that caused the accident and not the storm, because it was not raining. The hog is wise in his ways. He gets his lights tested before he buys his license and then after getting his license he pushes them up again. There ought to be a stricter enforcement of the law. It's a shame. It's really dangerous to travel in an auto at night.

Not only is the bright light hog still here, but his dearest friend, "Dead-Eye Dick," the one-light man. He is as bad as the bright light hog. "Dead-Eye Dick" can be seen on the streets of Ranger, Eastland and other towns in West Texas. The city ordinances of Ranger, Eastland and practically every other city and town in the state has an ordinance against one light on a car.

But that is neither here nor there, we are after the road hog and especially the road light hog who causes death because of his bright lights and wanting to hog the road. We know it to be a fact that there is no use to give the road light hog any signal, such as winking your lights. He pays no attention to it, that we know. Women and children do not make up a part of his existence, and likes to ply his hog trade when he sees them in a car.

There ought to be a law passed making a jail sentence compulsory for violations of the traffic laws on the road. The state lost a citizen Sunday night, a valuable asset. He went as a sacrifice on the altar for the headlight hog. It would not be a bad idea to have lights tested oftener than once in six months. That would help some.

Make the autoist show that he has had them tested and if not arrest him, and arrest him if his lights appear to be out of the limit even though tested. It's easy to change the lights after a test.

DAWES RULED SENATE WITH HAND OF IRON

By PAUL R. MAILLON (United Press Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, March 10.—During the short session of the sixty-ninth congress recently closed, Vice President Charles G. Dawes began to get his gavel working as presiding officer of the United States Senate. Dawes got away to a slow start, for his inaugural speech when he first assumed office in 1924, was received by senators with bitter and caustic criticism and ridicule. Sen-

ators resented his "lecture" on rules revision. Any new presiding officer must rely on the advice of clerks in the senate as to interpretation of the rules, for they have the experience of years while he has yet much to learn, which cannot be learned from reading the senate manual. Until this last short session began, Dawes rule was mild. But he showed himself absolutely impartial and "a good fellow" with senators. Soon the old animosities were forgotten and he was treated with respect rather than jibes from the floor. But in the months of change Dawes acquired a shrewd knowledge of the rules and precedents. During this last session he ruled with an iron hand. His gavel cracked relentlessly and his rulings challenged some of the precedents of the senate. At the time of the hectic sessions over Boulder Dam legislation, Dawes was once called to the chair so that

Senator Johnson, republican, California, could get in a cloture petition while his opponent Senator Ashurst, democrat, Arizona, had the floor. With the senate in an uproar because Senator Fess, republican, Ohio, temporarily in the chair had refused to accept Johnson's petition, Dawes rushed into the chair and accepted it while half a dozen senators were shouting for recognition. On another occasion during the closing days, republican leaders were again beginning to fear filibusters on approaching bills might force President Coolidge to call an extra session of congress. Senator La Follette, republican, Wisconsin, had indicated that he would object to everything. La Follette tried to block the mooted District of Columbia appropriation bill but Dawes forced the vote upon the measure and passed it without debate or a record vote. These incidents capped similar actions during the earlier part of the session when Dawes displayed the power of forceful rule.

Homage is Paid Virginia Carroll By C. I. A. Students

DENTON, March 10.—Special memorial services honoring Mrs. Virginia Carroll, one of the founders of Industrial Arts and for seventeen years hostess in that dormitory, were held in the garden back of the hall last Sunday afternoon. The services followed a dinner to which all senior students who formerly lived in Smith-Carroll Hall were present. Mrs. Carroll, wife of a one-time noted Texas minister, died February 24, 1926 in Colorado Springs. Representatives of the Y. W. C. A. cabinet and from Smith-Carroll dormitory carried flowers to the graves of Mrs. Carroll, her husband and her son, all buried in Denton.

Bring Textile Mills To Texas; Program Electric Service Co.



Waldo C. Cole, industrial commissioner of the Texas Electric Service Company, has been sent to Boston and other New England cities in an effort to bring a number of textile industries to Texas, John C. Carpenter, vice president and general manager of the Texas Electric Service Company, announced recently. Mr. Cole will remain in the East at least six months, acquainting capitalists and textile mill owners with the possibilities in Texas. Mr. Carpenter, himself a native Texan, has devoted much of his time the last five years to trips through Northwest and Eastern States to confer with capitalists interested in the textile industry and bring back ideas that would be helpful in the industrialization of his State. Several of

the newer textile mills are now operating in Texas as the result of Mr. Carpenter's efforts. Mr. Cole was reared in the cotton mill sections of the Carolinas, where he received much of his practical training. Until a few years ago he was in charge of one of the largest textile mills in Mexico. Before leaving for New England, Mr. Cole made extensive trips through Texas, conferring with Texas mill owners, studying the growth of these mills and gathering detailed information and samples of the goods to use in presenting the case of Texas. One of the newest advantages of Texas for textile mills which Mr. Cole will present during his stay in the East will be information about Texas Technological College at Lubbock, which has become one of the ranking textile institutions in the South, although only in its second year.

Death Is Subject Father Foulkes Wednesday Eve

Rev. D. J. Foulkes, S. J., the eloquent Jesuit Missionary who is conducting a week's mission at St. Rita's church has selected the general judgment under the title "After the Battle," as the topic of his lecture Thursday evening at the services which begin at 8 o'clock.

Press clippings from Beaumont, Texas, where Rev. Foulkes recently conducted a monster mission during which crowds were turned away night after night, declared that his conception and description of the scene that is to be enacted on the day of judgment was a masterpiece with oratorical pen-pictures and dramatic climaxes that thrilled his vast audience.

On Wednesday night Father Foulkes gave a meditation on death to the largest congregation assembled since the mission began, during the course of which he said in part: "What a piece of work is man; how noble in reason; how infinite in faculty; in form and moving, how express and admirable; in action, how like an angel; in apprehension, how like a god—the beauty of the world!"

"See," says the scientist, "the manifold productions of his genius. Who can resist his power? He has conquered the air with his airplanes and radio. He has conquered the sea with his dreadnaughts, his submarines and his ocean greyhounds. He has conquered the earth and made it yield forth its fruits for his support and refreshment. He has reached into the ether and dragged out that mysterious power called electricity and made it do his bidding, to turn his factories and to transport him across continents. He has dammed up streams and piped their waters to make the deserts bloom with verdure. He has delved into the earth and pilfered its treasures of gold and silver for his adornment, and copper and iron for his implements. He has well nigh conquered disease with his scientific researches; where now are the plagues that once took their count, less tolls of human life. He has looked into the beginnings of the germs of there the beginnings of the germs of immortality. He is evolved into a super-man, ere long to become a god."

"Who can resist his power? Who? There is a power that pulverizes genius and skill and knowledge and sets wealth at naught. Opulence and prestige shrink into nothingness before it. That power is death. Tonight we answer that challenge. Let us in spirit go to God's holy acre, where our departed await the last grand reveille of the eternal Easter dawn. And see!"

"The boast of heraldry, the pomp of power, All that beauty, all that wealth, for gave, Awaits alike the inevitable hour. The paths of glory lead but to the grave."

Where is Man? "Where is man? Take up a handful of dust. It was once, perhaps, a mighty brain that astonished the world with its learning. Perhaps it was a tongue, a golden tongue of mother, speaking words of love to

Wesson oil was used in preparing the salad dressings, using one half of the pint for this purpose to make thousand island dressing. The salads were combinations of vegetables, using grated carrots, turnips, cabbage, and a very little onion.

Fruit salad, two fancy salads, one candle salad, and a butterfly salad were prepared. Several others were mentioned and recipes given. Enough of both kinds were demonstrated to show how to serve the family and to serve the fancy salads in entertainments. Individual salads were stressed, as so many people say they do not like salads. If fixed in attractive ways, they will often be eaten. In them, Miss Ramey states, one gets so much uncooked vegetables and fruits that are so necessary to a protected diet which includes one raw vegetable and one raw fruit each day. Raw vegetables are recommended because the vitamins are not destroyed by heat. Salads were served to the members present.

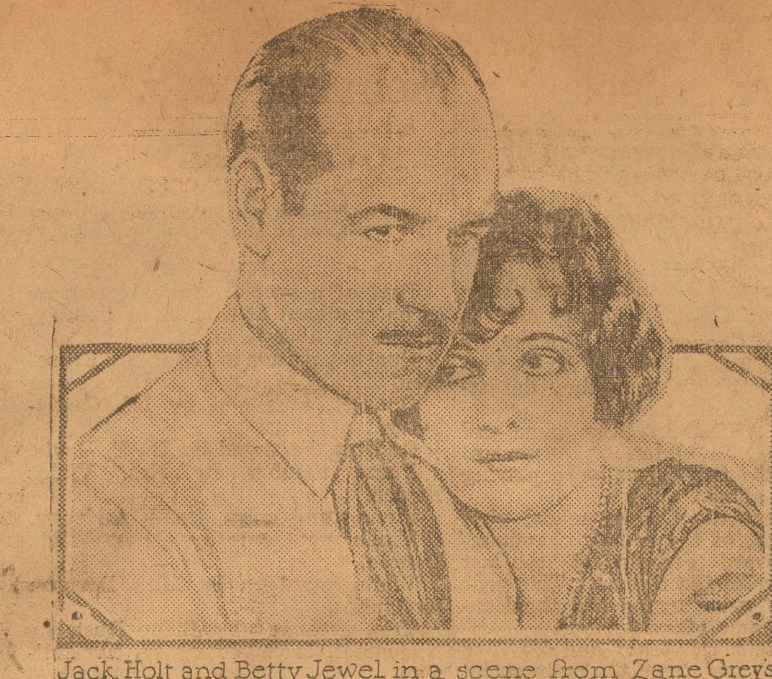
