Death of Blind Fiddler Technically Comes Under Case of Man Who is Charged With Firing Prince Rupert Hotel Before Conflagration.

The alleged eyewitness to the ignition of the burned building is known by several persons in Ranger and one of them has said that his hands were badly burned. It is thought that he helped the blind fiddler escape after he reached the burning stairway.

There is little likelihood that the Hamon-Kell line will establish a station for Necessity on their lines in the near future, according to General Manager Neff of the line, as the Hamon-Kell interest intend to appeal from the ruling to that effect by the State Railroad Commis-The commission recently ruled that the line must establish a depot for Necessity not to cost less






