

### FRANCE UNAFFECTED BY INDUSTRIAL ROWS IN NEIGHBOR NATIONS

By NEWTON C. PARKE, International News Service Staff Correspondent.

PARIS, Oct. 26.—Despite a steady increase in the cost of living in France last summer and frank statements that prices will go higher this winter, there is no prospect of a spread of bolshevism and absolutely no danger of any of the kind of serious industrial disturbances recently witnessed in Italy and England.

As cold weather approaches labor conditions may become more unsettled and the country may experience a few strikes. But the decisive manner in which the General Federation of Labor voted down bolshevism at its recent convention at Orleans indicated the temper of the working clases even better than the failure of the attempt last summer to carry out a general strike. Right now French labor is the most stable, unrevolutionary organization of its kind in all France.

Figures presented at the international ngress on finance at Brussels showed the cost of living in France to be higher than in any civilized nation in the world and about twice as high as in the United States. The report made by the council of the League of Nations, taking the figure 100 as a basis, put the present cost of living in leading countries as follows:

France, 339; Italy, 300; Norway, 298 Switzerland, 237; England, 235; Holland, 199; United States, 198.

But salaries of the average working-man in France has been creeping steadily higher, partly keeping pace with the increased cost of living. Naturally this has resulted in steady increases in the prices of most commodities. How far this so-called "vicious circle" will continue to turn before a wave of pricecutting sets in, is impossible to determ-The French newspapers print ports of price reductions in the United come early next spring.







Spurgeon Bell is head of the department The aim of the courses in business adextration is to present an intensive study of modern business. 'I wenty-two courses are offered in the department. canging from courses in bookkeeping and shorthand to commercial law and corporation finance. The shorthand and type-writing courses were added during the war, to help supply the government's need for stenographers, and these courses became so popular that they were made anent part of the curriculum

Mainly, however, the attention of the school is directed toward a study of business problems. Prerequisite to practically all other courses is an introductory course to the theory and practice of accounting, including actual practice in bookkeeping to illustrate the theories studied. This course is followed by edranced accounting, banking, selling prob-

Some of the most interesting and valnable courses given are business law, covering briefly but comprehensively practically all questions of law likely to come up in the regular course of business: the income tax, a course designed to make the student familiat with the United States income tax law, both in theory and in actual practice: property insurance, investments, and others.
