EARTHQUAKE IN CHILI TAKES HEAVY TOLL; DEATH AND DAMAGE

ROCK SPRINGS GETS MEDICAL SUPPLIES

COURT HOUSE BUILDING ONLY ONE LEFT

Leaders Say They Will Rebuild Town as Soon As Dead Can be Buried

ROCK SPRINGS, April 14.—Flyers from Kelly field at San Antonio arrived in storm-wrecked Rock Springs today with serums to be used as precaution against a possible typhoid epidemic. The sewerage and water systems were wrecked by the tornado which killed 73, and Dr. O. D. Westcott from the veterans' hospital near Kerrville, who is the medical doctor in charge here, was afraid that typhoid might develop.
All the water in town is in a cistern on the courthouse square. The water supply came from wells before the twister hit and these were put out of commission.
The cistern has been used by so many that Dr. Westcott decided to treat it with chemical composition brought here by the planes and also had some serum for injection brought in. Some persons may be inoculated today.
Jess Gilmer, in charge of local relief workers said today that "although many business men saw their life savings crumble, we will not abandon the town despite the fact that the courthouse is the only building left intact."
"We are going to start rebuilding as soon as we have buried our dead." Some 30 were buried yesterday and more were to be buried today. Gilmer estimated property damage at \$1,500,000.
Though neighboring towns raised \$7,000 for immediate relief, Gilmer said much more is needed.
"If the outside world could only realize that we were practically wiped off the face of the earth they would dig quick and deeply," Gilmer said.

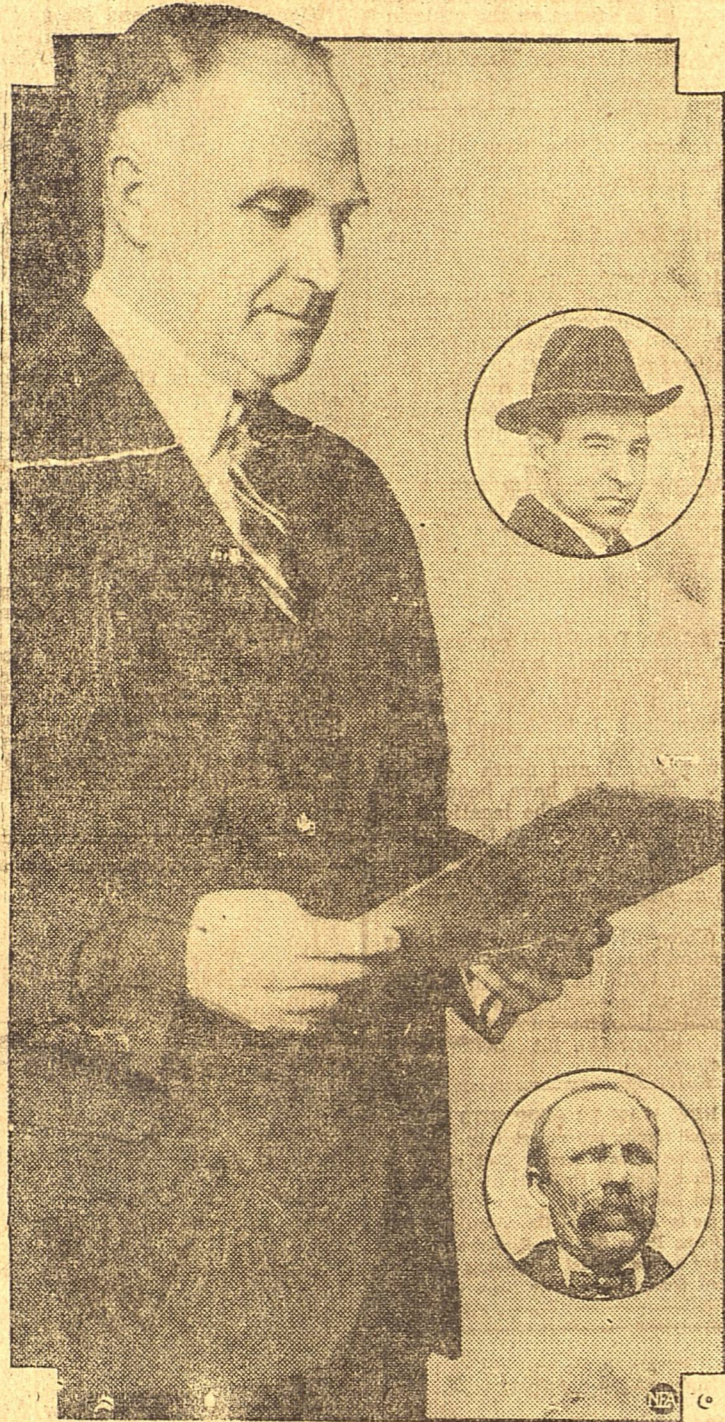
ROCK SPRINGS BUSY BURYING TORNADO DEAD

SAN ANTONIO, April 14.—With ninety-one victims of the Rock Springs tornado in San Antonio Thursday, survivors in the little hill town were busily carrying out the burial of fifty-five men, women and children, whose lives were snuffed out by the gale.
Three of the injured brought to San Antonio died in hospitals and two died enroute to the city. This brought the total number of deaths to 60.
The three latest victims are, John Lorraine, who died in Lee Surgical Hospital, Mrs. Adams, about 40, and Miss Dolly Fleming.
Miss Fleming was terribly mangled and one leg was amputated in an effort to save her life.
At least 20 others in San Antonio hospitals have injuries which may prove fatal.
The majority of those brought here are suffering from fractured skulls.

Bulletin Unfair And Libelous Say Valley People

STORMS, HEAVY. RAINS DELUGE EASTERN TEXAS

DALLAS, April 14.—East Texas was recovering from a night of electrical disturbance, rain and hail and freak winds, according to reports from that section to the United Press today.
Miss Mattie Hicks was killed at Lufkin in a tornado and nearly a score injured. Property damage and crop damage was estimated at nearly half a million dollars. The storm apparently swept from the Red river on the Texas-Oklahoma boundary, to the coast.
All streams are out of their banks and many bridges have been washed out, according to reports.
Wood, Smith, Cherokee, Anderson, Henderson, Houston and Nea-dochee counties deluged several days ago with rain and hail were hardest hit.

Miners Trapped By Flood Waters Reported Alive

HENRIETTA, Okla., April 14.—Twenty-six miners of the "Old Wise" mine, near here, trapped 110 feet underground in a drift when creek waters flooded the workings at 8 a. m. today are all alive and waiting rescue, it was learned at noon today.
The men are trapped in the mine's lone workable drift level cut off from shaft by water standing 25 feet above the entry way according to exchange of word with men through a drill hole from the surface.

Tom Dodson, 21, and Elmer Maynard, 18, of Delaware, five miles north of Nowata, were killed by a Missouri Pacific train while guarding a railroad bridge.

Chiang-Kai-Shek May Try To Form Own Government

REPORTS SAY AT LEAST 50 PERSONS DEAD

City of Santiago Was Thrown Into Panic As Buildings Wrecked

SANTIAGO, Chili, April 14.—A violent earthquake rocked this place at 1:30 a. m. today taking heavy toll in life and damage.
More than fifty persons killed, 100 injured, it was reported at 4 o'clock, death and injuries resulting from falling walls. Some buildings were cracked and others wrecked by the shocks which left the city in darkness.
The quake which came when most of the city was in bed caused a panic. Within a few minutes after the shock streets were crowded, many being in night clothes.
Open squares and parks were thronged for the rest of the night.

RANGER WATER SUPPLY IS PURE SAYS CHEMIST

Ranger city water is free of typhus germs, according to W. C. Blackmond, engineer at the city water plant.
Out of six samples of water sent to the state board of health, Austin, for examination, the low count was 35 and the high count 45, which left an average of 40 bacteria contents to the cubic centimeter.
The state requires the count to come below 100 bacteria to the cubic centimeter and that it also must show the absence of the B-Coli group, this group being a companion to the typhus group, would indicate human pollution, if found present.
Mr. Blackmond said today when talking of Ranger's water supply, which by the way, has improved greatly since he has been engineer, that numbers of people have erroneous ideas about the sewer being emptied into the lake. "If this was the case," Mr. Blackmond said, "the water would be unfit for any use and every health officer in the state would be on our necks in twenty-four hours. The sewer does not touch the lake at any place, but empties into a modern disposal plant 700 feet below the lake dam."
"In some of the outskirts of town, where lines are small and of black wrought pipe, the water may show red, and be distasteful at times, but if people flush their hydrants frequently it will help this condition materially."
"The pipe system is gradually getting stabilized by continuous treatment and with some improvement which may be made soon in the way of connecting up and flushing the bad ends, these troubles should disappear altogether."
"People should relieve their minds of all prejudice as to the safety of Ranger city water, as any number of cities get their drinking water from impounded lakes, which are subject to pollution. Take Fort Worth and Dallas for instance, these lakes are subject to 100 times the pollution of ours, yet we are using the same chemical and modern methods to purify."
"To my way of thinking a good and ample water supply is any city's most valuable asset as every prospective settler will invariably inquire as to the physical status of the city's water supply."

HEAVY RAINS PUT TRINITY 4 FEET ABOVE FLOOD STAGE

TRINIDAD, Texas, April 14.—Rainfall totaling 7.38 inches has fallen here in the last 16 hours bringing the Trinity river nearly four feet above flood stage. The lowlands are under water and crops have been damaged.

BETTER CHURCH ATTENDANCE IS NEED IN RANGER

(Editor's Note—Yesterday, one of the business and civic leaders the city told what he considered one of Ranger's main civic needs at this time. Today, one of the city's leading pastors tells of a very important spiritual need of the town. Another of the "Greatest Need" stories will follow soon.)
"The greatest need of Ranger just now is better church attendance," Rev. George Shearer, pastor of the Methodist church said, when asked to express his idea of what he felt was Ranger's greatest need.
"There are so many here who do not go to church," he added.
"Another great need of the city is for the churches to work together more and have a greater spirit of cooperation for churches working together can do much more than each church working alone."
"It seems to me that there is a need of church property improvement. Our church has been working all spring to beautify the church lawn and we found plenty of work to do. Grass, flowers and shrubs planted around the church make it inviting to not only the members of the church but to strangers and suggests church as well as civic pride. People spend worlds of money building a church and making it beautiful on the inside but so often forget that the front that it shows to the world looks neglected and unsightly."
"I believe that another need of Ranger is that the stores, filling stations or any kind of business that keeps men employed during the Sunday church hours, should close and give their employees an opportunity to come to morning and evening services," Rev. Mr. Shearer said.
"I estimate that in Ranger there are some 500 men who can't come to church on Sunday because they have to work and I think it would help Ranger if these places closed for at least an hour on Sunday morning so these men could come to church."

Condition of Earl Carroll Serious Physicians State

OUT IN SPACE MORE THAN FIFTY ONE HOURS

Bring Back The Record Which France Carried Away Four Years Ago

Bert Acosta and Clarence Chamberlain, American civilians, came back to earth in their tiny Bellanca designed and Wright-motored monoplane today after having remained in flight longer than other aviators in history.
They broke first the American and then the world record for sustained flying and set a new mark more than five hours better than any previous figure.
Their feat brought back to America a record that went to France in 1925.
Their feat was 51 hours and 12 minutes in the air.
For two days and two nights the airmen have flown in circles above Roosevelt and Mitchell fields, with occasional brief excursions outside their orbit. The first reward for the tired aviators came at 9:34 o'clock last night when they set a new American record.

Presbytery Will Formulate Plans To Raise \$6,000

Plans for making the drive to raise the Abilene Presbytery quota of \$6,000 of the \$15,000,000 fund to be raised throughout the nation were discussed at the sessions Wednesday afternoon. The committee having in charge the drive in the Presbytery will meet in Albany on April 21 when plans for the drive will be completed. Local chairmen were appointed and they will meet with the pastors at Albany. An effort will be made to obtain as many special gifts as possible.
Under the tentative plans adopted, each church adds 7 1/2 per cent to the salary paid the pastor and the pastor gives 2 1/2 per cent of his salary which goes into the dividend fund to help make up the total amount needed.
The need of workers in the home mission field to supply charges was brought out by Rev. W. M. Baker, field man, during the afternoon session. He made an appeal in the report read to the various pastors to supply the pulpits in some of the vacant churches at least once a month, thereby giving the flock spiritual food. In one section of the Presbytery there are four churches without pastors, and these need some one to care for them during the year.
A representative of Trinity university presented the cause of that institution, and was well received. Trinity university at Wapakoneta is one of the leading institutions in the southwest.
Rev. L. R. Hogan presided when the report on foreign missions was read. The report was gratifying in every way.
The Rev. J. E. Bryant presided when the committee on relief and sustentation was read.
Addresses by Dr. L. B. Gray, representative of Trinity University, and Dr. B. A. Hodges, educational director for the Synod of Texas, featured the concluding session of the Abilene Presbytery in Eastland this morning.
Dr. Gray spoke on the work being done by Trinity University, while Dr. Hodges' address dealt with summer bible schools and Sunday schools. Both addresses were well received.
The encampment committee reported at the morning session that \$5,000 is to be spent for permanent improvements at the encampment grounds, a sum amounting to this year was spent last year. When completed the grounds at Buffalo Gap will be the best equipped in the state. The encampment this year will be held on July 14 to 21.
The date for the next meeting of the Presbytery, which will be held in Albany, was set for the second Tuesday in September.
Reports of all standing committees and the report of the treasurer were read at the evening session.

Seek Injunction To Prohibit Man Calling On Girl

Mrs. R. B. Shropshire and her husband obtained a temporary injunction Thursday morning in the Eighty-eighth district court from Judge Elzo Beon preventing and prohibiting Otis Jenkins from calling upon and keeping company with their daughter, Lorraine Shropshire, 15 years old.

The petition alleges that the defendant, Otis Jenkins, a resident of Frath county, is leading their daughter astray and keeping her out late at night, and bringing her home in a sad plight physically and otherwise.

The petition also alleges that the defendant has endeavored to make the plaintiff's daughter elope with him, despite the fact that she is but 15 years old.

"That we can govern and control the child if the defendant is kept away. The petition specifically states that on the night of April 13, the defendant gave the daughter a strong drink and brought her home late at night in a sad plight.

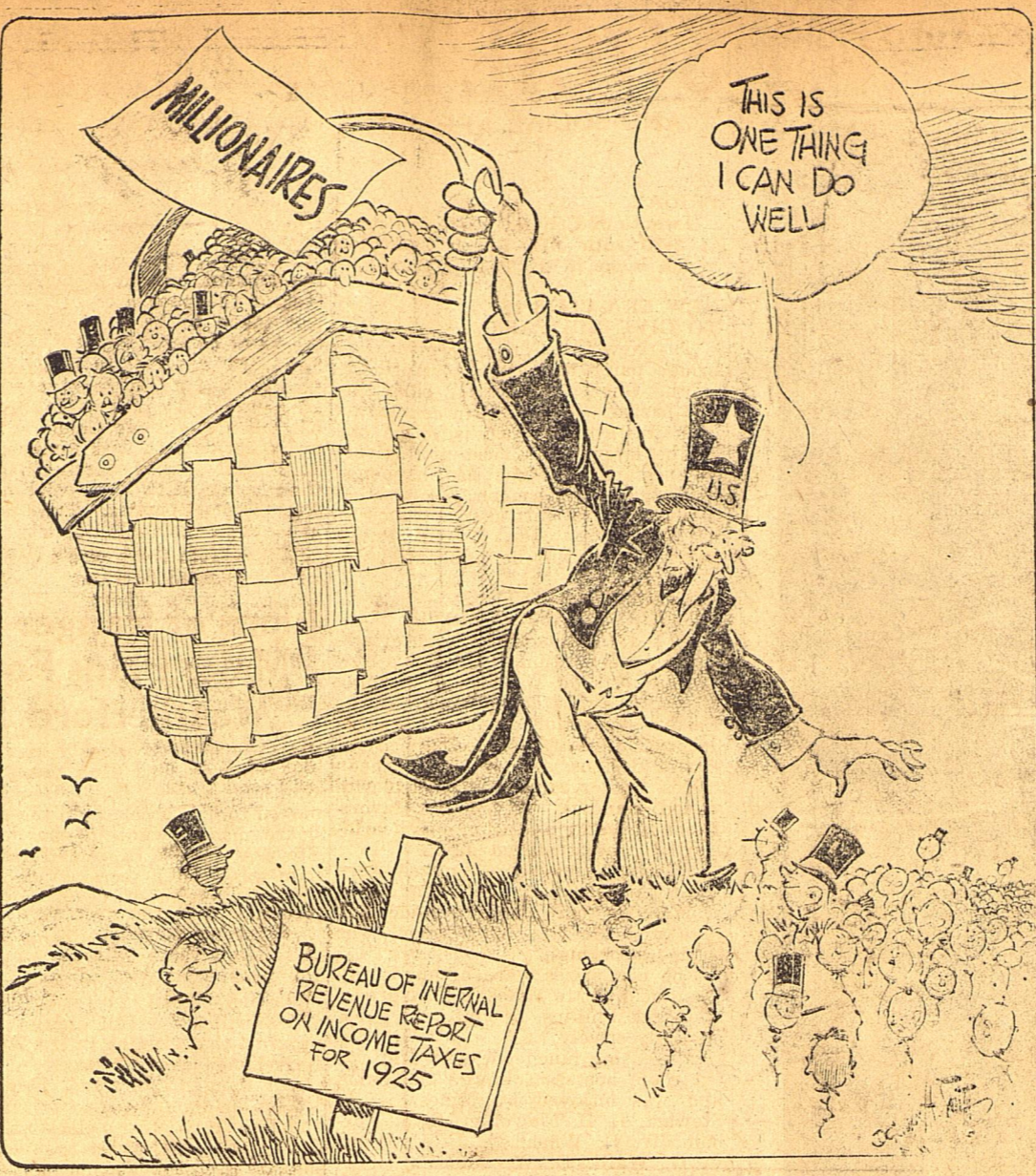

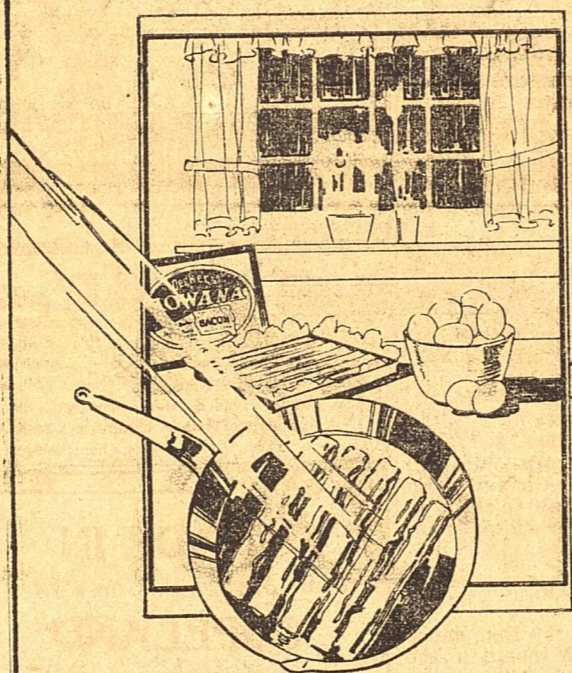

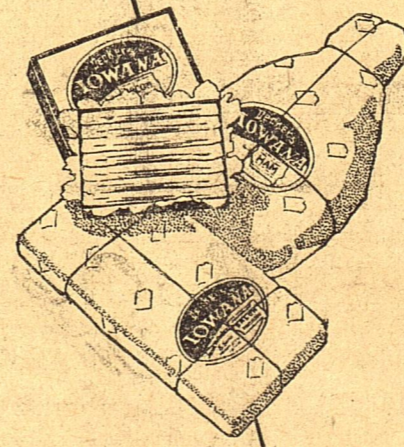

Saturday morning at 8 o'clock at St. Rita's there will be the reading of prophecies blessed of baptismal water, paschal candle and high Mass celebrated by Rev. M. Collins.

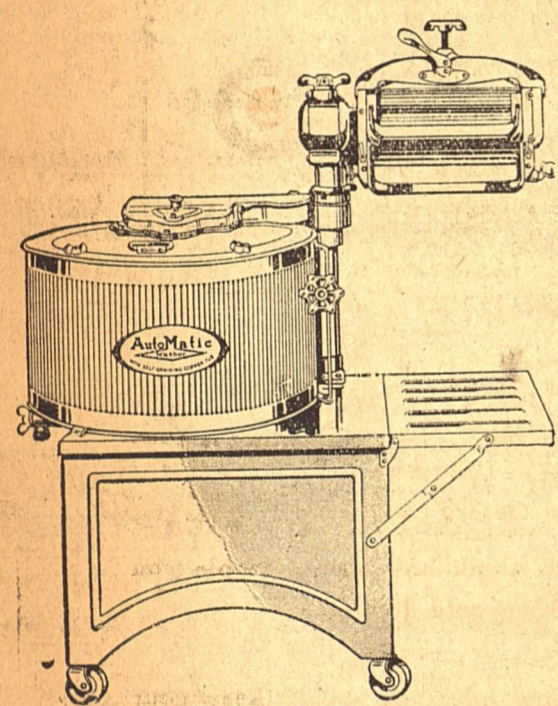

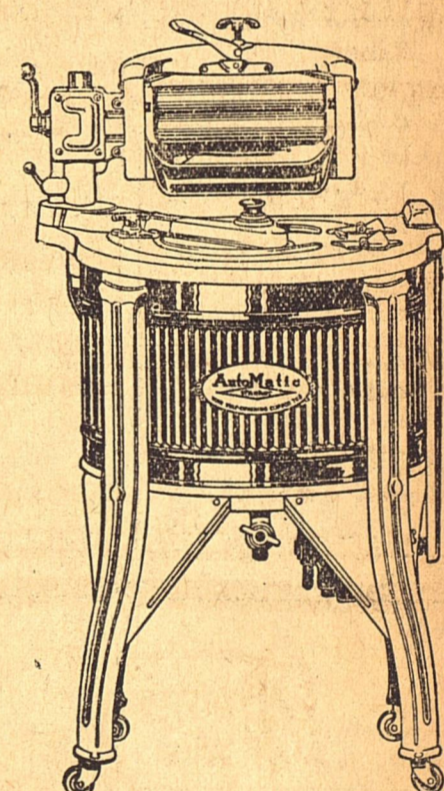

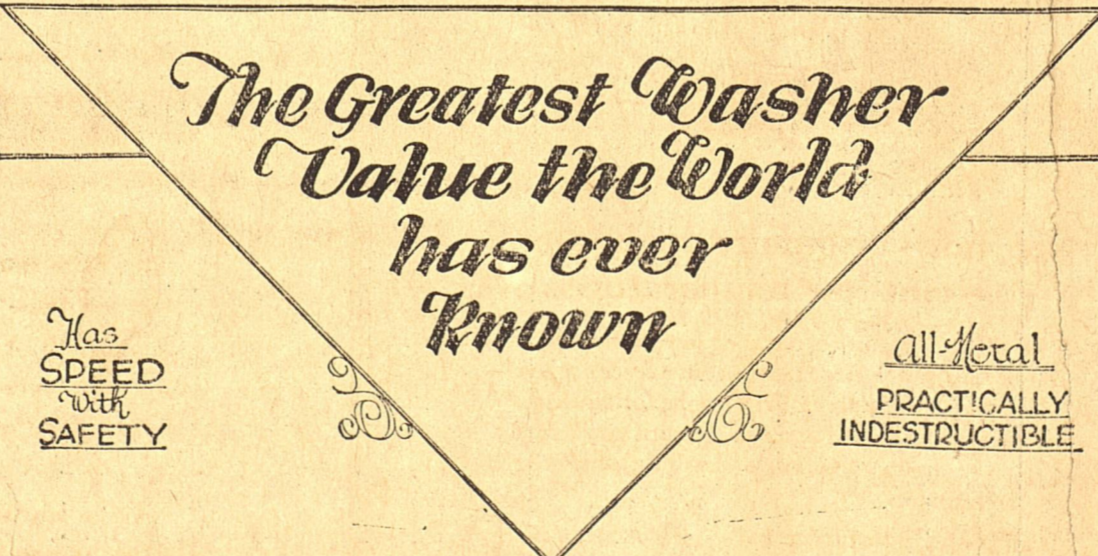

Texas Company Well is Making 600 Barrels Day

Reports of the Texas company to the oil and gas supervisor for the Cisco district which includes Callahan, Coleman and Brown counties show a production of 2,071 barrels of oil a day from 15 wells. "I wish I could, sir, but I'm darned if I can think of anything. Got anything particular in mind?"

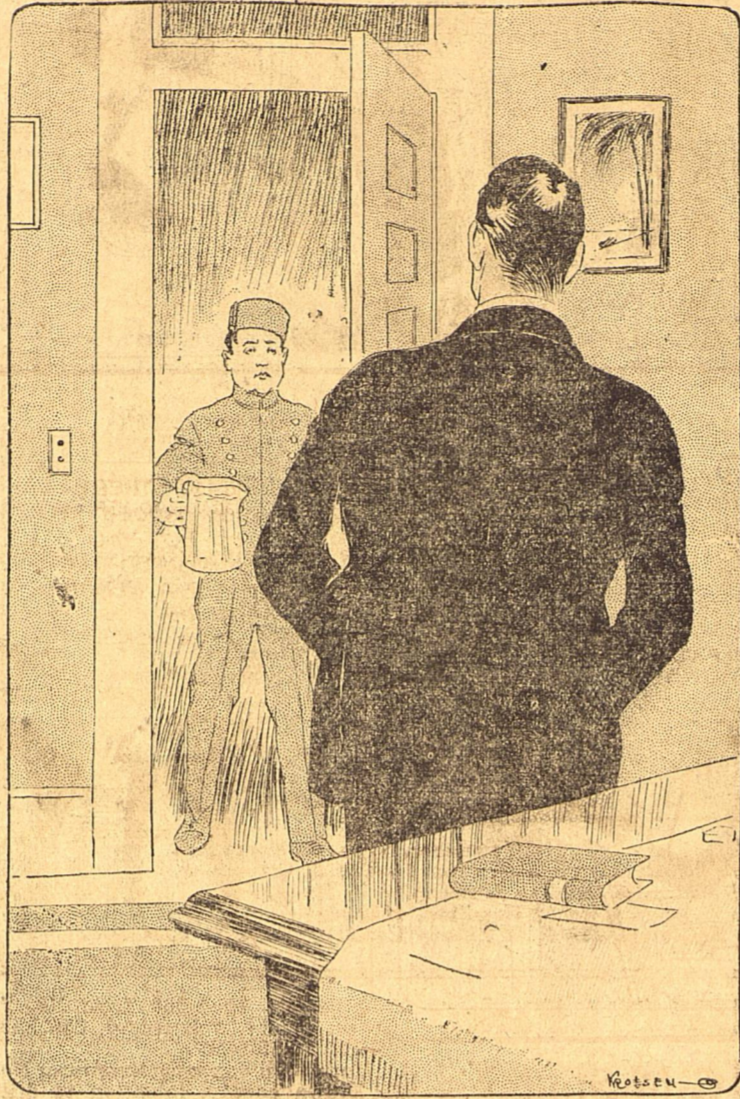
"No, I'm just floundering. Did you see Mr. Folsom when he arrived here? When he first came in?"

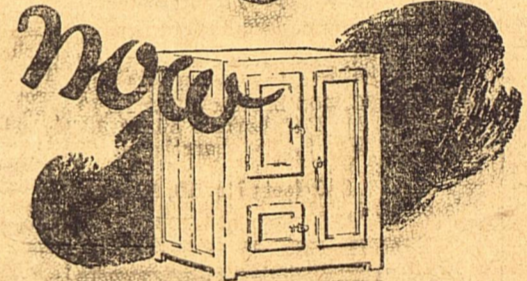
