

. Leaders Say They Will Rebuild Town as Soon As Dead Can be Buried


By United Press. ROCK SPRINGS, April 14 .- Flyers from Kelly field at San Antonio arrived in storm-wrecked Rock Springs today with serums to be used as precaution against a possible ty-phoid epidemic. The sewerage and water systems were wrecked by the tornado which killed 73, and Dr. O. D. Westcott from the veterans' hos-pital near Kerrville, who is the med-ical doctor in charge here was afraid that typhoid might develop.

All the water in town is in a cistern on the courthouse square. The water supply came from wells before the twister hit and these were put out of commission.

The cistern has been used by so many that Dr. Wesscott decided to treat it with chemical composition brought here by the planes and also had some serum for injection brought in. Some persons may be inoculated today.

Jess Gilmer, in charge of local re-lief workers said today that "although many business men saw their life sav-ings crumble, we will not abandon the town despite the fact that the courthouse is the only building left intact.'





City of Santiago Was Thrown Into Panic As Buildings Wrecked

SANTIAGO, Chili, April 14 .- A violent earthquake recked this place at 1:30 a. m. today taking heavy toll in life and damage.

More than fifty persons killed, 100 injured, it was reported at 4 o'clock, death and injuries resulting from falling walls. Some buildings were cracked and others wrecked by the shocks which left the city in dark-

The quake which came when most of the city was in bed caused a panic. Within a few minutes after the shock streets were crowded, many being in night clothes.




