Fifteen Women Killed In One Town as Water Sweeps Shelter Away.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 25 .- At least 100 persons were dead and relief workers believed that figure would be doubled today as the Mississippi river's most serious flood continued to spread itself over parts

of seven states Fifteen women were reported killed at Waterville, Miss., a refugee

camp when the house that sheltered them was swept away.

Approximately 1,500 persons were marooned in the Mississippi delta district. Some relief workers said a check up would reveal 200 dead. 

Soviet Seeks To Better Its South American Standing

By C. A. RODGERS
(United Press Staff Correspondent)
RIO DE JANEIRO, April 19.—
Successful in obtaining the recognition of the Uruguayan government, received indifferently in Argentina and greeted with open hostility of certain members of the Brazilian press, representatives of the Soviet government have worked steadily government have worked steadily during the past few months to gair a firmer footing in South America.

The delegation that arrived in Buenos Aires late in 1926 was ap-parently of a commercial character. At its head was M. Boris Kraevsky Soviet commercial agent. When, a few weeks later, recognition of the Soviets by Uruguay was announced in Montevideo, South America realized that the mission of the Russian was

not entirely commercial.

Results of the Soviet activities however, have been far greater o the commercial side than in diplomatic channels. They have begun, particularly in the hide market, an important commercial movement from South America to Russia. The work of Moscow's expert commercial envoys made a decided impression in South American business circles.

Cbservers declare that the chief stumbling block in the path of Soviet recognition in South America is the attitude of the "ABC" countries, Argentina, Brazil and Chile, who apparently have decided to stand together in determining their release. gether in determining their relations with Russia.

The Argentine Foreign Minister issued a statement to this effect at

the time that the Russian delegation secured the recognition of Uruguay, although he made it plain no request for recognition then had been received by Argentina.

It is also generally understood that neither Brazil nor Argentina serious-ly will consider recognition of the Russian government until the Soviets have been recognized by the United States. There is no indication of what Chile will do as Soviet senti-ment on the west coast has not yet been intensified. The conclusion that Brazil will await the action of the United States largely is deduct-ed from the fact that she has already declared herself in favor of unified action on the part of all American nations with regard to arother important world problem-

nembership in the league of nations. Shortly before the arrival of the Soviet comercial agent in Rio De Janeiro, the city's first avowed communist newspaper appeared. The paper, formerly of Socialistic and semi-revolutionary tendencies was suppressed by the Bernardes government. It now has reappeared, championing communism.



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
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
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
