## GOVERNOR MAY TRY TO CATCH HIGH BROWNS

### THREE CARS IN CRASH AND ONE IS ABANDONED

Roadster Collides With Touring Car and Coupe On Cisco-Rising Star Highway.

Three Ford automobiles—a roadster, touring car and sedan—were wrecked in a smash-up on the Rising Star-Cisco highway, about midway between the two towns yesterday about noon, but according to reports made to the members of the sheriff's department no one was seriously injured. The names of the occupants of the cars were not learned. The cars were not Eastland county cars, it is stated.

An old gentleman and members of his family, some of whom were sick, were traveling in the sedan and were en route to Carlsbad, Texas, where the sick folks were to be placed in the state hospital. Other members of the family were following the sedan in a touring car. The roadster, in which was a young man and two girls, was traveling in the same direction on the highway as were the other two cars, and as the roadster whipped around a loaded truck on the road, it smashed into the touring car and knocked it out of the road, it was claimed. The roadster was not badly damaged, it seems, and continued its journey at a rapid rate of speed and ran into the sedan, when both the roadster and sedan were smashed and put out of commission. When this happened the driver of the roadster and his two young women companions, according to the occupants of the sedan, ran back down the road and got on a truck that had just passed and went toward Cisco. The officers have information, which they believe will enable them to locate the owner and driver of the roadster.

Deputy Sheriff Virge Foster of Eastland, who happened along just after the accident, telephoned garage men and others at Rising Star to come out after the injured people and their cars.

Mrs. Kern received a telegram at Enid last night, which was very nicely after his operation. Previously Los Angeles physicians had said there was no hope for him. He was kicked in the side while playing football and developed appendicitis.

### Equalization Board In Ranger Organizes, Sending Out Notices

The new Ranger equalization board held its first meeting in the city hall Monday and sent out the required 10-day legal notices to property owners to appear and show reason for revision in the assessed or apporportioned valuations. Collier.

The board (or sections of it) will meet daily until the matters up for disposal are all taken care of, it is stated. Hearings will be given any property holders who may ask them; it is said. City Clerk S. J. Dean is sending out the notices and may be conferred with in regard to dates of hearings, it is announced.

### FRANCE WILL RESUME DEBT FUNDING PARLEYS

PARIS, Dec. 1.—France is moving rapidly towards resumption of debt funding negotiations with the United States. Finance Minister Loucheur today told United States Ambassador Herrick that negotiations would be reopened as soon as French financial program was completed, and supplemented this information later with the announcement that not only would settlement be effected with England and America, but that with France's stabilization accomplished, a loan would be sought in England or the United States.

### INJURED ACCUSER TO GO ON WITNESS STAND

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Dec. 1.—After weeks of preliminary testimony, the case of Louise King of Washington, Pa., against Arthur Rich, a Battle Creek youth whom she charged with criminal assault, Miss King today was scheduled to appear in court for the first time to give her version of the alleged attack.

Medical and lay witnesses who have been called by the State have gone minutely into what transpired last spring when, the prosecution claims, Rich beat the girl into unconsciousness with his foot. Much of the testimony has been highly technical, relating to the effect of various forms of attack and the type of wound that would result.

### TEXAS TODAY WITHOUT AN ADJUTANT GENERAL

AUSTIN, Dec. 1.—Texas is without an adjutant general today. The resignation of Adjutant General Mark McGee, tendered to the governor several weeks ago, became effective on this date and no appointment has been made to fill the vacancy.

### Chairman A. A. Diehl of Advisory Board To Help Salvation Army Campaign In Ranger Tells of Work of Organization

With a meeting Monday of the executive committee in charge of Ranger's Salvation Army charity drive, arrangements are being rapidly completed for the drive that will take place Dec. 8, 9, 10 and 11. Workers are being recruited to cover both business and residential districts of the city and the members of the committee feel that the people of Ranger will open their hearts as well as their purses to aid this worthy organization.

"There must be no home in Ranger this year without a Christmas dinner," said Judge Arthur A. Diehl, appeal chairman, in discussing the good work of the Salvation Army here. "There must be food and clothing supplied to those in need. Our poor unfortunates must be cared for and they will be if the good hearted citizens will supply the funds for the coming year's work of the Army."

Home Service Report. Relief Work—Number given meals, 218; transportation, 12; garments, 489; pairs shoes, 161; lodgings, 59, medical aid, 17; and temporary relief, 404.

Total Number Relieved 687—An average of nearly two cases of relief every day during the past year. Special—Two wayward girls were sent to the Army Maternity Home and Hospital at San Antonio.

### LOCARNO PEACE TREATY SIGNED BY 7 NATIONS

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The Locarno European security pact was signed today. Statesmen of seven nations assembled and affixed their names to a series of documents binding western Europe to keep the peace.

The signing of this treaty constitutes the greatest peace movement in the history of the old world, marking the beginning of a new post-war agreement between former warring nations, and the re-entrance of Germany into the councils of foreign nations after an absence of 11 years.

The next step in the march towards world peace is expected to be the disarmament conference, preparations for which next year are already being considered under League of Nations' auspices.

Today's ceremony occurred within a reception hall unused for many years, which had been polished and furnished anew for this historic signing. An hour before the signing, the throng had assembled to cheer the delegates. It was 11:21 a. m. when the signing of the pact started.

### Dead boys' Parents Wire For Body to Be Sent to Their Home

A telegram was received late Monday by O. V. Davenport, chief of police in Ranger, in response to his inquiry, signed by Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Thomas of Pittsburg, Kan., asking that the body of their son, Okie Thomas, who died Sunday in Ranger, be sent to them for burial. The body is being held in the Owens undertaking establishment pending final arrangements.

Prior efforts to reach the family had proven fruitless, it appears, for the reason that the father had been employed in Pitcher, Okla., a nearby mining town, and had left, doubtless for his home in Pittsburg, when the telegram was sent to Pitcher. Nothing in the telegram indicated where the lad had come to Texas, his own explanation that he wanted to see more of the world being the only information in that regard.

### T. B. and S. Tharpe Will Build Modern Residence in Ranger

T. B. Tharpe and his son, Sam Tharpe of the Tharpe Furniture company, have purchased the Williams property at the corner of Elm and Austin streets, Ranger, which they are improving.

The erection of a modern home, which will be occupied by T. B. Tharpe and family, and other improvements are planned. Work has begun on these and the property will present an appearance which will be a source of pride to the city in the near future, it is said.

### CARTER IS NOT YET READY TO RESIGN OFFICE

Fort Worth Publisher Replies To Governor's Letter With Cautious Comments.

FORT WORTH, Dec. 1.—Amon G. Carter, publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and Record, will not comply with Governor Ferguson's request that he resign from the board of directors of the Texas Technological College.

Carter, in a lengthy statement, issued today in answer to Governor Ferguson's letter to him yesterday, declared that his resignation from the board would be offered only through a demand by the people of Texas or by request of other members of the board.

The publisher terms the woman governor's charges against him of violating the prohibition laws an effort to divert attention from the highway situation and also denies all charges in the latter.

"The demand for my resignation is simply a huge barrage to hide the real intent and motive that lurks behind it," Carter declared.

"Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad. It is as true now as when first uttered and would appear to apply to the governor. It comes with poor grace to assert that now, for the first time, Governor Jim has learned of certain things which he now proceeds to denounce with angry assurance as contrary to good morals."

"I say 'Governor Jim' with no purpose to wound the sensibilities of the good lady who is the real governor, but to indicate who is the real actor behind the scene who puts his voice and figure on the stage."

In answer to the charge of stimulating drinks being served at a gathering where Carter acted as host, the publisher said:

"I have no apology to offer for the fact that I acted as the host on a certain occasion when distinguished men and hundreds of guests assembled in Fort Worth to learn of the hospitality that awaited them from the Chamber of Commerce, of which I chanced to be a representative at the time. The story that this entertainment violated the law is but another effort to divert the public mind."

Deferred Action. "It is strange that Governor Jim, familiar with what took place at this time, should suddenly wake up to the enormity of the offense. Why wait until the newspaper with which I happen to have the honor to be associated should publish to the world a series of articles on highway development in an effort to divert the public mind to a consideration of the wasteful public policy in progress."

"If I had wished to escape such diatribe as that in which Governor Jim indulges, all that would have been necessary to do in the premises was to heed veiled insinuations made sometime ago that unless such publications ceased there would be an effort on the part of Governor Jim to 'catch up' with me and seek an indictment."

### WOMAN HELD AS SUSPECT IN JAIL BREAK RELEASED

HOUSTON, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Ida May Jung, Houston woman questioned Monday by Warden Speer at the Huntsville penitentiary in connection with the sensational escape of four convicts Sunday, was released today. Speer said that although Mrs. Jung had visited George Arlington, one of the escaped convicts only two hours before the jail break, he believed she knew nothing of his affairs. Prison officials are without any clues as to whereabouts of the escaped convicts.

### Committee Would Have Government Operate Muscle Shoals Plant

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—A recommendation that the government lease the Muscle Shoals project and construct enterprise was made by a failing in that operate it as a majority of the Muscle Shoals committee, whose report to the president was made public at the white house today.

The minority report of the committee, made public at the same time, holds that private leases are indispensable, and opposes government operations under any circumstances.

### PETTY THIEVES ACTIVE IN RURAL DISTRICTS

### New Work Youth Kills Friend to Get Pocket Money

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—For no other reason than that "he got the notion," Gordon Pirie, 19-year-old under-sized youth, rained axe blows on the head of his friend, George Nye, and then took \$5.60 from the dead lad's pockets, which he spent playing pool, attending the movies and buying ice cream sodas for three girls, according to the Bronx district attorney, who said this was the meat of Pirie's confession after he had told three varying stories.

Nye's body was found Sunday night. Police were notified and detectives searched all day yesterday for Pirie, who later walked into the police station near his home and, according to the police, confessed to the murder.

### NEWSPAPERS IN NEW YORK QUOTE GOVERNOR "MA"

Former Governor "Jim" Flatly Denies Governor Made Any Such Statement.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—In a special dispatch from the Austin correspondent of the New York Tribune, World and Times today, Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson is quoted as definitely refusing to call a special session of the Texas legislature and as defying her opponents. The governor, according to the correspondent (which is denied by former Governor Ferguson) is quoted as saying:

"Let them assemble if they want to. Let them start something. I will be here at the finish."

"Now about this special session they want me to call. They tried to camouflage it as an inquiry into the foot and mouth disease and tick eradication. They must think I'm a beast. It is my feet, my mouth and my eradicator they want. Some of them call me a dumbbell. They will find out how dumb I am."

"I should call a special session? Well! Well!"

"They want me to authorize my enemies to get together, my enemies and Jim's. In spite of all that mush about my being a frail, delicate woman, they will see. I should authorize the state to pay the expenses of those wolverines who want to get together here and tear me apart? Not on your life. I know them too well. I was born and raised among them and they will see. They talk about raising \$300,000 to pay the expenses of a special session. Well! Well! We'll see about that, too."

The statement, alleged to have been given to a representative of a Houston newspaper in an exclusive interview yesterday, was flatly denied by ex-Gov. James E. Ferguson, husband of the governor, today. Ferguson declared that neither he nor the governor had made any statement to anybody concerning a special call of the legislature.

### Dallas Gas Company Finds Efficient Plan To Detect Gas Leaks

DALLAS, Dec. 1.—The Dallas Gas Company has put a plan into operation that is as ingenious as it is useful, to minimize the dangers of asphyxiation or explosions from leakages of natural gas.

When gas escapes and forms a "pocket" in a close room, explosions often follow that are dangerous to life and property. And the accumulation can result in a very short time, undetected.

A leaky gas jet in a room where one is sleeping can cause asphyxiation, too, if you haven't a keen sense of smell.

Since natural gas in small quantities may not be noticed, the local gas company has evolved a scheme that is sure-fire.

A harmless chemical is mixed with the gas. If there is a leak anywhere in a home served with gas, householders think rats have died. The odor is highly offensive. Even a person with asthma could smell it.

The public is being informed through local newspapers to report the offensive odor to the gas company so that leaks can be repaired. It's working.

### PRESIDENT COOLIDGE APPROVES LOCARNO PACT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—President Coolidge took cognizance of the signing of the Locarno pact in London today and reiterated his belief that this instrument means for peace and will be beneficial to all countries.

### FORMER RANGER CAPTAIN HAMER ENTERS SCENE

Confers With "Pa" in Governor's Office, Which May Mean Work Offered Him.

AUSTIN, Dec. 1.—Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson apparently has decided to let state matters rest awhile. The woman governor left for Temple, Texas, her former home, early today.

Former Gov. James E. Ferguson was at the executive office in the capitol, however, and was in a long conference with former Ranger Captain Hamer. It was said unofficially that the former ranger was to be placed on the trail of "highbrows" who violate the prohibition law.

The incident of the conference of the former governor with former Ranger Captain Hamer caused a stir in the capitol on account of the statement by Governor Ferguson recently reflecting on prohibition enforcement in Texas. The ranger retired from the law enforcement force last July and it was said then that the governor and captain had come to the parting of their ways.

Captain Hamer has a long list of law enforcement to his credit. It was said this was the first time the captain ever had called at the executive offices.

The move today added credit to the report that Ferguson was laying down a barrage to deflect public attention from the state highway muddle.

### County Agent Bush Gives Terracing Demonstration

County Agent R. H. Bush gave a terracing demonstration at the John Hopper farm, two miles southeast of Rising Star, yesterday afternoon, when 3,000 yards of terracing was done on 70 acres of land. There were nine farmers present to witness the work and each of them expressed a desire to have their farms terraced. Others, seen by Mr. Bush in the city, also made requests that he assist them in terracing their land.

Mr. Bush stated this morning that the requests for terracing had reached the point where it was impossible for him to give individual demonstrations and that it was going to be absolutely necessary for him to arrange community demonstrations in order that he could start the work off and let someone else finish it, thus enabling him to go on to another community and start another demonstration. "I suggest that farmers in communities where demonstrations are to be held, buy a farm level and buy or make such other instruments as they will need in terracing work, so that they can carry on the work of terracing after I have started the work and given instructions as to how to complete it," Mr. Bush said.

### DRILLING REVIVING IN RISING STAR SECTION

Parties who have been in Rising Star the last few days, state that the bringing in of the Humble Oil & Refining company's well on the Stover farm southwest of Rising Star, is causing a revival in oil development in that section and that leases are changing hands at prices ranging from \$6 to \$20 per acre.

### Governor Offers \$600 For Apprehension of Two Escaped Convicts

AUSTIN, Dec. 1.—A reward of \$600 was offered today by Governor Ferguson for the apprehension of Milt Good and Tom Ross, who made a sensational escape from the state prison at Huntsville, Sunday. Good and Ross, West Texas cattlemen, were serving terms for the murder of two cattle inspectors in a hotel at Seminole, Texas, about two years ago. They had been in prison since last spring.

### Mitchell Challenges Right of Graves to Sit as Court Member

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—After a heated exchange with the ten generals sitting in the court-martial of Col. William Mitchell, Representative Frank Reid, counsel for Mitchell, today challenged the right of Major General W. S. Graves to sit longer as a juror in the case. The court refused to accept Reid's challenge and announced that General Graves would continue as a member of the court.

"I hereby challenge Gen. Graves to sit longer as a member of this court," said Reid. "For the reason that his actions while a member of this court have shown that he is not impartial, he having repeatedly interfered with my examination of witnesses, and he should no longer be permitted to sit as a member of this court. I insist on my legal right to challenge him."

**RELIGIOUS WAR BREWING.**

Druse leaders in Syria accuse French authorities of trying to foment religious war by arming Christian civilians along the coast and sending them inland to oppose the rebels. The Druse leader has succeeded in crossing the frontier and will lay the evidence before the League of Nations at Geneva. Moslem leaders say they have given strict orders for their people not to molest Christians, but insist that they are unable to guarantee such protection unless the French discontinue their practice of arming volunteers. The Druses are neither Christians nor Mohammedans, but acknowledge only the name Muahidin, or Unitarians. They are very warlike and have engaged in conflicts with their Christian neighbors, the Maronites. There have been reports recently that they were being joined by the Moslems in their revolt against the French.

The American consul at Beirut has notified all American citizens to leave for coast towns. Dr. Ford, of the American missions educational colony at Haifa, Palestine, has asked that an American destroyer be sent there. Lord Plummer, the British governor of Palestine, is taking every precaution, but the Jewish colonists are very much disturbed over the possibilities.

A religious war at this moment would simply mean the annihilation of most of the Druse peoples as well as Arab Moslems, because the French, Italian and English air fleets would cover the field like a swarm of flies with deadly gas bombs. It is a disagreeable and apparently unnecessary situation viewed from a common sense standpoint.

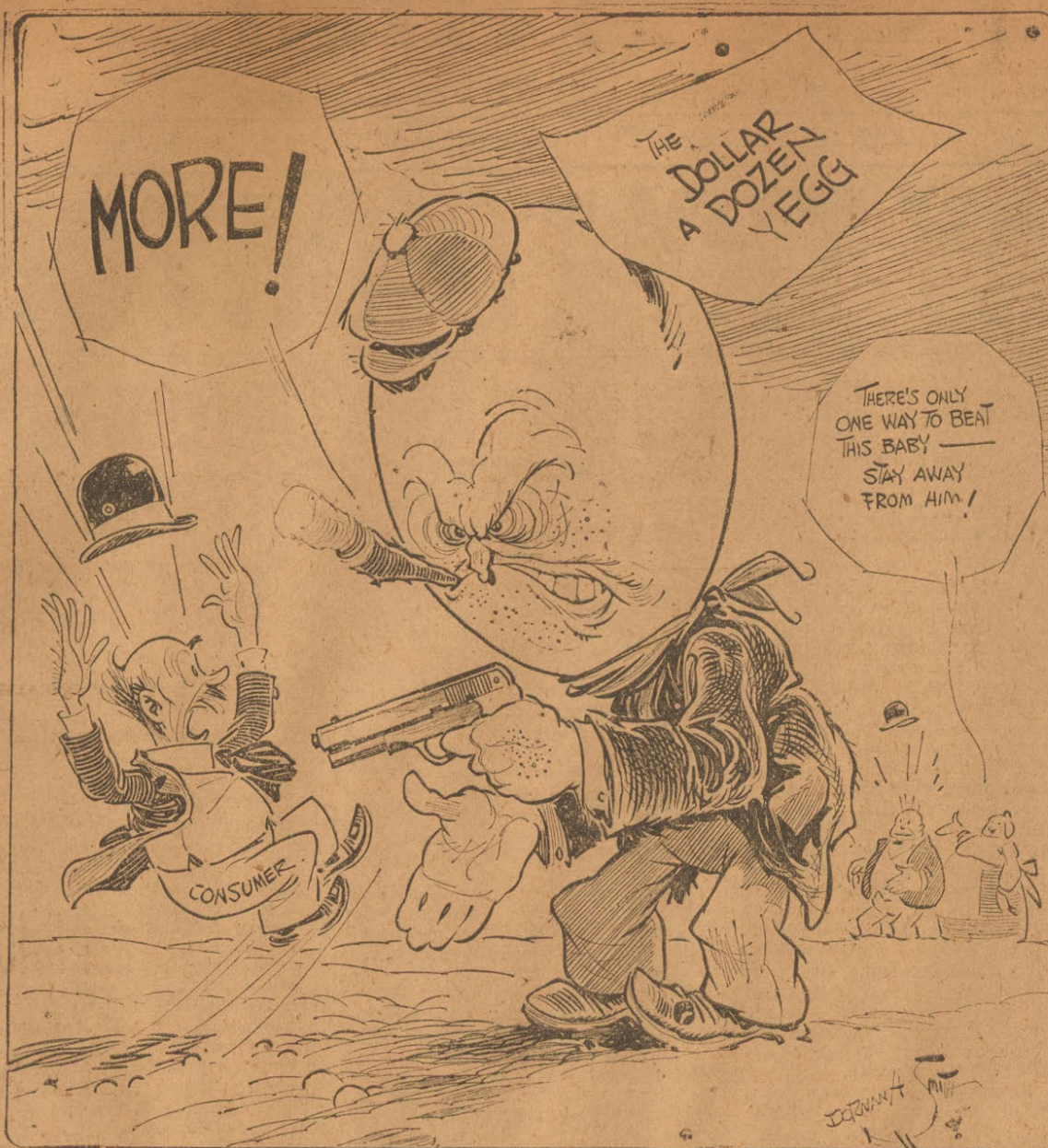

When she left the rest room it was with a velvet skin and peachy bloom that would have given battle to the president's wife herself, if need had been.

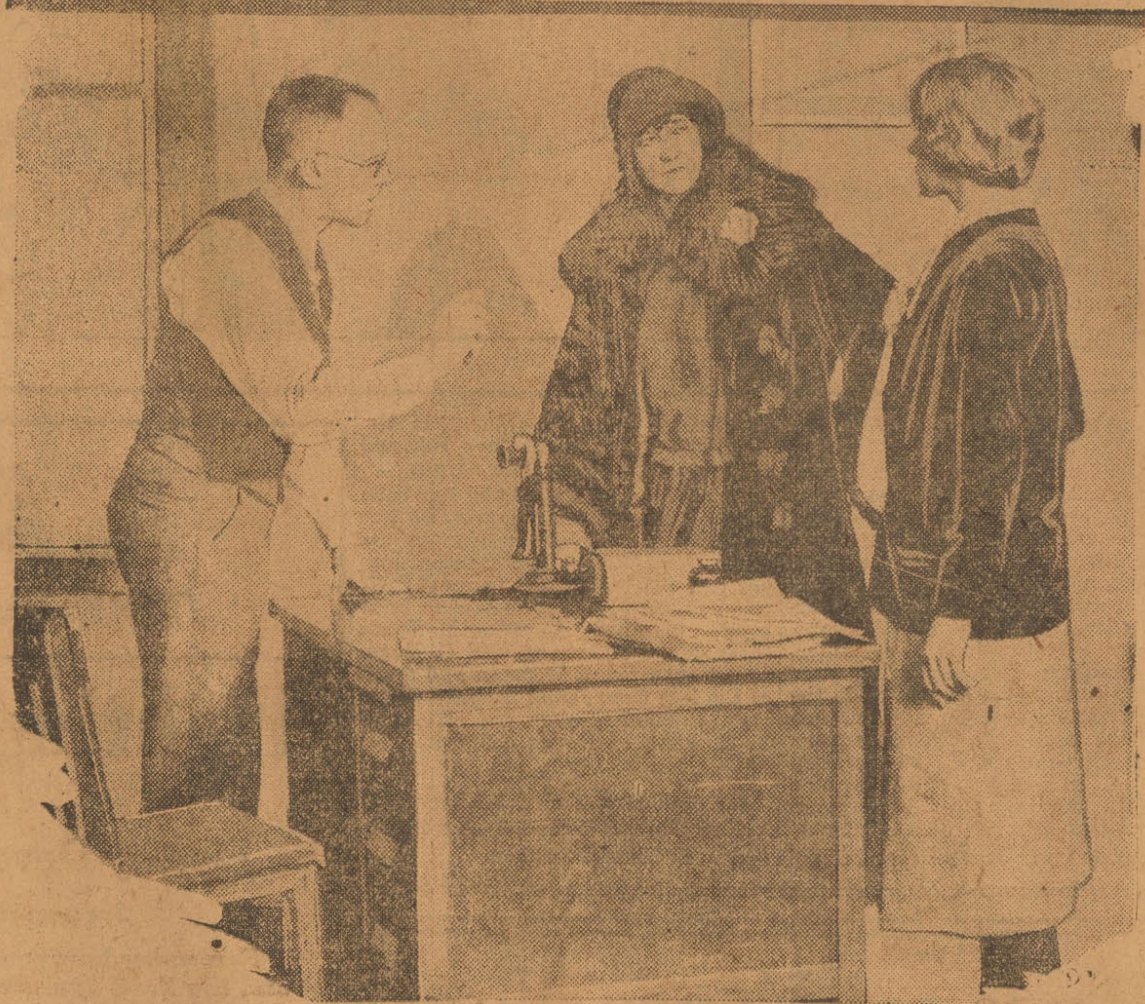
Mr. Ezra Hamilton was standing beside the city desk, talking volubly, and using her ringed hands to emphasize each sentence.

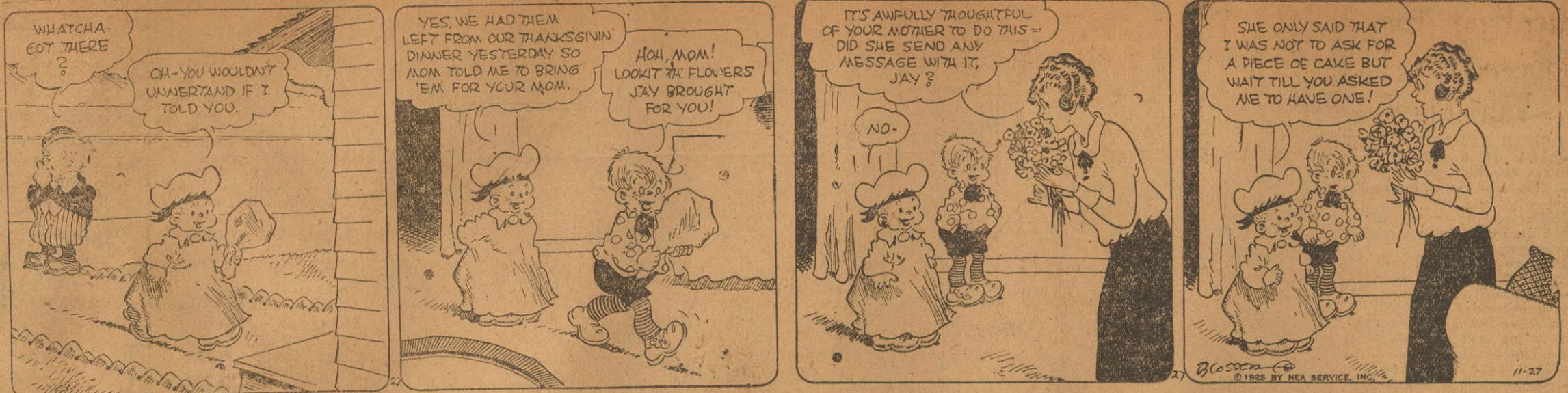

## Defenders of Christmas Trees Claim Thinning Does No Injury to Forests

By United Press.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—The annual use of Christmas trees "is not a serious forest problem," according to an editorial to appear in the current issue of Nature Magazine, published by the American Nature Association, which will criticize the efforts of some conservationists to limit the cutting of small trees for the holiday trade.

The editorial will quote Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Tree Association, as saying there is no reason the children should not have their Christmas trees. It will also quote other forestry experts to the effect that the Christmas tree is a proper by-product of the forest.

The editorial will say in part: "The department of forests and waters points out that more than 500 carloads of Christmas trees are imported into Pennsylvania each year. Trees from six to nine feet high are in great demand, and can be grown on moist and fairly fertile lands, 2,700 trees to the acre. With comparatively little care after the young trees are well under way, it is pointed out, a yearly cutting can be made netting the owner \$150 to \$250 an acre year after year, and still there will be enough left to form the mature crop.

"There are certain phases of Christmas-tree gathering that should not be condemned by law. They are vigorously prosecuted by law. The outstanding is the petty thievery of other people's property in young coniferous trees. It is the same sort of thing that prevails in summer with the filing of plants and shrubs, apples and pears and other wayside products growing on private property.

"Against the man who steals a tree from someone's lawn or a woodlot and carries it off in his automobile, there should be prompt and effective action. He is nothing more than a common thief, regardless of the horsepower of his car.

"In the larger commercial gathering of Christmas trees, legally done by lease or purchase, education is necessary. The scientific cutting for thinning purposes should be encouraged, specified in the lease of land for this use and demanded by common sense. The practice of topping large trees to obtain the pretty crown should be outlawed."

## SENTIMENT FOR EXTRA SESSION SEEMS GAINING

Governor Must Call Legislature Or Speaker Surely Will, It Is Said.

By United Press.

AUSTIN, Nov. 30.—A majority of leading Texas editors favor a special session of the legislature, according to a state-wide survey completed today by the United Press. That a special session would be an added expense to taxpayers, and that Attorney General Dan Moody is protecting the people's rights, is the chief reason advanced by those opposing the call.

Those editors advocating a special session declare it should be convened to give a thorough review to the Ferguson administration, to inquire into state highway matters, to restore public confidence, to clear away the clouds of suspicion and to make an appropriation for the livestock sanitary commission in its

fight against the foot and mouth disease.

The editors generally indicated that a special session would be called. Some believed the governor should issue the call, while others were willing to leave it to Speaker Lee Satterwhite, and yet others were willing to let it await the outcome of Attorney General Moody's investigations. Recent investigations have undermined public confidence in the state highway commission as well as in the administration, according to one editor. The cost of a special session is generally declared to be insignificant in comparison with wanton waste in the highway department. The editors are agreed that traces of suspicion of wrong doing should

be cleared away in order that the people of Texas might have full and complete light on public affairs.

It is stated that \$300,000 has been obtained from private sources to pay the cost of a special session in the event Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson does not call the legislature to meet. Of this amount \$100,000 is said to have been obtained in South Texas through the efforts of Will C. Hogg, an oil operator of Houston and a son of the late Gov. James Stephen Hogg, and \$200,000 through the efforts of T. K. Irvin of Dallas county.

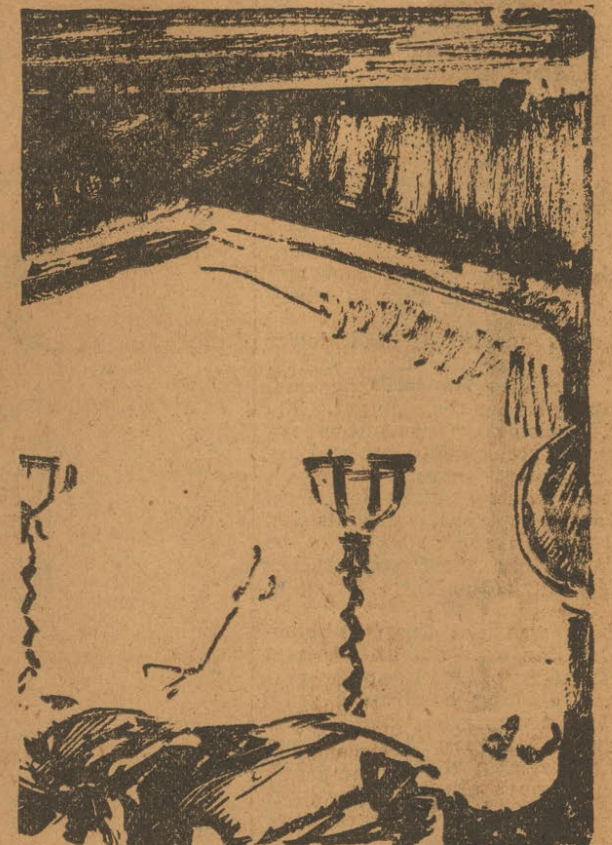
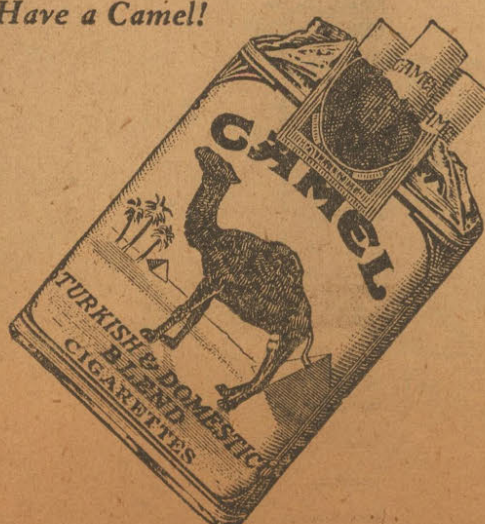

### Farmer Finds That Supposed Weed Is Valuable Plant

Down on a Missouri River bottom a big husky farmer was plowing his wheat stubble one Fall day. William H. Woods of Logan, Iowa, "W. H." as the folks around there call him runs a 700-acre farm just as other people run factories. His good valley land is really a great chemical laboratory on which he is continually experimenting with staple crops and trying out new ones.

But this particular patch of land he was plowing that day had always been a puzzle to him. Year after year, without fertilization or change a good yield had been maintained. And for seven years the parcel of land had been planted to wheat which is exceptionally hard on soil. He was the particular man to stumble upon a discovery which may revolutionize certain kinds of farming.

While stopping to clean the dirt from a plow shovel he noticed tiny knots on roots of a weed which grew in great profusion in this field. Knowing that nodules on the roots of alfalfa mean nitrogen deposits for the soil and being of an inquiring nature as well as a hard-headed business man who keeps careful ledgers, Mr. Wood heaved his two hundred and sixty pounds off of the groaning plow seat and proceeded to gather some sample plants. Going over the field charts that night he discovered that this field had always had a heavy growth of the curious fern-like weed. It was brought in, he believed, by the Missouri River which used to overflow the bottoms and cover his land before the installation of the dikes that now hold it in check. He also remembered that the weed always came up after the grain had been cut. Apparently it did not injure the crops. On the contrary a survey of his records that the yield in this field was greater than it had been seven years previous. And don't forget it had been planted every year to wheat. He went ahead and later furnished samples of the seed, a very hard tiny grain, shaped almost like a clover leaf, to the experiment station at Ames. Several acres were also planted to this Dalea along with his spring grain.

Now another one of these so-called obnoxious weeds has been added to the farmer's list of valuable plants as the much talked of Dalea clover. This plant, practically unrecognized before it was unearthed by the labor and experiments of Mr. Wood now promises to become more popular than its famous predecessor alfalfa. Already it is conceded to be superior in several respects. It produces more seed per acre, is cheaper to handle and it can be grown on soils unfavorable to

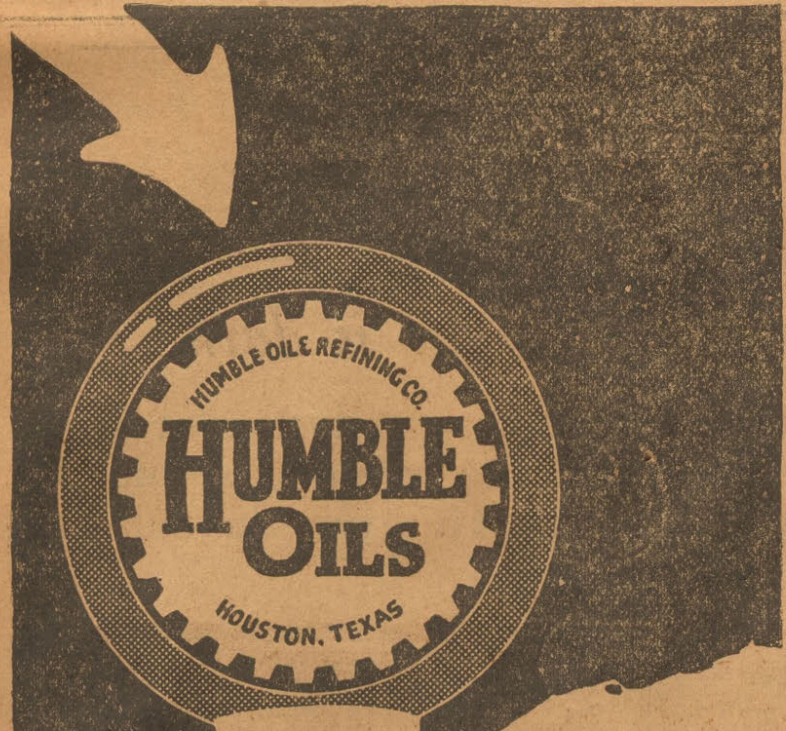

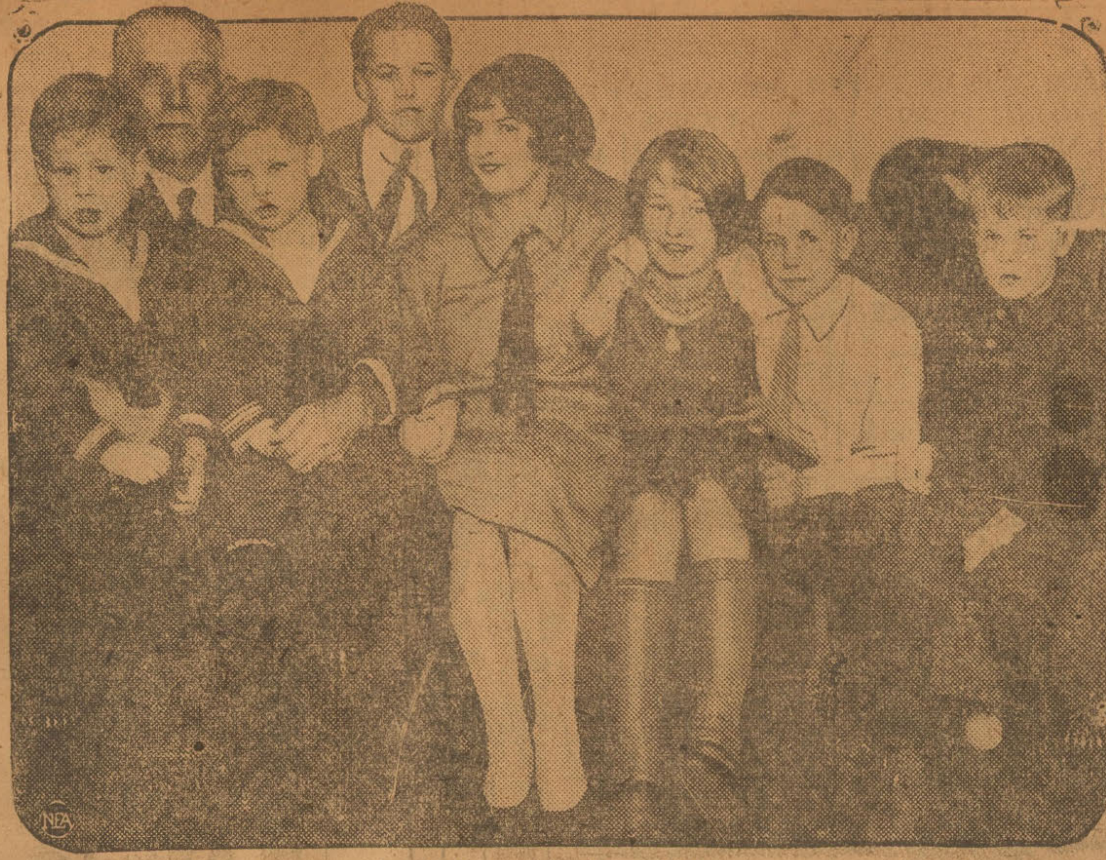
