

## WASHINGTON FORWARDS INSTRUCTIONS

### REPORTS SAY CHINESE AND JAP SAILORS IN BATTLE AT HANKOW

#### PROPERTY OF JAPANESE LOOTED

There Is Apprehension Among Foreigners Over Complicated Affairs

SHANGHAI, April 4.—Fighting between Japanese sailors and Chinese at Hankow and the looting of Japanese property at the nationalist capital today had aroused considerable apprehension among foreigners here, but it was believed that the international settlement was safe from any Chinese attacks.

Excluding the Japanese there are far more troops and police here than foreign civilians, and including the Japanese there is almost one soldier for every foreign man, woman and child in Shanghai.

Unrest among the Chinese was increasing today. Strikes hampered what little business there is. The Standard Oil company has closed its Chang office, and American and British were evacuating Ichang today.

Wang Chin-Wei, head of the nationalist government returned from abroad yesterday and conferred with Marshal Chiang Kai-Shek.

#### Pontoon Bridges To be Replaced By Magic Carpet

LONDON.—British army engineers are experimenting with a new secret "magic carpet" which can be thrown across rivers and streams of moderate width and enable armored trucks or motor lorries to follow an advance close on the heels of the new "submarine tanks."

Hitherto it has been necessary to construct pontoon bridges for heavy motor transport, an operation that requires from six to eight hours. The new "magic carpet" it is said can be thrown across in a few minutes.

While details of the secret have not been revealed, it is understood that the new device takes advantage of the fact that a floating object will support momentarily a considerably greater weight than it will support permanently. A man for instance can cross a stream by stepping quickly across a series of boards no one of which would support his weight alone for any considerable length of time.

In the new invention mats of light material, the nature of which is not disclosed, are strung together and thrown across the stream. Motor trucks are then rushed over the mat bridge one at a time. Each mat starts to sink as the wheels of the truck cross it, but before it has had a chance to sink more than an inch or two the wheels have passed on to the next mat, and then on to the next one successively until the truck has crossed the stream and is safe on shore on the other side. The principle employed is similar to that of a skater crossing "rubber ice"—by skating at a fair speed he can cross ice that would break under him almost immediately if he came to a standstill.

Numerous tests have been made with the new mat-bridge across the river Avon, and they are declared to have been entirely satisfactory. Officers declare it will solve the hitherto difficult problem of enabling heavy army transport to keep up with the rapid advance of infantry and tanks in modern warfare.

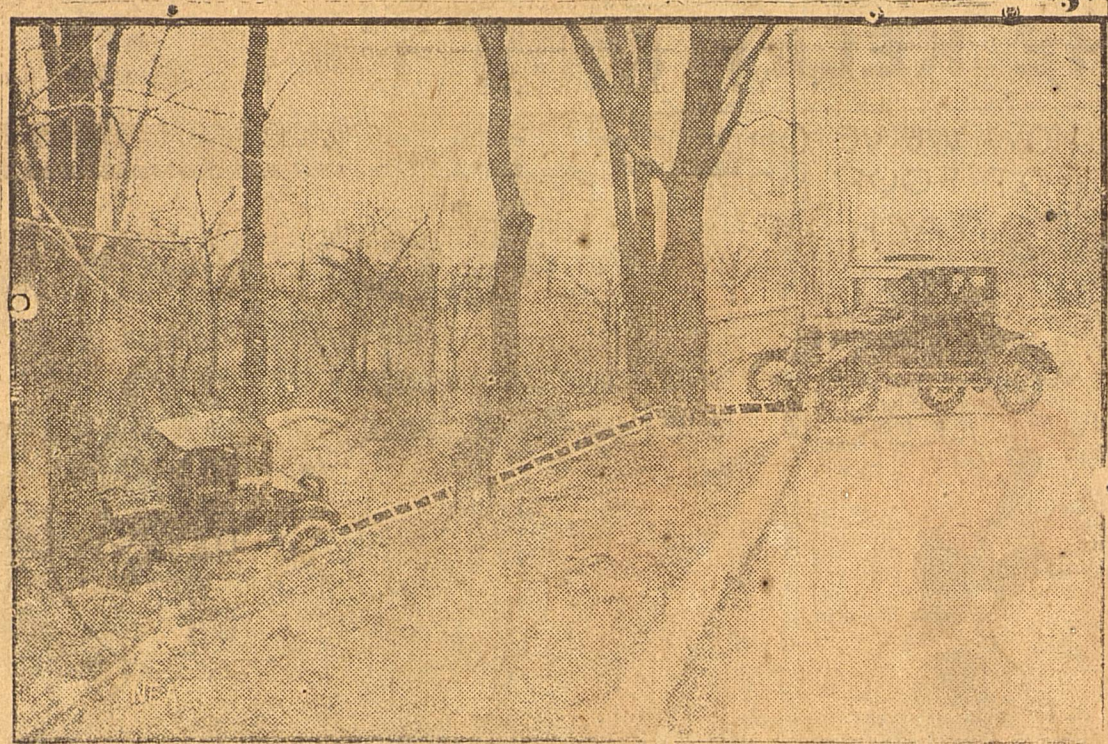
#### Mothers and P. T. A. Will Meet April 25 In Gainesville

#### Government Help Favored in Fight On Wild Animals

#### Moscow Beggars Organize, Seek To Improve Trade

MOSCOW.—The begging system has been revamped and greatly improved since the beggars of Moscow formed themselves into a corporation several weeks ago.

New and better methods of extracting kopeks from a credulous and sympathetic public have been introduced, and the corporation's idea of dividing the city into zones of action to prevent trespassing of one beggar into another's province shows signs of being strictly enforced.

Bolder beggars are a product of the incorporation. Only the restaurants of Moscow's two principal hotels are safe from intrusion by the brothers of the extended palm. The tea shops and pastry shops and the more humble restaurants are regularly "dunned" by invading mendicants, who profit by the embarrassment of attempting to refuse ten kopeks while seated at a table filled with delicate foods. The beggars disregard the faint-hearted protests of the tea-shop proprietors, who are apparently fearful of violating proletarian principles by excluding the poor and welcoming those who jingle coins in their pockets.

The pre-revolutionary system of bowing down on the sidewalk and howling has also been revived, apparently with considerable success. The old method has also been improved. Whereas in days before the revolution it was difficult to know where to deposit a coin, since the supplicant's hands are buried under his bent body, tin cups have now been provided for reception of the coins.

#### Two New Producers Are Reported From Callahan County

Two new wells, with a daily production of 45 barrels were added to those in the producing column in Callahan county Saturday, according to reports made by operators to the deputy oil and gas supervisor. The wells were drilled by the Mortimer, Hobbs & Ferguson, No. 5, from a depth of 517 feet, and same company's No. 4 Bessley is making 20 barrels from a depth of 518 feet.

**HOW ABOUT IT?**  
 Some two weeks ago there was considerable talk about a new courthouse for Eastland county—talk, that at that time gave some hope of bringing results. At that time it was said petitions had been prepared, that they were soon to be circulated over the county and that the commissioners' court would very likely be asked to order an election to vote courthouse bonds early in April.

Since that time, absolute silence seems to have prevailed. The movement for a new courthouse seems to have lost what little momentum it had gained.

This should not be. Any progressive movement that means as much to Eastland county as a new courthouse, a much needed courthouse at that, should not be allowed to die. It should not even be subjected to a subordinate place. It should be made to stand out as the one big progressive movement in the county and every community should take a pride in helping the movement along.

It might be said that this county really has no courthouse. It merely has an excuse for a courthouse—an antiquated, dilapidated, dangerous excuse at that. The building that now graces the public square at Eastland is by no means a credit to a county like Eastland county, a county with approximately 60,000 population and in which are situated a half dozen of the best and most progressive towns to be found anywhere in West Texas.

The building has been inspected by architects and construction engineers and has been pronounced as unsafe, and even dangerous. Probably all that has prevented an official condemnation of the structure is the fact that there is not now anywhere in the county seat available space to accommodate departments now housed in the old courthouse. Another good reason why the citizens of the county should insist on a new courthouse immediately is that some departments that were unable to find accommodations in the present building have been forced to go out and seek working quarters elsewhere.

There is probably not a county anywhere in this section of Texas that is so thoroughly in need of a new courthouse as is Eastland county. If there is, that county is probably building one or at least taking active steps in that direction.  
 Don't let the movement for a new courthouse die. The county needs a new one and it can be built.

TECH ENTRANTS**

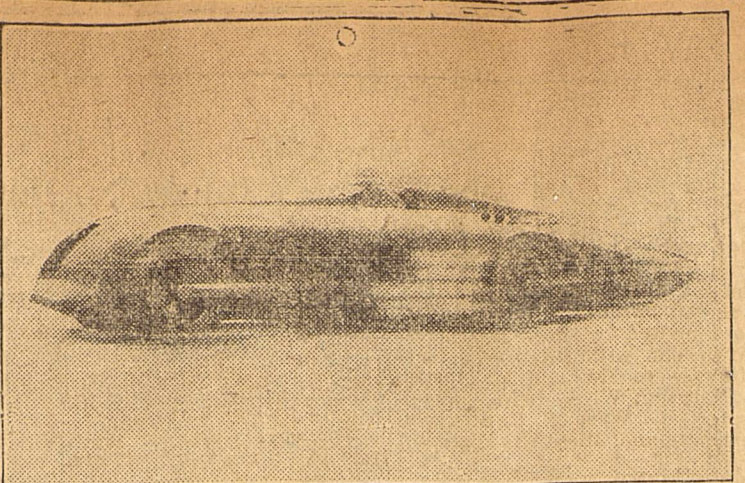

The war department announced today the total mileage of these planes, which will fly from stations in Michigan, Virginia and Texas, and return to their home fields after participating in the war game, will be more than 476,000 miles.

**Goddess of Fire  
Shows, Kilauea  
is Sure to Erupt**

HONOLULU, T. H.—An eruption of the Kilauea volcano on the island of Hawaii is not many weeks distant, for Madame Pele, the Hawaiian goddess of fire, has been seen near Kuhio wharf, not far from Hilo.  
The appearance of Madame Pele is a certain sign of lava flow. Predictions made by government geologists have failed in the past, but it has never been known that an appearance of Madame Pele has been wrong.  
The first indication of an eruption came a few days ago with the announcement of Dr. Thomas A. Jaggar, government geologist, that earthquakes and slides in the Halemau-pu pit of Kilauea volcano portends a change in the condition of the crater.  
A more certain indication of an impending eruption came when Hawaiians noted a peculiar color in the sky at sunset. This is a golden hue in half way between golden and copper. The strange coloring is not smoke although it is called "volcano smoke" by many of the kamaainas (people born in the islands).  
Madame Pele.  
But the most important portent of all came when an old Hawaiian named Haina, a resident of the village of Kuhio wharf, saw a mysterious old woman who approached his hut, requesting food and shelter. As Haina turned to comply with her request, the old hag vanished. And then Haina found a pile of "devil bones" behind his hut. These might be human or they might just be a dog's skeleton, but they are always found after a visit from Madame Pele.  
The water in the Waialuku river has been high recently, reaching a level similar to that which preceded the Hoopuloa flow last April.  
There has been very little rain on Hawaii recently and the high water in Waialuku has been explained as predicting an eruption.  
The hope that Madame Pele will return is a constant prayer breathed by the Hawaiians. Pele's return is a sign of good luck and prosperity. When the fire in the volcano pits is rampant, fortune smiles on Hawaii.  
To the haoles (white people) it means material prosperity because of increased tourist business. Then the Hiihiiinis (strangers) come in droves.  
Last Eruption.  
The last eruption on Hawaii was on April 19, 1926, when Mauna Loa spat her lava down the mountain sides and wiped out the native village of Hoopuloa. Faith of the older Hawaiians in their goddess, Pele, was the outstanding feature of the destruction of Hoopuloa. Even though Pele had appeared in March, 1926, the old Hawaiians insist that she never has harmed humans and so while they removed their pigs and chickens to safety, they stood their ground despite certain knowledge that Mauna Loa was about to erupt.  
None of the private possessions were removed from the Hawaiian residences and when the hissing, fiery mass came down and crushed the fishing hamlet out of existence, it was too late. The molten lava swept down to the sea and no amount of offerings to Pele could appease her wrath.

## Texas Cleaning House This Week, Many Cities Join

Old man Texas is going to be all spick and span at the end of the week as this is the week designated by the state board of health for general housecleaning, repairing, trash burning, flower planting, and other civic improvement measures.

Motorists passing through towns co-operating in this work are going to be impressed by the clean streets, pretty homes, and generally inviting appearance, according to Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer, who has given much effort to the successful observance of this annual health promotion program.

Towns not conducting clean-up activities at this time are urged by Dr. Anderson to conduct a campaign at a later date. Clean, sanitary conditions mean much for the promotion of public health.

## Kansas City Plans One of Greatest Universities

By United Press. KANSAS CITY, March 28.—On the state line between Kansas and Missouri here Kansas City is preparing to build one of the greatest educational institutions of the nation.

Lincoln and Lee university, so named to honor two of the United States' greatest heroes, will memorialize the reconstruction of the republic and will serve the educational needs of one of the most populous territories of the great middle west.

Climaxing a movement started 45 years ago, the acquisition of 281 acres of land in one of the most beautiful sections of Kansas City furnished a stimulus for concerted effort to build a university in Kansas City, the geographical hub of the nation.

Mrs. Kate W. Hewitt of Kansas City donated 146 acres for the site and the city added 115 acres by purchase. Donation of the land was immediately followed by a drive for funds on the part of several Missouri and Kansas Methodist Episcopal church districts, representatives of which will control the affairs of the institution.

More than \$1,300,000 already had been subscribed for the original fund of \$5,000,000 with which to start construction of buildings and commence instruction.

It is the aim of the sponsors to offer a curriculum that will be second to no other and to provide buildings and equipment for the university as fast as increasing registration demands them.

Congress will be petitioned to erect a shrine on the campus to depict the college spirit of Lincoln and Lee. It is planned to inter the bodies of an unknown Confederate and an unknown Union soldier in the shrine. It would be made the final resting place of martyred heroes, the burial ground of civil strife between the states. Lincoln and Lee aims to generate the spirit that inspired the reunion of the north and south.

Promoters of the university point to the fact Kansas City is the meeting place of the north and south and an ideal location for a university with the spirit and purpose its founders have conceived.

A dental college with 400 students already has been absorbed by the university which recently was granted a charter. One of its greatest departments will be the medical school, which will fill a long felt want in this territory.

A college of arts and sciences will be the foundation for the institution. When necessary buildings are constructed, departments for instruction in law, commerce, engineering, music and vocational subjects will be added. It is hoped the college of arts and sciences will open for the 1928 fall term.

Leaders of the endowment campaign are seeking \$5,000,000 with which to found Lincoln and Lee. Of that amount, \$2,000,000 will be expended at the outset for buildings, \$2,000,000 will be set aside for endowments and \$1,000,000 for maintenance.

Bishop Ernest L. Waldorf is president of the university corporation recently formed, and Bishop William F. McMurray is vice president. A board of 75 members, selected from the Methodist church districts will form the directorate. A board of 11 trustees will be vested with power of regents and will actively direct the affairs of the university.

The Kerrville hotel is the first of a number of similar hotels that the Blue Bonnet Hotel company, of which Floyd Singleton is president and general manager, hopes to build. One is to be built in San Antonio right away, which will probably be opened on Thanksgiving day, and others are contemplated. A move to make the Gholson hotel conform to the Blue Bonnet standards is being considered by the management.
