Rocke-feller Sr., contributed \$20,000 to the Anti-Saloon league on April 11, 1925, it was revealed today when the sen-ate primary investigating committee made public a list of contributors of more than \$500, in 1925-26 today. The committee refused to make public the list of contributors before 1925, although the records were sub-mitted as far back as 1917. The Rockefellers' contribution was the largest single donation received.
