



The crudeness of those times has been replaced by high finesse of the legislative agents now in Washington to emphasize the viewpoint of their employers on bills before the con-00000000

In the olden days highly paid workers fraternized with senators and congressmen and reports of money exchanges were frequent and persistent. The late Senator Robert M. Lafol-lette, Sr., has told in his book how he heard a vote bought in the cloakroom of the house of representatives one night for \$500. But all that is

gone now.

In these days very big group of industrialists has a public relations department and a legislative agent. The duties of these agents ostensibly are merely to keep the home office informed of the progress of legislation in congress. When hearings are held upon bills in which they are interested they appear and present the side of their employers. Their profession is highly respected.

The good legislative agents know

The good legislative agents know the first name of every senator and every congressman who is interested in subjects in which they are interested. There is no hint of corruption. There are no stories of vote buying. One of the reasons may be that there is no need to try. There is at least one senator or congress. is at least one senator or congress-man who represents the viewpoint that the agents desire to express and that senator or congressman is only too anxious to champion that view-point to such an extent as he may de-

sire, without pecuniary aid.

There are stories founded or unfounded as they may be going around that when an agent wishes to reward a senator for aid given, that the stock market may sometimes be used as a channel. He may give the senator a tip on a certain stock and a small investment might net a valuable personal return.

The mere information that a certain big corporation is against or for a certain bill is however now of suf-ficient importance to accomplish the the days by lavish use of funds for entertainment and interest.

No Coolidge policy is more absolutely an essential one than his policy toward agriculture. It is to this policy that the recent startling spread of republican insurgency is due.

the country remains to be seen. Even as to the house of representatives there may be a little uncertainty, the lower house is so unwieldy.

### English Composer Decries Jazz Music Of the Present Day

LONDON, July 7.—Jazz music is carrying the present generation back to the instincts of cavemen and savages, Dr. Henry Coward, prominent English composer and musical au-throity, told the United Press in an

throity, told the United Press in an interview today.

Dr. Coward declared that modern dances such as the exaggerated foxtrot and the Charleston, which followed the introduction of jazz as a "fixed standard" of music, have "turned back pages of progress to the drunken revelry or lesser breeds."

"It is not the noise, lack of rhythm or the ugly cleverness of jazz that I object to," Dr. Coward said, "but it is the exploitation of this class of ambitious gaiety which has been injected upon all people as a "fixed standard" of music for all occasions.

"The jerky rhythms; the hooting, out-of-tone saxaphones; the plongplong beats of the banjos and the grotesque howling and boisterous

grotesque howling and boisterous banging of toys and kitchen utensile is degrading to all artistic sense an possesses atavistic tendencies in carrying civilization back to the first

stages of music.

"The antics of bodily movement which have been devised to fit these humdrum sounds can only be compared with the oddity of the dances of the plantation slaves of 80 years of the plantation slaves of 80 years ago. Jazz music and jazz dancing is the outgrowth of a degarded table for art in the better class of people, with the result that the lesser classes saw the acceptance of jazz by people who should know better and felt that they should immediately accept this form of orgy to be 'proper.'
