MADRID FEARS STORM WILL LEAD TO MORROCCO REVOLT

CHINESE REJECT DEMANDS OF JOINT NOTE

WASHINGTON REFUSES TO COMMENT ON REPLY

Committee Wanted To Revise Treaties And Fix Responsibility

WASHINGTON, April 15.—The Chinese Nationalists, rejecting the demands of the United States and associated powers in connection with the Nanking anti-foreign outrages, was received by the state department today through Consul General Lockhart, at Hankow.

In the absence of Secretary of State Kellogg on Easter vacation officials would not comment on the Nationalist counter proposal for an international commission to revise the so-called unequal treaties and fix responsibility for the Nanking incident.

Officials here were disappointed by the nationalist note which failed to accept major demands of the United States and associated powers for apology, reparations and punishment of the guilty of the Nanking anti-foreign outrages.

Study of the text by the cabinet, however, tempered somewhat the reaction to incomplete press dispatches which had indicated the reply was a wholesale rejection of the demands.

The note made public by the state department expressed regret for the Nanking incident, agreed to "make good all damage to the American consulate regardless of those responsible and promised reparation for all other damage except that caused by northern troops and by the British-American bombardment. To the demands for apology and punishment the note suggested delay until responsibility can be fixed or apportioned by the Nationalist investigators or by a joint international commission.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Because of threatening conditions, Rear Admiral C. S. Williams, commander of the Asiatic fleet, has ordered a concentration of naval vessels at Hankow, he informed the navy department today.

Among those who are attending the school are J. C. Patterson, Eastland; E. H. Varnell, instructor in vocational agriculture, Cisco; Frank Lockridge, Breckenridge; William Hale, Graham; A. C. Magee, Albany and county agent Cooper, Baird.

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 15.—Strained relations between Texas and Minnesota were not bettered today by the statement of Oscar H. Smith, Minnesota commissioner of immigration, that he would not apologize for statements made in a recent bulletin.

The Rio Grande valley secretaries' association has protested that Smith's bulletin libeled South Texas. "The facts are just the same now as when the statement was written," Smith said.

NATIVES MAY TURN UPON SPANISH CHIEFS

Direct Communication Ordinarily Serves To Hold Men in Control

MADRID, Spain, April 15.—Revolt in Spanish Morocco was feared today as an aftermath of the Mediterranean storm which swept the Spanish and northern African coasts for 48 hours.

At least forty ships were sunk or damaged and total loss is estimated at \$20,000,000.

It was said to have been the worst storm in the history of northern Africa. Danger of revolt lay in the interruption of communication with the interior military posts. The outposts are garrisoned by natives under Spanish officers.

The first clue to be found by the searchers reached police headquarters last night when the Boy Scout members of the party found a gasoline bucket cover identified as young White's, on which were inscribed these words: "Come to Fourche, we are alive."

Togo Ray Murder Case Called For Trial Next Week

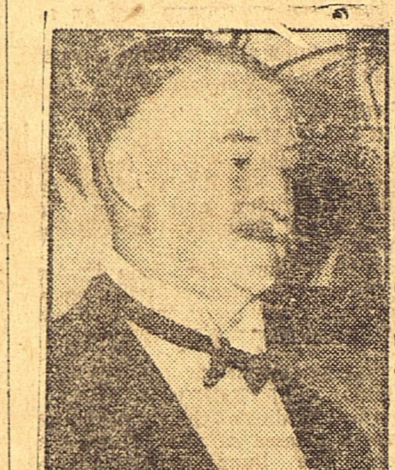

SPENCER WELL REPORTED IN FOR 1000 BARRELS

Cranfill & Reynolds No. 1, J. E. Spencer, in the McAllister pool four and one-half miles southwest of Carbon is in with a flush production of 1000 barrels.

Making considerable gas the well blew itself in at the usual depth.

The Spencer No. 1 makes the fourth producer in the McAllister pool and is one-half mile southwest of the McAllister discovery well. The other two wells are the Hand No. 1 a quarter of a mile north of the discovery well and the Able No. 1, the same distance northeast.

Considerable interest is being manifested in oil circles in the Root et al. well in the Ramsower district. This well was given a dose of 300 quarts of nitro late Wednesday afternoon in hopes of making it increase its production. Since then no news has emanated from that district.

The Gordon interests are keeping a close watch on developments in the territory and as soon as the colonel returns from the coast several new locations will be made north of the Ramsower No. 1.

While a close tab is being kept on the Ramsower area, the Davison interests are keeping a weather eye open on the Phillips well, two miles east of Eastland on the highway.

This well was a small producer, making from 10 to 20 barrels. It has been drilled deeper and was to have been finished today. Quite a crowd has gone to the scene, but no reports have been made of the well as yet.

Supervisor Kilgore with headquarters in Eastland received reports that the C. T. Webb well that is being drilled by Hoffman and Page is down 1,800 feet. They are going after deep production in that area.

Norris Paper Gets Charter From State Department

DEMAND THAT RUSSIAN ADVISOR QUIT

Reports From Fighting Fronts Say All is Quiet But Truce is Denied

SHANGHAI, April 15.—Moderate Nationalists in party meeting at Nanking today impeached the Nationalist government at Hankow and adopted a resolution demanding the arrest of several of the Nationalist ministers at Hankow.

The moderates, styled the central control committee, also demanded that Michael Borodin, Russian advisor to the party be ousted.

The U. S. S. Preble and the U. S. S. Cincinnati departed for Hankow today, Shanghai was quiet and railroads were running. Reports from the fighting fronts said all was quiet there but Nationalist headquarters here denied that a truce had been arranged.

Officials of the Nationalist party said today it would be safe for missionaries to return to the interior, but admitted it would be impossible for them to accomplish much under present conditions.

Four Destroyers At Manila Will Go to Shanghai

MANILA, Phil., Slando, April 15.—Four more destroyers now in port here today were ordered to proceed to Shanghai with all possible speed.

The Simpson and McCormack left immediately upon receipt of the orders from Admiral Williams, Asiatic fleet commander.

The Black Hawk and McLeish will leave within two days.

Claim Eastland County Has Best Roads in All State

Commissioner V. V. Cooper of Ranger, when asked for a good road story today by a Ranger Times reporter said that Eastland county's representative, M. H. Hagaman, said we had the best roads in Texas, and Mr. Cooper seemed to think that it might be possible to get the state highway department interested in closing the gap that now exists across the Eastland-Stephens county line, on the Caddo highway.

The highway is practically completed from LaCasa to within a few miles of the Eastland county line and is opened to traffic on Sundays. It would connect Ranger with a trade territory that has always been loyal to Ranger, Mr. Cooper explained, and he should know, as he was reared in that part of the country.

Mr. Cooper said that right now he was working a crew from Mangun south and west, intersecting the Grapevine and Rising Star road, a section that he had not worked in heretofore.

AN EARLY START.
 A few days ago newspaper dispatches told of a thorough clean-up made by officers in the little town of Crane, in Crane county. Statements were to the effect that some 15,000 bottles of one form or another of intoxicants were confiscated and destroyed and that the main street of the town was littered with broken bottles. Further statements were that a large number of undesirables were arrested and fined and that a much larger number of their associates were given leave of absence.

Crane is a mushroom oil field town, and according to reports is under the official jurisdiction of the officers of Ector county, adjoining Crane county. It was the officers of Ector county who made the raid, cleaned up the town, held court through practically one whole night and awakened the town on Sunday morning to an entirely different environment.

This is indeed getting a quick start and the early upper hand of the lawless element. There are some other towns today in the Texas oil fields that would probably be getting less adverse publicity had such drastic steps been taken at the very beginning.

Oil field towns and mining camps are always noted for their lawless element, especially if those in authority show the slightest tendency toward being lenient. The sheriff and county attorney in this instance are to be complimented on their foresight and on the fact that they mastered the situation while it could be mastered and before it was necessary to call upon the state for assistance.

A few more examples of this sort of dealing with the lawless element in the oil fields will go a long way toward keeping the oil field towns free of so many gamblers, robbers, bootleggers and their horde of undesirable associates.

Orchestra Has Been Organized In Ranger School

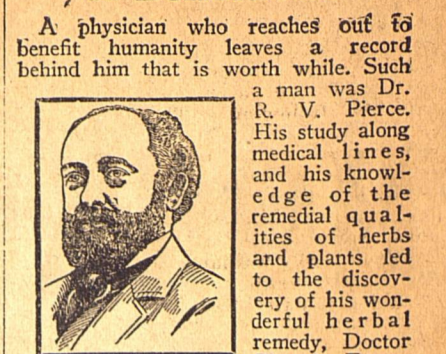

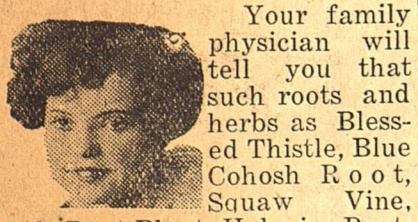

IDLE LAND

Waste and worthless land is worse than a dead loss. It is a drag on the community. Idle land leads to decline in industry, wealth, population and public revenues. It depresses agriculture and causes social retrogression. Permanent prosperity must be based on permanent resources, fully and wisely used. Timber growing must be the mainstay of regions in which this represents the highest use to which the bulk of the land can be put. The sooner it is begun the better for everybody. Tree crops not only put money in circulation in the form of wages to woods workers and sawmill hands but also attracts other industries. Productive forests are an economic necessity. Our 80,000,000 acres and more of idle forest land and the much larger acreage of second-growth and cut-over land now left wild and without care, to produce what it will, are a reproach to our intelligence. Not even so rich a country as the United States can afford such waste.—From Texas Forest News.

Much Gasoline Goes to Storage, Awaits Advance

Approximately 25 per cent of the natural gasoline as well as the motor fuel gasoline is going into storage, announced one of the leading manufacturers in Eastland. During March 1,150,000 gallons were run into storage in Central West Texas counties. Manufacturers are not trying to sell any more than is necessary contemplating an advance in price when the

tourist season is opened and going strong. Just now the cost of production is more than it is bringing wholesale. The past few days shows a quietness in the market for gas, with a slacker movement. However, this is only temporary and the demand is expected to show an increase within a few days.

Tank wagon prices at Fort Worth still hover around 4.35 cents for natural gasoline and 6 to 6 1/2 cents for motor fuel. The production of natural gasoline in Central West Texas counties shows practically no change in March as compared with previous months. The production, it is understood, will be held down until prices advance for both crude oil and gasoline.


