## American Legion Would Reorganize National Defense

### SUGGESTION BROUGHT UP AT PARIS TODAY

#### Resolution Favors Four Defense Heads Each in The Cabinet

AMERICAN LEGION CONVENTION HALL, PARIS, Sept. 21.—Reorganization of the administration of the national defense of the United States was proposed and approved today by the American Legion convention here.  
The legion adopted a resolution favoring the organization of a department of national defense in which there will be four divisions, one each for the army, navy, air service and munitions. Each division would have a separate chief under a departmental secretary who would be a member of the cabinet.  
The legionnaires cheered and sang the praises of the "doughty girls" as Evangeline Booth, national commander of the Salvation Army, rose to address the convention when it opened today.

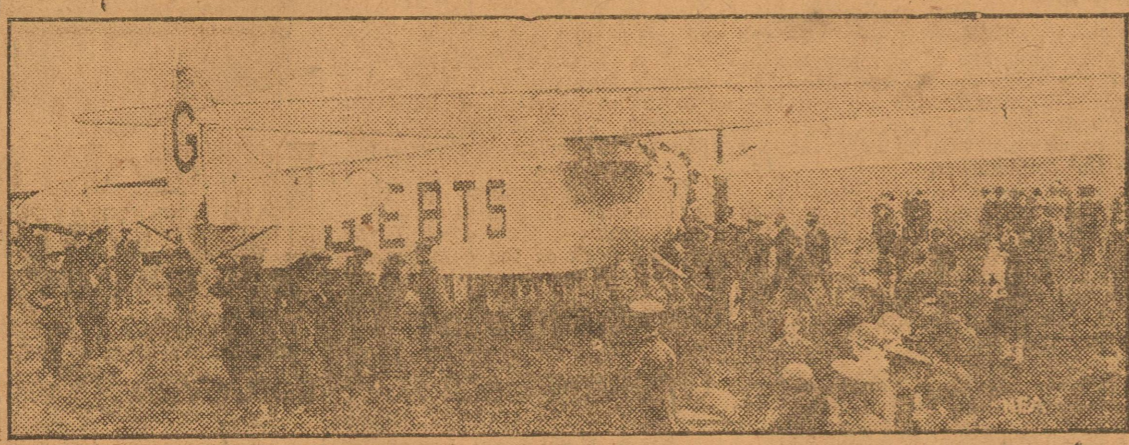
#### Pneumonia Victim Is Sent Back To Old Home for Burial

#### MANY SUSPECTS ROUNDED UP IN BRUTAL MURDER

#### Body of Fifteen Year Old Girl Found Near Home in Suburb of Chicago.

HILLSIDE, Ill., Sept. 21.—In an effort to solve the brutal killing of 15-year-old Edna Muller, police today had arrested more than a dozen suspects for questioning but were without a definite clue to identity of the killer.  
The body of the girl was found in a vacant lot near her home in a sparsely settled section of this Chicago suburb early yesterday. She was last seen alive leaving an elevated railroad station Monday.  
The body showed marks of horrible brutality. She had been badly beaten, her head was crushed and her throat bruised. The murderer had attacked her.

#### Frank Strong Is Killed After His Prison Escape

M'ALLISTER, Okla., Sept. 21.—Escape from the Latimer county jail and his scheduled trial for bank robbery ended fatally today for Frank Strong, when he was shot down by J. Thurston, Latimer county special deputy, while resisting capture.  
According to word received by Pittsburg county officers, Strong was one of the party of five who yesterday escaped from the county jail at Wilburton while the jailer went for the mail.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—President Coolidge may have some trouble getting the senate to confirm his choice of Dwight W. Morrow to be ambassador to Mexico. Independent republicans and democrats are talking about a possible investigation of Morrow by the senate foreign relations committee which will consider the nomination when Mr. Coolidge sends it to the senate next December.  
They have respect for Morrow personally but are generally opposed to the appointment of any member of the Wall street bankers. They are especially interested because of the oil land controversy with Mexico, in which many Wall street dollars have been invested.  
Mr. Coolidge made the appointment on his own initiative because he felt the Mexican situation needed a keen business man to handle it.

#### Washington Asks Investigation Of Murder Case

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—The United States today formally requested the Mexican government to investigate legal procedure in the case of Javier Diaz, Mexican, charged with killing Arthur Brewer, of Boston, June 1, at Guadalajara.  
According to the state department, local authorities are not pushing the case adequately and a miscarriage of justice is feared unless the federal government intervenes to punish the guilty.

F. has brought these French girls to the information office at American Legion headquarters here. Eagerly they have inquired whether John Doe is among the legionnaires who are now in Paris.

#### MANY VISIT GRAVES OF A. E. F. DEAD IN FRANCE

PARIS.—Many graves of American doughboys who made the supreme sacrifice on Flanders Field, at Chateau Thierry, Belleau Woods or in the Argonne, are being visited these days by those who were near and dear to him.  
Legionnaires, as well as members of the American Legion Auxiliary, are making pilgrimages to the final resting places of their beloved dead.  
Officers of the American Graves Registration Service in Europe and the American Battle Monuments commission, under whose care American cemeteries in France and Belgium have been placed by the American government, are authority for the statement that at least one-third of the graves of American war dead will have been decorated by mothers, wives and sisters before the legionnaires return home.

Cemetery caretakers and officials of the two organizations long ago prepared to receive all of the 6,000 American women who came for the American Legion Auxiliary convention either as delegates or guests. The procession of these to the cemeteries began as soon as the first delegates arrived. It has been no uncommon sight to see gold star mothers, still attired in deep mourning, kneeling for an hour in prayer on the spot where their beloved one sleeps.

Sheriff T. A. Binford of Harris county telephone that the name on the paper, a bank deposit slip, was not on the bank's list of depositors at Houston.

#### MAY CONNECT MAD MAN WITH BRUTAL MURDER

## BABE RUTH MAY BEAT RECORD OF SIX YEARS AGO

### Writer Says Record This Year Equal To 121 Since Change of Rules of That Year Favored Him.

By BILLIE EVANS.  
"How many home runs are you going to make this year?" I put that question to Babe Ruth at St. Petersburg, Fla., about the middle of last March, as I sat on the Yankee bench watching the New York club work out in spring training. The Babe had just returned from the plate after his customary time at bat during the practice session. In three swings at the ball, two of his efforts resulted in long drives to right that would have landed far up

in that section of the Yankee Stadium bleachers. "I'm in great shape," he replied. "I would like to break my record of 59, but I don't think I will be able to do it. However, I am positive I will make 50 home runs this year. You can quote me as strong as you want to on that one."

Despite my knowledge of Ruth's extraordinary slugging power, I doubted his ability to make good on his boast of 50 home runs. It struck me as if he was biting off entirely too much.

Gets His Fifty.  
On September 11, exactly three weeks before the close of the 1927 American League season, with 17 games still to play, Ruth made good his spring prediction of 50 home runs or bust. It was in a game that also had another unusual angle in connection with it, wholly aside from the fact that Ruth reached the half century mark in circuit clouts. This game marked the first victory the St. Louis Browns scored over the Yanks in 22 starts. Ruth made his 50th home run off Pitcher Milt Gaston one of the best right handers in the American league who allowed only five hits to regist-

er the sole win that St. Louis was able to score over New York all season. Since the major league schedules consist of 154 games, in order to make 50 home runs in the season, it meant Ruth must hit a home run every third game. That's quite some task, but he proved equal to it. Now the momentous question, relative to Ruth's 1927 home run spree, is what chance has he to break his record of 59 made in 1921? I doubt if he can do it.

If Ruth is to break his remarkable performance of 1921, it means that

he must average one home run every other game, which with 19 1/2 go, would make his total for the year an even 60, breaking the old mark by one homer.

As a matter of fact, Ruth's 50 home runs of this year is practically as meritorious a feat as his 59, made seven years ago.

The fact is lost sight of that Ruth in 1921 benefited by a rule that has since been changed. Until July of 1921, the umpire judged the ball fair or foul, according to where it was when it passed out of the playing field. The old rule, to which baseball has returned, makes it compulsory for the umpire to watch the

ball until it finally passes from his view in determining whether it is fair or foul.

As far as I am able to learn from a canvass of the American League umpires, Ruth, in 1921, profited to the extent of eight home runs on drives that would merely be foul balls this year.

On three occasions this year, I have been forced to call terrific drives by Ruth, that were fair when they passed from the playing field, foul balls, because they were such when they finally passed from my view.

No doubt the rest of the staff have had similar experiences, which mean Ruth would probably have at least 59 to his credit at this time if the freak rule that helped him in 1921 was still in vogue.

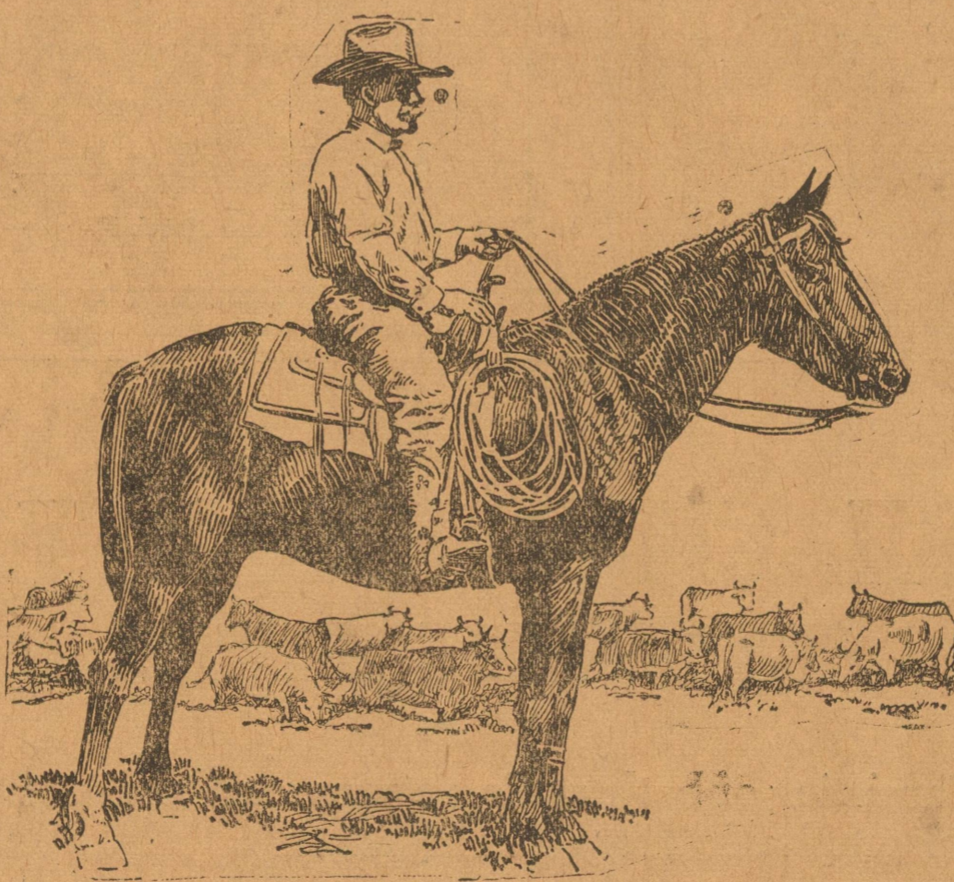

# LEGION GETS DATA ON VETERANS BUREAU AND ENDOWMENT FUND

By United Press.  
 PARIS, Sept. 20.—Reports on accomplishments of the U. S. Veterans bureau and the American Legion endowment fund corporation were made at the convention of the American Legion here today, by General Frank T. Hines, director of the veterans bureau, and James A. Drain, president of the endowment fund corporation.

Regarding the future, Gen. Hines said:  
 "In all matters of veteran's relief congress has indicated a policy of liberalization and generous treatment. In keeping with this attitude on the part of the American public, as represented by their congress, the bureau has endeavored to impart to

its personnel charged with the responsibility of carrying the law and regulations into effect, a policy of liberal and humane consideration of the problem.

"At the outset it was stated to the field that it is the clear and unmistakable duty of the bureau to give 'service.' I realize that this term of 'service' has a broad meaning and various interpretations, but we have tried to impart, by instructions to the field, that the type of service desired is that which gives to the claimant and the bureau's beneficiaries all that can possibly be extended in the way of relief under the existing law.

"No endeavor has been made to bring about economies so far as real measure of relief are concerned. So far as the veterans bureau is concerned, it may be safely stated that our endeavors in this regard have been more in the direction of eliminating waste than exercising any other form of economy. The best evidence of this can be found in a study of the bureau's expenditures over the past three years.

In listing the endeavors which the bureau will take up in the future General Hines pointed to: perfecting administrative machinery dealing with the present law; continuation of efforts to bring about a higher degree of professional service in connection with hospitalization giving further study to the vast amount of medical data available as a result of the bureau's past experience; bringing about closer and more uniform results in the matter of adjudicating claims; further extension of the bureau's diagnostic activities and finally continuation of the bureau's policy of dealing sympathetically, humanely and generously in all matters affecting veterans.

"Since June, 1924," he continued, "the number of active disability awards has increased in the net more than 64,000 with a consequent increase in the value of monthly payments exceeding \$4,800,000. During this same period there has resulted a material change in the character of awards. In line with the bureau's policy of placing as many awards on a permanent basis as possible, the number of temporary partial awards has been reduced from 83,300 to 63,700 while permanent partial awards have more than doubled. A marked increase in the number of permanent and total cases is noted, increasing from 16,700 in June 1924 to more than 32,500 at the present time. Thirteen percent of active cases are now rated permanent and total and 21 percent are rated as total."

Gen. Hines said the adjusted compensation act as administered by the

bureau has resulted in the filing of approximately 3,412,000 applications and of this number some 3,362,500 have been adjudicated to a value in excess of \$5,290,679,000. As of June 1, 1927, but 49,373 cases, or approximately one and one-half percent of the total applications were pending.

Drain, a past national commander of the American Legion endowment fund corporation which controls the \$5,000,000 raised for the care of the disabled and orphans of the world war, said in part:

The Knights of Columbus in one year of emergency, contributed \$75,000 for this purpose. The Y. M. C. A. turned over to the Legion an endowment fund of some hundreds of thousands of dollars, and the earnings from this were used to help."

"But the Legion decided in 1924 that it had the right to go before the American people and ask for subscriptions to an American Legion endowment fund of \$5,000,000 the earnings from which should be available as long as needed to carry on the service of the legion to the disabled veterans and orphans."  
 "The efforts of the legion to raise this money received a cordial reception all over the nation."  
 "The detailed figures for the operation of the endowment fund corporation for the past year shows a healthy condition and one with which Legionnaires may well be pleased. The activities surrounding the raising of the fund had a deep and wide effect."

## Special Trains To Bring Bankers To Houston Meet

By United Press.  
 HOUSTON, Sept. 20.—Nine special trains have been chartered in the north and east to aid in bringing the 5,000 delegates expected here Oct. 24-27 for the annual convention of the American bankers' association.

According to Roy Miller, Corpus Christi, convention manager, the entire state will be on exhibit before the meeting of financial leaders of the nation. Side trips have been arranged to the lower Rio Grande Valley, Fort Worth and Dallas, San Antonio, Austin and other points in order to enable the visitors to see the state at first hand. The side trips will be made by special train.

"We want these financial leaders to see the dormant opportunities in Texas at first hand," Miller explained.

The convention here will be the first one ever held south of the Mason and Dixon line by the bankers.

The special trains will be run from New York, three trains; Chicago, three; Kansas City, one; Cleveland, one; and Atlanta, one.

Malvin A. Taylor, president of the First National bank of Chicago and president of the association, will head the official delegation. Other officers of the association include Thomas R. Preston, Chattanooga, Tenn., and Craig B. Hazlewood, Chicago, vice president, and Nathan D. Prince, Hartford, Conn., treasurer.

A total of \$50,000 has been raised locally for entertaining the convention.

At the close of the convention sessions, a special train will leave for a side trip to Corpus Christi, Kingsville, Brownsville, Harlingen, Edinburg, San Benito and intermediate points. A second special train will go to San Antonio, Austin, Fort Worth and Dallas.

### Eastland County Banks May Make Service Charge

On Friday night at Cisco at a meeting of Eastland county bankers, the banks of Eastland county will probably be put on a service charge which is now used by 30 percent of all the banks in the United States, W. W. Housewright, acting vice-president of the Citizens State bank of Ranger, stated this morning.

The meeting on Friday night to decide the service charge question, comes as a sequel to the Eastland County Bankers' association, held Friday night at Rising Star, at which time tentative plans were outlined for charging an account that does not average over \$50 during the month, provided as many as two checks are drawn on it during the month, fifty cents monthly for carrying that account and to charge twenty-five cents on every check returned for the reason of insufficient funds, also to charge fifty cents where an account is opened for less than \$50.

"While the plan has not yet been agreed on, it is probable that it will be adopted at Friday night's meeting. It had already been adopted in Breckenridge. The exceptions to the service charge will be the clergy, savings accounts depositors, estates, churches and civic organizations.

Mr. Housewright in explaining the service charge stated that the expense of running a bank the size of the Citizens State bank was \$30,000 annually. Forty percent of this amount is for stationery. An analysis of the Citizens State bank shows that the bank carries a total of 4,624 accounts, and 2,425 of these accounts are under \$50, the total of those 2,425 accounts only aggregating 3 percent of the total deposits. For example, he explained, a man has \$30 on account, the bank loans 15 percent of it at an average of 8 percent per annum, the revenue brought in on that \$90 deposit is 10 cents per month, out of which the cost of checks, ledger sheets, pass books, deposit slips, clerk hire and the pro-rata amount of all overhead of the bank, must be paid.

Mr. Housewright stated that approximately 30 percent of all the banks in the United States had adopted the service charge plan, and more were adopting it every day, the necessity of such a charge being brought about by the fact that the interest rates are going down and the expenses of running a bank increasing, and that the banks of the county have found out that the people as a whole don't want the banks to lose anything on accounts.

The young medical student is a graduate of Ranger High school, completing his high school studies in 1920. During the following two years he attended the State university and since that time has been a student at the State Medical school.

### Over \$1,000,000 Coming to State Banks at Once

As a former member of the guaranty fund, the Citizens State bank of Ranger is due to get back the unused portion of the amount it had on deposit with the banking department at the time of its withdrawal from the guaranty fund system.

The state banking board Tuesday authorized the state banking commissioner to return to state banks and trust companies, formerly holding membership on the depositors guaranty fund, a sum in excess of \$785,000, representing these banks' unused interest in the fund at the time of their withdrawal from that system.

In addition to this sum, the commissioner was also instructed to return to such banks the sum of \$250,000 representing the unused portion of the assessments made against the banks from time to time by the banking board for the purpose of paying the depositors of failed guaranty fund banks.

The thirty-sixth legislature passed an act permitting guaranty fund banks to withdraw from the system by proper amendment of charter and adopt the bond security plan of securing depositors.

Mr. Housewright, of the Citizens State bank, Ranger, said today that the Citizens State bank and the Ranger State bank had paid into the guaranty fund, approximately \$24,000 and that this bank would get back its pro-rata part of its deposits.
