

## ROGERS MAKES TOUCHING PLEA FOR WIFE

### BROCK AND SCHLEE, ROUND WORLD FLYERS REACH CALIFORNIA

#### PLANE TAKEN TO FLYING FIELD AT ONCE

Present Plans Are To Leave San Francisco For Detroit Friday

By United Press. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29.—Touching native soil again after a month's absence in their spectacular attempt to break the world's record for circling the globe, W. S. Brock and Edward Schlee, Detroit aviators, reached San Francisco today.

The liner Korea Maru, on which they crossed the Pacific from Japan after abandoning plans to fly across the vast stretch of water, reached quarantine here at 7 a. m. Brock and Schlee were greeted by two officials which went down to quarantine to meet them. They were taken aboard one of the tugs and landed at Chissy Field shortly before 9 a. m.

Their plane, the Pride of Detroit, was unloaded onto a barge from the steamer and taken direct to the field. Brock and Schlee announced they planned to hop off tomorrow morning for Detroit.

#### Eastland-Strawn Game to Be Played On Cisco Grounds

Due to the fact that the Eastland athletic field has not been finished and is in no condition to play a game on, the game scheduled with Strawn for Saturday will be played on the gridiron of the Cisco High school at 3:30 o'clock.

The game played last week with Gorman was played on the Ranger field which the Ranger officials courteously offered to the Mavericks until their stadium was completed.

Cisco also offered their field to the Mavericks and inasmuch as the Lobes will be in El Paso and no game is scheduled there for this week end, the Mavericks decided to play the Saturday game there.

It is hoped that the field will be completed before the conference games start.

#### Carnival to Take Over Main Street During Oil Jubilee

Three blocks of Main street, Ranger, extending from Commerce to Marston, will be turned over to King carnival during the two days of the jubilee, Charles Moore announced today.

Traffic will be routed around these three blocks as they will be kept roped off during the celebration, providing in this way plenty of space for the some 15 or 20 bands that are expected to be here and for the booths that will be erected in front of each place of business.

Merchants are asked to go to the jubilee headquarters at once and order carnival wares so that they may reach here in ample time.

#### Instructor At Cooking School Talks on Salads

Mrs. Ida Chitwood, instructor in the Eastland Telegram cooking school, being held each afternoon at the city hall auditorium from 2 to 4 o'clock, took as her subject Wednesday afternoon the most popular dish in the world—salads.

Mrs. Chitwood lectured on salads and made several varieties of salads that would tempt anyone's taste. Salads are the foundation of every meal and can be made into the most delicate dishes very easily.

Three special salads led the list yesterday afternoon. Bean salad, made of Gebhart's Mexican style canned beans, formed the foundation for the salad. This was served to the class and declared very delicious and entirely different from any salad ever tried. This is a new salad, having just recently been compounded by the leading culinary artists of the world.

Another new salad made was the devil chili meat salad which is gradually taking the place of the chicken salad. It is made of Gebhart's canned chili meat and is a meal in itself. The other feature salad made was one of Mrs. Chitwood's favorite dishes, the Christmas basket salad, an artistic and pretty salad of varied colors.

The rich devil's food cake which was made Tuesday was served to the class along with the salad. The cake was baked on the famous Detroit Jewel gas range which was furnished by the Satterfield Hardware company at the request of Mrs. Chitwood. The cake was declared delicious and the Andly Amantine cake filling was very good.

In speaking of the value of a good salad to the meal Mrs. Chitwood gave many valuable hints to the salad maker. She said that many pretty salads could be made from fruits where a good brand of canned products was selected. She recommended the Sun-Kist product as a perfect brand of fruit suited for salad making.

In telling of the uses of salads on hot days Mrs. Chitwood showed how a good salad was more valuable to the health than a hot meal and still served the same purpose.

"A cool, crisp salad adds zest to any meal. When the first warm days of spring come, surprise your family with a water cress and cream cheese salad, or with fresh dandelion greens and young beets, or with any other refreshing and salad green that is obtainable in your locality.

"For hot summer evenings," she continued, "when the very thought of a heavy meal is destructive to the appetite, prepare a plentiful bowl of vegetable salad. Serve with cold meat and tall glasses of ice cold tea or iced coffee, and the most wearied member of the family will be tempted to eat.

Even in winter, salad should be a frequent feature of your meals. Chopped cabbage, or fruit or jellied salads will lighten the diet of hot meats and rich puddings, and add a welcome variety to your menu. In addition to the three salads mentioned above Mrs. Chitwood gave the recipes and made eight others. These were put on display and the students were requested to inspect the dishes and note the way in which attractive dishes could be made out of green material and fresh and canned fruit.

Her stuffed pear salad was especially pretty with the halves of a pear tinted pink and green and garnished with green and red.

#### ARKANSAS TOWN DESTROYED BY TORNADO TODAY

Residences, Schools, Business Houses Levelled But No Casualties Reported.

Twelve residences, four garages and the school building were swept away but no casualties were reported. Other towns in the vicinity were reported to have escaped damage but it was feared the twister left a wake of destruction in nearby farming territory.

The flight Friday will be to Detroit, their starting point.

The aviators were induced to abandon plans for a trans-Pacific flight and took a steamer from Japan.

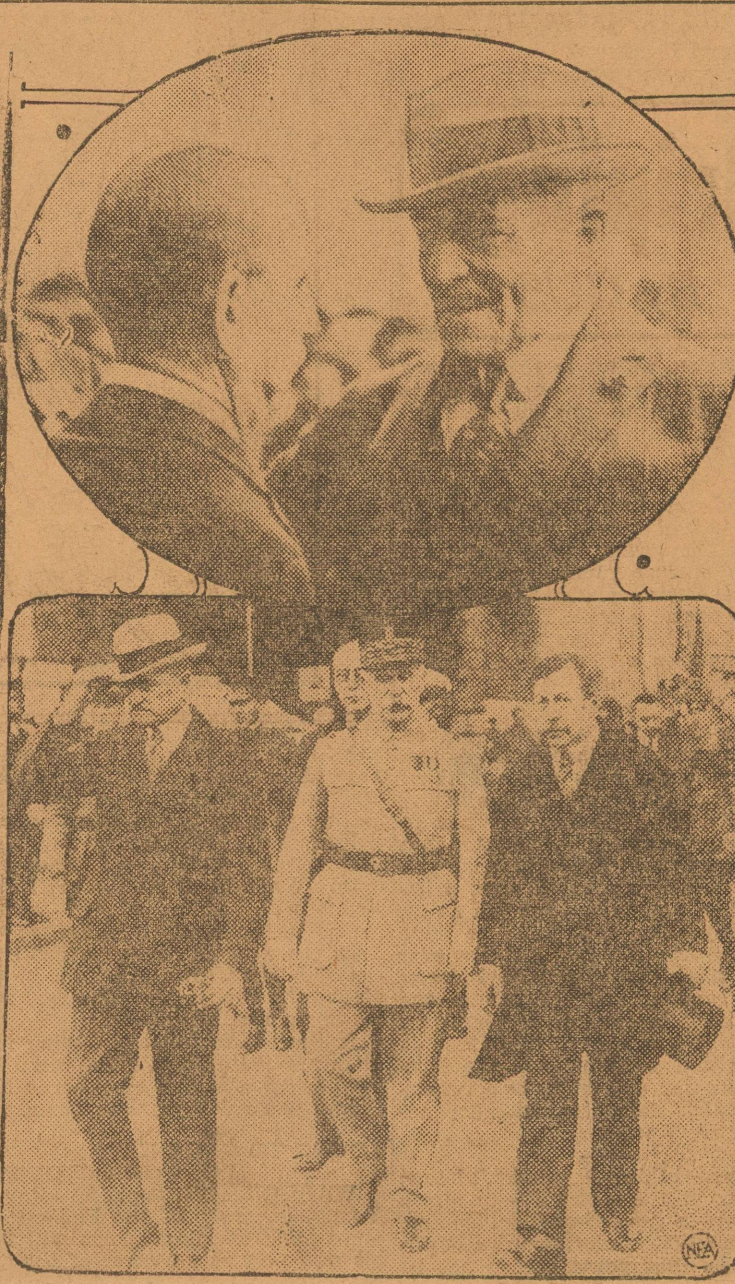

#### ASKS NOT FOR SYMPATHY BUT ONLY JUSTICE

Decide According To Law And Evidence Is His Plea To Jury

By United Press. COURTROOM, GEORGETOWN, Sept. 29.—Otis Rogers thrilled the courtroom at Georgetown into absolute silence here today in a half hour impassioned plea to the jury trying his wife, Rebecca Bradley Rogers, for arson.

"If it were possible to assess on me any penalty that she would not suffer I would gladly meet it," pleaded Rogers. "I believe that little girl to the extent that I would rather have my tongue torn out by its roots and my body thrown in the streets rather than she should suffer."

"Justice is a blind goddess indeed if you inflict such suffering," Rogers opened his plea to the jury strictly as a lawyer. He carefully dissected the testimony upon which the state relied and declared that it had three inconsistencies.

He said that this showed they had failed to make out the state's case and that the defendant had proven a complete alibi. In his entire argument he made no reference to the insanity plea.

"I ask for no sympathy," he said. "I ask you only to decide according to the law and evidence."

At no time did Rogers refer to her directly as his wife. He spoke of her as "this defendant" and as "this little girl."

#### Firemen Meet In Cisco, Auxiliary Also Attends

Volunteer firemen of the Twenty-seventh district, which includes eight towns of the oil belt, and a large number of the members of the Women's Auxiliary of Eastland and Ranger, were in attendance at the regular monthly meeting at Cisco Wednesday night. J. H. Cheatham of Eastland and chief of the Twenty-seventh district, opened the meeting which he later turned over to the chief of the Cisco fire department.

The meeting and chicken barbecue were to have been held at Lake Strickland, near Cisco, but threatening weather prevented and it was held at the Cisco firemen's hall.

The program consisted of round-table discussions of numerous problems confronting the firemen, and a water throwing demonstration put on by the Cisco department. In this demonstration six strings of hose were attached to three pumps. An American LaFrance pump and engine, en route from Dallas to McCamey, where it was to be used as a part of that town's fire-fighting equipment, was demonstrated to those present.

Gorman, Thurber and Breckenridge, members of the Twenty-seventh district organization, were not represented at the Cisco meeting. Large delegations from the other towns, including a number of women especially from Cisco, Eastland and Ranger, were present.

These meetings, which are held monthly for the purpose of discussing the various problems pertaining to fire-fighting, are gaining in interest and attendance.

The next meeting will be held at Ranger on the night of Oct. 22, at which time the Ranger Oil Jubilee will be in progress.

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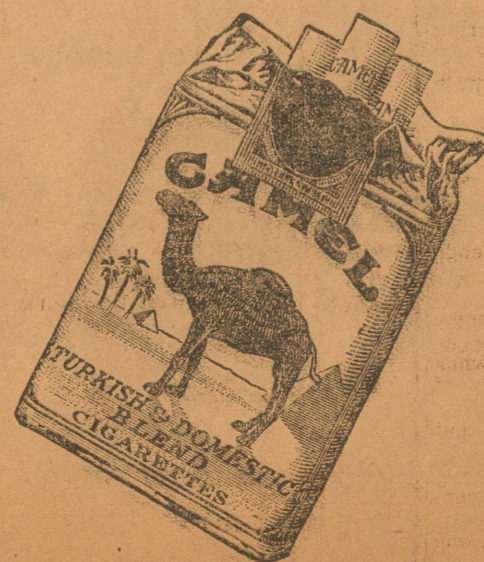

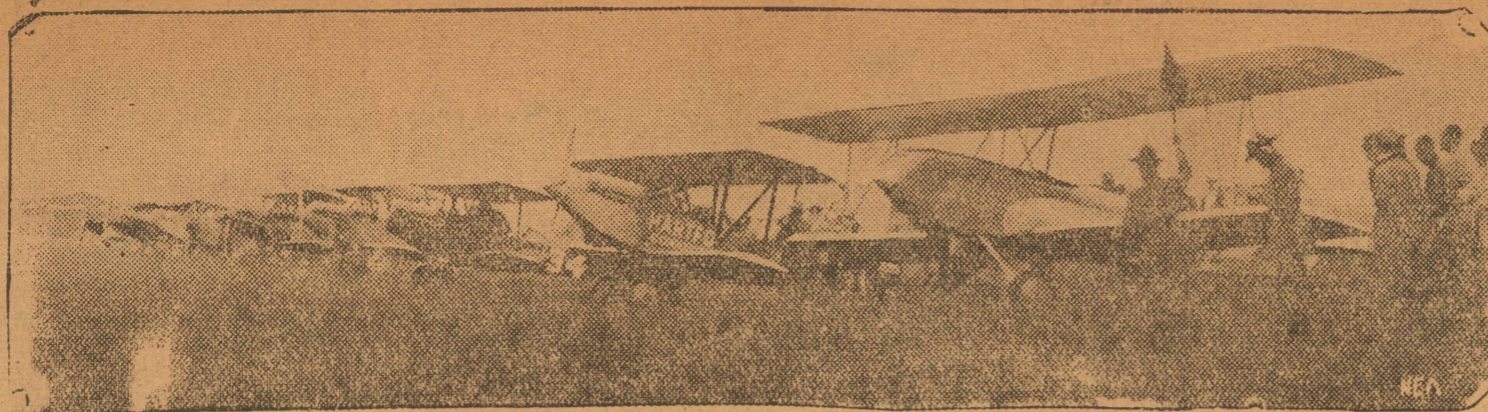

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept. 29.—Progress and possibilities of dairying in 11 of the most progressive southern states are to be depicted in an extensive and expensive exhibit which will be shown at the National Dairy exposition here on Oct. 15-22. States co-operating in the making of the exhibit are Arkansas, Florida, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia.

The principal purpose of the exhibition which has been named "Dairying in Dixieland" will be to show the natural advantages the south enjoys to tell the many facts concerning dairying conditions and the possibilities of the future. The central section of the exhibition is being con-

An exhibit building, longer than two city blocks, will house a great showing of modern farm, dairy and barn equipment, trucks, refrigerating machinery and other ice cream plant and farm machinery. More than a million dollars worth of the nation's foremost pure-bred and grade dairy cattle will be shown. The exposition is being held in connection with the Tri-State fair. 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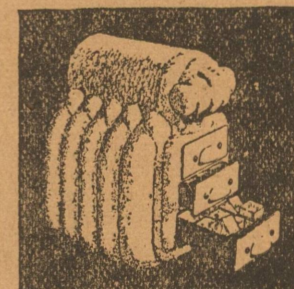

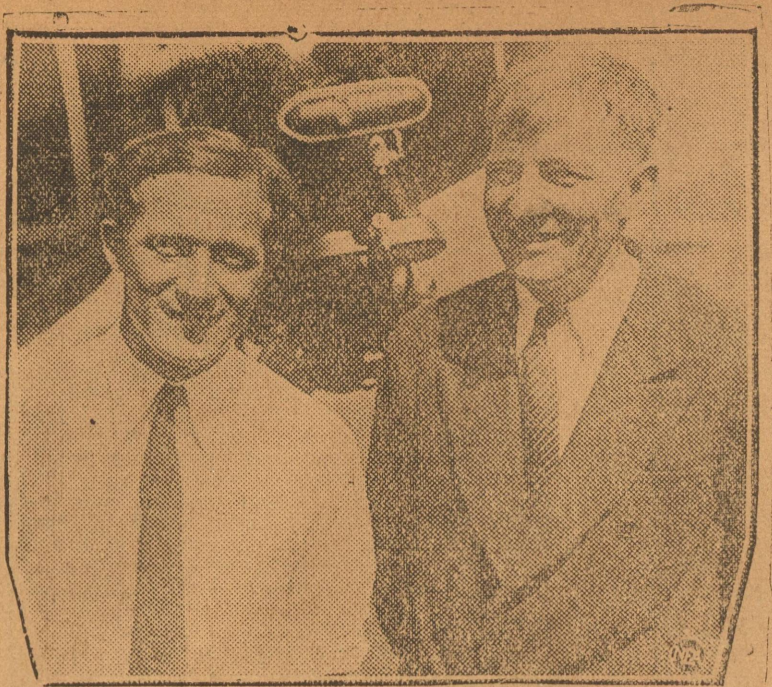

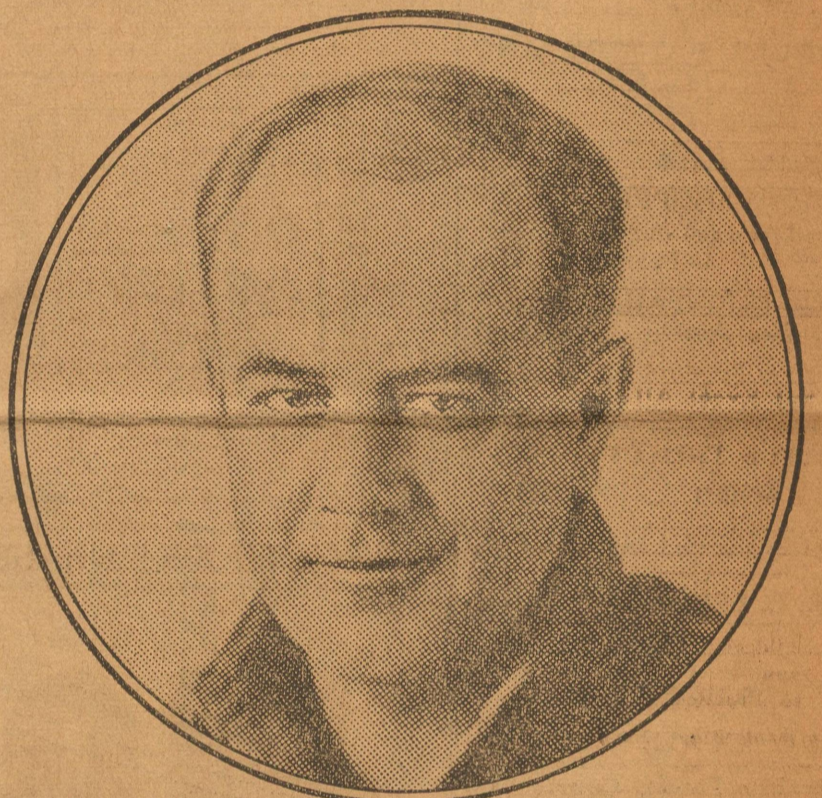

**NORFLEET**  
The Manhunter's Own True Story  
As told to Gordon Hines

**Chapter One**  
The events which follow will probably cause the reader to charge me with exceeding gullibility. Quite frankly, I was gullible. But, in justice to myself and hundreds of good people who have been victimized by swindling organizations, the reader should be made to understand a phase of the business environment in which I had grown up and made my fortune. It is safe to assume, also, that many other victims had come up in similar circumstances.

With us of the plains country, a man's word was his bond. Our cattle deals, our land sales—transactions running into many thousands, frequently, were often completed "sight unseen," the whole agreements being based on verbal representations and verbal understandings. We never doubted each other; in fact, no graver insult could have been passed upon a neighbor than to demand legal formalities in dealing with him. If I was gullible, I was simply following the reasoning habits I had acquired in my lifetime of experience. That was quite natural, for every man, regardless of his position in the business world, can only base his judgment on his own personal experience.

Reno Hamlin—who introduced himself to me as R. Miller—was the first member of the bunco ring I met. The meeting was so casual that, even at this time, I cannot positively say just how it came about.

I was stopping at the St. George Hotel in Dallas, waiting for Captain Slaughter to return to the city from a business trip. He was reported to be coming back soon and I had decided to wait a day or so for him, as I was anxious to go into the matter of land purchase with him. This was in the early part of November, 1919.

**Meets First Crook**

To me, although I am perfectly at home astride a horse and miles from another human being, a large city is the most lonely place in the world. I wandered about, gazing at show windows, lounging in the lobby of the hotel, buying a newspaper and throwing it aside, half read—utterly at a loss to know what to do with myself. I was never a reticent creature and I felt that I would give a hun-

drated dollars if some friendly soul would walk up and say "howdy." Evidently the professional confidence men fully understand this, for they capitalize it wonderfully. It was a relief to find in "R. Miller" a man of kindred tastes and experiences.

He claimed to be from Hill County, Texas, and posed, most naturally, as a mule buyer. He could talk mules so well that never once did I suspect him of being a pretender. I contended yet that he must have had experience as a stock man. He said he had handled many carloads of mules and grain from West Texas, but had never been there.

I happened to mention that I hoped to sell my own small ranch and acquire a larger property. He seemed deeply interested and, at his request, I gave him a general description of my own land, for he had said:

"Norfleet, I may help you out. A friend of mine is purchasing agent for the Green Immigration Company, of Minneapolis, and is now trying to close up the purchase of 2,000 acres in Williamson County, Texas, but owing to a recent oil boom, the owners have about decided not to dispose of their land. It is just possible that he might be interested in your place instead."

Then the ring's well-meshed gears started turning. At this auspicious moment his friend walked into the lobby and passed by us. Miller, whom I shall henceforth call Hamlin, his real name, asked me to wait and walked quickly after the other man. They talked for a moment, then Hamlin motioned me over to them, where I was introduced to W. B. Spencer.

Spencer looked to be about 34 years of age, was well dressed in a conservative business suit and had a pleasing personality. He did not seem especially interested in my property at first, but mentioned that he might be later if the Williamson County trade should fail to go through. He bade us a courteous good day and left us, promising to get in touch with me if he should want to discuss the purchase of my land.

Hamlin and I knocked about for a few hours, passing the time congenially and then we parted for the

night, appointing to meet in the morning at my hotel.

**The Land Deals**

We met next morning as we had agreed and lounged about the lobby for a short time. Hamlin had heard that Spencer had had a wire from the Williamson County parties in which they refused to go through with the sale of their land. In a short time, him over to us. He now seemed greatly interested in my ranch and asked me for a detailed description. This he briefly wrote on a telegraph blank, stating he would submit my proposition to Mr. Garrett Thompson, the secretary of the company at Minneapolis. I was led to believe that the telegram was sent out immediately.

We visited for the greater part of the day and Spencer became very cordial. He very cleverly said many nice things about his company, the great extent of its dealings and something of his own fine record with the organization. He was very anxious to show me his credentials and, like a proud schoolboy, he insisted that I should see a tabulated statement of his own sales record for the year. I smiled at this youthful enthusiasm and grew right paternal in my friendly attitude toward him.

Toward evening, Spencer mentioned that he and a friend had engaged a double room at the Jefferson hotel and that the friend had been called away. He insisted that I move my baggage to the room, that he might show me his credentials and get better acquainted with me. He seemed sure that the economy of the arrangement would appeal to me also, for he mentioned that I had just as well save my own hotel bill by using accommodations he would have to pay for anyway.

The man's friendliness broke down my reserve and I checked out of the St. George to accept his invitation. Before five o'clock, I went to Captain Slaughter's office and found him in. We discussed the land purchase and reached an agreement. I asked for a six week's option, which would give me time to sell my own land and thus raise the money to pay for the Slaughter property. He agreed to have the option drawn up and to send the abstract out for examination. It would probably be two or three days before everything would be ready for the signatures and the payment of my option money. Spencer and I first, but mentioned that he might be later if the Williamson County trade should fail to go through. In addition to the credentials he had already shown me, he had a large suit case filled with legal forms—deeds, contracts, releases, abstracts and various documents, all pertaining to land deals. He again referred me to the tabulated statement and showed me the different deals on which he had made large commissions. He stated that, after his company had purchased my land, on which he confidently told me he would make five per cent commission, his year's earnings would average for him an income of \$1,000 a month. "That is not so bad for a young fellow just out of the army, is it?"

I complimented him, believing that I was encouraging a very worthy young man. He laid special stress upon the large volume of business he was doing and mentioned proudly, that he was a man of action. I would have considered an older man very egotistical, if he had made such statements to me. It seemed thoroughly excusable in Spencer, due to his commendable youthful enthusiasm.

Next morning there was a reply to his telegram to his company. It was supposedly sent by Mr. Garrett Thompson and was dated from Oklahoma City. It read, in substance:

"Your message forwarded me here. Will say we have never dealt in lands that far West, but would suggest that you go home with party and make personal inspection. Send samples of soil from different parts of land. Give detailed report of conditions and citizenship of vicinity, all of which will receive due consideration."

Shortly afterward, he received another message from Thompson, also from Oklahoma City, saying that he had been called to El Paso on business and that, as he was going via Dallas, he would like to meet and have a personal talk with the owner of the land. We were asked to meet him at the Alolphus Hotel.

I did not see Hamlin again and Spencer and myself idled about, amusing ourselves in various ways. Thompson's train was due the next morning and we could do nothing but wait. I dropped in for a short visit with Captain Slaughter, but the papers were not yet ready and we did not sign them.

**Finds Purse**

Next morning, after Thompson's train was supposed to have arrived, Spencer and I walked up to the Adolphus Hotel. Spencer went to the desk and, upon being advised that Thompson had not registered came

over to where I stood and motioned for me to be seated in a near-by chair. Leaning backward comfortably, I felt a peculiar lump pressing against my back. I reached behind me and drew forth a bill fold. I examined it and remarked:

"Some fellow has lost his pocket-book."

Spencer moved around beside me and sat down in an adjoining chair, finding a Masonic card which bore Together, we examined the purse, the name of J. B. Stetson; \$240 in currency; a copy of a bond, payable to McLean & Company, in the sum of \$100,000, guaranteeing the faithful performance of certain things by Stetson; a cipher code letter; a card showing that J. B. Stetson was a member of the United Brokers and some other papers, all bearing the name of J. B. Stetson.

Spencer asked: "What shall we do with it?" I suggested we try to find the owner and return it to him. We found that Stetson was a guest at the hotel and that he was in. We went up and knocked at his door. Someone opened it very slightly and asked what we wanted.

Pinch pastry with the fingers to make a fancy edge and prick bottom and sides with a fork. Bake in a very hot oven (460 degrees F.) 10 to 15 minutes. For a 2 crust pie, line pie pan with pastry, put in a filling, cover with top crust, trim and press edges together. Prick top to allow steam to escape. Bake in a quick oven (425 degrees F.) 10 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate oven (325 degrees F.) and bake 20 minutes.

If a less rich pastry is desired, use only 1/2 cup Crisco.

Whipped cream may be used instead of the meringue.

1/2 cup flour  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup pineapple salt  
3 egg yolks  
1 cup hot water  
1 tablespoon Crisco  
Baked pie shell  
2 cups cooked or canned pineapple, cut in small pieces  
3 egg yolks  
3 tablespoons confectioner's sugar  
3 egg whites

Mix flour, sugar and salt together. Add the pineapple juice and water and bring slowly to the boiling point, stirring constantly. Cook 15 minutes over hot water. 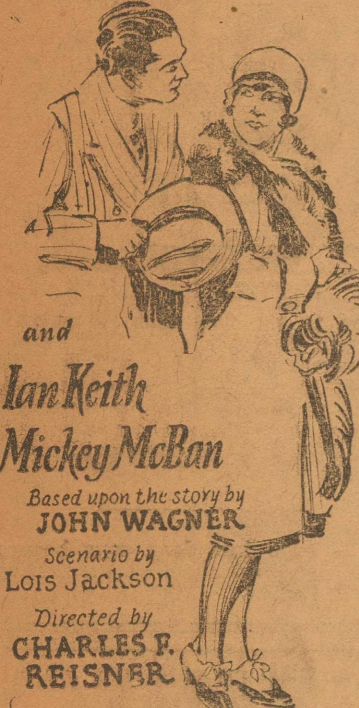

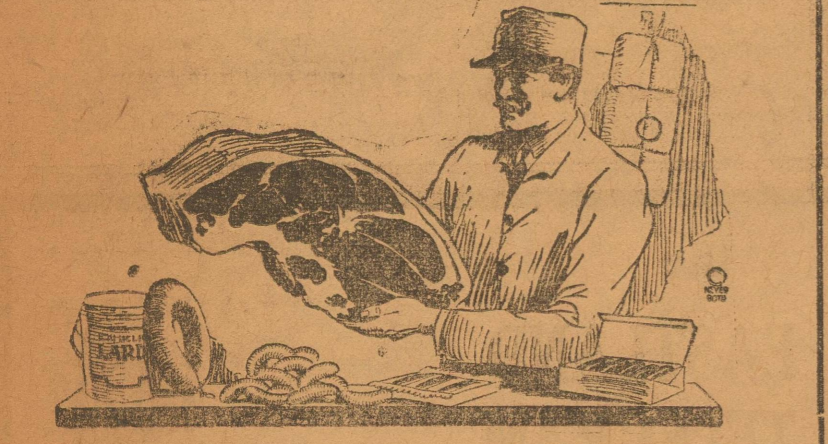
