RANGERS TAKE HUGE WHISKEY STILL IN HUTCHINSON COUNTY

MEXICAN REBEL BAND IS SEEN NEAR LAREDO

AMERICAN IS REPORTED LEADING SQUAD

Rebels Reported Well Mounted and Armed, Are Seeking Recruits

By United Press. LERADO, May 5.—A description of a well equipped band of rebels with an American in charge was brought here today by an employee of the White Engineering company, Cameron, Mexico.

The engineer who came here for supplies said 11 men of the band carried away for thirty others in hiding. He said the men were well mounted and carried new Springfield rifles and .45 Colt automatics.

The officer in charge of the party said he was seeking recruits, the engineer reported. The officer said there would be fighting if his troops met interference, which is expected.

LANGHORN MAY HAVE TO FACE DEATH PENALTY

By United Press. LA GRANGE, Texas, May 6.—William H. Langhorn, Jr., saved from the electric chair by former Governor M. A. Ferguson, will again face a charge for which his life may be forfeited in district court here May 26.

District Attorney Fred Blundell, today arranged for setting a case charging the wealthy Chappell Hill youth with attacking Minnie Zapata, younger sister of Valeria Zapata, for whose murder Langhorn was given the death penalty.

A charge of assault to murder Minnie Zapata was set for the same date.

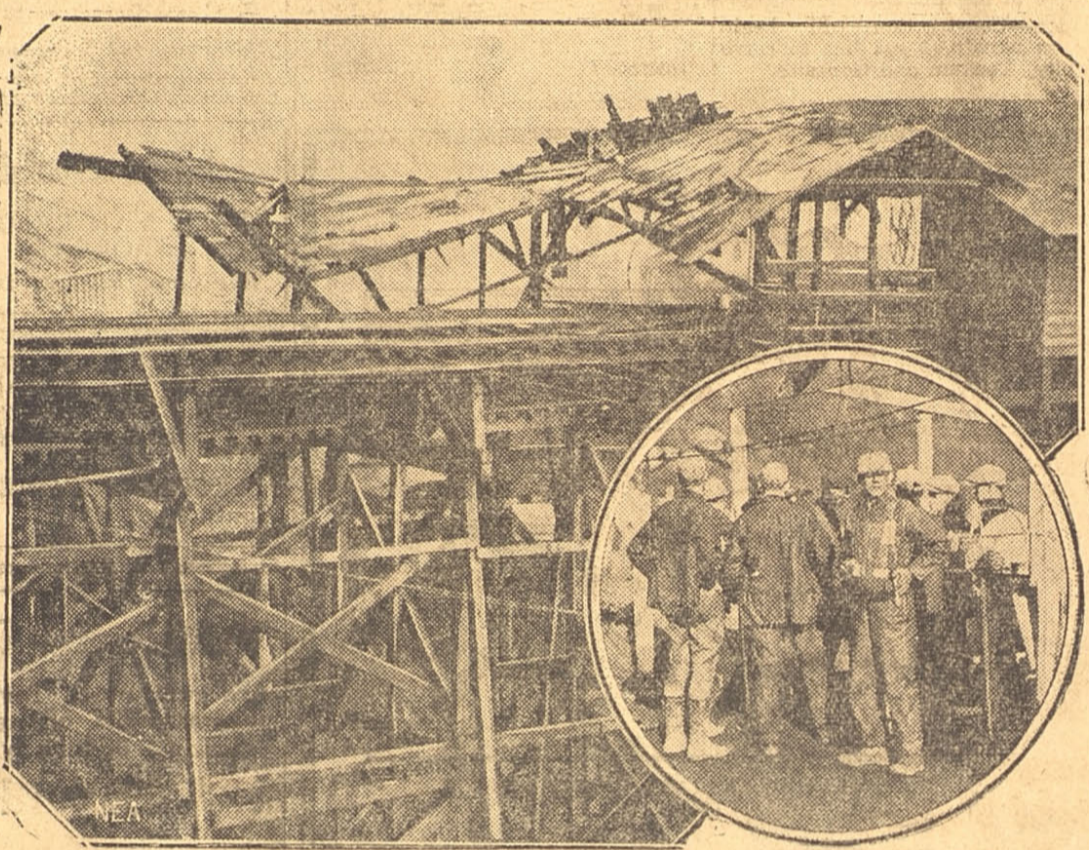
JAPAN HEARS RUSSIANS MISTREAT NATIONALISTS

Where 77 Miners Were Entombed



The explosion in the mine of the New England Fuel and Transportation company at Fairmount, W. Va., which entombed 77 miners, was so terrific that it wrecked the mine tippie 150 feet from the mouth of the mine and 650 feet from the spot where the explosion occurred. Two men working on the tippie were killed. First reports placed the death toll at 17, exclusive of the entombed men. RANGER WOMAN INDORSED FOR PRESIDENT STATE FEDERATION

Mrs. M. H. Hagaman, of Ranger, was endorsed by the sixth district of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, convening at Ozona, for state president. Only the affirmative vote was taken when a majority for Mrs. Hagaman was registered. The endorsement of Mrs. Hagaman's own district was taken as a matter of course by her loyal supporters, but there were said to be some doubting Thomases in the ranks of the supporters of the other candidate, Mrs. W. R. Potter of Bowie. However, their doubts were dispelled when a coup by the delegation of Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, Desdemona, Coleman and Rising Star women, who composed the largest delegation at the meeting, caught the supporters of the opposing candidate by surprise and routed her forces, as far as the sixth district is concerned. The 25 earnest loyal women who left Eastland county Monday morning for Ozona via "Miss Ranger," West Texas coach, were known to have a few tricks up their sleeve, so the news of the overwhelming victory of their candidate did not come as a surprise to those who stayed at home.

Leaving the selection of its next meeting place to the executive committee, no invitation having been extended, the sixth district of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Thursday elected Mrs. John Perry of Sweetwater president and adjourned

at Ozona. Mrs. Perry succeeded Mrs. H. B. Broadus of Colorado. She soon will name the secretary-treasurer and committees. Mrs. Greenleaf Fisk of Abilene was elected first vice president and Mrs. C. E. Mead of Marfa second vice president. None had opposition.

The final courtesy by Ozona was a luncheon at noon at Hotel Ozona, after which motor transportation was furnished to Barnhart, where many of the visitors boarded the train for San Angelo.

San Angelo club women Thursday night tendered them a reception on the St. Angelus hotel roof. Mrs. R. Q. Lee of Cisco started subscriptions to the national biennial convention, to be held this year at San Antonio, with a \$50 donation. Other contributions followed and several hundred dollars was raised.

Officials Think Have Evidence Of Forged Warrants

State Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher said Friday that no additional forged warrants had shown up. It was said that the authorities were working on a lead to the typewriter and numbering machine thought to have been used in the preparation of the warrants. These were said to be in Austin.

MARTIAL LAW MAY YET BE ASKED AT BORGER

Thoroughly Equipped Plant Could Turn Out Forty Gallons Daily

AUSTIN, May 6.—Hint that martial law may yet be resorted to in Governor Moody's campaign to clean Borger and Hutchinson county of lawlessness was made here today when news was received by the adjutant general department that state rangers had taken a thoroughly equipped copper still of large capacity in that county.

According to information the capture of the still was affected by the rangers alone. There was evidence that 25 men were engaged in the operation of the illicit liquor plant, it being estimated that it could produce 40 gallons of whiskey per hour.

A private natural gas line to the still furnished fuel for operation. No arrests have yet been made in connection with the operation of the still, but it is said that rangers were working on clues which may lead to identity of the "moonshiners."

BOYS AT PLAY INJURED BY EXPLOSIVES

Casimiro Cortez, 14, suffered crushed legs and Lupo Montes, 5, and Nacio Cortez, 6, were riddled with fragments of copper. Several other boys received less serious injuries.

Dean Kyle A. & M. Goes to Valley To Select Land

By United Press. COLLEGE STATION, May 6.—Dean E. J. Kyle, of the school of agriculture, A. & M. College of Texas, accompanied by Mrs. Kyle, left the first of the week for the Rio Grande valley where at the request of the American Rio Grande Land & Irrigation company, of Mercedes, he will select the 20-acre farm which this company has offered to outstanding agricultural graduate of the A. & M. college on condition that is cultivated for five years.

This is the third year that the land company has hung up such a prize for an A. & M. graduate. The gift comprises 20 acres of the company's choice land in fruit, truck, poultry, etc. At the end of that time, the company proposes to give a clear deed of the land to its occupant.

C. D. Whitman was the first graduate to receive such a prize and F. J. Germany, a graduate of last June, the second. Winner of this year's land prize will not be announced until commencement when the prize will be awarded by Harry L. Seay, of Dallas, president of the land company. Other officers of the company include Clarence Lutz, of Dallas, vice president, and H. E. Seay, secretary and general manager.

"No Work, No Food" Edict Employed In Drafting Men to Work

By United Press. VICKSBURG, Miss., May 6.—In the face of repeated defeats and reversals, Louisiana farmers and villagers continued today to fight the advancing floods in the hope of saving the smaller sections of the country which have escaped inundation.

Restless, sweating crews worked on the dykes. Capitalists, negro laborers, farmer refugees, merchants and state convicts strained side by side in their efforts to build up and strengthen the walls. The most concentrated effort is at Pineville, across the river from Alexandria where the Mississippi is higher than ever recorded before.

Refugees near the scene of the camp have been drafted for the work of strengthening the levees. "No work no food" was the edict in ordering all able men to work.

NUMBER OF HOMELESS MAY REACH 400,000

By United Press. NEW ORLEANS, May 6.—Rise of the Red river to unprecedented heights today turned the flood southward. A valiant effort was being made to save the levee at Pineville where the river gauge stood at 49.1 feet, one-tenth of a foot higher than ever recorded before.

Workers have been drafted from the refugee camps but the threat to the south central parishes is growing more serious hourly. As far as could be learned there have been no deaths from the present flood in this area.

The area inundated is estimated at about 15,000 square miles. The number of refugees cannot be accurately computed because of the unstable conditions, but it is estimated to be between 350,000 and 400,000.

A portion of eastern Monroe was ordered evacuated. Back water attacking the city has risen to a depth of five feet and efforts to construct a levee to hold it have proven too late.

The last transportation between Delhi and Oak Grove was severed today. Bus traffic was suspended when water on the highways became too high for the machines to operate.

HOOPER AND DAVIS ARRIVE AT VICKSBURG

By United Press. VICKSBURG, Miss., May 6.—Two members of President Coolidge's cabinet arrived here today for a conference on relief measures rehabilitation and farthest means of controlling Mississippi valley floods.

Secretary of Commerce Hoover conferred with A. L. Schaffer, Red Cross regional director, L. O. Crosby, Mississippi state flood relief dictator and Colonel E. G. Egger of the national guard.

Secretary of War Dwight Davis, met with the chief engineer for this district, Major John C. Lee, to obtain first hand information on the progress of the battle against the river.

The party from Washington which included Major General Edgar Jadwin, was to leave later in the day for a trip down the Mississippi.

HIDE THE SHIPS.

"In the event of another war," de-
 clares Admiral Sims, "the best thing
 to do with our battleships would be
 to send them as far as possible up
 the Mississippi river, out of harm's
 way, and use submarines and air-
 craft to do our defensive fighting.
 The battleship was one the backbone
 of the fleet, but it is no longer.
 The submarine and airplane have put
 an end to its reign, and clipped the
 wings of sea power.

"With the development of these
 new weapons, the whole strategy of
 the seas has been changed. The
 naval blockade is a thing of the past.
 Even a minor power, quite unable to
 cope in battleships and cruisers,
 could confront the blockading fleet
 with such a force of submarines and
 aircraft as would make maintenance
 of a blockade utterly impossible.
 Facing attack from both the air and
 the depths, the battleship has ceased
 to be an asset."

Possessions Of Russian Czars To Sell At Auction

MOSCOW.—Personal and intimate
 possessions of the former Russian
 czars and their families will be put
 up at auction in Moscow in the
 course of the summer. The articles
 were seized in the royal palaces in
 and around Leningrad, then called
 Petrograd, and are not sufficiently
 prized to be placed in museums.
 However, the articles are very inter-
 esting and many are valuable.

The highest price is expected to be
 paid for a large fur overcoat once
 owned by Czar Alexander III, the
 father of the last Czar Nicholas II,
 whom the bolsheviks executed. The
 coat is lined with perfect pelts of
 rare silver sables and there is a
 great cape attached of the same
 precious fur. The articles to be au-
 ctioned were mostly found in the
 winter palace at Leningrad, at Tzar-
 skoe-Selo, at Peterhof and at Gartchina,
 all sites of favorite palaces. Beds in
 which kings and princesses slept,
 lamps, handsome tables and chairs,
 some magnificent tables and chairs,
 and some paintings are included in
 the auction sale.

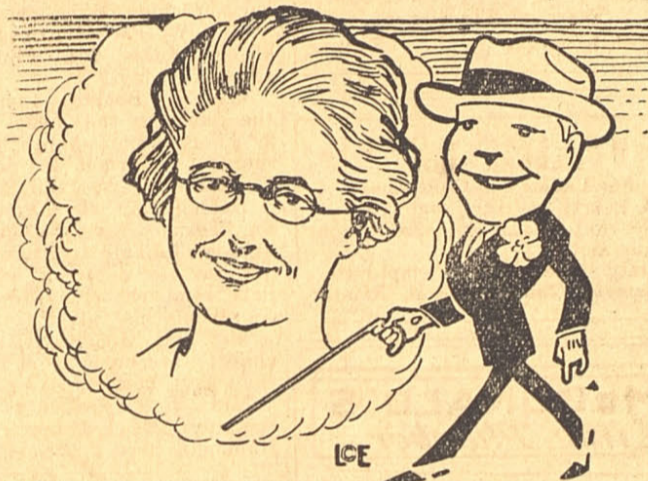

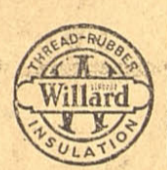

MOSCOW HAS LOTTERY IN WHICH NOBODY LOSES

By United Press.
MOSCOW. — Over \$10,000,000 were subscribed in Moscow alone in seven days when the soviet state lottery loan was opened. This is an average of \$5 for each inhabitant of the city.
Besides the grand prize of \$25,000 many hundreds of smaller rewards are offered for the holders of lucky numbers. In addition, every subscriber will eventually recover his money, under the lottery rules, as the contribution is in the form of a state loan. The tickets were sold on the installment plan, with six months in which to pay. In Leningrad and other centers the lottery loan was well supported but without the spectacular speed and volume which were its features in Moscow.

"HUNGARY'S GOD-MOTHER" MOURNED BY HUNDREDS

SZEKESFEHERVAR, Hungary.—Six hundred wreaths were placed on her grave and a tree bearing 570 burning candles was planted nearby when Maria Molnar, age 89, of this village was buried.
Each candle represented a child to whom Maria had stood god-mother. Two hundred and ninety she had held in her arms while the priest christened them and 280 she had sponsored on their confirmation day.
She was known locally as "Hungary's god-mother." At her funeral all of her god-children who are still living took part, each bringing a wreath and a candle. The 30 remaining wreaths were added by friends.

PLANES HERE TO ADVERTISE UNIVERSITY FLYING SCHOOL

When the roar of a Waco plane sounds above Ranger today, and for the next few days to come, those who are in on the secret of the pilot's identity will know that it is Jerry Marshall, who was the pilot of the first airship that arrived in storm-devastated Rocksprings with supplies of serum, anti-toxin, and an army surgeon after the cyclone that visited that city a short time ago.
Jerry Marshall has literally flown his way through college, and he and several other flyers from the University of Texas are in Ranger, the second stop on an advertising tour which will cover the United States, in the interest of the State University School of Aeronautics, which will open in Austin next fall.
Two planes, the other a Lincoln standard five-passenger plane, will stop in Ranger for a few days and let passengers take the air at a very nominal rate. Jerry Marshall, who is chief pilot of the university air caravan, said today that both planes are new, and that during last summer they carried aloft some 31,000 passengers without an accident, as all the pilots are ex-service men and trained aviators.

H. J. R. No. 32
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto Section 60, Article 16 so as to provide that the Legislature may fix the compensation of certain county officers by salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other perquisites; providing for an election and making appropriation to pay expenses.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 60. The Legislature may provide compensation for certain district and county officers, to-wit:

The District Attorney, County Judge, County Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, District Clerk, County Tax Assessor and County Tax Collector, by prescribing their duties, and fixing salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other perquisites as now provided by the Constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees, and commissions and perquisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," and "Against amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and perquisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. There is hereby appropriated out of any money on hand in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or as much thereof as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the holding of this election, including the expense of printing notices and advertisements.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
