Here is the first picture to reach America showing Clarence D. Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine after they had landed in Cottbus, Germany, on conclusion of their world record-breaking non-stop flight from New York. Chamberlin stands at the left, pointing to the broken propeller of their monoplane "Columbia" while Levine, at the right, and a German, in the rear, look on. Their 225-horsepower biplane will be brought here from Denver about June 21, when it is completed. The plane will have a fuel capacity for 3,500 miles with a cruising speed of 110 miles an

BIG GASSER

Dyar Brothers of Ranger, drilling Dyar Brothers of Ranger, drilling on the Weddington lease, 12 miles northwest of Cisco for the Transcontinental Oil company, brought in a big gasser Thursday. The gas, which came at a volume of 20,000,000 to 25,000,000 cubic feet daily, was altogether unexpected. The drillers were after the oil and which is prowere after the oil sand which is producing in the No. 1 Dyer of Moody and Adams two locations to the east. The gas pressure was of sufficient force to blow the five-inch tools from the hole and against the crown block. The drill then fell down through the cellar and stuck 19 feet in the ground.

The gas sand was just entered at a depth of 3,805 feet. Efforts are now being made to get by the gas pressure so that drilling may be continued to a depth of 3,865 feet where the oil producing formation is expect-
