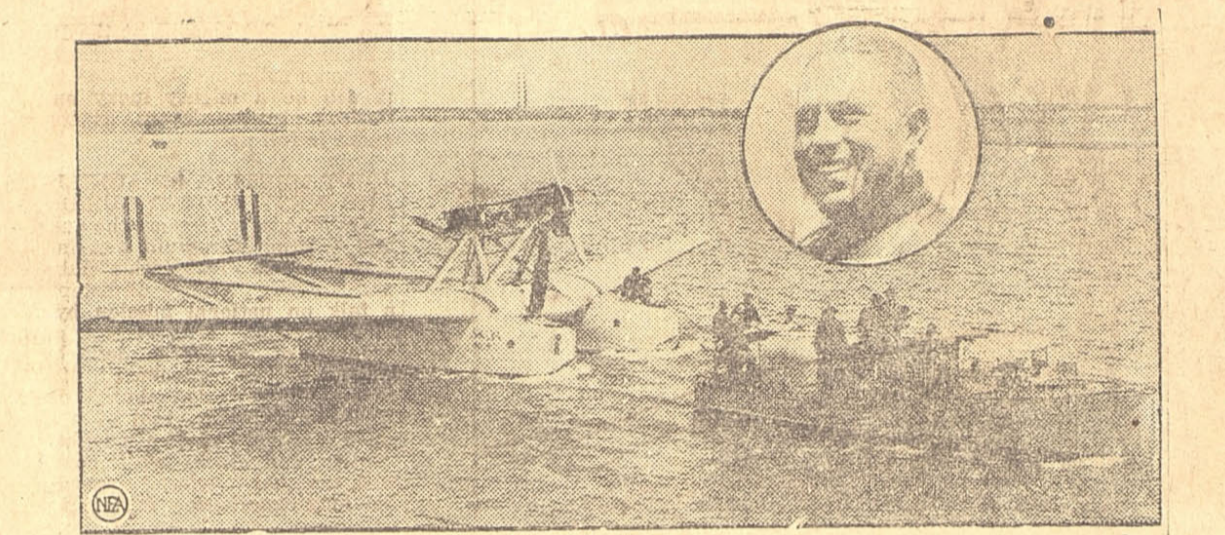
Search Continues For French Flyers By Air and By Sea

AFTER THE FLOOD.
 With the crest of the great Mississippi flood just about ready to unburden itself by emptying into the Gulf of Mexico, but still threatening the great sugar valley of Louisiana, the average American citizen seems just about ready to divert his attention to something else. When the deep headlines of the newspapers stop calling his attention to miseries of the flood he is apt to forget these things and bury himself in his business or forget everything in the pursuit of his favorite sport.

He may or he may not have contributed his share to the Red Cross fund, but even this should not bring him satisfaction. He should vision the broken levees, the flooded farms, the hungry refugees, the drowned animals and the remnants of farm equipment piled out in the open awaiting the subsidence of the waters. Then he should begin talking flood prevention—prevention for all time to come.

The flood has been disastrous but some day this terrible disaster will be only a memory, a sad memory of course, but it will have served a purpose. It will be the stepping-stone to one of the country's great achievements, flood prevention.

We quote the following from the Manufacturers Record as being particularly appropriate:

"When the earthquake and fire nearly wrecked San Francisco, when the hurricane at Galveston left thousands of dead in its wake, when Dayton, Ohio, seemed almost ruined by its fearful flood, when South Florida faced its unprecedented storm with its terrific losses, men rose superior to these disasters, and on the wreck and ruin laid a more solid foundation for future progress. They offered an illustration of how the flooded regions of the Mississippi valley will make their appalling disasters stepping-stones to higher achievements. But for the present money for the relief of the sufferers should be poured out in unstinted measure. Tens of thousands have lost their all, and many other tens of thousands have suffered severely and cannot recoup their losses for years to come.

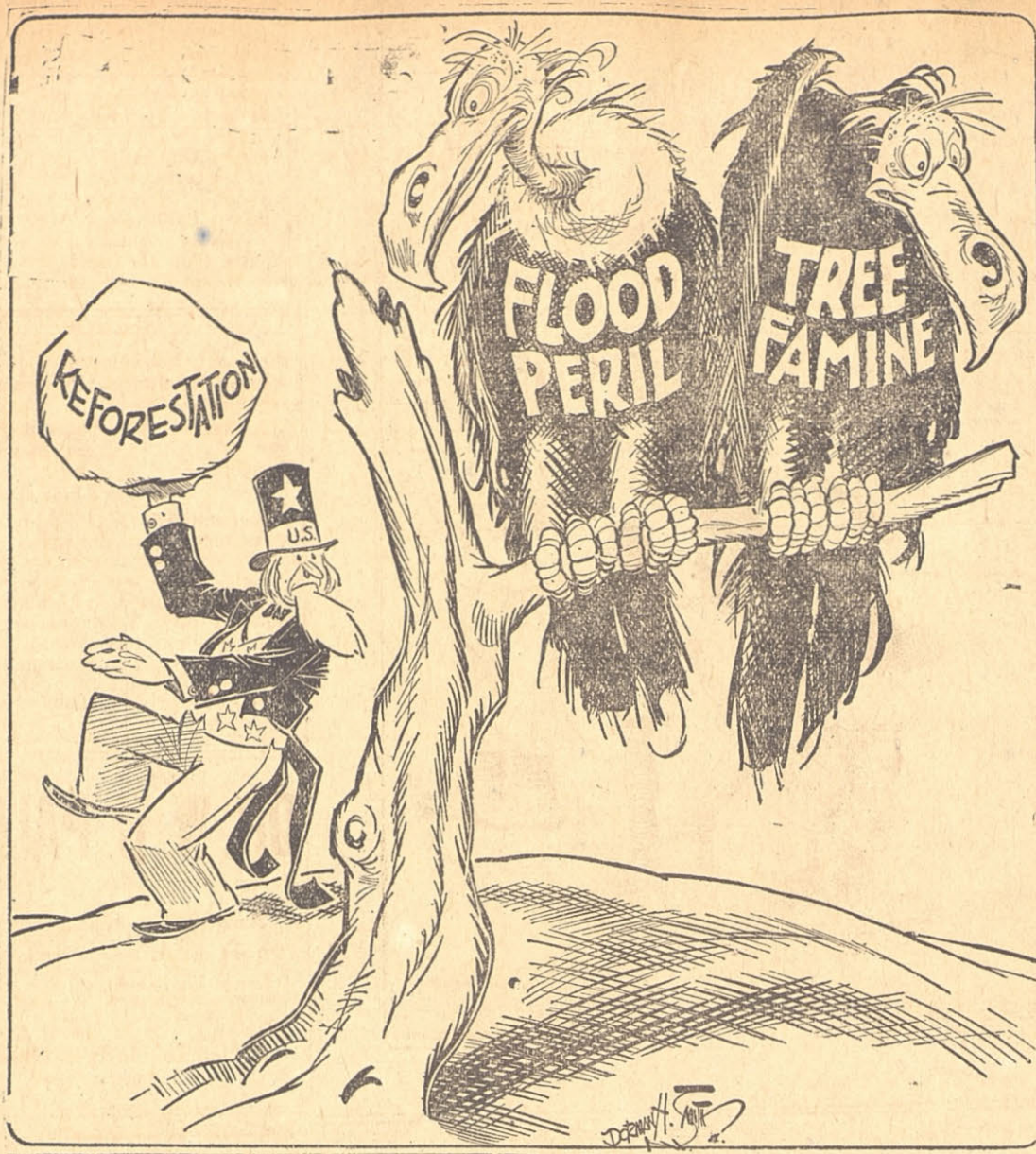
"The disaster is an appalling one. It is the direct outcome of the unpardonable failure of the federal government to make such a condition impossible. For many years engineers and others have urged the government to carry out a broad scheme of river improvement which would have turned this tremendous liability into a national asset of enormous value. But the federal government has failed to do so. The nation itself is, therefore, responsible for this disaster, for the waters which started in the upper reaches of the Mississippi, the Missouri and the Ohio have been pouring their floods down through the Mississippi valley from Illinois to the gulf.

"In the light of this situation the vast business interests of the country which have piled up great profits should give, and give unstintedly, heaped up and running over, and give quickly. The people of moderate resources should give in proportion to their means, and give freely; for the cry is the cry of humanity, and no one of us knows when some great disaster may reach the section in which each one of us is living.

"Nature this year seems to be in a turmoil and whatever may be the cause we must bravely face any disaster that comes and do our utmost to relieve the suffering of those who have to pass through such trying ordeals. Divine wisdom has said that 'to whom much has been given, of him shall much be required.' Vast wealth, almost boundless wealth, has been given to this country. That wealth must be used for the alleviation of suffering, and for carrying out the work which in this case at least could have saved the entire Mississippi valley from the danger of this overflow."

He is what might be called a cafe bellhop. He is indispensable to the man or woman who does not want to be bothered with all the little details incident to enjoying Paris life. He usually speaks enough English to make it unnecessary for the tourist to make himself an object of bantering remarks from the native customers by trying to put over something in college French.

The "chasseur" is a mine of information about the "regulars" of the place, men and women, and this he is willing to impart—for a well gauged tip.

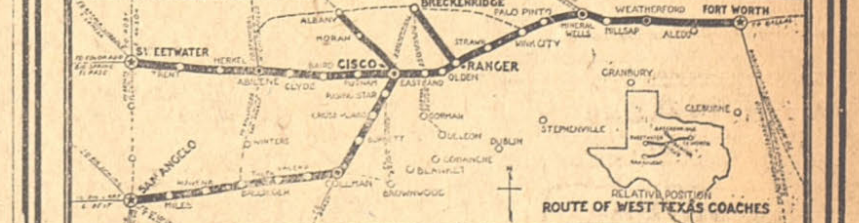

 The Boston Red Sox are the only club that you can count out of the running with any degree of certainty. At that, I look for Boston to show constant improvement under Manager Carrigan.

Bill Carrigan has been out of the majors for 10 years. A lot of things have happened since then. There are many stars in the American League who are new to Carrigan. Give him once around the circuit, however, and he will have the players and general situation pretty well sized up.

Huggins, not given to making predictions, has been quoted as saying that the team that beats the Athletics has a pretty good chance of winning.

Miller Huggins is smart. His two contentions, that there will be a tough race in the American League and the Athletics will be hard to beat, simply offers further proof.

Has No Weak Spots
 The Athletics impress Huggins, first, because the pitching staff should prove formidable, second, because the club has power, and third, because it has a world of reserve strength.

How long Cobb, Collins or Wheat will be able to go, doesn't enter very strongly into Huggins' thoughts on the pennant question. He figures the Mackmen were strong last year and the veteran trio simply adds more punch, regardless of how far they go.

The aggressive spirit of Cobb has already added a dash to the play of the Athletics that was missing last year. It was one of the things the club needed.

Getting away from the Athletics and back to the Yankees. Since Miller Huggins has a wholesome respect for the A's, it is interesting to know what so capable a leader as Bill Carrigan thinks of the Mackmen.

In the first series between the two teams, the Yankees looked like a great club, doing everything right.

Wrong Dope on Yanks
 When a new manager takes charge of a major league club, he must for a time look for expert advice from those closely identified with major league affairs.

Right here it might be well to say that the Yankees are a peculiar ball club. Ordinarily they look great but at times they can appear just the opposite.

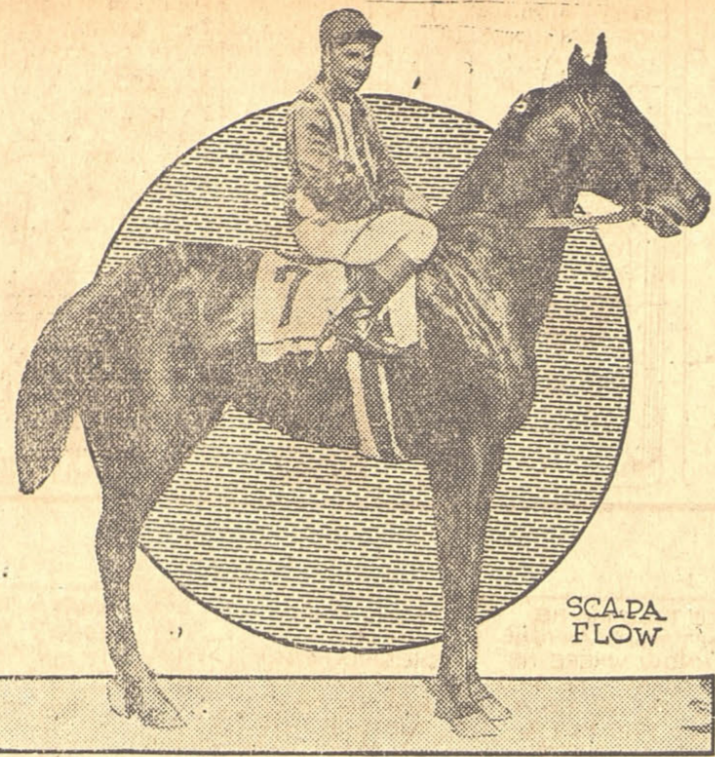
One often hears the remark that the truly great teams in baseball are not streaky. That doesn't apply to the Yanks. They have a few bad moments mingled in with a lot of big ones.

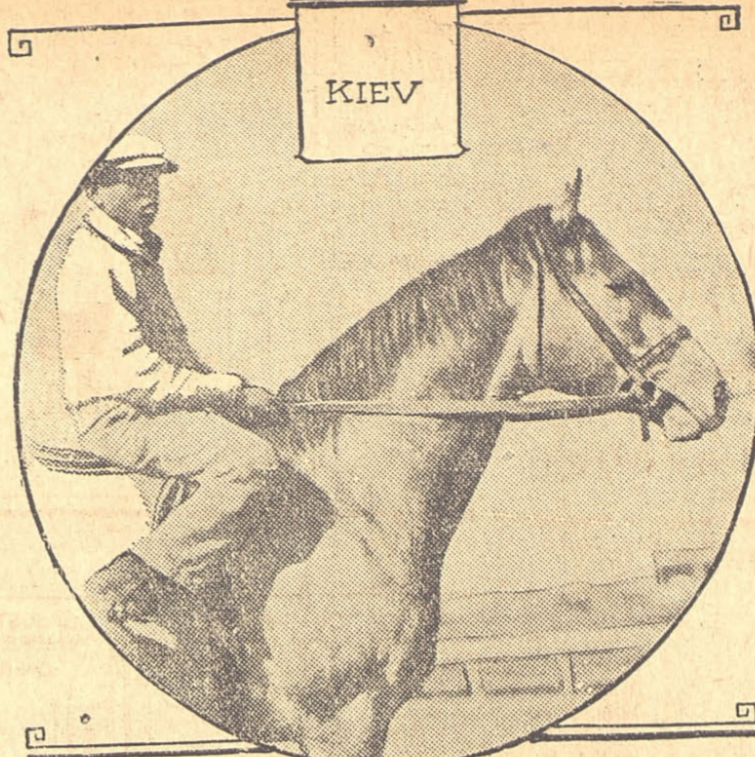

Gold has been found on the Puet farm for years, but while before the civil war, the old Leper mine, as it was called, was worked, it has been practically suspended since. A few have panned the stream, giving a percentage of their earnings to the farm owners.

The gold is said to lie in the bed of a mountain brook, washed down from ore laden hillsides, which will be washed with up-to-date machinery in this newest venture.

C. W. Miller, a miner who was in Alaska during the gold field days, has been hired by Mrs. Puet to supervise operations.

State Geologist R. J. Bryson has already reported that gold can be found in sufficient quantity in that part of the state to warrant mining activities. In neighboring, but abandoned mines, gold ore which assayed 328 to 1,000 ounces to the ton, has been found.

Warden Declares Electrocution Is Easiest Death

By United Press.
COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 12.—No one wants to die in the electric chair, yet it is the easiest of all deaths, according to Warden P. E. Thomas of Ohio penitentiary.

Warden Thomas, who has made a careful study of the subject, recommends the electric chair as far superior to other forms of violent death and he is willing to recommend it in preference to death by asphyxiation, drowning, carbolic acid, a leap from a tall building, or even by a shot from a pistol.

"A current of 1,950 volts is applied at the start," he said in extolling the merits of the chair.

"Almost instantaneously—in less than 1-240th of a second, according to sylographic tests—heart action stops.

"It takes 24 times as long as that 1-10th of a second before the sensation made by the prick of a needle at the base of the skull, is recorded by the brain."

Thomas went on to explain the effects of the charge carried by the chair, which if left on long enough, would cremate the body of the victim.

"While the current is on the heart remains still. When it is turned off, the heart frequently commences to beat again, although the man in the chair is not breathing. The man is dead. The heart has no life-sustaining qualities. Its beat cannot be accelerated nor strengthened.

"As long as the voltage passes through the body the respiratory organs are paralyzed. This causes the air to be forced from the lungs. At the same time the blood corpuscles disintegrate.

"Either of these, the paralysis of the lungs or the disintegration of the blood corpuscles, is of itself fatal.

"Blood of an electrocuted person does not coagulate. The shattered corpuscles can never be put together again and the idea that an electrocuted person may be revived is false."

The warden declared that it is

easier to electrocute a healthy man than a sickly one.

"A sickly man does not die as easily for the reason that his skin is dry and does not conduct the electricity as well as when it is damp. And for the same reason, it is easier to execute a man in the summer time when his body is bathed in perspiration, than in the winter, when his skin is usually dry," he said.

ACTORS INDULGE IN CIGAR SMOKING CONTEST

A unique cigar-smoking contest in which actors, director and company puffed away for hours at all brands of stogies, was part of the day's work in filming "Lonesome Ladies", a First National production.

The director was faced with the problem of supplying Lewis Stone with cigar after cigar, each having a huge ash. Stone himself was one of the contestants. Director Joseph Henabery and cameraman Sol Polito were tied for the honor of supplying the greatest number of cigars with the longest ash.

The cigars were required for a comedy scene in which Stone spills ash from his smoke on a rug. In order to get the best effect the scene had to be retaken a number of times making it necessary to have a good number of cigars ready.
