





Whenever one member of the 'pony battery" was given an offer he promptly turned it down unless the same amount was offered his part-ner. Mitchell and Miller played with the Reds, Springfield, O., Cleveland

The Moncadistas say that Moncada is the most popular man in Nicaragua today, and what is more important, that his election would have the consent if not the blessing of the American department of state.

Word of Moncada's popularity is emphasized by Evarista Caraso-Morales, the 24-year-old grandson of a Nicaraguan president who served as

Nicaraguan president who served secretary to President Sacasa wh Sacasa was in Washington and to '

secretary to President Sacasa while Sacasa was in Washington and to T. S. Vaca, who fought Sacasa's battles here for him during the winter and spring. On his recent return to Nicaragua upon the death of his mother, Caraso Morales, was asked to represent Moncada in this country.

"Moncada became a national hero when he crossed the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific, bringing his army through the jungle," explained Morales, who has just returned to a Washington university to complete graduate studies. "His soldiers stood in water up to their waists and formed a human bridge for rifles and munitions kept dry by passing them from one set of raised arms to another. He had to make several speeches a day to keep up the spirit of these men. His troops were not conscripts, as has been said in the United States. Most of them had come from conservative territory to find him and sometimes he had to send men home for lack of arms.

English Cabinet Leader During War Days Is 71 Years Old

LONDON, July 30 .- Viscount Hal dane, known as the man who pre pared the machinery for Kitchener's first army, is 71 years old today.

Lord Haldane as Secretary of State for War, from 1905 until 1911, is one of England's best known wartime leaders.

Lacking the personal magnetism which makes a great political leader, Haldane will probably never rise to great heights in Britain's political arena. The great measure of success which he has already reached in British politics and statecraft has be due to his unquenchable thirst f work and details.

One of the most outstanding ac complishments of Haldane's career a Secretary for War, and one for which he was bitterly criticized at the time was his plan for the formation of the Territorial Army which he quietly and steadily built out of the some-what ramshackled old Voluteeer

He was formerly a Liberal of the old school and a staunch follower of Lord Asquith, but when Ramsay Mac-Donald was forming his Labor Cabinet in 1924, he asked Haldane to serve as Lord High Chancellor. Haldane accepted and has since beer listed as a member of the Labor Party. He had served as Lord High Chancellor under Lord Asquith from 1912 until 1915.

He was born at Cloanden, Scot-land, July 30, 1856 and was educated at Edinburgh Academy, and Edinburgh and Gottingen Universities.



It now appears that even his former friend and supporter, Emiliano Chamorro, who placed him in the presidential palace, has gone back on him. Chamorro put over the election of Diaz when the United States refused to recognize him after his coup d'etat, but the leading Spanish language newspaper of this country has just printed a dispatch from Rome quoting Chamorro as saying that he would return to his country to fight Diaz. Without Diaz Chamorro and his faction, Diaz becomes almost the man he was when he servented to the state of the state Adolfo Diaz, the president who re almost the man he was when he served as a \$25 clerk for an american mining company.






