AUSTIN, June 18.—Governor Dan Moody whittled \$239,600 out of the departmental appropriation bill in vetoes filed today, bringing the grand total of appropriations vetoed up to date \$686,860. These include the educational, eleemosynary emergency and judiciary bills. The governor is yet to act on the miscellaneous claims and accounts bill.

Practically every department received the veto ax for some amount. The governor vetoed the provision in the bill for the comptroller to use the liquor permit fees in the enforce-ment of liquor laws. This appropri-ation was advocated by the W. C. T.

One contracting firm in Ranger has closed contracts amounting to around \$20,000 for the first fifteen days in June. Building permits issued in May amounted to \$13,000 exclusive of the W. D. 

Sold off to put paid to the Emden's account—a job allied warships had been trying to do for three months—the Sydney raced at full speed for Cocos Off the island, the Emdon. Off the island the Emden was sighted and a two-hours battle was fought before the Emden was

The Sydney was damaged, too, but patched up at Colombo, she saw service throughout the great war, and much peace-time service since. But now her day is done. She will go to a grave at the bottom of the sea, as did the flagship of the Australian navy, the Austria, after the Washington disarmament treaty decreed that ton disarmament treaty decreed that







An American success followed four years later. Henry Sullivan succeeded on August 5-6, 1923, after battl ing the tides between Dover and Cal-ais for 27 hours 25 minutes. Dover poatmen still talk of this memorable feat and declare it to be the finest wim known in the history of Channel attempts despite last year's record-breaking successes.

It is safe to say that the first wonan to succeed in crossing from England to France will achieve as such fame and notoriety as Gertrude Ederle did when the world hailed her as the Channel's first woman con-

#### **Temple Man Wins** Race With Death To Dying Mother


