EASTLAND COUNTY WILL SEND 40 TO A. & M.

NORTH AND EAST STILL SUFFERING FROM EXTREME HEAT WAVE

4-H CLUBS TO SEND TOTAL OF 28 TO COURSE

Six Representatives of Women's Clubs of County Will Attend

Eastland county will be represented by approximately 40 at the eighteenth annual short course at A. & M. College, according to J. C. Patterson and Miss Ruth Ramey, county agents.

The dates are July 25 to 30. Fourteen boys and 14 girls will represent the boys' and girls' clubs of the county, six representatives of women's clubs will attend, the two county agents will go and other individuals from this county are expected to be present.

All necessary expenses of the trip—including Pullman, railroad fare, room and meals—can be covered for \$20 for an adult. The expense incurred in sending club members is approximately \$18. The trip can be considered in the nature of a vacation, said Mr. Patterson. In fact, some of the conferences at the short course do not consume the entire week and some of those in attendance will run down to Galveston for a day or two.

There will be a bankers' conference, agricultural writers' conference, meeting of Texas Jersey Cattle club, meeting of the Texas Bookkeepers Association as well as the short course itself for the boys and girls as well as the adults. The latter will find that agriculture has been divided in groups and they may study the one in which they are most interested—aromony, livestock, horticulture and poultry.

Fort Worth Will Stage Largest Aerial Show

FORT WORTH, July 14.—What is expected to be the largest aerial exhibition ever staged in Texas during peace time will be held here Saturday and Sunday in connection with the opening of Meacham air field.

At least 100 airplanes are expected to participate in the maneuvers during the celebration. Prizes totaling \$1,500 are offered the winners of the aerial contests. The crowd attending the affair is expected to exceed 25,000.

Five Texas made planes will be a feature of the aerial maneuvers. They will be brought here by E. K. Williams, publisher of the Temple Telegram, who manufactured them. Several airplane manufacturers from other states have accepted invitations to attend.

A Ford 10-passenger plane will come here from the factory at Detroit.

A squadron of nine planes from Kelly Field, San Antonio, will seek a new world's altitude record during the celebration.

Plans For Orient Road Depend On The Owners

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 14.—Dependent on who the owners of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railway will be next October, tentative plans have been made for expansion of the railroad. W. T. Kemper, president, told the United Press here today. The plans were discussed at a meeting of the directors in Wichita last night. Kemper said nothing definite on the plans was decided, according to Kemper and it might be the contemplated extension involving an expenditure of over \$6,000,000 will not take place.

As outlined, however, the plans would include the extension of the line from Wichita to the Pacific coast and adding other links in the southwest. The work would start shortly after Oct. 7.

If a change of management takes place at the time the plans might fall through, Kemper said.

GORDON POOL COMPLETIONS EXPECTED LATE THIS WEEK

Three Wells In Pool Are Nearing Level of Pay Sand, Any Or All Of Which May Be Big Producers

While the oil spotlight has played on the Johnson Ranch in Callahan county since the Empire Gas and Fuel Company's deep test well there came in a producer, at the depth of 4,165 feet, the Gordon Pool, north of Ranger, has held the center of the stage in local oil fraternities.

A number of completions are expected in the Gordon Pool toward the week-end as Root and Fehl's No. 2 Watson is nearing the pay with Colonel Gordon's Ramsower No. 3 and the Texas-Pacific Coal and Oil Company's Higginbotham No. 2, being close contestants. The six inch casing is being run in the latter well which is 3,530 feet deep.

About a mile and a half from the Jerome McLester wells, one of which came in about ten days ago with a production around 1000 barrels, Moorman et al. of Ranger are drilling a well on the Thorpe at around 500 feet.

Cranfill-Reynolds No. 3, an offset to Cochran No. 2 of the Texas-Pacific Coal and Oil Company, in the Carbor Pool, was to have a shot late yesterday.

The J. W. Cochran No. 1 is drilling at 3030 feet and is expected to reach its total depth in a short time, while Cochran No. 2 is drilling at 2725 feet.

The same company is drilling on the J. S. Swift at 750 feet.

In the Strawn area, Hinkson No. 1, on the Hinkson Ranch, which is being drilled by Ranger talent, had a fishing job at near 600 feet and is shut down for the time being.

While the Pratt field north of Ranger, and one mile east of LaCasa is comparatively quiet, the Riddle Heirs tract near the Pratt in Stephens county is undergoing quite an extensive drilling campaign and seeing a few completions in the Strawn sand. C. F. Clark of Breckenridge has completed a well on Riddle Heirs No. 1, in this sand, which is flowing naturally at the rate of 36 barrels a day from a depth of 1852 feet.

The Mook Texas has brought in a producer of similar size, at 1,985 feet, with the hole not yet completed, about 1800 feet northwest of Clark's well.

Five wells are due to be drilled on the Riddle estate by a Dallas man, who has recently purchased 80 acres about a mile and half east of the Riddle Heirs discovery well and it is understood that one of these wells will start within the next few days.

REPORT MANY DEATHS DUE DIRECTLY TO HEAT

Only Relief Promised Is Through Probable Showers Late Today

A death toll of 35, mostly due directly to the heat has been taken in the United States by freak weather in the last two days.

Most of the East continued to suffer today under extreme temperatures and high humidity with the only hope of relief held out by the weather forecasters in the promise of possible showers later in the day.

Boston, New York, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Washington, Pittsburgh and other cities were suffering intensely. A high of 95 was reached in Boston and Washington and 91 in New York.

Relief came to the mid-west today after a cooling rain.

A freak storm in Colorado ended a period of high temperature there.

Citizens In Mass Meeting Protest Against Problem

By United Press. CORPUS CHRISTI, July 14.—Two thousand citizens attended a mass meeting called by the Chamber of Commerce here last night to discuss the proposed \$2,000,000 municipal waterworks problem.

Probable legal action to prevent the city council from letting a contract for the project was discussed by speakers at the meeting. Speakers argued that the proposed obligation would bankrupt the city's finances and cause the loss of the present waterworks, which would be mortgaged under the proposed plan.

PLANS MADE TO THWART ESCAPE OF PRISONERS

Officers Believe Schemes Designed to Free Three Condemned Men

By United Press. JOLIET, Ill., July 14.—While the boom of 200-pound sand bags used in testing the triple gallows resounded through Will county jail, officials made plans today to thwart two schemes which they believed were designed to prevent execution of three slayers of a prison warden tomorrow.

The first effort to interfere with plans for the execution was made through the courts by Mary Belle Spencer, attorney, who said she represented Luis Lipan, Mexican counsel for Chicago. Miss Spencer filed a petition in Will county court asking a sanity hearing for Roberto Torre, one of the convicted trio.

The other threat of an effort to stop the execution was a report to Will county authorities that friends of Charles Duschowski and Walter Stalesky, the other two men to die for killing Warden Peter M. Klein, planned to raid the jail and free the condemned men.

DISTILLERY OPERATOR WANTED IN MEXICO. BROWNSVILLE, July 14.—Mexican police today captured Modesto Vasquez, wanted on charges of robbing a bank in southern Mexico.

Police said they found Vasquez operating a distillery at Matamoros under an assumed name.

FIVE PLANES ESCORT HIM OUT OVER BAY

Is First Civilian To Challenge Pacific; Departs at 10.39 a. m.

OAKLAND AIRPORT, San Francisco Bay, Calif., July 14.—The civilian challenge to the once-conquered Pacific airway began at 10:39 a. m. today.

After one false start the small monoplane piloted by Ernest L. Smith made a perfect departure from the field. He rose slowly, ascending to about 700 feet before the silver gray wings of his plane faded from sight in the haze over San Francisco bay.

With him was Emory E. Bronte, navigator. They hoped to be the first civilians to fly from San Francisco to Honolulu.

Nine minutes after he disappeared in the haze his plane, "City of Oakland," was headed back toward Oakland airport, and circled this field. He descended to an altitude of 200 feet. Bronte's head appeared through the window of his cockpit. He waved to the crowds. Five planes escorted him in his last farewell to the field.

Swinging gracefully around, the plane headed once more for the bay entrance, gaining altitude rapidly.

NEW OIL POOL DISCOVERED NEAR GORMAN

Kokomo Petroleum Company Brings In 250 Barrel Well At 2800 Feet In New Area

Another new oil pool was opened in Eastland county Wednesday when the Kokomo Petroleum Company and the Phillips Petroleum Corporation brought in their No. 1 J. T. Collins, five miles northwest of Gorman for a 250 barrel producer at a depth of 2,800 feet. The new well is about one and one-half miles from production.

Leasing activities in that section have greatly increased since the pay was struck in the Collins.

In the Brown county area of the Central West Texas field, the Gibson Oil Corporation Wednesday brought in five new producers that showed a total production of approximately 1,000 barrels.

Katy Passenger Train Wrecked, No One Injured

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 14.—A heavy rain washing ballast from beneath rails and ties caused derailment of Missouri, Kansas & Texas passenger train No. 4, north-bound, five miles north of Atoka, Okla., at 5 a. m. today but no persons were injured, according to confirmed reports to the railroad offices here.

The traffic department said the train was running slow at the time of derailment and that nine day coaches left the rails but remained standing and that the train would be moved by noon.

Wichita Falls To Get Air Mail Service Soon

By United Press. WICHITA FALLS, July 13.—Announcement that Wichita Falls will become a stop on the Chicago and Dallas air mail route will be forthcoming within a few days, according to Hubert Harrison, secretary of the chamber of commerce.

Harrison has been working on the project for several weeks with officials of the National Air Transport company, which holds the air mail contract for this territory.

Army Escort For Conquerors Pacific Airway

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Lieutenant Lester J. Maitland and Lieutenant Albert Hagenberger, conquerors of the Pacific airway, will be met in Chicago by an army air escort and accompanied to Milwaukee, Dayton and Washington.

No tentative dates have been fixed, pending the officers' choice of date for leaving the Pacific coast aboard a train for Chicago. A three-motored Fokker transport plane, sister ship of their Pacific plane, will be flown from Washington to Chicago for their use.

ALABAMA WILL TRY ANTI-MOB LEGISLATION

Three Bills Have Been Passed Before Legislature Designed To Prevent Flogging By Mobs

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 14.—The Alabama legislature today had before it three bills designed to prevent flogging by masked mobs.

In the senate, Travis Williams offered a bill providing a heavy fine for appearing on the highways masked and a penalty of five years for any violation of a criminal statute while masked.

In the house a similar measure was authorized with a minimum sentence of two years.

Another bill of the house would prohibit masking on the highways except where the maskers are in charge of a legal officer of the organization which permits the masking.

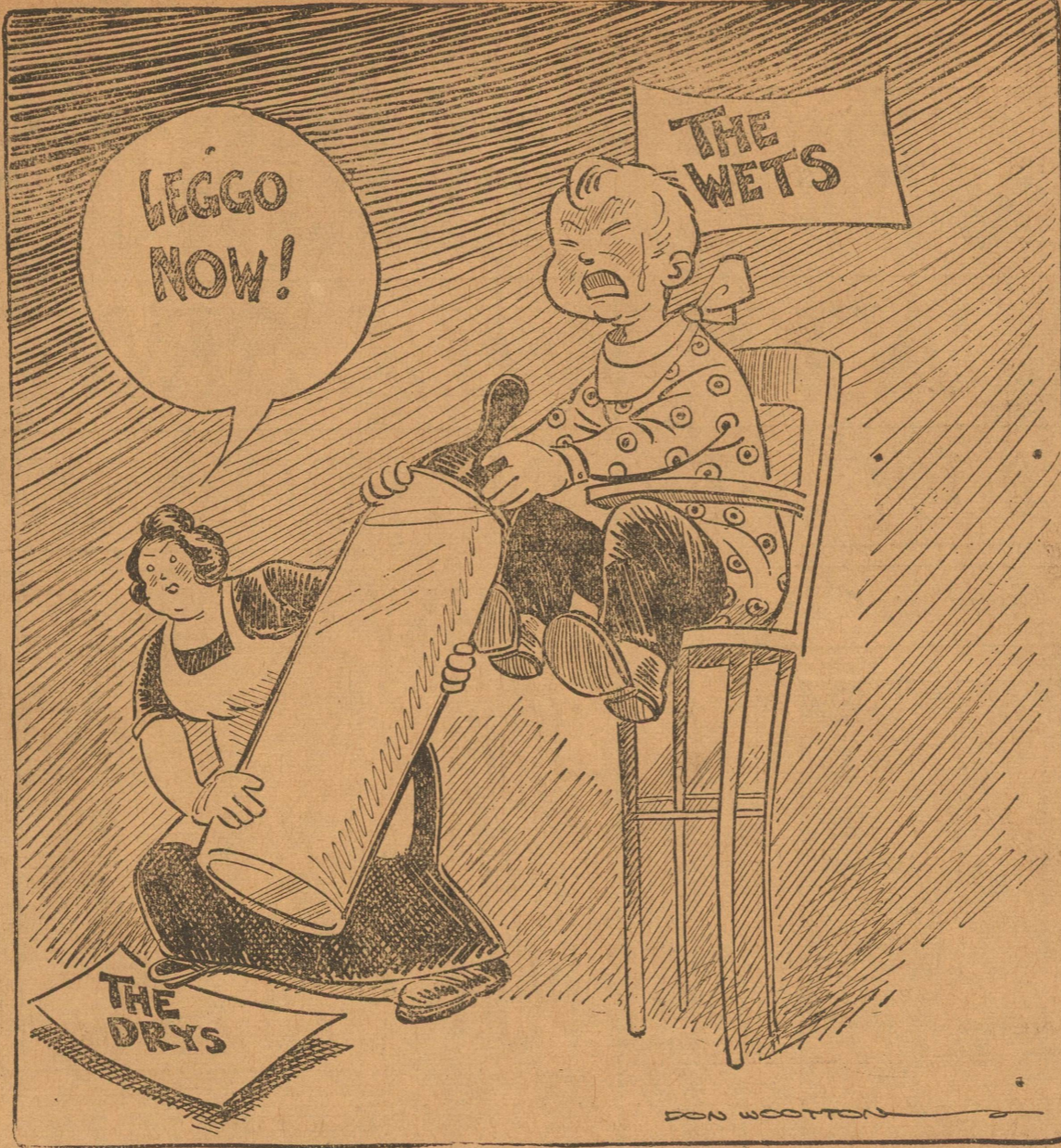
EXPORTS EXCEED IMPORTS, FIGURES SHOW

TOURISTS ARE WARNED NOT GO TO NEW MEXICO

Two Counties in State Have Infantile Paralysis According to Health Department.

AUSTIN, July 14.—Warning tourists against taking children into Chavez and Eddy counties, New Mexico, where several cases of infantile paralysis have been reported, J. C. Anderson, State health officer declared there was "grave danger of the transmission of this disease to Texas and other states."

"Children should be safeguarded against infection from infantile paralysis and by all means should be kept out of district where it is known to exist," said Dr. Anderson.

The disease, infantile paralysis, was described by Dr. Anderson as an "acute infectious disease of children caused by a specific organism."

SLEEPING SICKNESS AND CRIMINAL TENDENCIES

LONDON.—Do the after effects of sleeping sickness promote criminal tendencies? This question occupied the majority of the annual report of the Scottish board of health.

Scotland has a large number of cases on record and great stress is laid on the grave after-effects of this disease. Many patients who have recovered from this ailment are now mentally abnormal.

Youths who were former patients now show marked criminal tendencies and are described as a "source of trouble to the police," "a menace to the locality," "bad tempered and violent."

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Third Party Not Likely This Year Cost Prohibitive

WASHINGTON—There are many earnest souls who yearn for a third party movement which would give the nation's progressive and liberals a chance to express themselves politically, but three major factors hold them back: 1. It costs like blazes to organize and promote a national ticket, and third parties have an especially hard time raising cash. 2. The third party sentiment lacks a leader to head the ticket. 3. It is reasonably certain that a third party would stand no chance of victory in its first presidential campaign.

All these factors apply with equal force to the third party suggested by Dr. Wayne B. Wheeler of the Anti-Saloon League, who threatens to lead the dry children of Democracy off on a bolt in case the unregenerate leaders nominate Governor Al Smith. The high cost of new parties is the most discouraging feature in the minds of the chronic third party men. If they could be sure of a healthy popular support and enough money to cover expenses, they would be able to find some sort of a candidate.

Borah and Senator Norris of Nebraska are the two men who stand out as the best candidates if a possible third party, but there is some question as to whether either would carry the banner.

Borah probably wouldn't accept unless he felt there was some chance of winning. Norris is willing to fight a battle for progressivism at any and all times, but he has always avoided trying to set himself up as a leader, though he is the best-loved of the progressives.

Some progressives, such as William Allen White, believe that there is no appreciable public sentiment in favor of progressive ideals, but most of them refuse to admit this and believe that a Foses is all that's necessary.

The loss of the elder LaFollette was a terrible blow. Had LaFollette lived, many of his worshippers believe that he might have organized a third party which would have figured importantly in the next election. As it is, few of the 5,000,000 LaFollette voters of 1924 will be satisfied to vote for Coolidge or any but a very exceptional Democrat in 1928. A handful may vote for Coolidge, many would vote for Al Smith, but the majority would like a candidate of their own.

1927 "HYMN OF MATE" RUSSIA'S GIFT TO ENGLAND

By United Press. LONDON.—A copy of Russia's "Hymn of Hate" has reached England. Roughly translated, the "hymn" is as follows: "England in purple or ironed top hat; "England, with the iron clad belly of your bank safes; "England of dreadnoughts and grenades; "England, prostitute with red-painted lips; "England, which intones bigoted prayers; "On the corpses of the victims of justice, in the name of the king; "England, heaping brutality upon brutality; "England, home of scoundrels and murderers; "You! You! "You are our deadly enemy! "The arms of the chimneys clench themselves into fists. "Look out, England. "Solemnly, terribly sounds the command. "Fire! "And the word is turned into deed."

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Necessity Often Makes Stars Of Average Players

It often takes years of knocking about before a big league player finds the position to which he is best fitted.

It was three years before Connie Mack decided that second base was the proper spot in the infield for Eddie Collins. He had previously experimented with him at short, third and in the outfield.

Sheer necessity also had something to do with placing Collins at second. He later became the greatest player ever to hold down that position in the majors.

Danny Murphy, the regular second sacker of the Athletics, was slowing up, therefore no longer able to cover the territory expected of a regular. However, he could hit as well as ever. Desirous of keeping Murphy's hitting strength in the lineup, he was used in the short right field at Shibe Park, an easy position to play, and Collins was assigned to second.

The change worked like a charm. Collins soon developed into a star, while Murphy's bat continued to win games for the Athletics as the right fielder.

Hauer's Injury Hurt
Once again sheer necessity has caused Manager Mack to make a shift in his lineup that may solve a situation that has been puzzling him for several years.

Joe Hauer seemed to have solved the first base problem for Mack when he definitely made good on the job. Then came a broken knee cap that destroyed Hauer's confidence in himself and he was relegated to the minors.

In turning him back to the American Association, Mack, in return, got the star first sacker of that league, Brannan of Kansas City. Scouts said he would step right into the majors and deliver.

Touted as a strong batsman, he failed utterly against big league pitching, although I am inclined to think he is a much better hitter than he showed during his short stay up here.

Jim Poole, an understudy for the first base job, also failed to come up to Mack's requirements, so the club was without a regular first sacker and going nowhere.

Dire necessity caused Manager Mack to tempt fate by using his utility infielder, Jimmy Dykes, at first base. He is playing a whale of a game.

Dykes Making Good
This is Jimmy Dykes' 10th season in the major leagues. He came up as a second baseman, but has played probably as much at third. In between, he has done several tricks at shortstop.

In all these positions Dykes has shown great versatility. It is rather surprising that he hasn't been pressed into service at first base sooner. Not only has he played a great game in the field but he has more than delivered at the bat.

Jimmy is still a youngster, only 30 years old, and he continues his great play at first base, he will have won himself a job as a regular at a position he never yearned nor tried to play.

Dykes is only five feet, nine inches, considered short for a first baseman. But it will be recalled that "Stuffy" McInnis, who played that position and starred at it for the Athletics, was exactly the same height.

McInnis, by the way, came to the Athletics as a shortstop, only to get a chance at first, when an injury to Harry Davis forced Mack to make a hurried change.

Maybe Cal wanted a little cowboy experience to help round up the mavericks next year.

Sport Odds and Ends

TENNIS TIPS

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There are so many players who go on year after year "soaking" the ball on every stroke, content with the occasional "hum dinger" they get over the net and in bounds.

They are not getting out of the game the fascination of the rally, where the ball is in play for a number of trips across the net, each succeeding stroke designed to get the opponent out of position, then win the point by a foxy placement.

Also the "wild" player is not giving his opponent any fun. If his ferocious drives do find the court they are so swift his opponent probably cannot return them. So the entire fun of exchanging shots is lost.

It is not tennis just to occasionally outwit your opponent. Outwit him and you are "playing the game."

The majority of champion tennis players were wild in the first stages of their career and no one wilder than Big Bill Tilden. Now no one is steeper than Big Bill.

How do you steady down?
In the first place, get the ball over the net.

If you look at the analysis of errors of important matches or get someone to keep tally of your errors, you will find that usually more points are lost in the net than out of bounds.

Molla Mallory, present National Champion, lost to Elizabeth Ryan in the English Championships several years ago, after Molla had taken the first set 6-0. Molla said, "If only someone had told me 'get the ball over the net' I was netting and netting them, but didn't come to until too late."

It isn't hard to life your strokes over the net. It is usually only a question of keeping it in mind and accomplished by tilting up the racket slightly or by finishing your fellow-through higher and out. Not across close to the body and down, because that will pull the ball down too soon and into the net.

Next, cut down on the power of your stroke. Speed of stroke is not as important as the destination of the shot.

Get the ball where you are aiming, slowly at first, until you have acquired control and then increase your speed. As a matter of fact, it is never necessary to put your whole strength into the shot. If you time your ball, it will go off nearly with very little physical strength behind it and sufficient speed.

Try to visualize the pendulum of the clock as the bat or the symphony director, and you will understand timing. It is smoothness and rhythm to the stroke which produces speed under control. That is what you should be aiming at, not wild uncontrolled hitting.

The first principles of sound tennis tactics is to get the ball in play. In other words, return the service safely or, if you are the server, avoid the costly error of making double faults.

Obviously, if you get the ball in play you give your opponent the chance to make the error and the longer you keep it in play, the more chance you have to win on his error.

Eighty per cent of the points of big matrons are won on errors and only twenty per cent on service aces and placements, which are points won outright, when the opponent is unable to lay his racket on the ball.

Even good players win few points on soaking the ball with all their might.

GOLF HINTS

It is somewhat amusing for me to be giving golf hints when I am one of the most avid golfers in search of hints myself. However, what I am going to set down here are hints I have picked up, used, and passed on to very good advantage.

When you reach a dog leg (a mule's leg, would perhaps be more appropriate from the view of a golfer) you probably find it difficult to get your stance in relation to the line you hope our ball will take.

The tee is probably faced toward the hole and you want to go to the right or left, to open up the hole for your next shot.

I find that if I line up my drive by getting behind the ball, selecting an outstanding weed at the front of the tree which is in the line of flight and then try to climb up the hazard, and the top of the green from a distance, by taking my stance in relation to this short grassy line from my ball to the front of the tree, it helps immensely.

The same system works in the fairway when you must take a line away from the hole to play safe.

The tendency after you have taken your correct stance away from the hole, is to pull your shot around to ward the green, unless you are able to forget the green temporarily and just feel yourself practicing to get off a straight ball on the line of that object you have selected in the line of flight.

I got the idea of lining up my putts from an article by Cecil Leitch, former British champion. She recommends selecting a blade of grass or light spot, anything which attracts your attention and is about six inches from your ball on the green, directly in line with your put. Place your putter behind the ball so as to start your ball in this line.

Of course, this will not insure your ball going into the cup, for you must follow through correctly so as not to slice or hook your putt. It will, however, help a lot in getting your correct stance and the proper line.

Another hint which I believe has saved me some grief is, if you have missed your drive and can not possibly get home with your longest club, don't try to use a brassie out of action, for you may miss your next wood the same as your tee shot. Take two safe irons and get home in three.

Time and again I have seen players try to make up by taking a wooden club in the rough after a short missed drive. Two midirons will get you the same distance as a spoon and a mashie. This is especially a good hint.

In medal play, when one must look at trouble in the sense of "slow recuperation" rather than "quick surgical operation."

For example, you are in a trap and you think you must try to get some distance in order to get home in your next and you take the risky club. If you get out to a good advantage, but if you are just normal or below normal, as we are most apt to be, you miss your shot, then take the club you should have taken in the beginning and just play safe.

You must recuperate slowly from trouble in medal rounds and play safe out of trouble. "Bravado" does not pay and you are not a boob" but just sensible.

If it is a catch and your opponent is off to a good start, then, of course, you must "operate." Go for your shot, you lose anyway.

It is the same story whether your opponent beats you by one stroke or by ten on a hole in match play, but it is another story in medal play.

Another thing, don't hand yourself too much when it comes to the selection of the right club for a given distance. Study your own limitations. If you can't get to a one-shot hole with an iron use a spoon, even if your opponent elects to use a mashie, for the very simple and obvious reason, if you under-club yourself for "looks," you will press and the results will be more embarrassing than the chagrin of using a longer club than your opponent.

Life of Jack Sharkey

New York, July 15.—Boxers in the Navy do not have, to bother much about training. They don't get time. Training has to be done out of working hours and the working hours are long. The work makes them hard but it makes them hungry also and there never was a gob, a marine or a doughboy who would admit that he ever got enough sleep.

When Jack Sharkey was fighting his way through to the championship of the United States Navy, he used to eat plenty and when he got out of the service he went into intensive eating and grew into the poundage of about 215.

Johnnie Buckley, who is still his manager, saw in him when he left the Navy, a great prospect and he took him over.

"If you lay off the feed bag a little I think I can do something with you," Buckley told him, and as Sharkey was in need of funds, he took the tip without any argument.

"Without much exaggeration," Buckley said, "that fellow could eat more than Babe Ruth and the Babe is supposed to hold several records. He would eat steak for dessert, and what he could do to a couple of pies was murder."

Buckley put him in a gymnasium, placed him on a light diet which Sharkey complained was starvation, and went out to get some work for him.

"I asked him if he had a choice about opponents and he told me to get any fight that would get us some money," Buckley said. "He said he didn't know much about any of the fighters and that he didn't care. His logic was that if he didn't have the makings of a fighter he should find it out quickly and if he couldn't be a fighter he'd have to look for some other kind of work."

Buckley was confident that he was a fighter because he had all the physical requirements and with them a confidence that was as cocky as any fighter ever had shown, but Buckley didn't want to overmatch him.

In 1924 Buckley matched him with Billy Muldoon, Pat Haze, Dan Lucas and Eddie Record, and he won the fight by knockout, the longest being seven rounds against Record. Those names don't sound much now and they didn't then, but they were good enough to give him the experience that he needed.

He also won decisions in 1924 from Al Floyd Johnson, Homer Smith and Al Roberts, and engaged in no-decision bouts against Young Jack Johnson and Charley Weinert and three years ago they were good tests for a youngster.

His record in 1924 wasn't all good, however, as he later lost a 10-round decision in a return match with Record and was also beaten in 10 rounds by Jim Maloney after he had been floored five times.

When he began to get a little money in 1924 he decided to buy an automobile and he went shopping. He came back without a car but had a wife. He fell in love with a pretty Irish stenographer in one of the automobile sales agencies and about five days later he fought Romero Rojas, a tough South American, and was knocked out in the ninth round.

"That's a fine wedding present for the wife," Sharkey moaned, but he wasn't discouraged and he told Buckley that he had learned a good lesson.

Sharkey was asked later of these "misses and flukes, lucky punch or something like that in the victory of Rojas.

"No," he replied. "Just a good sock on the whippers, I'll watch my whiskers after this."

The loss of Rojas set Sharkey back as far as his big money market value was concerned, but he kept on going on and in 1925 won decisions from Jack De Mays, Sully Montgomery, Jack Renault, George Cook, Johnny Rusko, Jimmy Maloney and Kine Solomon. He lost 10-round decisions, however, to Charley Weinert and Bud Gorman.

He began to demand his attention in 1926 when he knocked out Joe Lawson and won from Eddie Hoffman, George J. McCarthy, Governor George Godfrey, Harry Wills and Homer Smith.

Although he did not show any killing punch—or didn't use it if he had

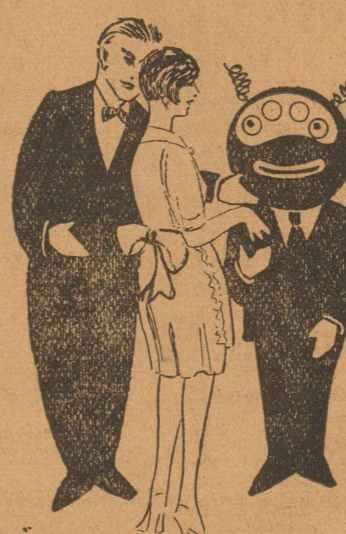
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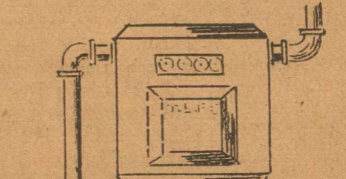

What Is Hapening At Hankow

By RANDALL GOULD
(United Press Staff Correspondent)
HANKOW.—In spite of all efforts to confuse the issues in China there is and has been but one Nationalist government—the government now located here and backed by the central executive committee of the Kuomintang party.

Thus Eugene Shen, Nationalist foreign minister, disposes of allegations that the "so called government at Nanking" has any claim to title of more than a rebel organism doomed to an early disintegration through structural weakness.

"All manner of things are being said in an attempt to create the feeling that the Nanking government is the true Nationalist government," Chen told the United Press. "It is not. It is in fact nothing more than General Chiang Kai-shek himself.

"Efforts are being made to create a feeling that the Nanking government is a constitutional. It is not. It has perhaps five or six members of the central executive committee of the Kuomintang; we have more than twenty-six here in Hankow, not alone a majority but a quorum which can and does hold meetings. The Nanking government is, in spite of all attempts to make it appear a group organization, nothing more than the personal organ of Chiang Kai-shek.

"Finally, efforts are being made to raise the cry of 'red' against us. We are being charged with communistic principles. This is all false. We are not communistic; we are Kuomintang the true expression of Chinese Nationalism. Our government has been, and is, based upon sound party principles, not upon any such one-man domination as prevails where militarists rule—whether they be Chiang Kai-shek or Chang Tso-lin."

Illustrative of this carrying out of party principles, Chen explained how virtually all governmental power goes back to the political council of fifteen members. Ministers of the government and various other persons, all appointed by the central executive committee of Kuomintang, meet in this council twice a week. Decisions are made, orders are given, reports submitted concerning the carrying out of previous orders.

"This gives a joint responsibility," continued the foreign minister. "When I, for example, am instructed to do a thing relating to foreign affairs, I proceed to carry out the order in the knowledge that responsibility for the decision does not go back to one man, but to a group of fifteen persons. They all stand behind me, and I am responsible to them all, as a body, and not to any single individual or master. If I were at Nanking, I should be responsible to Chiang Kai-shek who is the 'whole cheese' there!

"When I have done the work, I must submit a report to the council. This insures that each of us does his work rapidly and with care, for we are subject to a close check.

"Where one-man domination prevails, affairs are conducted very differently. The digestive difficulties of a single person can stop all governmental enterprises, or jeopardize the positions of perhaps quite conscientious subordinates. Our government here is the true voice of the Kuomintang, and it is knowledge of this fact which causes our opponents to resort to such time worn expedients as charging us with communism, in an effort to confuse the public at home and abroad."

Forces within the ranks of all opponents of the Nationalist government here are working to bring about the downfall of these opponents, according to Chen. For this reason, no military activity against Chiang Kai-shek at Nanking is considered necessary and for this reason the drive northward through Honan province is expected to bring the Nationalists into Peking within a relatively short time.

"Feudal concepts in China must go," declared Chen. "The day of one man government has passed. Our Kuomintang government is based upon sound principles and they must be victorious."

World's Tallest Premier Is Ned Hogan, Laborite

MELBOURNE.—The world's tallest premier is claimed by the state of Victoria.

Ned Hogan, laborite, who recently led his party into office, stands six feet five and one-half inches in his socks and a fine thatch of curly hair adds a couple of inches to that height.

Like most labor premiers who have held office in the various Australian states at different times, Hogan worked his own way from the bottom rung of the ladder. At 12 he left school and drove a team of horses on his father's farm, while even before that age he had done a man's work in the fields. At 19, Hogan left for the gold fields of western Australia and was a lumber jack. There he started out on his political career as spokesmen for workers in disputes with employers. He also gained the reputation at athletic meetings there of being the best exponent of putting the weight, tossing the caber, and similar sports.

Hogan is not yet 40 years of age, but has had a parliamentary career extending over a decade.

He is reputed to have no extreme tendencies, such as were said to animate Premier John T. Lang of New South Wales after he assumed control. If Hogan does develop them, he will have a hand curb put on him, for his party, though the largest in the state legislative assembly, has no absolute majority and can only govern with the help of three or four independents, who will certainly turn opponents should Hogan head towards extremism.

ONE THOUSAND FARM BOYS AND GIRLS WILL BE AT A & M

COLLEGE STATION, July 14.—More than 1,000 farm boys and girls of Texas are expected for the eighteenth annual farmers' short course at A. & M. college of Texas July 25-30. The attendance of the boys and girls is as a rule 50 per cent or more of the total attendance and Director Charles H. Alvord of the extension service, under the auspices of which the short course is held, has announced that the total attendance is expected to exceed 3,000 this year.

Special group programs have been arranged for the boys and girls of the 4-H clubs. Lessons and intensive training in livestock judging, the judging of grain and feed crops, demonstrations and lessons in canning, cooking, dress making and other home improvement projects have been designed especially for the benefit of these club members. In addition to the regular instruction, numerous contests will be held in which very attractive prizes will be awarded.

Both the boys and girls groups will be divided into four sections and the same courses will be given for each section of the respective divisions. The girls will be assigned to quarters in Bizzell and Goodwin dormitories and will be chaperoned at all times. Miss Mildred Horton, state home demonstration agent, is the leader of the girls' group. Sterling C. Evans is state boys' club leader.

Each of the four groups of girls will elect chairmen at the opening of the course and these chairmen will preside at the meetings. Captains for the boys' section have already been chosen.

A feature of the boys' and girls' meetings will be the appearance of the four representatives from Texas, two boys and two girls, who attended the first annual 4-H club encampment in Washington this year. These representatives, selected on the records of their club work out of the thousands of club boys and girls in the state, are Fontilla Johnson, Van Zandt county; Ruth Ebner, Jefferson county; Homer Sheffield, Harris county, and I. J. Thornton, Lubbock county. During the meetings these four will discuss with the groups the four big subjects around which the Washington conference centered. Fontilla Johnson will discuss "Service," I. J. Thornton, "Co-operation," Ruth Ebner, "Achievement," and Homer Sheffield, "Measurements."

The list of speakers for the girls' division during the short course includes Miss Susan Landon, educational director, Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association, who will talk on Farm and Home Life in Denmark from observations made during her visit to that country last year; Mrs. Lily Pearl Chamberlain, head home economics department, John Tarleton Agricultural college, who will talk on How to Enjoy Pictures, using an exhibit of masterpieces from the Chicago Art bureau in her talk; Mrs. Bernice Clayton, home improvement specialist, extension service, who will talk on Attractive Rugs and How to Make Them; Mrs. Bruce Reid, Port Arthur, who will talk on Our Bird Friends of Texas, and use an exhibit

Non-Stop Golf Record Is Made By Sutherland

LONDON.—A new world's record for non-stop golf has just been established by W. Bruce Sutherland, an Edinburgh professional, who accomplished fourteen rounds over the hilly Craig Lockhart course at Edinburgh in 23 1-2 hours of continuous playing. He achieved the feat alone, using a relay of caddies and luminous balls during the night.

The record was formerly held by H. B. Lumsden, who played ten consecutive rounds in 1912 over the course of the royal Aberdeen golf club, at Balgowrie, Aberdeen. He took 20 hours to do it.

Sutherland, who is also a physical culture expert, started at 8:15 at night in heavy rain and high wind. His first round was completed in the exceptionally fast time of an hour and a quarter, and throughout the night he reeled off holes with uneventful monotony, averaging be-

tween 30 and 50 strokes per round. He got soaked in the recurrent showers but played himself dry again. It was not until noon of the next day that he even paused long enough to change his mud-clogged shoes. He ended his play at 7:30 p. m. when he had finished the fourteen rounds.

During the night members of a company of Rover scouts acted as caddies, lighting the way with getylene lamps. They had no trouble in finding the luminous balls which were used in the dark.

Throughout the test Sutherland's meals were light, consisting mainly of milk and meat-extract.

On being interviewed after his achievement, Sutherland said that he had been impelled to make the test in an effort to prove his theory that physical fitness is a necessary component in the makeup of a good golfer. He added that he believed the av-

erage golfer does not pay enough attention to his physical condition.

Claim Is Made Cotton Prices Will Be Good

DALLAS, July 14.—Favorable cotton prices are in store for Texas farmers this fall, a census of local agricultural experts and cotton merchants, disclosed.

Based on the federal report of last week showing the total cotton acreage to be 11 percent less than a year ago, the opinions were almost unanimous that a fairly profitable price would be forthcoming for cotton.

The Texas crop is expected to aggregate more than 4,000,000 bales this year, according to rough estimates made from available figures. This estimate was made on a production of 135 pounds per acre.

It was generally agreed that the crop will not be as productive as it was last year. It faces an above normal infestation of boll weevil and weather conditions promise to be uncertain.

Excess cotton supplies have been absorbed, according to reports, giving promise that even should the crop be unusually light it will probably find a market.

Predictions were made that the price would exceed 15 cents, which probably would not exceed 20 cents, which local experts claim will insure a fair profit to the grower.

Between January 1 and May 24 this year truck farmers of Texas shipped 1,768 cars of potatoes, 3,744 cars of onions, 4,529 cars of spinach, and 8,686 cars of mixed vegetables, making a total of 19,708 cars of winter vegetables with a net return to the growers of \$15,635,276.

SAYS WEATHER THIS YEAR TO DUPLICATE THAT OF 1816

Oceanic Changes Will Be Responsible for Freakish Weather Declares Well Know Forecaster

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Oceanic changes have a material effect on future weather conditions, as demonstrated by the recent change in temperatures in the great ocean currents of warm and cold water, in the opinion of Herbert Janvyn Brown, long distance weather forecaster.

That these changes, caused by the sun reaching the maximum sun spot period, have had effect on the climatic conditions for the past six months throughout the northern hemisphere, is shown in the serious weather fluctuations.

"Floods, tornadoes, drought, hurricanes, cloudbursts, heavy rains and cold waves have all taken toll and the ultimate effects from these conditions of the ocean cannot yet be accurately forecast," Brown said.

The influence of ocean currents of the winds, which in turn have their effect on climatic conditions, are responsible, in part for the unusual weather for the first six months of 1927, which is comparable to that of 1816, known as the year without a summer, he believes.

Brown points out that "with the retreat from the north and east of the warm water area of the Eastern Arctic will be a southerly advance of Arctic water."

"In the South Atlantic the cold water area already has shown a marked expansion, while Antarctic water encircling the world will exercise powerfully its cold dominating influence in the southern hemisphere," he said.

The temperate zone cold water areas, he said, still remain dominant in their zones, leaving the tropical waters and those of the semi-enclosed bordering seas to bear the brunt of maintaining the warm winds and thereby the humidities of the continental areas.

"The interferences are for cold winters and generally heavy winter precipitation widely across the North temperate zones," Brown believes. He forecasts a resumption of cold waves before the beginning of fall, although the intensity or exact location cannot yet be determined.

Persistence of inshore cold water currents will have their effect on weather, he points out. These will cause dry weather along the northern and eastern continental seaboard.

Over the seas the weakening of the warm water areas points toward a reduction in the force and number of storm-carrying cyclonic low pressure areas, which, Brown says, enter the United States from the northwest and Europe through the ice-landic areas.

Reduction of barometrical gradients between cold and warm water areas will inevitably see a slackening of the winds rotating clockwise around the north Atlantic cold water area, which are never very strong.

This, in turn, will cause a reduction in their moisture carrying function, which according to his calculations, Brown predicts will mean a reduction of rain fall in central and southern Europe and in the Atlantic seaboard and eastern gulf states.

"It follows inevitably that there will be periods in which southerly winds slow moving, during July and August, will bring high temperatures and dry weather into the Mississippi valley, which may have to depend for its principal precipitation on casual thunder storms," Brown proposes.

How 1927 which so far has been a year marked with violent weather contrasts, has duplicated 1816, known as the year without a summer, was pointed out.

Comparing weather records, the year 1816 was one of the most remarkable in history, notable for its severe cold waves and heavy snows. It started early in the fall of 1815 and lasted late into the following spring.

Weather, according to Brown, comes in cycles of so many years. He points out that what is known as the "55.8" cycle, which occurred in the

severe winter of 1816, became apparent again in the winter of 1926-27.

As early as January 1 of this year Brown forecast a return of the cycle with its subsequent severe weather conditions. His prediction at that time said:

"The famous year 1816, 'the year without a summer' fell in that cycle. The years 1871 and 1872 are included in the cycle, and it will be seen

that the winter of 1926-27 and the crop season of 1927 are included in the period of its return.

"The present winter and its succeeding year also come into the remarkable cycle, developed by Abbe Gabriel, the lunar-solar cycle of 186 years, which refers back to the famous winter of 1740 and its still more famous prototype of 1553."

Demonstrating the effect of the "weather cycle," Brown points out that navigation on the Great Lakes this winter was practically closed at the Soo canal, November 30. The earliest closing date on record was November 24, 1872, which date was included in the cycle. The average date of closing has been December 15.

Forecasting that the periods from June 23 to July 2 and July 7 to July 11 would bring heavy frosts over certain sections of the country, Brown said "these determinations are the results of long and careful calculation."

"June and July dates are comparable with phenomena of the same order in the year 1816. In that memorable year, a violent snowstorm with low temperature raged north of the Ohio and the Potomac from June 17 to 19. It was accompanied by killing frosts even in areas further south not visited by the storm."

"In that year the last week of June saw a killing frost across the north, while the night of July 4 witnessed freezing temperatures and the formation of ice north from the Ohio and the Potomac and from the Atlantic seaboard west to Fort Dearborn, now the site of the city of Chicago."

- 15. Complexion**—Ice rubbed over the cheeks will give a rosy flush and by stimulating circulation improves the complexion—it is better and safer than cosmetics and is permanent when used regularly.
- 16. Headache**—Cracked ice in an ice bag or wrapped in a cloth will often cure headache when applied to neck or head. Rubbing the soles of the feet with ice draws the blood from the head and so relieves headache.
- 17. Drinking Water**—Melt in clean covered receptacles for drinking water. Melted ice makes a pure, soft drink lacking the flat, disagreeable taste of distilled or bottled water. It is safer drinking water than bottled spring water and much cheaper.
- 18. Clothes Washing**—Melted ice is of great advantage where the local water supply is hard, because it is always soft and sweet. For washing delicate fabrics, melted ice being soft removes dirt and discoloration by careful rinsing and often without soap.
- 19. Grease and Fat in Soups**—To remove grease and fat from soups and stews wrap a piece of ice in cheese-cloth and pass rapidly over the surface of the hot liquid—the grease will adhere to the cloth.
- 20. Pie Crust**—Melted ice water in pie crust makes light, short crusts. Many bakers use "soft" water.
- 21. Tea and Coffee**—Melted ice water used in making tea and coffee requires less tea or coffee per cup than ordinary water. The brew also holds all the fragrance and aroma of the tea leaf and coffee bean.
- Also, if hot tea or coffee is poured over cracked ice without dilution, the drink will retain all of its original fragrance.
- 22. Bread**—Cake and pastry kept in the refrigerator will be fresh and sweet until used.
- 23. Chewing Gum**—To remove chewing gum from the children's dresses or hair, or from rugs, hold a piece of ice on the chewing gum—this will harden it so that it can be scraped off easily.
- 24. Prescriptions**—Many druggists use melted ice water instead of distilled water in compounding prescriptions because it is less easily contaminated and dissolves refractory drugs more quickly.
- 25. Pain and Inflammation**—To relieve pain and inflammation in cases of gout and inflammatory rheumatism apply cracked ice in ice bag or wrapped in cloth.
- 26. Circulation**—To restore circulation in cases of numbness of limbs, rub affected parts with a piece of ice.
- 27. Croup**—To cure croup, rub throat and chest of patient with a piece of ice until skin is very red. Relief will follow in about one minute.
- 28. Sore Throat**—To cure coughs and sore throat rub affected parts with a piece of ice.
- 29. Gangrene**—To cure gangrene, first pack affected part in cracked ice, then plunge into very hot water, about half an hour in each alternately. This often restores circulation and affects a complete cure.
- 30. Sick Room**—To cool the sick room place a cake of ice in a tub in front of an electric fan—the temperature can be lowered many degrees in this manner.
- 31. Stings**—To relieve irritation following stings of bees or other insects, dissolve two teaspoonsful of bicarbonate of soda in a half pint of melted ice water and apply liberally. In bad cases put the preparation on a piece of absorbent cotton and place over affected spot, keeping cotton wet constantly.
- 32. Snowball**—Scrape ice very fine, flavor with fruit extracts; this is delicious and cooling on a warm day.
- 33. Hiccoughs**—Cases that seem to defy ordinary treatment will often respond to one or two applications of cracked ice.
- 34. Sunstroke**—Put ice in a rubber bag or cloth on top of head and down the back.
- 35. Cold Feet**—Ice rubbed on the feet removes this trouble without delay.
- 36. To Stop Gagging and Vomiting**—Chew on a small piece of ice until relieved.
- 37. Carbuncles**—Cracked ice applied to carbuncles will take the sting out of them—also reduce inflammation.
- 38. Blood Poison**—Ice is used to stop the spread of blood poison from the parts affected.
- 39. Economy**—Ice kept in the ice box during the winter not only preserves the food at the proper temperature, but insures food keeping longer, thus saving money.
- 40. Roses and Fruit Trees**—Will prevent hasty and unseasonable growth.
- 41. Photography**—Ice water used in the developing mixture insures bringing out the details and means sharper pictures.
- 42. Candy Making**—Ice is used to make certain mixtures set properly.
- 43. Sausages**—Cracked ice is sometimes mixed in sausage meat while making sausage.
- 44. Oil**—Ice is used to cool tempering oil.
- 45. Plumbers**—Use cracked ice and salt to freeze the water line where there is no shut-off—this permits them to make the proper repair.
- 46. Radiators of Automobiles**—Will last longer and require less repair if ice water is used in them rather than "hard" water which causes corrosion and scale.
- 47. Canned Fruits**—Peaches, pears, apricots and other fruits may be frozen in the can by packing with cracked ice and salt about three to four hours.
- 48. Watermelon**—Pack in cracked ice and a little salt in a tub—the melon will be chilled through in four to six hours.
- 49. Garnishes**—To make salads, fruits and vegetables more attractive and appetizing, garnish with sparkling cracked ice.
- 50. Fruit Juices**—In serving, place cracked ice around the glass instead of in the drink—thus preventing dilution and loss of flavor.

Rising Star — Mrs. D. M. Jacobs, first; Mrs. J. E. Bolding, second; Mrs. E. R. Wagen, third.

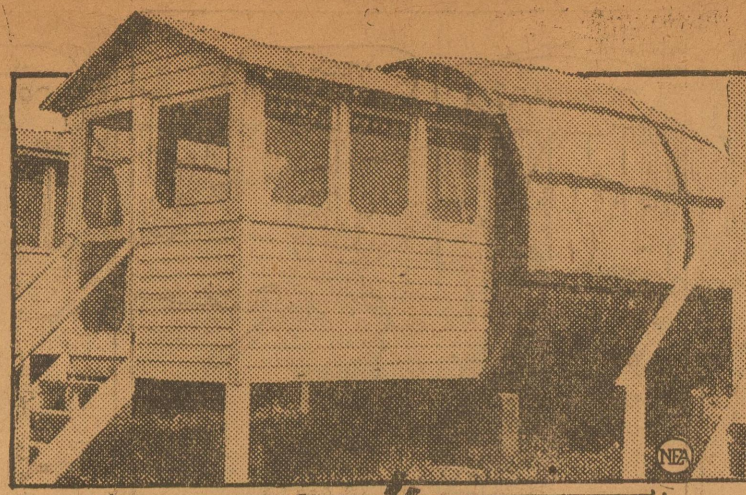
Okra — Mrs. D. Adams, first; Miss Mosselle Hill, second; Miss Hallie Hill, third.

The daily consumption of beer in Moscow in summer averages 25,000 pails, the pail-measure equalling 40 bottles. The average cost is 30 kopeks (15 cents) a bottle. Drinking of vodka has been greatly diminished in favor of beer through the hot weather.
