The plane was an army machine from Pearson field, Vancouver, Washington. It was piloted by Lieutenant R. T. Parshall, who was flying low when his motor stalled and he attempted to land on the river banks, but struck a high powered line and the machine burst into

Parshall freed himself. Knauss suffered from a broken arm and was held in the net work of twisted wires. Mrs. Reicks, who lived near swam out to the burning machine, freed Knaus and raised him under the water away from the fire to safety. Both flyers were burned and will be in the hospital for weeks.


