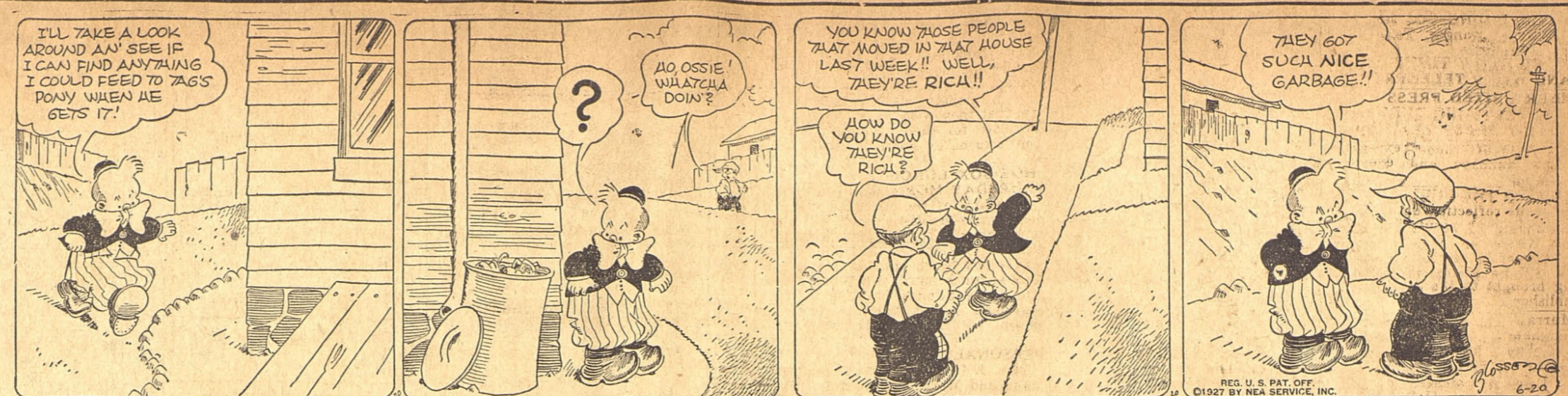

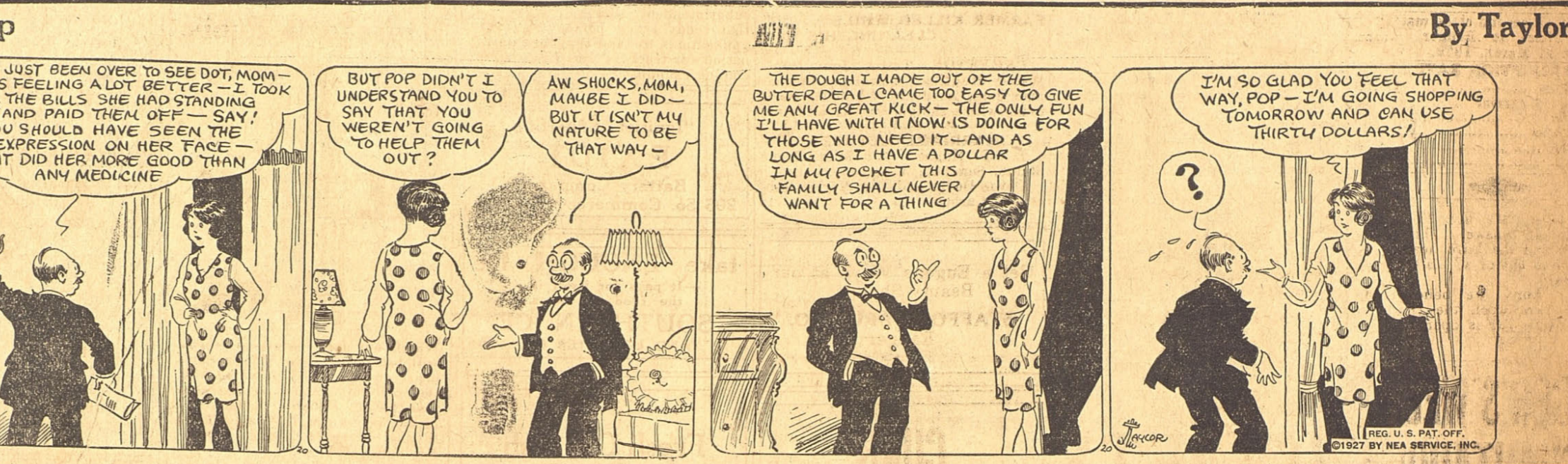
FRECKLES AND HIS FRIENDS

**MENTION OF LINDBERGH'S NAME
GETS OVATION D. A. V. MEETING**

**President Sends Message of Good Will Outlining
Work Done by Disabled Veterans Body.
Tomorrow Parade Will be Led By
Blind and Maimed Veterans**

EL PASO, Texas, June 20.—Mention by Brig. Gen. John V. Cinnin of Chicago, national commander of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh drew a tremendous ovation at the opening session of the seventh national convention of the Disabled American Veterans here today.

Hundreds of the war's maimed from all sections of the country attended the meeting which was given over almost entirely to exchange of greetings between the organized disabled and the spokesmen for the civil and Spanish war veterans, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

Following a D. A. V. tradition, proceedings were halted for two minutes while the vast crowd stood in silence at the same time D. A. V. wreaths were being deposited on the tombs of the unknown soldiers at Arlington, Rome, Paris, Brussels and London. Silence was broken by "taps" and the singing of the Star Spangled Banner.

A letter to Commander Cinnin from the president was read as follows:

"Upon the occasion of the Seventh Annual Convention of the Disabled American Veterans of the world war I wish to extend through you my personal greetings to those men and women, disabled in the military and naval service of this country. Your organization has done much to bring about the present satisfactory program for government relief. Sympathetically have you considered and zealously have you supported their needs.

"The government gladly has recognized its obligations to its disabled veterans and their dependents. It has obtained generous and human legislation for their benefit. Through the liberal interpretation and application of these laws it has been possible to extend to many thousands the financial and physical relief so much needed.

"I am advised that to date compensation payments have been made in excess of one billion dollars, and that payments are now being made \$23,000 claims, which represents a net increase in this particular type of benefit of nearly 20,000 since the commencement of this fiscal year. In the government's great vocational rehabilitation program, now nearing completion, more than 128,000 have completed their training, or been fitted for gainful occupations. This program has cost nearly \$650,000,000. More than \$64,000,000 has been appropriated for the construction of modern fireproof institutional buildings. There are now available to the disabled veterans 28,700 hospital beds, and 26,000 patients are suffering from disabilities not directly due to their military service indicates the extent to which the government has gone in expressing its appreciation of military service honorably rendered.

"The government in both the legislative and executive branches, has welcomed your counsel. I desire this relationship to continue so that the laws so amply providing for the disabled veteran may be properly executed."

Tomorrow morning will come the annual D. A. V. parade led by the blind and the men who lost legs or arms in the war and escorted by the regular army, civic societies of El Paso and detachments of the national guard.

Regular business sessions will open tomorrow and will extend through the week.

One of the principal speakers of the convention will be Gen. Frank T. Hines, director of the Veteran's bureau, who will make his annual report to the disabled men of the country.
