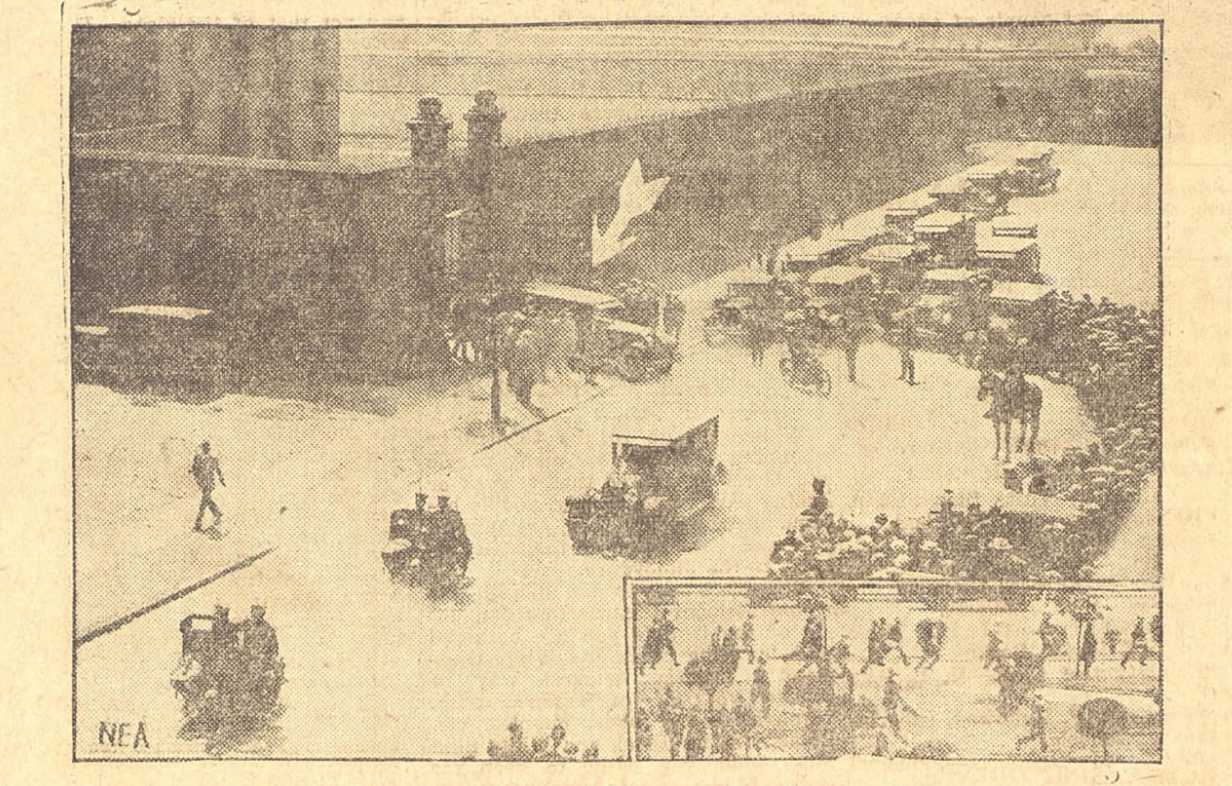
Trial of Lonnie Dixon Starts At Little Rock, Ark.

**A MUCH NEGLECTED INDUSTRY.**  
Texas imported \$53,000,000 worth  
of dairy products last year, according  
to the statement of R. L. Pau in an  
address to the Dallas Agricultural  
club recently. At the same time  
Texas produced about \$50,000,000  
worth of dairy products, exclusive of  
the amount consumed on the farms in  
the state.

That is a tremendous amount of  
money to send out of a state for one  
single line of food products that can  
be so easily and profitably produced  
right here in the state. There is  
probably no section of the American  
continent more favorably adapted to  
dairy farming than Texas. But the  
trouble is that the industry has not  
been developed.

Wisconsin is probably the leading  
dairy state of the union, simply be-  
cause the industry has been developed  
there and not because Wisconsin is  
more favorably adapted to the indus-  
try than is Texas. Any advantage  
that Wisconsin has over Texas is due  
to development and not to natural  
causes.

Eastland county is an ideal section  
for dairy farming. So why should  
Eastland county people eat dairy  
products from Wisconsin when they  
can produce their own and enough in  
addition to add a healthy income to  
the farm each year? Of course, de-  
velopment along this line will come  
some day but it would be materially  
hastened if the farmer could be made  
to realize the immediate importance  
of the dairy industry.

County Agricultural Agent J. C.  
Patterson is going to devote consid-  
erable of his time this year to the  
development of the dairy farm in this  
county. His task in interesting the  
farmers in this line of endeavor will  
be simplified if he can bring home to  
them the sad plight of \$53,000,000  
annually going out of the state for  
dairy products. The grand total of  
\$53,000,000 that goes out of the  
state annually for dairy products  
represents an amount not far from  
\$10 per capita annually. Granting  
that the population of Eastland  
county is 50,000 people, it stands to  
reason that the people of this county  
are annually sending out of the  
state close to a half million dollars  
for dairy products alone.

Of course most of the amount is  
spent for condensed and powdered  
milks, cheese and the like, products  
which are manufactured only in a  
limited way in the state of Texas.  
But they could be manufactured  
here just as easily and just as profit-  
ably as they are manufactured in  
Wisconsin or any other section of the  
country.

Quoting from Mr. Pau's statement:  
"The trouble with dairying in  
Texas seems to be that farmers are  
encouraged to haul or ship their  
waste fluid milk to the large cities  
when they should separate the cream  
from the skim milk and feed the lat-  
ter. Also the Texas ice cream indus-  
tries now are using largely condensed  
or powdered milk instead of fresh  
cream.

"Dairying in Texas offers large  
opportunities for farmers who will  
follow it in a businesslike manner.  
It offers an outlet for the roughage  
that can be grown on every farm,  
also it distributes the farmers' labor  
efficiency over the whole year and  
not only a few months; it gives a  
market for the by-products of cotton,  
such as cottonseed meal and hulls; it  
maintains and builds up soil fertility  
through use of the manure from ani-  
mals. But with raw milk selling for  
15 cents a gallon in Dallas when it  
ought to be 25 cents there is little  
incentive for dairying."

Discussion brought out that one of  
the troubles of dairying is that farm-  
ers are difficult to bring into an or-  
ganization to sell collectively, which  
Col. Clarence Ouseley said is due to  
the highly developed individualism of  
the American farmer who wants to  
market when and how he pleases.

# House Considers National Guard Appropriation

AUSTIN, May 19.—The house  
consumed the greater portion of this  
morning's session considering the sec-  
tion of the departmental bill making  
appropriation for support of the  
Texas national guard, numerous sub-  
stitutes being offered to the commit-  
tee amendment providing an appro-  
priation of \$250,000.

This item in the bill was for \$262,-  
000. The committee amendment was  
finally adopted.

Representative Poage sought to  
have the entire national guard section  
eliminated from the bill, declaring it  
was the duty of the federal govern-  
ment to provide the national defense  
and not that of the state. His sub-  
stitute was tabled overwhelmingly.

A substitute by Representative  
Van Zandt was for a reduction of the  
appropriation to \$190,000. It was  
also tabled.

### Organizers For Dispensary Tax League In Ranger

W. J. Reid, state organizer, and Walter J. Hayt, national organizer of the Federal Dispensary Tax Reduction League, Inc., are in Ranger today recruiting members for their organization, which has for its object the amending of section 1 of the eighteenth amendment by adding three words, "except the government."

Boiled down, the object would be to make real liquor so cheap that bootleggers could not successfully compete, and the making it legal for the government to handle it.

A number of Ranger men have already signed up, as cards carried by the two representatives of the league showed today.

The passing of the buck plan as it is called would mean the opening of dispensaries in cities of 50,000, while the penalties would be far more stringent than those now in force in Canada. The plan as outlined is to help promote prohibition since it places all liquor under government control.

A number of prominent Texas men are on the executive board of the state league, which has its headquarters in Dallas. The bill has been carefully prepared and is directly different to any bills so far submitted to the supreme court to amend the Volstead act.

The plan of the Federal Dispensary Tax Reduction League is outlined as follows:

To forever work against the return

of the saloon in any form. To reduce taxes and eliminate bootlegging and other crime by changing the present law to a federal dispensary plan, whereby a reasonable amount per month of pure liquors may be secured for home consumption only, with a tax of 100 per cent above cost divided equally between the state and government.

Estimated revenue from this plan \$1,117,373,212 annually, besides the amount saved in trying to enforce the present law, should reduce county, state and federal taxes 35 per cent.
