ANDREWS WHEN OUT OF OFFICE MAY TALK SOME

WASHINGTON.—It is an excellent bet that Wayne B. Wheeler, the prolific boss of the Anti-Saloon League, has already compiled a series of statements to shoot when General Lincoln C. Andrews, the retiring "dry czar" begins to tell what he considers the truth about prohibition.

Beyond doubt, Andrews will write the story of his career as chief enforcer and incidentally outline his conclusions.
No one can predict just what Andrews will tell the world, but the Anti-Saloon league fears the worst. It can hardly feel any other way, in view of its violent enmity toward Andrews and its conviction that he was never at heart a supporter of the Volstead act.

The other day, in New York, a newspaperman asked Andrews if he thought that prohibition could be enforced, Andrews, it is reported, did not reply. He still holds office, despite the league's desire to push him out before his resignation takes effect on August 1.

Out of the office, Andrews probably will be as sincere as he has been on the job, but he is not likely to be tongue-tied. He will be in a position to make startling disclosures and, within the limits of decency and a sense of honor, he may be expected to do so.

Despite Anti-Saloon league misgivings, it is quite possible that Andrews will suggest a constructive program for enforcement.

Rumors are revived that Governor General Leonard Wood, returning here from the Philippines, and Ambassador Sheffield returning from Mexico, are going to resign.

Sheffield's resignation is the more probable. He has made a hit with the representatives of foreign oil interests in Mexico City, but apparently is unpopular with the Mexican government and Mexican people, who credit him with causing much of last year's unpleasantness between our republic and their.

It must be admitted that General Wood is no national idol to the Filipino people, but the Philippines are a possession and not a supposedly friendly and neighboring sovereign state. If the administration is in accord with Wood and his work it presumably will try to keep him in Manila.

Breckenridge Man Disappears Very Suddenly

The mysterious disappearance of Robbie L. Livingston, tailor of Breckenridge, is worrying his friends, who are beginning to fear that he has met with foul play.
Livingston, according to his friends left Breckenridge last Wednesday for Fort Worth. At about 7:30 p. m. of the same day, Fort Worth friends say they saw him in Fort Worth and he stated to them that he was leaving at once on his return to Breckenridge. He has not been seen nor heard from since, it is stated.

Livingston is described as being 34 years of age, 5 feet and 11 inches tall, weighs 145 pounds and wore a Knights of Pythias pin and Masonic ring. He is bald with the exception of a fringe of dark hair.

LINDBERGH WELCOMED TO NEW YORK

NEW YORK, June 13.—New York today received Lindbergh as its hero in the most tumultuous welcome this city has ever given to any man.

Lindbergh flew here from Washington, alighting in the harbor in an amphibian plane.
He was brought to the Battery through a line of hundreds of saluting boats and beneath great arches of water thrown 150 feet in the air by fireboats in the escort.

For five minutes police fought back crowds to give him a chance to land.
When the thousands at the Battery saw Lindbergh was ashore they could not be restrained longer. They surged to the police line and packed in a mass around his automobile.

Two hundred police charged at full tilt, their rear-end hoses threatening to trample people before them, but it took five minutes of that to make even a semblance of a path for Lindbergh's car. Then it moved slowly forward.

Ticker tape began streaming from buildings to entangle itself in the web which had hung over Broadway since morning.
"Washington's reception was just children's play beside this," Graham McNamee, radio announcer, shouted through his microphone as he witnessed the spectacle.

At 2:30 p. m. Lindbergh reached the city hall and alighted from his car at the historic steps of the old building.
Mayor Walker awaited him on the city hall steps.

Two Persons Are Seriously Hurt In Dallas Fires

DALLAS, June 13.—Two persons were seriously injured and nine others narrowly escaped injury as a result of two fires here early today.
C. M. Eberhart, 50, was seriously burned about the face and body when he was trapped by fire in the bedroom of his home. His condition is critical. Eberhart was rescued when firemen held a tarpaulin beneath his second-story window for him to leap into.

Jacob Herdt, 50, was injured when struck by an automobile that was speeding in the fire.
Quick rescue work by neighbors saved two families from possible injury when two adjoining homes burned.

Washington Says Goodbye to Col. Chas. Lindbergh

Two men entered the bank casually about 9:30 a. m., according to R. H. Odell, cashier and inquired, "Has this bank ever been robbed before?"
Receiving an affirmative answer they added, "Well, get your hands up," and forced the three bank employees and two customers to line up near the wall then looted the cash tills and vault obtaining approximately \$1,000 and ran to their autos parked in the street.

2 INCHES OF RAIN FALLS AT LUBBOCK

Farmers were arranging today to enter their fields for late planting as quickly as possible.
Approximately two inches of rain fell here flooding several downtown store buildings.

CORPORATIONS RUINING PORTO RICO IS CLAIM

WASHINGTON.—Foreign economic oppression and drainage of the island's resources is the menace which has stirred up the people of Porto Rico.

Until recently, this menace has been the concern only of the Porto Rican labor party, a minority, but it now appears that the conservative leaders of the American possession have come to the conclusion that the welfare of the Porto Rican people is very seriously threatened.
The first evidence of this was apparent recently when the conservative speaker of the Porto Rican house of representatives and the conservative president of the Porto Rican senate protested the attitude of foreign-owned corporations.

Secretary of War Dwight F. Davis at a dinner in his honor at San Juan.
Porto Ricans subsequently sent many pamphlets containing these speeches to the United States in an effort to tell their story to the American people.

A few days ago a delegation of island leaders called on President Coolidge. It included the speaker of the Porto Rican house of representatives, Jose Tons Soto and the senate president, Antonio R. Barcelo. Most significantly, as indicating a united front, it included Santiago Iglesias, senate minority leader, and Rafael Alonso, minority leader of the house.

Want Governor Retained.
This delegation had been inspired to come here by rumors that the sugar, tobacco and other big American interests in Porto Rico had been trying to persuade the president to replace Horace M. Towner, governor of the island. The Porto Ricans want the privilege of electing their own governor and Towner is not satisfactory to all of them, but privately they expressed the thought that if the corporations obtained another governor Porto Rico would be pushed from the frying-pan into the fire.

The basis of Towner's present popularity with Porto Ricans and his unpopularity with the corporations is said by the former to be his advocacy of adequate taxation for the interests which are taking everything out of the country and not putting anything back in.

Fireman Killed By Live Wire In Fort Worth Fire

FORT WORTH, June 13.—Capt. Frank Massengale fireman, was killed here shortly before noon when he stepped on a live wire in fighting a fire. His body was not recovered for more than forty minutes while firemen fought flames in an effort to extricate him from debris.

OTHERS ARE INJURED AS BOLT HITS

Tragedy Occurs While Boys Are Preparing Grave for Little Girl.

DALLAS, June 13.—One child was killed and fifteen others injured today when lightning struck the Buckner Orphan's home, during a thunder storm here today.
Ishmid Akin, 18, was the youth killed when the lightning struck.
According to Joe D. Buckner, superintendent of the home, Akin and several other boys were digging a grave for the body of a girl who died in the home last Friday. About a dozen other boys were cutting grass near by. They had started a fire to burn some grass and it was this fire, Buckner believes, which drew the bolt.
Akin was killed instantly and about 15 of the boys were knocked out for a few minutes. All are suffering from the shock.

New Libel Law Is To Be Effective Tuesday Night

AUSTIN, June 13.—The new libel law affecting newspapers, enacted by the regular session of the fortieth legislature, which adjourned March 18, becomes effective at midnight Tuesday.

Other important enactments to become effective at midnight Tuesday included the bill placing the regulation of passenger vehicles for hire under the jurisdiction of the railroad commission; the bill abolishing the grade of manslaughter, and the act creating the state insurance commission, which is to be composed of three commissioners.

Judge Rust Again Selected Head Of Sunshine Singers

Judge R. L. Rust of Eastland was re-elected for the third term, as president of the T-P Sunshine district singing convention at the third annual meeting of that organization, held Saturday and Sunday in Gorman. Judge J. M. Parker of Gorman was elected secretary-treasurer, and Rev. T. H. B. McAllister of near Carbon, was selected as chaplain. No meeting place was selected for the next convention. Abilene and Sweetwater each made application for the meeting, however.

Estimates of the crowd Sunday were as high as 6,000.—The tabernacle, it is stated, seated 2,500 and it was filled to overflowing early both Saturday and Sunday.

Police Recover Stolen Car, File Theft Charges

The Ranger police department recovered a Ford roadster which was stolen from an Eastland man on last Thursday, out on the old Eastland road, Sunday.

The car had been stripped but the articles stolen from it were also recovered. These accessories had been sold to various individuals and the officers got their clew Saturday when the man from Eastland recognized his casings on a car that was parked down town.

Total of 31 True Bills Returned By Grand Jury

The 91st district court grand jury empaneled by Judge Geo. L. Davenport at the opening of the June term of his court last Monday returned 31 true bills of indictment, all felonies, before recessing Saturday until Monday, June 20th.

A large number of those against whom indictments were returned have not been taken into custody. Among those who are either in jail or at liberty on bond, is Luther Helm, who is charged with the theft of a cow belonging to City Manager J. H. Cheatham of Eastland. Another indictment against Helm, charges him with the theft of cattle belonging to Buck Myrick of Cisco.

Earl Watts is charged by indictment with transporting liquor.

Jury In Russell Case at Eastland Unable to Agree

Trial of the case of the State of Texas vs. J. A. Russell, former Eastland county district clerk, on a charge of embezzlement, in the 88th district court before special Judge L. H. Flewelling, resulted in a mistrial, the jury having stood finally six for acquittal and six for conviction.

This is the second trial of cases against Russell. A number of the indictments against him were quashed. The first case trial resulted in an acquittal. There are a number of other cases to be disposed of.
