DR. H. Y. BENEDICT IS NAMED PRESIDENT OF TEXAS UNIVERSITY

MAN OF WIDE LEARNING AND MANY DEGREES

Dr. Splawn Refuses To Reconsider His Recent Resignation

AUSTIN, July 19.—Dr. H. Y. Benedict was elected president of the University of Texas by acclamation this morning.
Action was taken after President Walter Splawn, had been asked to reconsider his recent resignation. Dr. Splawn declined to withdraw it.
Dr. Harry Yandell Benedict was born in Louisville, Ky., Nov. 14, 1869. His wife was Miss Ada Stone of Henderson.
Dr. Benedict is dean of the college of business administration at University of Texas and has been connected with the university for 35 years.
He holds degrees from University of Texas, University of Virginia, Baylor and Harvard. He has been instructor at both Texas and Vanderbilt. He is a member of Vanderbilt mathematics society and American astronomy society and of the society of promotion of engineering education.

DISPATCH SAYS THOUSANDS OF CHINESE DEAD

Great Execution of Trade Union Members and Leaders is Result of Fight Being Made Against Communism

LONDON, July 19.—A Manchester Guardian dispatch from Shanghai said foreign newspaper correspondents returning from Hankow reported that more than 4,000 trade union members and peasant leaders had been executed in Hupeh and Hunan provinces during the Wuhan government oppression of communism. The correspondents reported that the Wuhan government has two policies, first to eliminate communism and second to eliminate Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek moderate nationalist leader.

NO INJURIES REPORTED, WINDOWS BROKEN

Three-Foot Hole Torn In Consulate Garden By Heavy Explosion

NICE, France, July 19.—A bomb exploding in front of the United States consulate here shortly before midnight, shook the building and shattered its windows.
No one in the consulate was injured. A cyclist passing near the consulate at the time when the bomb exploded was thrown off his wheel and was injured slightly.
Police examining the debris decided that a nitro glycerine bomb had been used. The explosion tore a hole three feet deep in the consulate garden.
The theory was suggested, without apparent justification, that the bomb had been placed by sympathizers of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, condemned to die in Massachusetts after their conviction of murder.

California Has Six Deaths From Strange Malady

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 19.—A strange malady induced by the eating of poisoned mussels which has resulted in six deaths in the San Francisco bay region has caused alarm in official health circles.
The state board of health issued a quarantine order last night prohibiting sale of the shell fish in the state until the exact cause of the poisoning has been determined.
If the state bacteriologist finds the condition likely to become widespread the quarantine will be extended, it was announced.
In addition to the six persons who died as a result of the poisoning, nearly a score of others were reported ill from eating mussels.

Uncertain Peace Rules In Austrian Capitol

Both Factions Claim to Be Victorious in Recent Rioting, Courts Resume Session, Nearly Hundred Dead

VIENNA, July 19.—A nervous peace made potentially unstable by claim and counter claim from opposing factions, today had settled upon the Austrian capital. The palace of justice was in ruins but the government announced that last Friday's riots would not interfere with the machinery of the law. Three courts were to resume sessions today in the former national bank building.
Both rebel socialists and the clerical government declared themselves victorious in the internal strife.
The government attributed collapse of the riot to realization by socialists that all revolutionary acts would be met with a strong hand and conquered. The socialists on the other hand argued that the masses had won a victory when the government permitted the republican guard, the socialists police force, to bear arms.
Latest reports today placed the dead from the week end rioting at 97 and the critically wounded at more than 100.

Chief Shepherd Of U. S. Addresses Keerville Meet

KERRVILLE, July 19.—One of the largest sheep owners in America addressed the opening session of the annual three day convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' association here today.
He was Frank J. Hagenbarth, Spencer, Idaho, head of a ranching company which owns 100,000 sheep and 10,000 cattle. For the past 20 years he has been president of the National Wool Growers' association. He has acquired in recent years the title of "chief shepherd of the United States."
Hagenbarth, addressing the 4,000 sheep men here for the convention, urged closer cooperation between cattlemen and sheep men of the country, pointing out that the coordinated efforts of these two industries would bring better success to the livestock industry.
Governor Dan Moody was expected to arrive during the day to deliver a speech before the convention.
Many sheep and goat raisers of Arizona, New Mexico, Iowa and Ohio attended the convention. Sheep buyers representing the Russian and Japanese governments were on hand to make purchases for their governments from the auction sale of more than 1,000 head of pure bred sheep that are on exhibit. Most of the sheep for the sale were imported from other states.

Nicaragua Delegates Ask Troops Withdrawal

Resolution Introduced at Washington Conference Calls on Coolidge to Take Immediate Action

WASHINGTON, July 19.—Nicaragua delegates to the Pan-American federation of labor congress here today introduced a resolution calling upon President Coolidge to withdraw United States forces from their country immediately.

Russell Case Is Postponed Due To Absent Witnesses

Due to absent witnesses the case of the State of Texas vs. J. A. Russell, which was scheduled to come to trial for the second time Monday, the first trial having resulted in a mistrial, was continued until Thursday of this week.
Special Judge L. H. Fowell, sitting in the place of Judge Elzo Been, issued attachments for M. J. Smith of San Antonio, C. R. Starnes of San Antonio, both witnesses; and Senator Joe Burckett, attorney for Russell. Fifty dollar fines were also assessed against Smith, Burckett and Starnes.

AMERICAN AIRPLANES FIRED ON

One of Two Reconnoitering Ships Forced Down With Punctured Gasoline Tank in Nicaragua.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, July 19.—Two American airplanes sent on a reconnoitering trip by Marine Captain Gilbert Hatfield, were struck by bullets yesterday and one was forced down when the gasoline tank was punctured, it was reported today at Marine headquarters here.

New Producer In Shallow Oil Sand South of Ranger

The area southeast of Ranger recorded another good producer today with the coming in of a shallow well estimated good for fifty barrels a day on the Earnest Webb farm, five and one-half miles southeast of Ranger and one-half mile south of the Panhandle-Hightower shallow field. The new producer found the sand at between 1250-90 feet, the usual depth of wells in that vicinity.
In the Gholson pool, not far away the Gulf is drilling on the Jones farm, an offset to Gulf Duffer No. 1. It is reported that Hammer No. 1 five and one-half miles west of Ranger, being drilled by the Belva Oil company and the Arab Gasoline company found water at 3645, the Ranger sand, and is plugging back to the Marble Falls sand where a showing of oil and gas was passed up on the way down to the Ranger pay.

Condition of City Secretary Dakan Still Is Serious

The condition of City Secretary Ed Dakan of Eastland, who is in a Dallas hospital for treatment, has not improved according to information received by City Manager J. H. Cheatham of Eastland. Mr. Dakan's case is not hopeless, however, and physicians state that it is possible that with from three to six months treatment he may regain his health.
Mr. Dakan went to the Dallas hospital for an operation for stomach trouble but when the surgeons made the necessary incisions they declined to perform an operation, stating that it would not do any good and advised treatment.
Reports from the hospital state that Mr. Dakan is resting as well as might be expected under the conditions.

LONDON-N. Y. HOP SET FOR TOMORROW

Captain Courtney Will Hop Off at Noon to Attempt Flight Never Yet Made.

LONDON, July 19.—The projected flight of Capt. Frank T. Courtney from England to New York, today was set definitely for tomorrow. Captain Courtney plans to point his Dornier-Napier whale flying boat toward the west at noon and head toward Valencia, Ireland, before tackling 1,900 miles of open water.

Eastland Takes Pride in T. & P. Rail Development

Due to the fact that the Texas & Pacific railroad company has been one of the big factors in the development and growth of the city of Eastland, Eastland people are necessarily interested in the welfare of the road, and therefore have followed closely the company's activities in this section where they have recently acquired additional railroad mileage.
Not many months ago the Texas & Pacific acquired by purchase the Cisco & Northwestern railroad, a short line running from Cisco to Breckenridge, which they now plan to extend to Throckmorton, northwest of Breckenridge a distance of about 40 miles.
The Abilene Southern, which operates through the city of Abilene, has also been taken over by the Texas & Pacific.
And now the Interstate Commerce Commission has granted permission for the Texas & Pacific to acquire the Pecos Valley Southern, a short line forty miles in length.
At Eastland, where the Texas & Pacific proposes to build terminals and shops, several hundred acres of land has been acquired by them for that purpose.
In addition to the purchase of the above named short lines, which are valuable feeders for the Texas & Pacific, the company has greatly improved its roadbed in this section by laying heavier steel, ballasting the roadbed and building new and better bridges. Bigger and better engines of the very latest type and improved rolling stock of other kinds have also been put in operation on this end of its main line by the Texas & Pacific.

Aerial Hop To Australia With One Stop Planned

LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 19.—An aerial hop of more than 7,000 miles from the Pacific Coast to Australia with a stop over at some island in the South Seas, may be undertaken August 1 the United Press learned here today.
"We may abandon our plan to fly to Tokyo and head for Sydney or Melbourne" Theodore S. Lundgren, aviator for Cap. James L. Griffin of Long Beach told United Press. "We will attempt to break the existing record for the number of hours in the air."

Colonel Roosevelt Recovering From Burn On Knee

NEW YORK, July 19.—Col. Theodore Roosevelt, who is receiving treatment at the Harbor Hospital for burns told the United Press today that he expected to leave the hospital in two or three days.
Colonel Roosevelt suffered painful burns on his right knee while cooking over a camp fire during an outing trip with his children, he spilled a pan of hot grease on his knee. Infection followed the burn.

Decomposed Body of Man Missing Since July 7, Is Found

WELCOMING FLYERS

Byrd, Chamberlin and others got a rousing welcome the other day when they returned to New York from Europe after having risked their lives in trans-Atlantic flights. Newspaper dispatches however say that it was nothing compared with the reception accorded Col. Charles Lindbergh upon his triumphant return.

As a matter of fact this thing of welcoming home flyers who have done something really worth while is getting to be rather common in the United States. First it was Lindbergh, then Maitland and Hegenberger, then Byrd, Chamberlin, Acosta, Noville and Balchen and there are still two civilian flyers out there that spanned the Pacific from California to Hawaii but who have not returned. They too must be welcomed home.

If interest in aviation continues, which it will, it will not be long until returning non-stop flyers around the world flyers and such as that will be entirely too numerous to permit of public greetings.

But American people will always have a cheering welcome for Col. Lindbergh. There is something about this young fellow that makes people want to see him and welcome him. Probably no man in this country in recent years has been the object of such hero worship as has Lindbergh. He is the idol of not only the younger generation but the older as well.

Lindbergh will leave in a few days on his all-America tour in the interest of aviation and he will continue to furnish newspapers a lot of front page news that most people will clamour to read.

Paving Gravel Sand And Rock Near Eastland

Sand, gravel and rock, the best to be found anywhere, are being secured in the immediate vicinity of Eastland for use in paving the city streets, work on which is now under way. Local labor is also being used by the contractors where it is practical.

There are large deposits of brick clay in the vicinity of Eastland, but there are no brick plants in operation therefore brick for paving the city's streets must be shipped in. A few years ago a small brick plant was built south of the city, but the owners lacked sufficient capital to equip it to meet outside competition and it was soon closed down and the machinery, or at least most of it, moved away.

TAHITI PEARL DIVERS REPLACED BY MACHINES

WASHINGTON — The industrial age is overtaking even the pearl divers of the South Sea. Starting this summer, diving machines are to be used in the Tuamotus Archipelago.

Heretofore only the native divers without special equipment other than their splendid swimming ability, have been allowed by the island government. It was decided, however, that extremely deep diving without machine was unprofitable and detrimental to the diver's health, according to commerce department advice.

DIME TIPS ACCEPTED BY MAGNATES, HE SAYS

NEW YORK.—Silk-hatted big business men are guilty of accepting dime and quarter tips daily, declares Albert Payson Terhune, noted writer, in launching today in the American Magazine, what he hopes will become a nation-wide movement to end tipping.

"The tip we give," says Terhune, "does not go to the employe to whom we trust it. It goes straight to the pockets of his employer, who depends upon the soft-boiledness of his patrons to eke out the salary he does not wish to pay his employe. Half the world trades upon the soft-boiledness of the other half and whatever this half gives in tips is just that much in the pockets of the 'hard-boiled' fraction. The remedy is to reverybody to develop a thirty-minute head and keep a three-minute heart.

"The hard-boiled dependants upon soft-boiled people realize that we do not tip to ordinary generosity. If we did not the people whom we tip would get fair pay in wages and the public would be saved from originating in cowardly guise to pay an undeserved cash tribute. Perhaps service would cost more, but we could come out of a hotel, restaurant, barber shop or other place with our self respect and everybody would be richer at the end of the year."

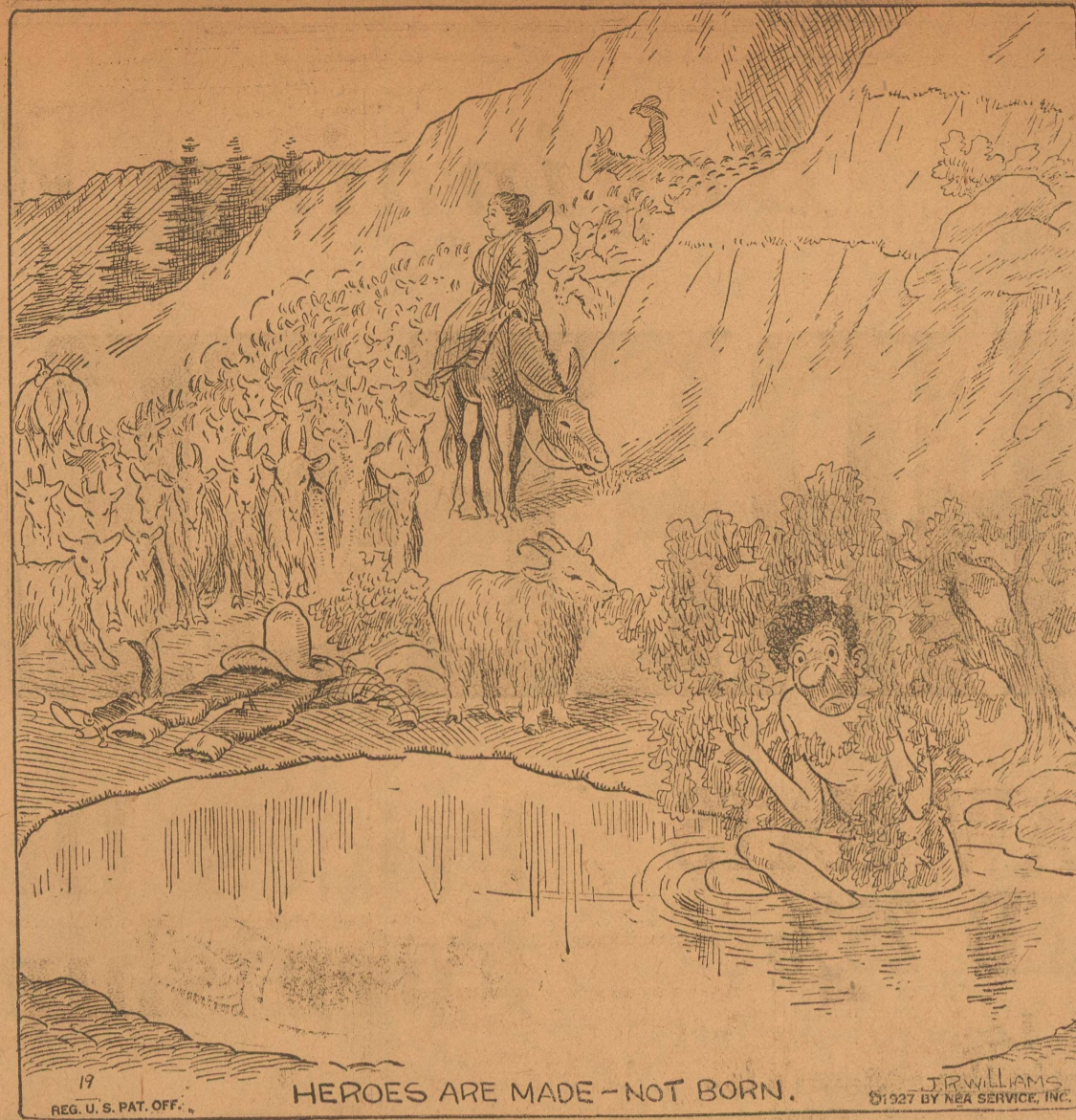

VAST LONELY ANTARTIC MAY SOON BE VISITED BY MAN-EAGLE

By HARRY W. FRANTZ (United Press Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, July 19.—The vast lonely Antarctic, with its magnificent memories of Amundsen, Scott and Shackleton, may soon be disturbed by the modern man-eagle.

Commander Byrd, his friends believe, may go to the southern end of the world; but if he does not others will try. Aviators' inquiries to scientists here reveal that aerial exploration of the Antarctic is already in prospect.

Dr. Austin H. Clark, oceanographer of Smithsonian Institution, in exclusive United Press interview, explained the appeal and the problems of exploration in the far south.

"The greatest opportunity for aerial exploration now challenging aviators is in the Antarctic region. Geographic and scientific information concerning that area is meager, the outlines of the great land mass have never been completely mapped, and an extraordinary spectacular interest would attach to exploration," he said.

"Three separate possibilities confront aerial explorers in the Antarctic. First of all, a dash for the south pole might be made from some carefully prepared advance base. Secondly, the aviator might attempt a flight across the entire area, starting from some point south of New Zealand and ending, for example in South America. A third possibility would be a combined expedition of sea-going vessels and planes which would circle the globe in the Antarctic. At intervals the planes, from the vessel as base, could make explorations of the coast-line of the Antarctic continent.

"The latter project, in my opinion, would possess the greatest scientific value. It would enable accurate mapping of the coast line and the northern fringe of the ice wall. Geologically, the survey of mountains and earth configuration would assist scientists in determining the land connection which may at some geological epoch have connected Australia or New Zealand and South America.

"Scientists have found in South America certain fresh water fish and insects which also exist in Australia and Tasmania. Fossil remains of the Tasmanian wolf have been found in South America, as well as in Tasmania and Australia. The discoveries indicate a land connection across the Antarctic at some remote geological epoch. Systematic aerial photography would be of extraordinary value.

"Such an expedition would contribute indirectly to the future economic exploitation of the southern region, which will include the whaling industry and the development of fisheries.

"If a polar dash is the object, the most logical approach would be from a base in the Ross Sea, from which the route was found overland. The vicinity has been mapped, and advance preparations could be carefully calculated. Perhaps the most feasible method would be a flight by scaplane. With capable of more than two thousand miles of sustained flight a position of sufficient proximity for the hop-off could be attained. The volcano of Mount Erebus and the cone of Mount Terror might serve as aerial guide-posts.

"The greatest single obstacle to Antarctic exploration will be the menace of blizzards, which recur frequently and in many places, often reaching a velocity of forty to sixty miles an hour. These blizzards also would complicate the problem of bases, as they cause snow drifts which might bury huts. Antarctic aviators would also have to count on extreme cold.

"The problem of navigation would be very serious because of the difficulty of determining longitude in the polar region where the meridians converge. "There are, however, no difficulties which could not be overcome by careful preparation. Antarctic attempts are likely to involve large financial expenditures because of the great distance to be traversed even before an advanced base can be established."

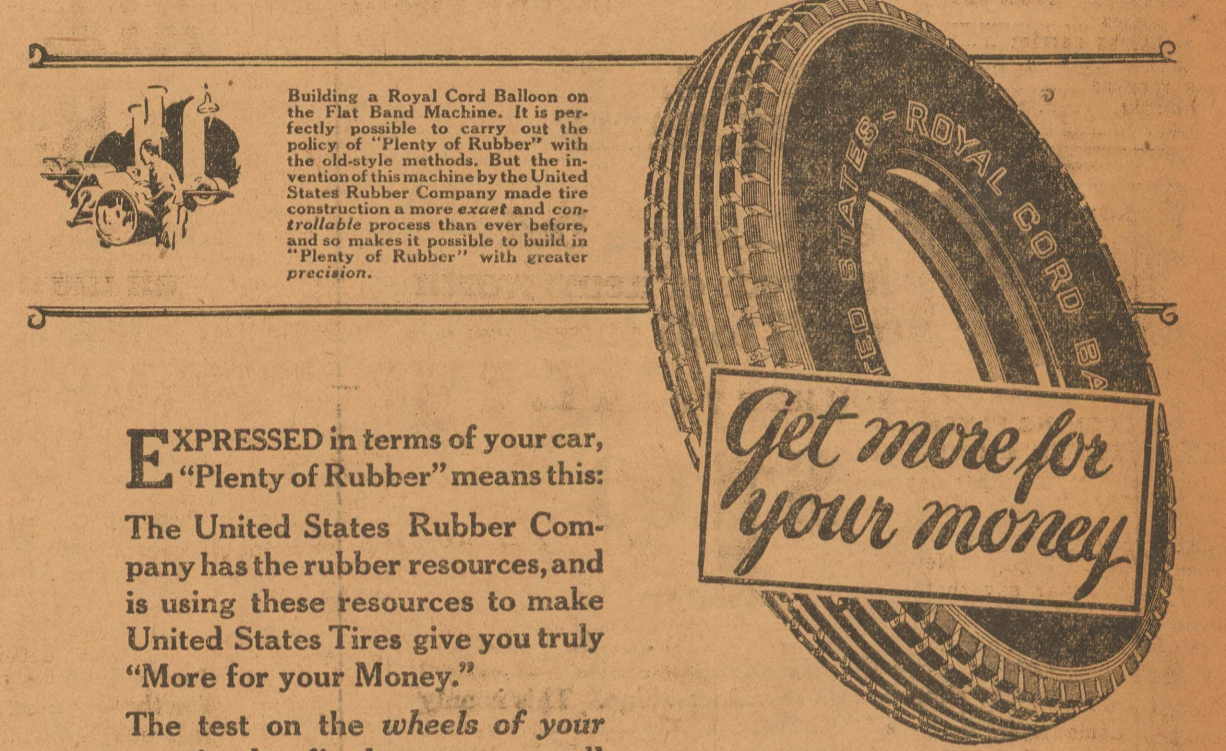

Approximately 60 players from all over the world are participating in the play which will continue until July 30.

Simultaneously with the International Team Tournament a General Chess Congress will be held commencing at 5:30 this afternoon with the star players of the various teams competing for individual honors. This general tournament is to be subdivided into three tournaments: 1. A Premier Tournament; 2. A Major Tournament; 3. A Women's Tournament. Each of these sections is to be limited to 12 players each.

Prior to the opening of the International Team Tournament, the British Chess Federation which has been in charge of all the arrangements, entertained the team player at a luncheon at Central Hall at 1 p. m.

Argentine is well represented in the tournament by three of her best players: A. R. Acuna, R. Grau, L. Palau and D. Reza.
