BABY BOY GETS OXYGEN FROM TUBE IN BACK

Suffering from Bronchial Pneumonia, Physicians Force Air Into Lungs

CHICAGO, July 22.—Breathing by means of a rubber tube which extends from one lung through an incision in his back, two year old Albert Katzen today held off death that has threatened so menacingly for the past 48 hours.

Doctors say he is improving despite his inability to breath normally and despite their inability to force oxygen into his infected lung.

He has been ill for more than three weeks with bronchial pneumonia but it was not until Wednesday that his lungs became so infected that the artificial method had to be employed.

The boy was taken ill 22 days ago. Two weeks ago doctors found it necessary to force oxygen through the boy's mouth and into his lungs. Five times according to Dr. Sheppard Remington the boy was on the brink of death—fighting for breath.

A small incision was made in the boy's back just behind the lungs. Parts of the ribs were removed and the small rubber tube inserted. One end went flush against the boy's lungs while the other extends out of the back.

Oxygen may be forced through this tube when it becomes necessary, doctors declare.

Demonstration Of Dempsey's Left Punch Kills Boy

PHILADELPHIA, July 22.—A demonstration of the Dempsey punch that defeated Sharkey in New York, today resulted in the death of Thomas Celloucci, 27, and the arrest of his friend John Derogatis, 20, on a charge of manslaughter.

After hearing a radio act of the battle they attempted to work out the details.

Celloucci led with a right to Derogatis' head. Derogatis came back with a right to the stomach and a left hook to the jaw.

Celloucci dropped to the pavement and did not arise. Physicians said the dead youth's skull was fractured when he struck the pavement. Charge of manslaughter was filed against Derogatis.

Sixty-Two Mexican Aliens Halted At Border Town Today

SAN BENITO, July 22.—The deportation of 62 Mexican aliens who were halted at Falfurrias was reported here today. This deportation brought the total number of deported during the last two weeks to 40.

Last week 124 were returned to Mexico in one party.

LONG LEGAL TANGLE OVER TAX LOSS OF EIGHT CENTS

PARIS.—Because Martial Boyer, proprietor of the famous Noctambules cabaret, allowed a friend of his back in 1921 to enter without paying, thereby technically defrauding the treasury out of the tax for the benefit of the poor, amounting in this case to about eight cents, the highest courts of France have been handing down verdicts and quashing them, studying appeals and rejecting them for six years.

French theatres are obliged to turn over ten percent of the receipts every night for the department of Public Assistance. In each house there is an agent of the government to see that this is done. When Boyer saw among the crowd of people waiting to enter his wartime "buddy" he greeted him warmly and told him to come right in. The vigilant government inspector noticed that the man bought no ticket and immediately reported the affair.

The Seine department tribunal sentenced Boyer to two fines of 500 francs each, one for defrauding the treasury, and the other for defrauding the poor, and an additional fine of 4 francs 15 centimes representing five times the amount of the fraud. The high court of Paris annulled this sentence on the ground that Boyer was entitled to the benefit of an amnesty law just passed. But the high court of judgement declared, on the contrary, that frauds against the door do not come under the amnesty law and sent Boyer for a new trial before the court of Orleans which is considering.

Petitions Ask Court House Be Moved to Carbon

Reports have reached Eastland to the effect that petitions are being circulated in Carbon, Gorman and Cisco asking the county commissioners to call an election that the voters of the county may vote on the question of moving the courthouse.

According to reports the petitions ask that the courthouse be moved to Carbon which it is claimed, is within five miles of the geographical center of the county.

DEMPSEY MAY HAVE WON FIGHT BY FOUL BLOW

Slow Motion Pictures Fail To Settle Dispute, Rickard Not Altogether Satisfied

NEW YORK, July 22.—Slow motion pictures of the Dempsey-Sharkey fight exhibited privately to newspaper men and others today left the issue of whether Dempsey fouled Sharkey as wide open to dispute as ever.

The fifty seconds who saw the first running of the pictures were sharply divided in their opinions as were those at the ring side last night.

To this observer it seemed that Dempsey struck Sharkey in the groin twice during the seventh round. It looked like two foul blows.

Others present saw the picture differently.

Tex Rickard, one of the observers said, "I don't think it was low hitting. It looked to me as if the blows were right in the pit of the stomach."

Rickard, however, seemed to indicate that he had not formed an absolute judgment when he added, "I'd like to see the pictures run through again."

Johnny Buckley, Sharkey's manager, however, was largely indignant when he had seen the films.

"There is no doubt about it. Sharkey was fouled," he exclaimed.

Monroe Doctrine Attack Causes Green To Rebuke Delegate

WASHINGTON, July 22.—An attack upon the Monroe Doctrine by Venezuelan delegate Raulo Martinez, before the Pan-American federation of labor conference was today preemptorily stopped by President Wm. Green of the American federation of labor, presiding officer who ruled Martinez out of order and rebuked him.

SAN MARCOS, July 22.—Two pleasant bandits robbed I. H. Edwards of Hobart, Okla., last night near here of \$229.

The pair had blocked the road five miles out and when Edwards drove up requested the loan of an auto pump.

Edwards furnished them one and then asked if there was anything else he could do for them. As one drew a revolver the other told Edwards he could give them his money, and proceeded to search him.

They returned his watch when Edwards explained it was a present. Edwards forehad today bears the imprint of the muzzle of the pistol which was pressed against him.

Rising Star Firm Gets Contract for Building Big Dam

RISING STAR, July 22.—E. F. Bucy & Son of this city, were the successful bidders for the contract to construct the big reservoir for the Humble company on the Kilgore lease one mile west of the Humble plant erected there by the Humble last year.

When completed and filled with water the lake will cover 50 acres. The contract calls for the completion of the job within 35 days. Work has been begun.

GOVERNMENT DISCOVERS MANY USES FOR AIRPLANE

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Airplanes have 156 uses, the government has discovered in the course of its new aviation promotion program. Thirty-two of these functions are military and naval, but the others fall within industrial, civic, commercial and sporting classifications.

The survey, conducted under direction of William P. MacCracken, Jr., head of the new civilian aviation branch of the commerce department disclosed that most of the uses had already employed planes to a considerable degree.

The illegal occupations of smuggling liquor, aliens and narcotics, in which airplanes have been used, unofficially brought the total to 159.

Among unique uses for planes were cited the pursuit and capture of lawbreakers, the discovery of smoke- nuisance violators, the location of wrecks and other sea navigation hindrances, search of flood areas for refugees, and surveys of disaster situations, scouting for schools of fish, transportation of mine and other payrolls, and exploration of otherwise inaccessible areas.

For civic purposes, the report of the survey mentions use of planes in architecture, city and suburban planning, police and fire department work and hospital service. Transfer of patients from vessels to hospitals, transportation of physicians and medical supplies in emergencies, locating fire, mapping and surveying large areas of either developed lands are specially mentioned.

In state and national government services, planes can be used for crop surveys and mine rescue work, mapping, studies of river traffic and dredging work, transportation of officials, studying tides and currents, life-saving service with the coast guard, anti-smuggling patrol, chasing run-running ships and smugglers airplanes, valuation of forest fire damage and locating forest fires.

Transcontinental, interstate and transoceanic mail service is mentioned. The military uses of airplanes is the most extensive single function, flying machines being deemed useful in almost every department of warfare. The list of activities included:

• "Attack of all enemy elements in the air, liaison with infantry, messenger service, prevention of enemy air attacks on friendly troops, artillery adjustment and surveillance, visual and photographic reconnaissance, bombardment, coast patrol assisting in naval blockades, destruction of enemy lines of communication and supplies, location and destruction of mines, adjustment of shore batteries."

Other military uses included: "Destruction of battleships, photographing results of bombardment, dropping propaganda, guiding advancing troops, landing spies in enemy territory, attacking ground troops, supplying food and ammunition to outlying posts, locating and destroying submarines, landing raiding parties back of enemy lines, and adjusting fire from ships."

Clarendon Has Temperature Of 110, Amarillo 104

DALLAS, July 22.—The heat wave will probably last the remainder of the week, the weather bureau indicated today. It was cloudy over parts of central Texas today and the humidity was higher than yesterday.

New high marks were registered by the thermometers in the Texas Panhandle. Clarendon reported 110 degrees, the highest in Texas, and Amarillo reported 104. Thunder showers may bring small relief.

CAROL STILL MAY CLAIM THE THRONE

Has Indicated as Much But Last Will of Ferdinand Forestalls His Son Assuming Throne.

BUCHAREST, July 22.—Although Prince Carol of Roumania has indicated he may claim the kinship he renounced, the late King Ferdinand showed in his last testament, will and codicil, that he did not expect his son to assume the throne.

The codicil disinheriting Carol, was drawn up Jan. 11, 1926. Under its terms Michael, Carol's son, became the heir to the crown.

The original will left Carol the royal palaces but because of his renunciation of the throne he will receive only money and securities to which he is entitled as son of Ferdinand.

Queen Marie, the widow inherits the royal palaces.

T & P Railroad to Restore Through Train Service

A circular from the passenger traffic department of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company, Dallas, announces that on Sunday, July 24, the road will resume through passenger train service to Louisiana.

The Louisiana Limited train 21 and 22 and the Texas-Colorado Limited (trains 23 and 24) will detour between Bunkie and Livonia, via Eola and Opelousas.

There will be no through service from points west of Bunkie to points intermediate to Livonia, or from points east of Livonia to points intermediate to Bunkie.

Bank Bookkeeper Drinks Poison, Books Perfect

SHREVEPORT, La., July 22.—Herbert L. Baker, 39, bookkeeper in a local bank committed suicide by drinking poison at his home here today, the motive is undetermined.

An examination revealed Baker's books at the bank in perfect shape. He was a veteran of the world war and is survived by a widow and 3 small children.

Russell Case Is Continued, Is Set For September 19

The case of the State of Texas vs. J. A. Russell charged with embezzlement, which was called for trial in the 88th district court Thursday morning after having been postponed from Monday, was passed until September 19th, then it became apparent that it was impossible to secure the attendance of a number of state and defense witnesses.

Virtually all day Thursday was consumed by the court and its attaches in an effort to get into the trial of the case. The jury was kept waiting for practically the entire day, but was discharged when it was seen that the case would not be tried at this time.

STORK'S NEST CAUSES FIRE

MADRID.—A stork's nest has caused the destruction of part of a church at Santa Cristina de la Polvorosa, a town near Zamora, Western Spain.

While fireworks were being displayed a rocket fell on the roof of the church.

REPORT MORE BANDITRY IN OLD MEXICO

Superintendent of American Smelting Company Kidnapped, Embassy Asks For His Release

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Two new cases of Mexican banditry against American citizens and property were reported to the state department today together with an expression of regret from Mexican government over the shooting of American consul Chapman at Puerto, Mexico last week.

Russell Johnson, American superintendent of the American smelting and refining company near Parral was kidnapped July 20. The American consul at Chihuahua reported.

The American embassy has addressed an urgent note to the Mexican foreign office requesting that steps be taken for the release of Johnson and punishment of his captors, the state department announced.

Record Made In Administering Of Fishing Laws

AUSTIN, July 22.—All records were broken in administering the fishing laws during April, May and June, according to figures of the game, fish and oyster commission which show that \$2,707.10 was collected for fines as compared to \$580 for the same months in 1926.

During these months there were 261 fines paid out of the total of 381 since last September. Undersize fish, mostly bass and crappie from interior fishermen, account for 151 fines since September 1. The total number of coast fines for all offenses since September is 37 and 21 of these were in April, May and June.

The total fish fines from September 1 was \$4,318.90 as compared to \$2,414.50 for the preceding fiscal year. The total fishing receipts including licenses, taxes and fines for April, May and June is \$12,487.83, as compared to \$7,553.33 for the same months last year. Total fish receipts were \$38,104.28 as compared to \$36,789.89 for the previous fiscal year.

"I am fairly well pleased with what has been done since reorganizing the department in March," Commissioner Will T. Tucker said.

Governor Fuller Visits Fasting Men At State Prison

BOSTON, July 22.—Governor Alvin T. Fuller who is making a personal investigation of the world famous Sacco-Vanzetti murder case, visited the hunger striking men at Charleston state prison today.

Sacco and Vanzetti had just begun the 6th day of their voluntary fast when the governor arrived.

Oklahoma Girl Kills Self After Brutal Attack

LAWTON, Okla., July 22.—Comanche county officers were searching today for a man charged with attacking and violently mistreating Christina Chandler, 15, of Sapulpa, who died in a local hospital last night as the result of a self-inflicted bullet wound, according to the story told by Mrs. Lilah Posey, with whom the girl had been visiting. The girl recounted the details of a brutal attack a half hour before she shot her self.

Inquest into the girl's death was to be held today.

Cisco Will Get Big German Gun For Park at Lake

CISCO, July 22.—In reply to a letter from the Cisco chamber of commerce regarding the shipment of German guns captured during the late war to Cisco, Congressman Blanton notified the chamber of commerce officials that a German howitzer is available for Cisco to be placed at the Lake Cisco park.

A diagram of the howitzer was included in the letter. It shows a cannon with a barrel 11 feet long, capable of shooting a projectile 9.2 in. in diameter. The gun is now at Fort Crockett, Galveston and can be obtained on application of the mayor. It weighs 6,400 pounds.

DIFFICULTY IS DUE TO CALL OF EXTRA SESSION

President Denies He Has Made Decision Regarding Matter

RAPID CITY, July 22.—Differences have arisen between President Coolidge and some of his closest republican advisers over whether there shall be an extra session of congress for flood relief in October.

The affair started in Washington when Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee announced after conferring with the president that Mr. Coolidge would summon congress. A few hours later Mr. Coolidge denied he had made up his mind on the subject.

Now Secretary of Commerce Hoover and Representative John O. Tillson, republican floor leader, in the house have been drawn into the argument. Hoover favors the extra session and Tillson strongly opposes it. Both urged their opinions on the president during their recent visits here.

THE TAX AMENDMENT
 The proposed amendment to the
 state constitution which would change
 the present system of taxation in the
 state will probably be defeated be-
 cause the voters of the state cannot
 be brought to see where they will de-
 rive any particular benefit from the
 proposed change. In fact it would
 appear that instead of benefits be-
 ing derived from the change, the ex-
 act opposite will likely be the result
 of the proposed change.

The property owner cannot see
 where he can be benefited by giving
 the legislature a free hand in the
 matter of fixing taxes for state pur-
 poses. Proponents of the proposed
 tax amendment point to the proposition
 that the ad valorem tax is to be
 left entirely to the counties and that
 the state will be run on taxes derived
 from other sources, AS FAR AS
 OTHER SOURCES WILL GO.
 That is where the rub comes. Prop-
 erty owners in the various counties
 have been given no assurance that
 the so-called other sources will any-
 thing like pay the expenses of the
 state government. As a matter of
 fact they have been given nothing
 like an authoritative estimate of
 what these other sources will pay.
 The average tax payer has it fig-

ured out his own way and so far as
 the proponents of the amendment are
 concerned they have given out nothing
 to indicate that the tax payers
 figures are anything but correct.
 The truth of the matter is that the
 amendment has been proposed on a
 rather flimsy foundation. When the
 advocates of the amendment can
 show the property owner any definite
 figures that will indicate beyond a
 doubt that any part of the tax bur-
 den of the state will be shifted from
 them to other sources which it is
 claimed now may not be bearing
 their share of the burden, then the
 tax payers will show some interest in
 the proposed amendment.

What is needed now is something
 definite. The people do not want
 any vague possibilities or empty half
 hearted promises.

The average tax payer has no de-
 sire to shun a just and reasonable
 burden of the taxes. He does not
 want the state to be run on money
 that comes from intangible values
 that are being talked about so much.
 He feels that if that were the case
 the holders of these so called intan-
 gible values might probably want to
 take too much of a hand in running
 the affairs of the state.

If the proponents of the amend-
 ment would have the people support
 the measure let them give the people
 a sound, sensible reason for the
 amendment. Let them give the peo-
 ple something definite. Let them
 take the common people of the state
 into their confidence.

We don't wish to intimate that
 there is a nigger in the wood pile
 but the present situation presents
 just that effect on the minds of the
 people.

Advocates of the amendment con-
 tend that it would not encourage ex-
 travagance on the part of the legisla-
 ture. They contend that the legisla-
 ture now has the authority to levy
 any special taxes that it deems neces-
 sary.

Very well then, let the matter
 stand just as it is. Why make any
 changes? If this authority rests with
 the legislature the adoption of the
 amendment will not add one item to
 its authority. The legislature didn't
 have to have an amendment to the
 constitution in order to create the 3
 cent gasoline tax. It considered the
 proposed tobacco tax without the
 adoption of an amendment. There-
 fore it is clear that the legislature
 has this authority, then why amend
 the constitution if there is nothing to
 be gained by it?

If there is anything beneficial to
 be derived from the adoption of the
 amendment give the people the cold,
 hard facts.

LONDON, July 23.—The centuries
 old dispute as to whether Shake-
 speare or Francis Lord Bacon wrote
 the Shakespearean plays is renewed
 again in the latest book of Lord
 Sydenham of Combe, famous as the
 governor of Australia and India, as
 the first secretary of the imperial
 defense committee, as one of the re-
 organizers of the war office, and as
 a public commentator on the litera-
 ture and history of the British peo-
 ple. "My working life," is the name
 of the new volume which has just
 been published by John Murray.

Lord Sydenham declares that the
 claim purporting that Shakespeare
 wrote Shakespeare in "an intellectu-
 ally demoralizing myth which has
 been infinitely harmful to the nation."
 In part he writes:
 "Such totally different personages
 as Lord Palmerston and Penzance,
 John Bright, Bismarck, Emerson,
 Whittier and Mark Twain, without
 knowledge of the huge volume of Ba-
 conian research, arrived at the defi-
 nite conclusion that plays embodying
 all the learning of the Elizabethan
 era and exhibiting an intimate ac-
 quaintance with law and with the life
 of the courts could never have been
 written by an uneducated rustic
 who became an actor of small parts,
 and who during his last years, while
 still in his prime, was engaged in
 petty trading, in the ruthless col-
 lection of small debts, and in trying to
 deprive the citizens of Stratford of
 their common lands.

Maybe the President is trying to
 worm his way into the heart of the
 west!



Simmons officials announced they had received word from E. J. (Doc) Stewart, football mentor at Texas University, asking that he be given a hearing for the position in event Bridges was not chosen.

Work Starting On San Angelo Gas Supply Line

In a full page advertisement in the San Angelo Daily Standard, the San Angelo Gas company and the Western Gas Service company, of which Barney Carter of Ranger and Louis M. Roberts of New York, are directors and officers, the company announces that on or before the 12th day of October, 1927, natural gas will be delivered in the city of San Angelo, as called for in the franchise and further that they have bought and paid for the San Angelo Gas company.
The advertisement further states that work of rebuilding the present distribution system of the San Angelo Gas company has begun, and that after weeks of work on the part of engineers, work on the main line and distributing systems is under way.

It is estimated, they state, that the cost of the San Angelo distribution system alone will be \$750,000.
Natural gas will be piped from the Coleman fields, where the company has an abundance of gas, estimating that from the present producing wells they have more than 15 times the daily requirements of the city of San Angelo for domestic and industrial purposes.
Barney Carter is one of Ranger's successful oil operators. In 1925 he discovered the Carter pool at Sand City near Ranger, but for the last six months or more has been working on the gas pipe line proposition from the Coleman fields to San Angelo.

The contract was awarded the Atek Construction company of Eastland.

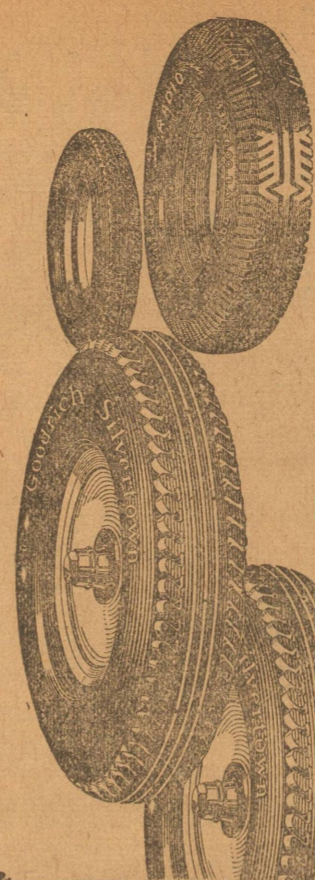

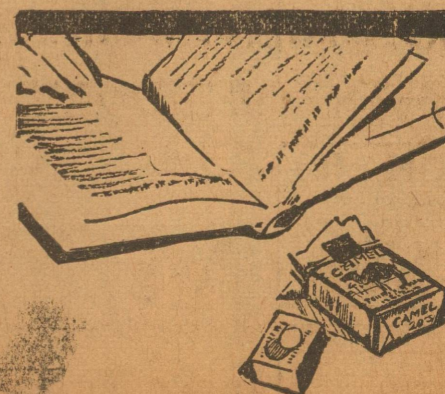
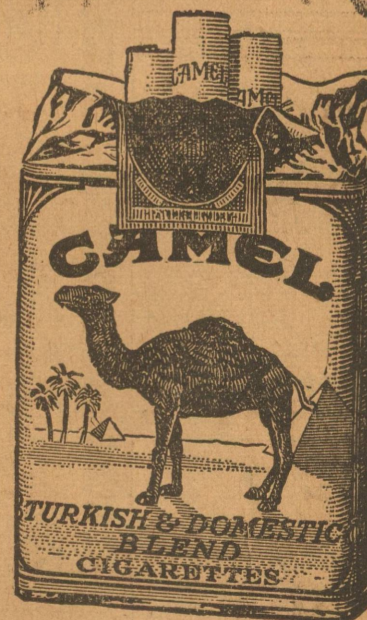

Cotton Yield To Be Greater Than Last Year's Crop
Eastland county, at the worst, will make more cotton than it made last year, according to County Agent J. C. Patterson, who recently made a partial survey of the crop along with other crops in the county.
To begin with, cotton, as a rule in the county, was a poor stand due to the dry weather prevailing at planting time, and the weevil, flea and grasshoppers have done more or less damage. Just at present, however, the insects have let up on their work. This, Mr. Patterson says, is due largely to the hot, dry weather.
Weather conditions during the next two or three weeks will have much to do with the amount of the cotton yield this fall. The old weevils are dead, but there are numerous grubs in the squares waiting to come out, but if the sun is too hot they will die before they have had an opportunity to do any damage.



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According to Mr. Patterson there is some cotton in the county that now has as much as one-half a bale to the acre on it. And if the weather continues favorable for two or three more weeks much of this will have matured.
There is an abundant feed crop in the county. Early plantings of feed plantings are doing nicely. This is particularly true of grain sorghums. The corn crop is extra good for this section. The peanut crop is fine.
Farmers generally over the county are still plowing. This is for the purpose of keeping the ground clean in order to furnish less protection to the insects that threaten the destruction of the crops.
There is not sufficient livestock, especially hogs, in the county to utilize the feed crop that is being harvested or will be harvested this fall, according to County Agent Patterson, who deplores the fact that more are not being shipped in.
On the whole, as Mr. Patterson sees it, the Eastland county farmer is in good financial condition, so far as this year's crop is concerned, and many of them are on the road to prosperity.

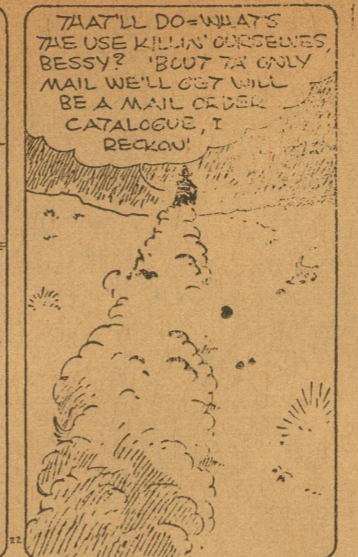

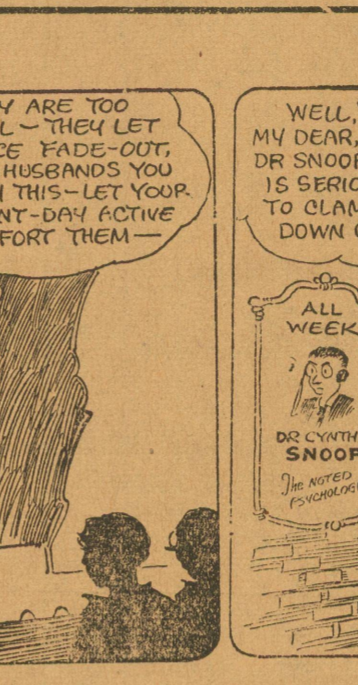
