Execution Throws World Into Turmoil

WHEAT FARMERS WARNED AGAINST BIG SURPLUS NEXT YEAR

FAVORABLE MARKET IS NOT SURE THING

Tendency Is Toward Increased Acreage Over Most Countries

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The world market situation for wheat next year may not be as favorable as hitherto for marketing the export surplus on account of large plantings in this country and certain foreign countries, the agricultural department said in a report today.
"The carry-over of old wheat next season may be larger than this season's carry-over, but there is a tendency to continue to expand the wheat area, not only in the U. S. but also in Canada, Argentina and Australia," declared the report which is being widely distributed as a warning to wheat farmers.
On the basis of reported intentions of farmers to plant as of August 1, and considering the ten year average abandonment, the department estimated a winter wheat crop of around 626,000,000 bushels. This crop and a spring wheat crop, the average five bushels per acre, would result in an export surplus of over 250,000,000 bushels, the largest since 1924, the report said.

FIVE HUNDRED FAMILIES ARE WATER BOUND

Huddled in Red Cross Relief Stations Along Levees Waiting for Low Water to Return to Their Homes.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 23.—Huddled together in a Red Cross relief station 500 families peered atop levees of Mississippi and Arkansas river in Desha county, waiting for flood waters to recede in order that they might again undertake the task of rebuilding where the waters occupied their homes.
Hundreds of others were being cared for by Red Cross workers. A total of 2,000 acres of land has been covered in this latest Arkansas disaster.

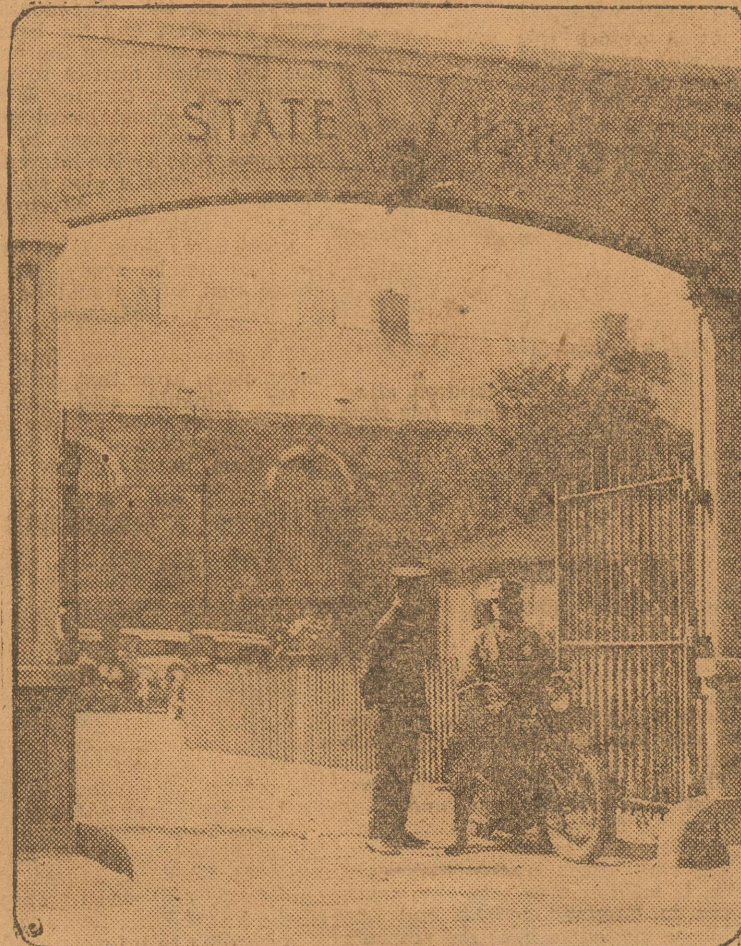
Eastland County Schools Given Classification

At a called session of the Eastland county school board, which met recently in Eastland, classification of the rural schools of the county were made as recommended by State School Superintendent S. M. N. Marts and were as follows:
One teacher schools were classed as elementary schools and may teach the first seven grades only.
All two-teacher schools were classed as elementary high schools and may teach the first seven grades, and in addition shall be eligible to teach the eighth grade. The ninth grade may also be taught provided the entire enrollment of the school is less than forty pupils.
Three teacher schools may teach the first seven grades and in addition may teach the eighth, ninth and tenth if the entire enrollment is fewer than sixty pupils.
All four teacher schools may teach the first seven grades and in addition may teach the first three years of high school work, and may teach the fourth year of high school work provided there are fewer than eighty pupils in the entire school and at least one grade is not offered. In other words a four teacher school is limited to ten grades.
Some variations to the above classifications may be allowed if the matter is first taken up with the county school superintendent and the county school board.
At the recent meeting of the school board, which was attended by all members, M. A. Hazzard was appointed trustee of the Union school, and F. S. Ponville was named trustee of the Salem school.

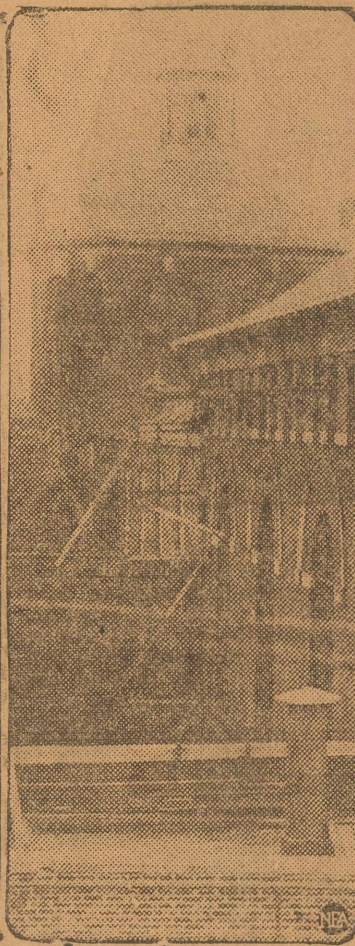
Sacco and Vanzetti and Their Death Place

Your Mind Must Be Made to Fit Your Business

WASHINGTON.—The war department tells one of the cavalry's favorite horse stories which, in case you haven't heard it, is about the rookie who was assigned to a horse as soon as he reached camp.
The rookie hastily explained that he had never ridden a horse in his life.
"That's all right," the sergeant said. "The horse has never been ridden in his life, either. The two of you can work it out together."
Just as the cavalry officers are horse-minded, so everyone engaged in aviation should be air-minded, to use a more or less new expression. It is often hoped here that the American people will also become air-minded, to the glory and benefit of aeronautics.
The National Aeronautic Association, for instance, is as air minded as the ordinary dog is flea-minded.
The N. A. A. first demonstrated its complete air-mindedness when it became a pioneer of the air mail service. There is no elevator in its three story building and time was when the weary postman had to climb up two flights of stairs with N. A. A. mail.
But that was a long time ago. The association rigged up a contraption by which it pulls up its mail box from the first floor, empties it and sends it back down. All the postman has to do is to ring a bell alongside the box. The thing is operated with pulleys, weights and ropes, but who can say it isn't air mail?
Diplomats, one discovers, are automobile-minded. Your correspondent cannot say offhand just what would happen to an ambassador who walked to another embassy to pay a call, but it probably would be something pretty horrible. A diplomat on foot is as rare as a male member of the House of David in a beauty contest.

FALL BUSINESS OUTLOOK GOOD SURVEY SHOWS

Prospect is for Higher Cotton Prices, Building Holds Up and Retailers Buying With Less Caution.

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 23.—Continued reports of deterioration of the Texas cotton crop have been accompanied by increased optimism in most other branches of industry, it was observed here today.
The crop reporting service of the Dallas Morning News reports added damage to the cotton crop in many sections of the state during the past 10 days. Hot weather in east Texas caused the bolls to open prematurely and the younger plants in most sections are badly infested with weevils. The west Texas crop is in fair shape.
However, the further deterioration of the crop promises to cause considerably higher cotton prices this fall than were anticipated a month ago. This has given impetus to a reign of optimism in all business centers of Texas.
The Dallas wholesalers association reports fall buying well advanced and considerably heavier than last year. The hundreds of merchants from all sections of the southwest who have visited local wholesalers during the past four weeks bought heavily and with less caution than they did last year when a heavy cotton yield resulted in low prices and a serious business slump.
Bank clearings continue to show substantial gains and an abundance of ready money is apparent. Bank clearings last week, in Dallas, were \$45,839,826.40. An increase of more than \$3,850,000.
Building permits are holding up with last year in most cities and several points anticipate increased building activity during September and October.
Local market experts expect the steady advance in cotton prices to continue. Although it may slump slightly next month, market observers believe the shortage in this year's crop will assure 20 cent cotton throughout the season. The present gains in the market have been excited some hopes for 25 cents cotton.
Another encouraging report comes from the Dallas Federal Reserve bank which states that the number of insolvencies during the past month was less than for the same month a year ago. This, together with other encouraging trends, gives promise to a successful business season, the bank assures.

FIRE DESTROYS LUMBER MILL NEAR NACOGDOCHES

Plant Fossils Of 10,000,000 Years Ago Collected

BRYAN, Tex., Aug. 23.—The climate in central Texas was about the same 10,000,000 years ago as it is now, only slightly warmer, according to the collection of fossils collected in this section by Dr. O. M. Ball, head of the biology department of Texas A. and M. college.
Fossils of the giant Sequoia trees, similar to those now growing in California, have been found in the business section of Bryan. Many fossils of palms and trees have been found in Brazos county which are similar to those grown in Mexico.
Dr. Ball is said to have the largest collection of fossil plants from the Jackson formation of any other man in Texas.

Governor Moody Asks Extradition Murder Suspect

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—Extradition of Eugenio Bianjuni, wanted for slaying Bascom County Deputy Sheriff J. T. Holloway, has been asked by Governor Moody.
Governor Moody made requisition through the United States department of state on the governor of Coahuila, Mexico.
Bianjuni is charged with the murder of Holloway in Frio county on July 23, 1924. He is alleged to be in Piedras Negras, Mexico, although not under arrest.
Bianjuni has been twice arrested in Mexico and twice escaped before the Texas authorities could get him. He was being carried to the border when he escaped.
Holloway's body later was found hidden in the brush near the road.

Survey of Texas Mineral Region Will Begin Sept. 1

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—Survey of the central mineral region of Texas will be started September 1 by W. S. Adkins, associate geologist of the bureau of economic geology at the University of Texas.
He will make a complete contour of the district, including Williamson, Travis, San Saba, Lampasas, Mason, Burnet and Llano counties. Principal object of the survey is to determine the amount of uplift there has been since cretaceous times. This has a direct bearing on oil possibilities, according to Adkins.
Adkins is to make investigation also of the "bend arch" which runs north from the central region through the Ranger and other oil fields.

JUDGE GARY'S WILL IS FILED FOR PROBATE

No Estimate Given as to Value of Estate but Specific Bequests Amount to More Than \$2,000,000.

MINEOLA, N. Y., Aug. 23.—The will of the late Elbert H. Gary, former chairman of the United States Steel corporation was filed for probate here today.
It contained no estimate of the value of the estate beyond the usual declaration that it amounted to more than \$10,000.
It contained specific bequests amounting to more than \$2,000,000. The will creates two trust funds of \$800,000 each for Mrs. Gertrude Gary Sutcliffe and Mrs. Bertha Gary Campbell, Gary's two daughters by his first marriage. The will was made October 24, 1925.

Search for Flyers Augmented by 16 Additional Ships

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The navy's search of the Pacific for the seven missing Hawaiian flyers was augmented today by 16 more ships—the light cruiser Omaha and 15 destroyers.
The intensive search of the Pacific lanes will be continued until darkness Thursday, at which time if no traces have been found of Miss Mildred Doran and the six aviators lost in three planes, all vessels will start returning to duties interrupted by the hunt.

WOULD FORCE PROOF IF COSMETICS ARE BANNED

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 23.—Demand that legislative bans on cosmetics and toilet preparations be backed by proof that they have deleterious effects when applied to the human body will be made at the National Hairdressers' association convention here, Aug. 27.
T. Paul Vitus, of Cleveland, counsel for the association, said today this move will be one of the most important topics to be brought up at the conference.
Three thousand delegates are expected in Cleveland from all sections of the country to attend the convention. President Charles W. Godefroy of St. Louis heads the general committee assisted by T. Paul Vitus and Miss Betty Butte, both of Cleveland.
Sept. 1 is the day set for the brilliant fashion show dance and banquet which will climax the meeting.

Riots, Bombs, Street Battles All Feature Red Activities

Many Points In America, Europe, South America Report Vendictive Moves by Radical Element All Believed to Be Staged by Sympathizers Of Sacco and Vanzetti.

CONVENTIONAL MURDER BECOMES WORLD ISSUE IN SEVEN YEARS

Both Sacco and Vanzetti Die Bravely, Sacco Proclaiming "Long Live Anarchy," and Vanzetti Protesting His Innocence. Triple Execution Is Dramatic But Methodical and Careful.

European people awoke today without learning from their morning papers that Sacco and Vanzetti had died in the electric chair, the hour of execution having come too late to catch even the last editions. An exception was the Daily Express of London, which held up its last edition for the first time in 19 years.

But the word soon spread and serious outbreaks were feared. United States embassies and consulates were under heavy guard. Demonstrations were held in many parts of Europe last night as final protests were lodged against the pending executions. The outbreaks were the most serious witnessed during the seven years of agitation for the liberation of the now dead anarchists.

At Geneva American delegates to the International Press conference narrowly escaped being stoned. Sympathizers hurled stones at the Kursaal and the Kursaal cafe in front of which the American delegates were seated, but only windows and dishes suffered.

The American garage back of the Kursaal was stormed and American automobiles in the streets were halted and wrecked. Movie houses showing American films were entered and the films seized and destroyed.

In Sydney, Australia, more than 10,000 sympathizers marched through the streets singing communist songs and carrying banners. They cheered and hooted as they passed the United States consulate.

Fearing violence, the Spanish government put a censorship on cabled dispatches from the United States telling of the execution. When word of the execution got abroad despite the censorship several persons were injured.

In Berlin the excitement reached at 12:11 a. m. A man of 36 years, fever heat as the hour of doom drew near. Thirty thousand workers gathered carrying placards bearing anti-American slogans.

At Buenos Aires about 1,000 persons were still on hand in front of newspaper bulletin boards when word came that Sacco and Vanzetti had been put to death. The crowd formed a parade, shouting and breaking windows of trolley cars as they marched. Police dispersed them.

Many were injured and 100 arrested at Halle, Germany, where thousands of communists clashed with police. Street fighting continued for four hours.

At Lyon, France, sympathizers attempted to boycott movie houses showing American films. Several persons were wounded at Göteborg, Denmark, when thousands of sympathizers were dispersed by police from in front of the American consulate.

There was heavy street fighting at Copenhagen in which several policemen were wounded.

At St. Nazaire, France, police and sympathizers engaged in a revolver fight but no one was injured. Twenty-five communists attacked the police station, shouting "vengeance for Sacco and Vanzetti."

At Mont Peller, France, two bombs were exploded today, one at the police station and another near the jail. Several policemen were injured and windows in neighboring houses were smashed.

The Sacco-Vanzetti case which dragged through the Massachusetts courts for seven years ended in the electric chair early today in just 24 minutes. Stole and with a flash of defiance, Nicola Sacco, the shoemaker, and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, the fish peddler went to their deaths protesting their innocence.

Celestino Madeiros, the youthful Portuguese, who had "confessed" to the crime so which they were convicted went with them, although he stood convicted on another crime. He, too, died a stoic.

A gray old prison was the scene of this closing chapter of the case that started as the conventional murder of a paymaster and his guard and ultimately became a world issue.

The triple execution was intensely dramatic, yet methodical, careful and not without dignity.

Madeiros, who played only a minor role in the drama, was stolid and resigned to the inevitable.

At 12:05 a. m. he entered the death chamber. He walked to the death chair led by two guards, and sat down to die.

The man believed by police to have been in sympathy with Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti was arrested while loitering in the neighborhood of the church. He protested innocence.

HEAVY GUARD MAINTAINED AT LEAGUE NATION'S BUILDING

Americans are among the delegates participating in the conference and the guard was posted to prevent Sacco-Vanzetti demonstrators from indulging in violence.

EXPECT BIG POULTRY EXHIBIT AT STATE FAIR

**Delinquents Are
Warned That Tax
Suits To Be Filed**

With a delinquent tax list that
totals thousands of dollars, the school
board of the Ranger independent
school district, just on the eve of the
1927-28 school term opening is fac-
ing a hard financial problem and the
city an equally hard one for carrying
out its proposed improvement proj-
ects.

According to city and school tax
collector E. A. Ringold, who with a
corps of assistants is busy working
on statements of delinquent taxes, a
list of which has already been pub-
lished in the Ranger Times, between
\$10,000 and \$12,000 in delinquent
taxes for the year 1926 are due the
schools and between \$20,000 and
\$25,000 the city.

"Schools will open on Sept. 12,"
Mr. Ringold said today. "Teachers
salaries and the necessary expenses in
carrying on the nine-month school
term will start and the board is de-
pending on collecting the back taxes
due the school district to pay these
expenses as they accrue. If all would
pay up the school board would not
have to borrow money to meet its
expenses, thus saving interest and the
city would have a nice sum towards
financing the many improvements it
wishes to make."

Right after Sept. 1, or as soon as
the lists can be ready, Mr. Ringold
advised that suits would be filed for
the collection of these delinquent
taxes. To the original amount will be
added attorney fees, interest and
court costs, after that date.

Mr. Ringold said that people
clamored for good schools and more
civic improvements but in order to
have them, taxes must be paid.

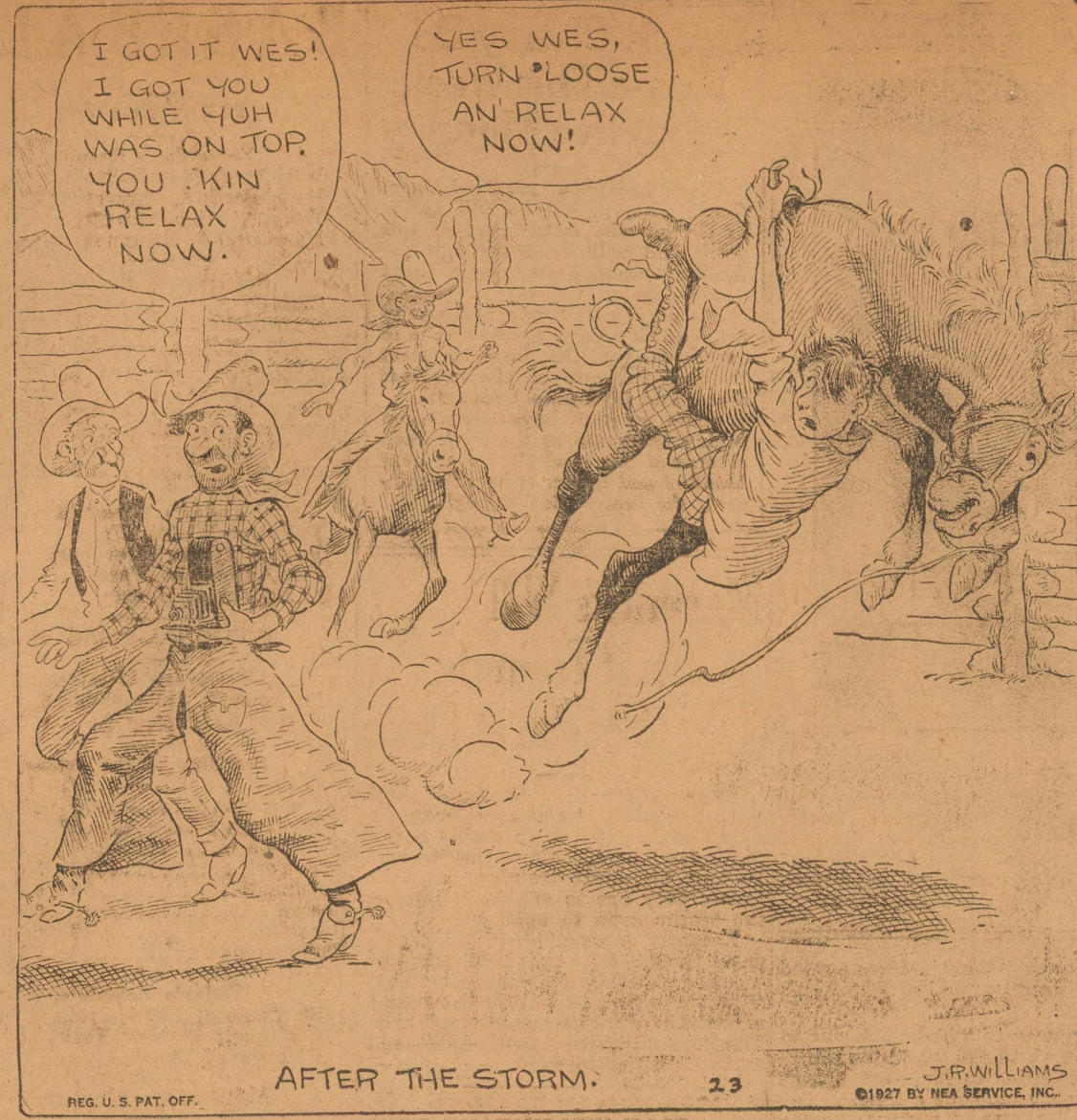

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 23.—Delegates from every state in the union and from foreign countries were assembled here today for the supreme lodge session which this morning opened the thirty-ninth annual convention of the Loyal Order of Moose.
The Quaker City has thrown wide its doors to welcome the 100,000 visitors brought here by the convention. Delegates from England, France, Germany, Hawaii, the Philippines and elsewhere were welcomed at the opening of the supreme lodge session in the Academy of Music in an address by Supreme Dictator Norman G. Heyd, of Toronto, head of the order.
The contingent from Wales was personally welcomed by James J. Davis, of Pittsburgh, secretary of labor. Davis is director-general of the fraternal order. He is by birth a Welshman, having come to the United States as a young boy.
Two blocks of Broad street near the academy have been transformed into a gayly decorated court of honor where the visiting bands will hold public concerts and drill teams will give exhibitions.
General welcome to the arriving Moose was given by Philadelphia lodge No. 54, which is not only the largest lodge in the order but is said to be the largest fraternal lodge in the world. A membership of nearly 50,000 is claimed by the lodge. The reception committee is headed by Albert H. Ladner, prominent politician here.

SMALL ARMY WILL GREET LINDY IN LITTLE FALLS

LITTLE FALLS, Minn., Aug. 23. When Lindy comes flying home Thursday, a small army of military, civic and private officers will form a guard of honor for this city's most famous son.
Two companies of regulars from the United States army, three companies from the national guard, a dozen detectives and the police of Little Falls will ride near the flier when he comes back to the place where he spent much of his boyhood, before his father represented this district in the house of representatives.
The streets through which Colonel Charles Lindbergh wandered as a boy are being garlanded with arches of laurel and evergreen. Hundreds of automobiles are being decorated for a parade such as this prairie town has never seen before.
Preparations are being made for thousands of out-of-town visitors. The high points of the celebration are to be a reception, where thousands of persons will hear Lindy's voice through the amplifiers at the fair grounds, and a banquet with plates for 1,000 persons.
Lindbergh will fly here in his famous plane "The Spirit of St. Louis," landing at a specially prepared landing field.

All Efforts Fail To Identify Dead San Marcos Man

SAN MARCOS, Aug. 23.—All efforts to identify the body of the middle aged man who was found dead in a local hotel August 12 have failed, although dozens of persons have viewed the body.
