## WOMAN ATTEMPTS TRANS-ATLANTIC HOP

### POPULATION OF WORLD WILL BE CONSIDERED

Distant Day When World Will Be Crowded to Overflowing Is Subject at Geneva Conference.

GENEVA, Aug. 31.—The day when the people of the earth will crowd it beyond the limit will be taken under consideration when the world population congress convenes in Geneva today.

With the governments of Italy, Japan and other countries already admittedly concerned over the possibilities of a distinguished meeting which opens its five day session under the direction of international leaders.

The date for the conference was fixed purposely just before the opening of the annual September assembly of the league of nations in order to impress upon the latter this importance of the problem the world is already facing.

It is hoped that as a result of the conference a permanent international organization can be created for carrying on the work which this problem presents.

According to statistics prepared for the conference, the human race in 300 years will number about 8,000,000,000 people which is estimated to be about the maximum limit that can be supported on the world's surface.

In the meantime the maximum density of existence and unemployment is expected to be constantly on the increase unless steps are taken to meet the situation.

The conference will be convened under the presidency of Sir Bernard Mallet, K. C. B. of London. It is composed largely of distinguished experts from all of the leading countries of the world such as Professor Calmette of France, Prof. J. S. Huxley of England, Prof. E. M. East of the United States, Prof. Eugene Fischer of Germany, Prof. Corrado Gini of Italy, Dr. K. Goldscheid of Austria, Dr. W. Kellian of Norway, Sir Geo. Knibbs of Australia, Dr. H. W. Methorst of Holland, Prof. W. Rappard of Switzerland, Prof. Silverstolpe of Sweden, Ex-Prime Minister Erisch of Finland, Francois Sokal of Poland, Dr. F. S. Netusil of Czechoslovakia, Dr. F. Belehrak of Estonia and many others.

The question of population will be taken up purely on a scientific basis, but from every possible point of approach. These include the differential birth rate; its results, especially in Holland and France; the biology of population growth; the maximum density of population; population and food supply; migration and its control; fertility and sterility in their relation to population; the work of race biological institutes.

Among special cases that will be studied is the rapidity with which the population of Japan is increasing despite earthquake losses, economic disturbances and other factors. Japan's birthrate of 960,000 for the past 12 months constituted a record, while the death rate of something over 300,000 left a net increase in the population of half a million.

On the other hand certain other countries such as New Zealand and France are showing exceptionally low figures of increase in population.

The European situation will be studied largely from the economic standpoint where in the period from 1910 to 1940 there will be a heavy increase in the working population that can only complicate the present status of unemployment. This increase for the period mentioned above is estimated by conference experts at 26 per cent for England and Switzerland and 18 per cent for Belgium.

Conference delegates will find some consolation, however, in the fact that if the birthrate in Europe today were the same that it was in 1875 the annual crop of babies would exceed by 2,500,000 the present figures. The laws governing this decrease in birth rate will be one of the special subjects of study by the conference.

### PANHANDLE CRUDE IS PASSING THROUGH RANGER 35,000 DAILY

The Gulf Pipe Line company is taking delivery from the Gulf and Magnolia ten-inch Panhandle line, receiving 35,000 barrels daily, enroute to the coast, according to information received today from the Magnolia district headquarters at Olden.

While this company, which is one of the largest in the county, is not doing a great deal of drilling at present, it reports that production is holding up good and everything is getting along all right in spite of the fact that it has recently drilled two dry holes, one the P-58 No. 4, in the shallow pool near Moran, which was dry at 740 feet and one in Coleman county near Coleman, J. P. Morris No. 18, dry at 3740 feet.

The same inertia that seems to be affecting everything just at the end of the season, is apparent in the oil circles also, as very few new locations are being announced. However, on Thursday, the owners of Hurdleston Fox No. 1 which came in a few weeks ago for 100 barrels, and is a north extension of the J. D. Parsons pool, are moving the rig from Fox No. 1 to Fox No. 2 to spud in. The discovery well which found the sand at 1600 feet is still making about 75 barrels a day. L. H. Flewellen, Ghent Sanderford of Ranger and Hurdleston of Fort Worth, are interested in the Fox lease.

Activity north of Ranger, in the Lacasa area is quite torpid at present. The well being drilled by the Texas Fidelity Oil corporation on the Lippe north of Lacasa, is dry at 3,815 but it is still drilling, according to reports from that section.

The Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company is going to clean out the Higginbotham No. 2, in the Gordon pool, which came in as a 12-barrel per hour oil well in hopes of increasing production which is now estimated at 175 barrels daily.

Dillon No. 1, of the same company, east of Cisco is drilling at 750 feet and the J. C. Swift No. 1 in the Carbon-McAllister pool, will be shot in a day or two. It has been drilled to 2995 feet.

### Truman H. Conner Visiting Brother At Eastland

Judge Truman H. Conner, chief justice of the second court of civil appeals at Fort Worth, with his wife is visiting his brother Judge Earl Conner of Eastland.

Judge Conner, many years ago, was district judge of the 42nd judicial district, which, at that time, included Eastland, Comanche, Shackelford, Callahan, Taylor, Stephens and Jones counties, having been appointed by Governor Sul Ross. He served 12 years in this capacity and only once in that time had an opponent for re-election.

In 1898 Judge Conner was elected to the second court of civil appeals and has served continuously in that position ever since, not one time having had an opponent for re-election. To date he has served approximately 40 years on the bench.

Recently a banquet was given in Fort Worth by the Tarrant county bar in honor of Judge Conner, and his long service on the bench. Present at this banquet were many of the most prominent men of Texas representing various walks of life.

### BANDIT KILLED IN FIGHT WITH KANSAS POLICE

Paroled Bank Robber And Last of Trio Wanted For Officer's Murder Meets Death in Wichita, Kans.

WICHITA, Kans., Aug. 31.—Porter Meeks, paroled bank robber of Cushing, Okla., and last member of a bandit trio, sought for the murder of officer Joseph Marshall, was killed this morning by Merl Colver, detective. Harold Burkholder, 14, was wounded in the leg by one of the bullets from the bandit's gun, when he led officers to the house, where he hid Meeks was hiding.

SENT UP FROM DALLAS  
DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 31.—Porter Meeks, bandit, killed at Wichita, Kans., today was convicted in Dallas three years ago of holding up a gambling game in a downtown hotel and escaping with \$10,000.

He was paroled by Governor Ferguson, after serving a short term in the state penitentiary.

### County Swelters In Hottest Weather of Entire Season

Eastland county, like the rest of Texas is still in the throes of high summer temperatures. At noon today in the shade, down town a thermometer in Ranger stood at 102 degrees, however, that was lower than it stood Tuesday when according to one report it stood at 107 and was said to be the hottest day of the summer.

Oglesby has a theft sentence from Stephens county.

Elmer Eganell was given a 30-day furlough to attend his child's operation at Breckenridge. He has a forgery sentence from Stephens county.

Ranger police when asked about Ernest Oglesby said they knew nothing about the man.

### Americans Are Reported Safe At Amparo Mine

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—The 18 Americans reported barricaded by labor radicals at the American Amparo mines at Etzadlan, Mexico, last week, are safe according to information received by the American consul at Guadalajara and transmitted to the state department today.

Mexican troops are in the vicinity of the mines, according to the indirect reports received by the consul.

### San Angelo Lad In Accident; Loses Leg Both Arms Broken

SAN ANGELO, Aug. 31.—Billie Holland, 9, was in a critical condition at a local hospital here today from injuries received when he was caught in the fly wheel of a gas engine.

His left leg was so badly mangled it had to be amputated and both arms were broken.

### Four Persons Are Hurt When Struck By Interurban

DALLAS, Aug. 31.—Four persons were seriously injured near Arlington near here today when their automobile was struck by a Fort Worth interurban. All the injured were from Dallas and were taken to Fort Worth hospitals.

The injured are: Jack Werb, driver of the car; Mrs. L. E. Johnston, 76; M. A. Lawrence, and Coress Goldsberry.

### STATE BRIEFS

DALLAS, Aug. 31.—Deputy Sheriff Jack Nalsan has chased fugitives by automobile and on foot but when it became necessary to swim after one, he was equal to the occasion.

In a liquor raid on an island in Roxana Cliff Lake, near Carrollton, a man was seen to escape the island and start swimming toward the mainland. Nelson plunged in and swam after him, overtaking him a short distance.

BRYAN, Aug. 31.—An electric sign for every business firm is being urged here to give Bryan a white way.

Bryan was recently rated the eleventh best lighted city in the United States under 10,000 population, but local merchants are bent on having a Broadway all their own.

The city owns its own public utility and no charge is made for street lights.

AUSTIN, Aug. 31.—Decision of the United States congress that income tax returns shall no longer be open to the public will not prevent the state tax survey committee attempting to find out what Texans paid the federal government.

Questionnaires sent out to persons, firms, partnerships and corporations call for the taxes paid the federal, state, county, municipal and district governments in 1924, 1925 and 1926. The letterheads of the committee cite the provision of the resolution creating the committee giving them power to enforce the divulging of information.

Status of the committee has been attacked in an injunction suit filed by Representative A. H. King of Throckmorton to enjoin the state comptroller from issuing warrants to pay members of the committee. This injunction is set down for hearing this week.

GAINESVILLE, Aug. 31.—Catholics from all parts of Texas will gather in Muenster, 16 miles west of here September 6, 7 and 8, for the annual meeting of the Staatsverband of Texas, the union of individual Catholic societies of men and women of the state. Five hundred delegates are expected to attend.

The principal feature will be the Katholikentag, a public meeting to be held on the afternoon of September 7, when Rev. A. J. Muench, D. S. Sec. of St. Francis, Wis., will be the principal speaker.

## PRINCESS 63 YEARS OLD TRYING LUCK

### Monoplane St. Raphael Bears Princess From England To Ottawa

UTAVON, England, Aug. 31.—Carrying the 63-year-old Princess Lowenstein-Wertheim as a passenger, Captain Leslie Hamilton and Colonel F. F. Minschin took off at 7:31 a. m. today in their Fokker monoplane St. Raphael on a non-stop flight to Ottawa, Canada.

The take-off was accomplished with much difficulty, an easy wind preventing the plane from starting from the place that had been selected. It was necessary to taxi the plane about the field for three-quarters of an hour before its wheels finally left the ground and the plane rose slowly.

The plane narrowly missed hitting the roof of one of the buildings at the east end of the airfield. Gradually it gained height, turned west and disappeared in the mist in the direction of Bath and Bristol.

The princess, who is the first woman to attempt an air passage to the Atlantic, has long been an aviation enthusiast.

If successful the British aviator will receive three distinctions: No. 1—They will be the first to make the westward flight across the Atlantic. No. 2—The first to carry a passenger from Europe to America. No. 3—The first of the Atlantic flights either direction to include a woman.

### Sheep Herder Taken To Santa Fe Jail Today

TAOS, N. M., Aug. 31.—Fear of mob violence prompted police here today to plan the removal of Jose Cruz, sheep herder, who pleaded guilty late yesterday in justice court to the murder of Prof. R. P. DeWiss, 30, Dallas, and the shooting of Henry Moburg, also of Dallas, to the Santa Fe jail.

Cruz shot and killed DeWiss Sunday and fired on Moburg in order to kidnap Mrs. DeWiss, he said in justice court.

Mrs. DeWiss escaped while Moburg was grappling with the sheep herder after her husband had been shot.

### Childress Wants 3 Men Arrested At Ballinger Today

CHILDRESS, Aug. 31.—Herbert Bailey and two companions wanted in connection with the investigation of a bank robbery at Dodsonville, Texas, were arrested at Ballinger, Texas, today.

Bailey and his companions are wanted at Hollis and Childress on theft charges.

**UNITED EFFORT.**  
 We have not heard another word about the proposed Eastland County Chamber of Commerce, organization of which was suggested recently by Editor Cockrell of the Gorman Progress. We don't know who should feel called upon to take the lead in a movement of this kind, but some public-spirited citizen who has the interest of the entire county at heart should do so and do so at once.  
 A county-wide chamber of commerce should not interfere in the least with the functions of the various chambers already organized and functioning in the county like those at Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, Gorman and other places. The county-wide chamber should be organized with a separate function in view and should work with and not against local chambers of commerce.  
 It strikes us that a county organization could and should do a great deal in interesting outside people in the agricultural possibilities of Eastland county. There are many thousands of acres of very rich farming lands in Eastland county that have never been touched with the plow. This county is unusually well adapted to poultry and dairy farming, yet these branches of agriculture have been developed only to a limited degree at any point in the county.  
 An organization of this kind could go a considerable way in encouraging intensive farming in this county. We are informed that there is only a very small percentage of the farms in this county where the farmers raise their own meat and produce their own milk and butter. No community can expect to show any great amount of progress in agricultural lines so long as a condition of this kind exists. That is or at least should be one of the primary objects on any farm. It certainly is one of the most certain means of reducing the high cost of living on the farm and this high cost of living on the farm is one of the greatest drawbacks to farm life.  
 Eastland county is well adapted to the growing of fruits and vegetables, yet comparatively little of these are produced in the county and the small surplus that is produced nearly always goes to waste because there are no methods of caring for more than the mere demands of the county. Eastland county sends out literally thousands upon thousands of dollars every year for fruits and vegetables that could be produced right here at home. The people of the county send out many more thousands of dollars every year for meats that should be produced right here on the farms of Eastland county.  
 It occurs to us that a county Chamber of Commerce should be organized with the farmers and land owners of the county as contributing members to its support. In this way the farming communities of the county could be made to realize some actual benefits from the organization.  
 Farmers in other parts of the world that are digging out an existence on poor farm lands would be glad of the opportunity to farm some of the rich farm lands of this county if they only know of the opportunities and possibilities that awaited them here. They can be advised of these through a well organized and well managed county Chamber of Commerce and their coming in here will materially increase the value of every acre of farm land in Eastland county.

Captain Phillips was an end of great ability and his experience and football knowledge would have greatly enhanced the chances for a championship this year.

The loss of these three strong men will not only give both Cisco and Abilene an advantage but will make it harder on the boys who are left on the team, still there is a possibility of their emerging somewhere near the top, for there is a good bunch of boys left and a pair of good coaches, and with lots of work and patient coaching they will make it hard on someone to win even if they don't win themselves.

of the best seasons of his career. The job of center will go either to Bohannon or Blackmon, both are working hard for the regular place. An interesting battle will be the one staged between Clyde Peppers, Gilbert Cook and Thurman Hinman for the tackle position vacated by Whitehall when he goes to end. It is a fairly certain fact that Garland Hinman has a cinch on his tackle unless he gets hurt.

Bryon Reeves will in all probability be the selection for first string quarterback. "Cotton" as he is called, did not have much chance to show his stuff last year because he had a crippled knee all season, and then, too, remember that our old friend Buster Mills was in there doing the good work.

# BULLDOGS LOOK BEST TO CISCO SPORTS SCRIBE

### Chances of Various Football Teams in Oil Belt Outlined, Writer Says Cherry's Ranger Team Looks Best.

A sports writer on the Cisco Daily News, giving a paper summation of the relative strength of the various football teams in the oil belt, states that at this stage Ranger appears to be the best bet for the championship and that Ranger, Abilene and Cisco loom largest in the race for the district title. The writer says:

"The Bulldogs will build around Hinman and Whitehall, both veteran and brilliant tacklers of last season and Captain Taylor, powerful fullback, who is easily the most outstanding backfield man returning from last year's oil belt teams. Taylor was mighty hard to stop last year and with the added experience he gained while attending Knute Rockne's Notre Dame coaching school this summer, Taylor gives promise of eclipsing the brilliant record hung up last year by his teammate, Buster Mills. Much new material is expected to join Coach Blair Cherry's team and the Bulldogs now promise to be the heaviest team on the oil belt gridiron.

"Abilene, building around Gibson Sellers, Captain Smith and Quarterback Wolters, will likely have one of the best backfields in this section of the state. Berger at tackle is another veteran from last year's campaign, being counted upon to help bring home the fresh pork. Much new material is reported to have drifted Abileneward this season, and the Eagles will likely have a team almost as heavy as Ranger. Coach Dewey Mayhew comes to Abilene fresh from winning the state class B championship with the Marlin Bulldogs; whether he can do the same his first year in class A football is a mooted question in these parts. In fact, opponents of the Eagles are pinning their hopes of beating Abilene on the fact that it usually takes a coach more than one season to get a line on his material and get his system working properly; but they realize that Mayhew may be an exception and are not counting any games before they are played.

"Cisco Situation.  
"The Cisco team for 1927 is a question mark. Six veterans, headed by Captain Bill Smith, center, are back for this season's work. Eddle-

man, fullback, appears to be a most promising backfield man, while there are several halves of promise. Coach Chapman's greatest problem in the backfield is that of developing a quarterback to replace the sensational Meadows of last year, while his line problem is that of obtaining a sturdy tackle to balance the other side of the line from big Wilbur Brian, who will be a new man this year. Little, sensational halfback with Stephenville last year, has joined the Big Dam Lobos, while Jenkins, a veteran end from the Leonard high school team, is another newcomer. As a whole, the Lobo eleven will be much lighter than that of last year and far below the average sized team Chapman has put out in the past. But Chapman has made this statement: "Give me one good tackle and I'll not worry over our prospects for this year."

"Breckenridge is considered a dark horse this season. Shotwell, who coached a state championship team while at Abilene, is beginning his first year with the Buckaroos. He will face the same problem as Mayhew at Abilene, that of being a new man at the school and not as familiar with his material as other coaches will be with theirs. However, Shotwell has the advantage of having been identified with oil belt football for years and he knows the style of play he will have to provide a defense for. He will build his eleven around Captain Granberry, an end; Bert Harrison, fullback, and Nestor Zarafonitis, halfback. Zarafonitis, by the way, is the third of three brothers to star with a Breckenridge high team. All of this material would be welcomed by any other coach in the district, and Shotwell is being watched closely for signs of producing a real dark horse contender.

"Mavericks to Be Fast.  
"Eastland, with Dave Pena beginning his second year as coach, may prove troublesome, with some sport fans predicting the Mavericks will go fartoward the district championship. The team will be light, on the average, but with the fastest backfield in the circuit. It is said there are 12 or 13 10-second men seeking backfield berths. The team will be led by Captain Jimmy King, one of the best tacklers in the district last season. Jimmy Matthews, 190-pound tackle of 1925, returns to the gridiron after a year's absence, during which he acquired a wife. "Old Man Matthews" is already being referred to as a contender for all-district honors at tackle along with Hinman of Ranger."

### Committee Texas Cotton Men Meet To Study Plans

The committee is investigating plans for perfecting a permanent organization to develop the advantages of production, marketing and manufacturing of cotton.  
Members of the committee attending today's meeting included: John T. Orr, president of the Texas Farm Bureau cotton association; Victor H. Schoffelmayer, agricultural editor of the Dallas News; H. S. Stafford, president of the Texas cotton association; C. H. Alvord, director of the extension service, Texas A. and M. college; J. O. Morgan, agronomist of the school of agriculture, Texas A. and M.; C. R. Miller, Dallas, president of the Cotton Manufacturers association; and A. B. Conner, director of the Texas Agricultural experiment stations.

### Hunters Getting Ready for Dove Season Tomorrow

The season for hunting mourning doves in this section of Texas opens September 1 and closes October 31st and many sportsmen are getting ready for the opening.  
Under the law not more than 15 doves may be killed in any one day, nor more than 45 in one week. No game bird or animal is permitted to be bought, sold or bartered. The hunting season of game birds or animals is prohibited from airplanes, motor boats, sail boats, automobiles, boats under tow. Hunting by the aid of lights or lanterns of any kind at night is also prohibited.  
County clerk, R. L. Jones, states that his office has just received a supply of hunting license. License for hunting anywhere in the state sell for \$2. No license is required for hunting in the county of one's residence.

### Gasoline Station Robbed, Officers Think Have Clews

Thieves Tuesday night broke the locks on the gasoline tanks and oil containers at the Pennant Filling Station in Eastland and stole a large quantity of gasoline and lubricating oil. Apparently the gasoline was poured into cars and trucks.  
Miss Cora Montgomery, proprietor of the station, is confined at the Eastland sanitarium where she underwent an operation for appendicitis last Friday, and the station was in charge of an employee.  
Evidence, which, it is believed, will lead to the identity of the thieves, was found about the station this morning when the robbery was discovered.
