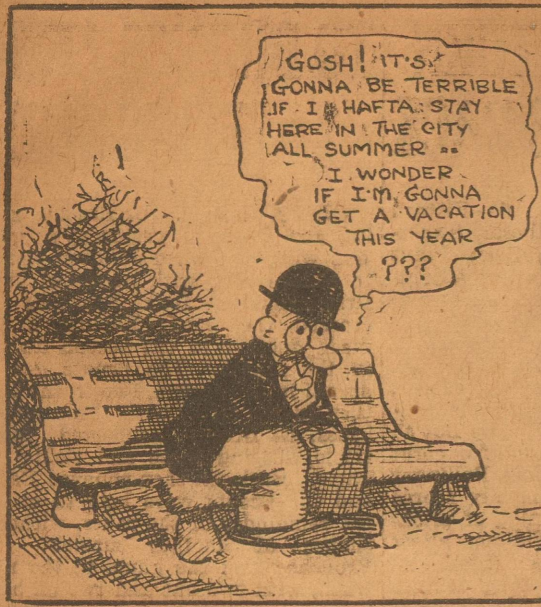

GOV'T OFFERS VACATION TO BOYS 16 TO 25

The United States government is offering boys over sixteen and under twenty-five years of age a month's vacation with all expenses paid, according to announcement coming to the Chamber of Commerce. The time will be spent at Camp Travis doing "squads right." The government will establish a summer training camp at Camp Travis from July 15 to August 14 and will take all applicants who can qualify. The announcement states that all expenses including transportation will be paid. Boys between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years will have to secure the written consent of their parents before they can qualify for the training. Those who are interested may secure further information from the Chamber of Commerce.

BRITAIN FOR WORLD PEACE: WAITS SUGGESTIONS OF U. S. LONDON, June 5.—It is stated in official circles here that Great Britain has not received the "informal feelers" reported from Washington with reference to an international agreement for the reduction of armaments. The British government, however, it is said, would heartily sympathize with any movement for furthering of world peace and would welcome suggestions from the United States to that end.

CUBA'S TOBACCO INDUSTRY HARD HIT

HAVANA, June 6.—Cuban tobacco planters say that the suspension by Great Britain of its extra 50 per cent tax on tobacco imports will give little help in the present crisis faced by the Cuban tobacco industry. In a recent meeting of planters it was stated that the British dealers had stocked up heavily and would require little tobacco for some time. The planters also stated that their efforts to induce the tobacco workers' federations to accept reduced wage scales, so that Cuban tobacco could be put on the market at reduced prices had resulted in so slight a reduction of wages that it was considered useless.

PARIS JEWELERS SCOFF AT MANUFACTURE OF ARTIFICIAL PEARLS

PARIS, June 6.—The fashionable jewelers of the Rue de la Paix are smiling over a report from London that a Japanese pearl expert had discovered a cultivating process to produce pearls which could not be distinguished from genuine Oriental pearls and which consequently had the same value. "In the whole history of the world," says Jacques Cartier, a prominent jewel merchant, "no one has ever succeeded in artificially producing precious stones. Man has never been able to imitate the processes of nature." The pearl, said M. Cartier, is particularly difficult to imitate and anyone could distinguish an Oriental pearl from the imitation. The real pearl is composed of many concentric skins, as an onion. Held up in natural light the center shows darkest, with the transparency increasing in perfect gradation toward the exterior.

THREE CLOSE TO DEATH WHEN AUTOS COLLIDE

Death was near to L. W. MacDonald and two male companions last night when the car in which they were riding crashed into a second machine standing in the road without its lights burning or anyone in attendance, and turned over. MacDonald is the only one of the three seriously hurt. He is in the Clinical hospital with several bad cuts on his head and shoulders caused by him plunging through the windshield of the car. The accident happened three miles west of Ranger on the Eastland road. MacDonald said this morning that the abandoned car was standing in front of a house. The driver of his machine was going at a high rate of speed and when he saw the obstructing car he tried to turn out of the road with the result that he side-swiped the second car. His two companions, he said, escaped without injury. They carried him into the house and a doctor was summoned, who later sent him to the hospital. The car in which the injured man was riding is badly wrecked.

EASTLAND BEATEN BY CADDO IN FAST GAME

CADDO, Texas, June 5.—Caddo defeated Eastland here today in the fastest game of the season, 3 to 2. His were held to a minimum for both teams, Caddo getting 5 and Eastland 4. The winning run was brought in in the ninth when Caddo stole home on a wild pitch. One error was chalked up against each team. Batteries were: For Caddo, Deputy and Tierce, pitchers, and Vaughn and McConnel behind the bat. For Eastland, Fairborn and Amos. Of eight games played this season, Caddo has won 15 and beat Ivan Friday afternoon, 5 to 1.

DENZEL CHESTER, SAID TO HAVE SLAIN SOCIETY GIRL IS ACQUITTED

KANSAS CITY, June 4.—A jury of eleven men acquitted Denzel Chester in 20 minutes here today of a charge of first degree murder in connection with the killing of Miss Florence Barton October 2, 1920. Miss Barton was fatally wounded as she sat in a motor car with her fiancé, Howard Winter, on a country road south of Kansas City one moonlight night last fall. Winter, who was wounded, said that three men in a motor car drove up and one of them got out and fired the shot that killed Miss Barton. Chester was charged with being that man.
