Man Slays Wife and Self In Disease Grips Pueblo; Known Dead 35 Breckenridge Restaurant

BRECKENRIDGE, June 6.-A murder and suicide was committed this morning at 9:15 in the Browning cafe in the business district in the presence of many customers. Without warning and without knowledge of what she had wone, Mrs. O. M. Huffman, a bride of sixteen days, was shot to death by her husband, O. M. Huffman, as she entered the cafe and he then turned the gun on himself. Family trouble is thought to have instigated the action of the man. Five children, two of whom were of a former marriage of the woman and three by a former marriage of Huffman, are left in Breceknridge. The dead man was one of the partners of the Browning cafe. The other partner is F. E. Gourney. Huffman was about 40 years old and his wife about 30

years of age.
Wife Just Returned. She had been to Fort Worth on a visit, it is said, and when she returned home this morning the shooting followed. Only one bullet was fired for each death. The death missile that ended the life of the woman entered her body through her mouth and tore its way through her head and out at the back of her neck.

Huffman fired one bullet into his body just below the heart and died on the way to the hospital.


