# Will Hold Ferguson To Wager; 'Ma' Must Resign From Race

By United Press

DALLAS, July 24.—Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson tonight faced the threat of possible elimination in the first state primary with the reiteration of her campaign prediction that she would retain her office by a majority vote in today's election. In a statement given the United Press from Austin Ferguson, speaking for his wife, declared he had nothing to say "other than that my wife will win by a majority, as predicted in her speech of July 15."

Ferguson indicated no further statement would be forth-

coming tonight on a basis of available returns.

Holding a majority lead over four other gubernatorial entries Moody declared he was confident he would oust the woman governor and avoid the necessity of a second primary. He told the United Press in the event of his election he would insist on the governor living up to the letter of her challenge and resigning from office as soon as his election is determined. 2 BANDI Governor Ferguson, in her opening campaign speech, gave

Moody 25,000 to 1 odds on her election, offering to resign in the event "he polled a single more vote than she did."

Moody in turn was to vacate his office if he trailed the woman governor by 25,000 votes or more. Moody accepted the

Lynch Davidson's headquarters said tonight Lynch would "sit tight in the boat" until the vote was recorded entirely.

# Results From 206 Counties In Texas Show These Totals

By TEXAS ELECTION BUREAU DALLAS, July 24.—Whether Governor Miriam A. Ferguson and Dan Moody would enter the run-off primary in August or whether Moody would have a clean majority on the final count was in doubt when the Texas Election bureau suspended tabulation at 1:30 o'clock Sunday morning. After holding a substantial lead over all five opponents, Moody's majority had disappeared. The returns from 206 out of 252 counties in the state, including nine complete, showed the following totals for candidates in Saturday's primary election:

In a majority of the races for county offices it will take the final count to tell the results. The vote was unusually heavy at all precincts, with candidates and their friends not letting up in the work until the polls were closed.

In the governor's race, Moody maintained his early lead and as the count progressed increased it over both of his leading opponents, Ferguson and Lynch Davidson.

In several of the county races there was a number of upsets, and a second primary will be needed to decide several of the races in which there were more than two candidates.

The greatest interest was manifested in the contest for county judge between Oscar Chastain and the present incumbent, Judge Ed S. Pritchard, and at midnight last night not more than 200 votes separated the two men. Pritchard had a slight lead over Chastain. Th two men fought to the last ditch on the hustings.

In the the sheriff's race it appeared as if Hart had the present incumbent beaten for more than 200 votes. This race was an upset to the talent. Early indications were that Edwards would be the winner, and unless there is a great change in the count, Hart will be the next sheriff.

In the county attorney's race, Sparks is in the lead, with Lawrence second and Shropshire third. It will take a second primary to decide the winner.

For county clerk, Woods had a plurality of votes, with Jones second and Irwin a poor third. In the county treasurer's race, it looks as Sue and Cooper

will have to run over. These two are in the lead with neither having any chance of getting a majority. The vote generally over the county was lighter than two years ago, according to the records kept by this paper.

In the tax assessor's race, it is Bryant and Herrington, with no chance for Collins. In this race, whoever Collins's friends flock to, he will be the winner.

For congressman, Tom Blanton had his opponent beat 40 city blocks. The Abilene man it appears will win in a walk in the district.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 24—Russell Scott, under sentence to hang for the nurder of Joseph Maurer, in a drug store hold up, today saw fresh hopes of escaping the gallows through the confession of his brother Robert, that ie, Robert, fired the fatal shot. Robert's confession stated that Russell had nothing to do with the murder except to help his brother escape. Robert's confession came as a startling climax to one of the strangest murder cases in Chicago. Robert recently pleaded guilty to the murder, but swore from the witness stand that he did not fire the shot which sent Maurer to meet his death.

MORE HOGS ARE NEEDED. Prospects are the brightest they

have been in Texas for 25 years for the harvest of bumper feed crops, corn and sorghum grains. The question of what to do with the heavy crop of feedstuff can be easily an swered and should be carried out. The farmers of Texas, and especially those of Eastland county should plant more hogs. They should feed more cattle. The world needs hogs. Despite the drop in other farm products, the price of hogs still hovers around \$12.50 to \$14 a hundred pounds on the Fort Worth market The farmers of Eastland county should market their sorghum grains and corn on the hoof. They are insured large supplies, and if marketed on the hoof, they can return to the soil that produced the bumper crops fertilization through the manure derived from the animals fed.

Not only does the world need hogs but fat muttons always bring a good price, and generally the supply is inadequate to meet the demand. Wethers are selling around \$8 a hundred and lambs from \$10 a hundred pounds up. These prices were for the average run usually received.

have a market right at their door. They can leave their farms early in the morning and reach the Fort Worth market with their trucks loaded with hogs, sheep or fat calves in time for the sales that day and get back home early in the evening.

There is very little danger of the price of hogs dropping to any appreciable degree. Business surveys made by such banks as the National Bank of Commerce in New York re veal that industries generally are active, and that despite summer dullness, the steel industry shows little signs of much of a let-up.

The steel industry is considered the barometer of the business world. The machine tool industry, according to that review, is good. The automobile industry is holding up fairly well despite the fact that preparations for new models and other seasonal ad-

The railroads are improving their facilities to handle a large autumn business. Money rates range from 334 to 41/2 per cent for commercial paper in the east. Ninety-day acceptances range lower than that. This speaks volumes for the healthfulness of business.

The farmers of Eastland and other counties in the oil belt, and in West Texas can derive enough profit from marketing their surplus sorghum grain and corn crops on the hoof to make their cotton and other crops clear money to be banked.

The industrial workers in the east must be fed. Texas must feed them, and the farmers of Texas should do the feeding. The farmer who raises his own meat, meal and other supplies can ride in autos without going ty. into debt for them.

Hogs and poultry are known to be mortgage lifters and children of Mother Prosperity and Old Man Di-

versification. In addition to raising more hogs, the farmers can raise more turkeys, more chickens, and at the same time feed a few head of dairy and beef cattle. The farmer who markets his surplus grain crops on the hoof derives profits from two sources. This is especially noted in hogs and sheep. When you sell hogs fed on kaffir, milo and other sorghum grains along with a little corn, which is unnecessary, he is getting from \$12 to \$14 a hundred pounds for it, and at the same time can use the fertilizers derived in eriching his land that is used for the production of cotton and
